**Talco-Bogata CISD Sets School Board Election**

The Talco-Bogata CISD Board of Trustees met Tuesday, Jan. 12 at 7:00 p.m.

The first item of business was to present an appreciation plaque to Kip Stansell who resigned in August after filling one three term.

Next the board approved the minutes of the previous meeting, approved the financial report, approved the cafeteria report, the tax report and voted to pay bills.

A school board election was called for May 1, 1993. Three positions will be open: Position Number 2, from Talco currently by appointee Sandra Ingram. This position will have two remaining years. Number 3 position from Talco will be available. This is

a three year term currently held by Eddie Brown; Position Number 6 from Bogata will be a three year term and is currently held by Buford Herevey.

Interested persons may file between the dates of February 16 until March 17 of 1993.

The board discussed and changed the regular board meetings to the third Monday of each month, starting February the 15th.

They scheduled a sweetheart banquet prior to February meeting.

The board discussed handling of delinquent taxes on personal property. They will continue the current collection policies.

The board discussed various ways

of reducing the budget in coming years due to pending legislation which will make less school funding available.

They heard a report from the architect who discussed and presented proposed blueprints on Bogata Campus work. The board accepted this with minor changes.

The budget was amended to accommodate the construction on Bogata campus.

They then went into executive session to evaluate the superintendent.

After they came out of executive they renewed his contract until June 30, 1996.

Meeting was adjourned.

**Local School System Helps Establish National Repository**

The Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. was one of 542 school districts providing information to the National Research Center on the Gifted and Talented. Each district provided information on both local and standardized identification and evaluation instruments and the process in which they are used. The National Research Center on the Gifted and Talented at the University of Virginia used this information to establish the National Repository for Instruments and Strategies Used in the Identification and Evaluation of Gifted Students and Programs. In addition to information on local uses of instruments and procedures, the fourteen databases at the National Repository contain abstracts covering all available literature on gifted education

practices, information on reliability and validity of instruments, and information describing both published and unpublished instruments. Of particular importance are the instruments which show potential for identifying students from underserved populations. The Repository provides teachers and administrators a wide variety of information regarding assessment and evaluation.

The National Research Center on the Gifted and Talented was established in response to a requirement in the Jacob K. Javits Gifted and Talented Students Education Act of 1988, and is administered by the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Educational Research and Improvement. The purpose of the Act is to provide financial assistance to state

and local educational agencies, institutions of higher education, and other public and private agencies and organizations. These grants are used for program development, demonstration projects, personnel training and similar activities. The goal is to build a nationwide capability in elementary and secondary schools to identify and meet the special educational needs of gifted and talented students. Other activities at the National Research Center at the University of Virginia include studies focusing on the social and emotional needs of gifted students, the effects of various program options, training pre-service teachers in curriculum differentiation for the gifted and reliability and validity studies of non-traditional identification instruments.

**Immunization Clinic Scheduled**

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at the Texas Department of Health, 1014 N. Jefferson, Mt. Pleasant.

Clinic hours will be from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Parents may call the clinic for an appointment for their child, (903)572-9877, or arrive on a walk-in basis.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guidelines, beginning at two months of

age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.

