It's a safe subject. I mean that literally...for once I'm on a safe topic!

A few weeks ago the driver of a freight company truck delivered some supplies to us. He needed to call in, and wanted to know the best way back to Texarkana. In the process of getting these two things accomplished he noticed our big old safe, manufactured by Cary Safe Co.

That set him to talking about when he used to be a locksmith. This man proceeded to tell me that our safe was more for fire safety than anything...it was designed for businesses that didn't keep a lot of cash on hand.

That certainly fit us, I said, and told him about the smaller safe at the Bogata Office, which has a little picture of trees and a river painted on it.

The man wanted to buy it...I wouldn't sell.

So, he began to talk about all the different kinds of safes...and boy, have times changed!

The first thing people used to do during a burglary (if they were very stupid), he explained, was to try and knock the hinges off of a safe. Apparently they thought that the door would then just fall out. Of course, with the big steel rods that lock it, the door stayed firmly shut.

Slightly smarter folks used to try and knock off the combination dial and then punch through the locking mechanism to get the door open. That could be pretty interesting too.

According to this fellow, several safe companies used to put little glass vials inside next to the mechanism.

When a would-be burglar punched through it shattered the vials and tear gas came pouring out!

The board voted to give approval of purchase of a new reel mower.



1-7 oz. pkg. seasoned stuffing mix
1-10 3/4 oz. can cream of chicken soup
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/3 cup milk
2 cups diced chicken
2 ribs celery, chopped
1 cup English peas
1/2 teaspoon thyme leaves, crushed
1 cup shredded American cheese

Heat water and butter to boiling. Pour over stuffing mix and toss to mix well. Pat 1/2 of mixture into 12x18" baking dish.

Mix soup, mayonnaise, milk, chicken, celery and peas and thyme well. Spoon evenly over stuffing mixture. Top with remaining stuffing mixture. Bake at 400 for 30 minutes. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake 5 minutes more or until cheese is melted.

Jeremy Belyeu booted the extra point over to make it 7-0.