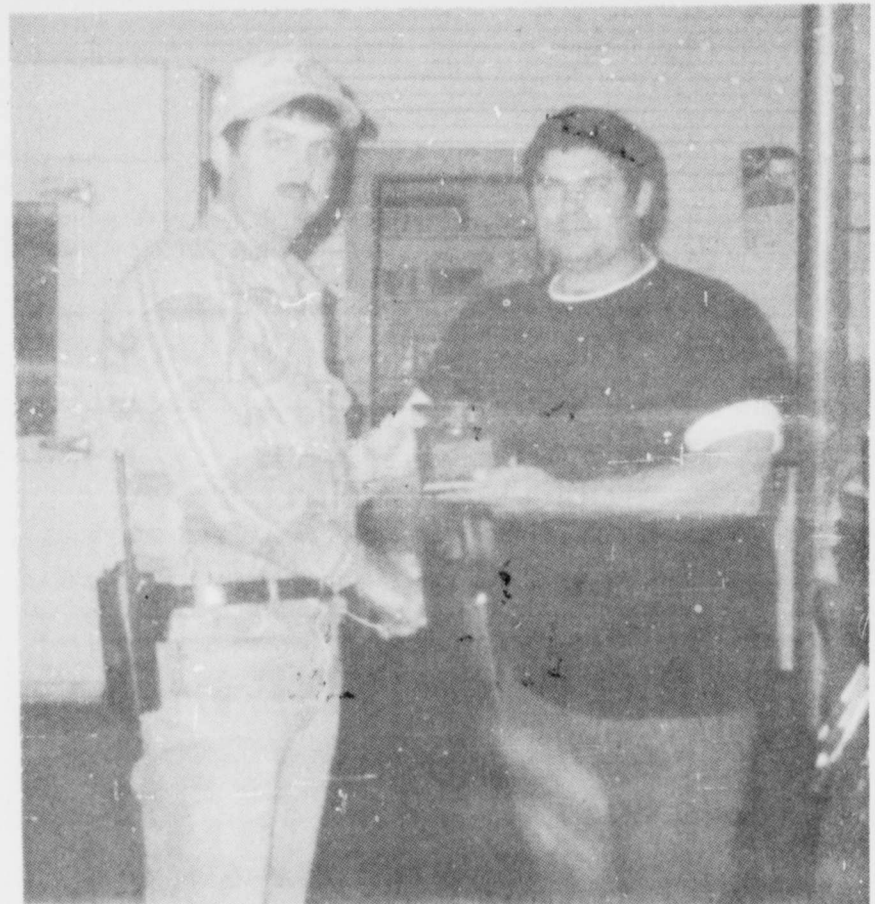

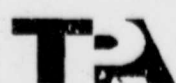

This week I visited in the home of Mollie and Mike Williams of Bogata. Mollie is a secretary/teller at Peoples National Bank and Mike is co-owner of an extermination service.

It was Saturday, and the house was teeming with activity. Mikel Ann, Mollie and Mike's oldest daughter, along with her sons, Micah and Matthew were visiting. Mikel's husband, John Haynes, wasn't around at the time. Marla and Mandy, the younger daughters, were busy fixing hair and make-up and all the other things teenagers do on Saturdays.

The Williams family attends the Assembly of God Church where Mollie is WMU President.

Marla and Mandy's school activities keep everyone hopping. They are both cheerleaders, and Mandy plays JV basketball. Sometimes the busy parents have to attend events at two different schools in one night in order to be part of their children's activities.

When Mollie was in high school, she attended beauty school during the summer so that she would be ready to open a beauty shop when she graduated from school. She went on and got her certification to teach

cosmetology, and did so at Paris Beauty School for a while. She will soon be registering for classes in PJC's Continuing Education Department to take some business related classes.

Out of necessity, quick, simple recipes are the type Mollie fixes during the week. When she has the time to cook, though, she enjoys plain southern cooking, such as fried chicken and all the trimmings. She prefers to cook these large meals on the weekends or when the whole family can be together.

The recipes Mollie is sharing with us this week sound delicious. The Maple Pumpkin Cheesecake and the Lemon Chiffon Pie recipes came from a Classic Desserts Book. The Quesadillas and Chicken Pie are dishes that the family likes and she just put them together by trial and error.

I didn't ask Mollie, but I always wonder when I see her how she manages to still look like a kid, and always have a smile on her face. I think I'll ask her the next time I see her.

### Quesadillas

By Mollie Williams

1 lb. hamburger meat  
1 can refried beans  
1 pkg. fajita seasoning  
flour tortillas  
shredded cheddar cheese  
shredded mozzarella cheese  
diced tomatoes  
diced green onions

Brown meat, drain. Add refried beans and seasoning. Mix well. Spread mixture on flour tortillas, add shredded cheeses; top with flour tortilla. Place in buttered skillet or on griddle; brown until cheeses are melted inside. Cut in four pieces with pizza cutter and serve with diced tomatoes, green onions, sour cream, hot sauce and guacamole.

### Easy Chicken Pie

2 pie crusts  
1 can mixed vegetables  
1 can cream of chicken soup  
1 can boned chicken  
salt and pepper to taste

Mix vegetables, soup and chicken together. Pour into pie crust and top with crust. Make vent holes in top crust with fork. Bake in over 350 degree oven until golden brown.

### Lemon Chiffon Pie

1-9" graham cracker crust or baked pastry shell  
1-14 oz. can Eagle Brand sweetened condensed milk (not evaporated milk)  
1/3 cup RealLemon Juice from concentrate  
few drops yellow food coloring, optional  
3 egg whites  
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar

In medium bowl, combine sweet-

ened condensed milk, RealLemon brand and food coloring if desired. IN small mixer bowl, beat egg whites with cream of tartar until stiff but not dry; gently fold into sweetened condensed milk mixture. Pour into prepared crust. Chill 3 hours or until set. Refrigerate leftovers. Use only Grade A clean, uncracked eggs.

### Maple Pumpkin Cheesecake

1 1/4 cups graham cracker crumbs  
1/4 cup sugar  
1/4 cup margarine or butter, melted  
3-8 oz. pkgs. cream cheese, softened  
1-14 oz. can Eagle Brand Sweetened Condensed Milk (not evaporated milk)  
1-16 oz. can pumpkin (2 cups)  
3 eggs

1-8 oz. bottle Cary's Pure Maple Syrup  
1 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon  
1 teaspoon ground nutmeg  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
Maple pecan glaze

Preheat oven to 300. Combine crumbs, sugar and margarine; press firmly on bottom of 9" springform pan or 13x9" baking pan. In large mixer bowl, beat cheese until fluffy. Gradually beat in sweetened condensed milk, until smooth. Add pumpkin, eggs, 1/4 cup maple syrup, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt; mix well. Pour into prepared pan. Bake 1 hour and 15 minutes or until cake springs back when lightly touched. Cool. Chill. Top with maple pecan glaze. Refrigerate leftovers.

**Maple Pecan Glaze:** In saucepan, combine remaining 3/4 cup maple syrup and 1 cup (1/2 pint) Borden Whipping Cream; bring to a boil. Boil rapidly 15 to 20 minutes; stir occasionally. Add 1/2 cup chopped pecans. (Makes about 1 1/4 cups)

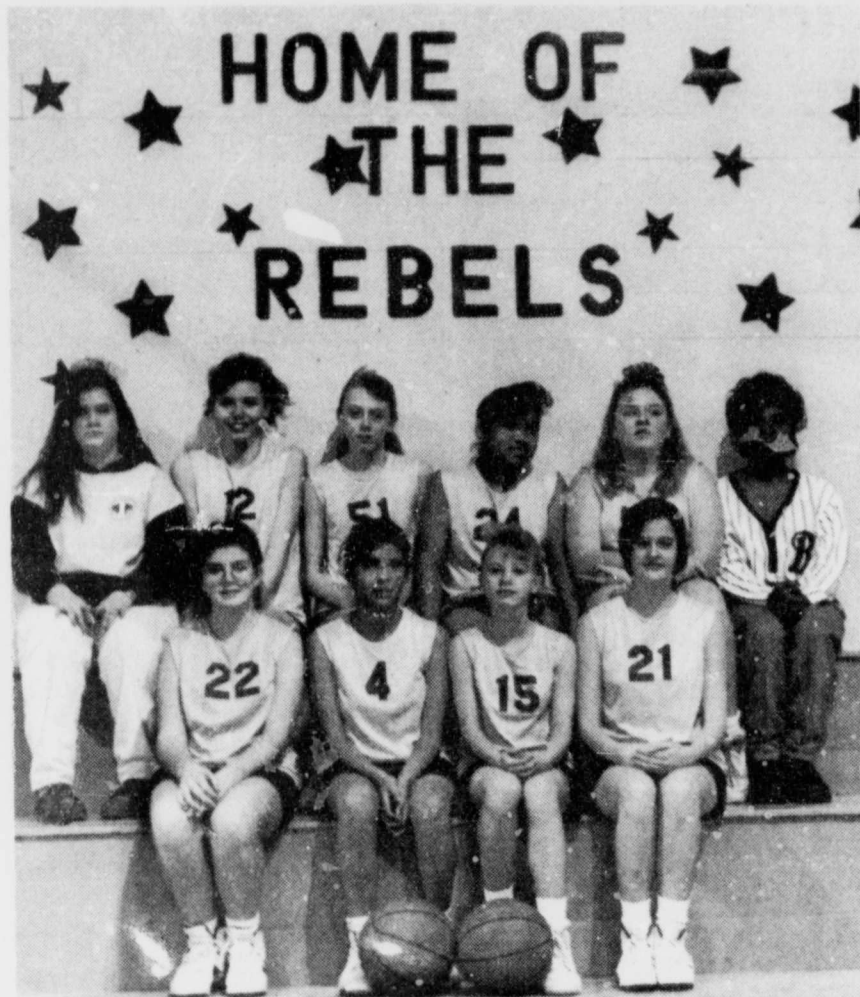

**What Does The Red River County Attorney Do?**  
The County Attorney has jurisdiction to prosecute all criminal cases in Justice of the Peace courts, the county court, and the district courts of Red River County. Felonies are prosecuted in the district courts. A felony is a crime in which the punishment could result in a prison sentence. Approximately 33 million felonies are committed in the United States each year. Of that 33 million, only 3 million (9%) are ever arrested, only 1.5 million (4.5%) are convicted, and only 750,000 (2.75%) ever went to prison.  
As you can see, only a fraction of felony crimes ever end up in my office.  
Most of you will never be arrested. But it is very likely that you will be the victim of a crime.  
**Is there anything you as an individual can do about crime?**  
Yes, there is!  
1. Be willing to report any criminal offense.  
2. If you are a witness to a crime, cooperate with investigating police officers, and be willing to testify.  
3. If called, serve with pride on a jury or grand jury.

### Silver-Haired Legislature Announces Priorities

The Texas Silver-Haired Legislature (TSHL) has three words it wants the Texas Legislature to remember: Community Based Services.

The TSHL, a nonpartisan, 116-member advocacy group elected by their 60-and-older peers statewide, recently announced a list of 15 issues they've found to be of paramount importance to Texas seniors, and community services for the elderly figured prominently in the top two.

According to local TSHL member James H. Davis of Mount Pleasant, the legislature will be asked during its upcoming session to levy a tax of 2 cents per pack on cigarettes with these revenues dedicated to community services for the elderly provided by the Texas Department on Aging and other agencies.

"This is our number one priority," said Jim Davis. "The money from this tax would be a huge help in supporting underfunded programs like nutrition services, the Senior Texans Employment Program, the Retired Senior Volunteer Program, homemaking services and many others."

"A lot of people mistakenly believe we're spending a disproportionate amount of money on services for older people. But the truth is, the State of Texas only spends \$2.35 per capita for senior-oriented services through its state unit on aging, compared to an average of \$11.11 per capita for other Southwestern states. The cigarette tax revenue would just bring us in line with what these other states are spending."

The TSHL's number two priority is expansion of the Texas Department on Aging's Options for Independent Living case management programs. Case management is a system in which a trained professional arranges for and coordinates services from a variety of sources on behalf of frail or disabled older persons.

"By providing these services to seniors in their homes and other community settings, the need for more costly institutional care can be avoided or delayed," said Davis. "And, most importantly, community-based services make it possible for seniors to stay in the one place they most want to be -- home."

The other resolutions are as follows:

- Protect seniors from discrimination in obtaining drivers' licenses;
- Provide for continuation of the senior homestead tax exemption (up to \$10,000) in any new education funding proposals or constitutional amendments produced in the legislative session;
- Increase civil penalties to deter fraud against older consumers;
- Combine all major government programs for older persons under the administrative control of the Texas

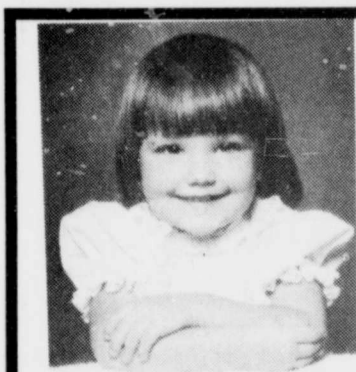
