## Three Vehicle Accident Results In No Serious Injuries

A three vehicle accident which included a headon between a semi tractor trailer rig and a pickup Saturday morning produced traffic problems but, almost miraculously, no serious injuries.

The accident, which occurred at 6:05 a.m. Saturday, January 30, happened a few miles east of Rugby on Hwy. 271 and resulted in traffic having to be re-routed for several hours.

According to official DPS reports, Muriel Duncan was in a pickup truck heading southbound on Hwy. 271 pulling his boat on a trailer. Following him was Jay Meek of Powderly, also pulling a boat.

A double-decker cattle truck, driven by Roland Motley out of

Osceola, Missouri, was northbound on Hwy. 271.

The tractor/trailer rig, according to reports, drove into the southbound lane. Duncan swerved to avoid the semi, but the rig struck his boat and trailer, yanking the back bumper from the pickup.

The semi then lost control and swerved to the left, striking Meek's vehicle headon right front to right front, and then overturned onto Meek's pickup.

Bogata Volunteer Fire Department and Clarksville Rescue Units responded to the emergency. The "Jaws of Life" had to be used to cut Meeks out of his vehicle, which was virtually unrecognizable as a pickup, so crushed was it.

Meeks was helicopter flown to a Texarkana Hospital, but he escaped, almost miraculously, without a broken bone or serious injury.

After attending to the human injuries, the "Jaws of Life" were used to cut into the top of the overturned cattle trailer. Portable corral was set up around the area and the calves released. Officials made the decision to destroy three to four calves due to the severity of their injuries, and three or four more were found to have been killed in the crash. The rest were loaded into stock trailers and transferred.

The scene of the wreck was littered with boat motors, fishing gear and other equipment from the boats and pieces of vehicle. Cleanup operations took some time.

struck a boat and trailer towed by Muriel Duncan. The accident occurred Saturday morning on Hwy. 271 between Rugby and Bogata. Traffic had to be re-routed for some time until the roadway could be cleared.

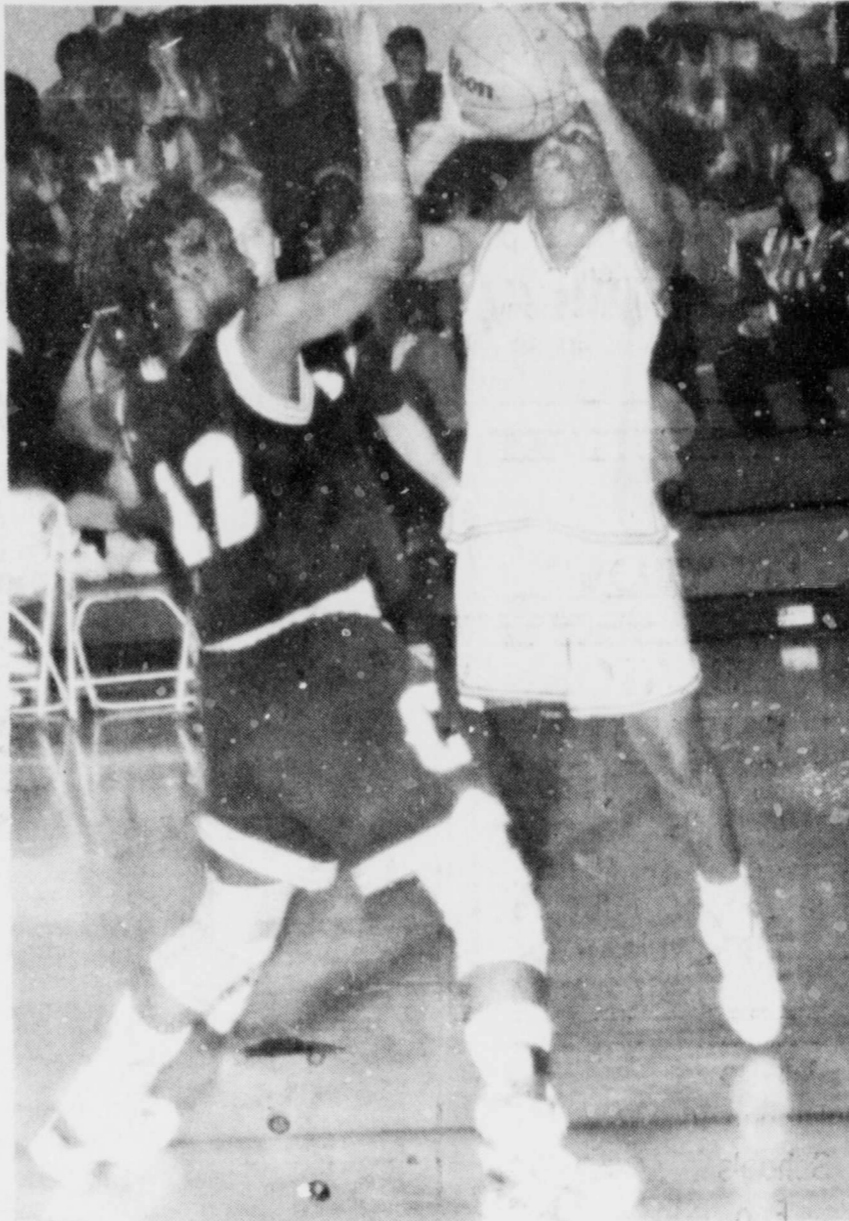

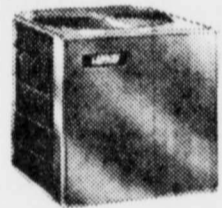

## Need For Pre-Kindergarten Being Determined In Area

The Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District is in the process of determining the need of the communities for a pre-kindergarten class for the coming school year.

The eligibility requirements for entering a student in a pre-kindergarten class are as follows:

1. Student must turn four years of age before or on September 1, 1993.
2. Any student that does not speak and comprehend the English language and has another language other than English used in the home is eligible.
3. Eligibility is determined also by the family income which must be at or below subsistence. School districts must apply the formula used to qualify student for free or reduced

lunches under the National School Lunch Program.

The Pre-kindergarten class would be held on the Talco Campus for both communities. The students would attend a half day program. If there is sufficient enrollment, the district would be able to conduct two sessions as follows:

**Morning Session:** Begin at 8 a.m. and end at noon after the students had eaten lunch at school.

**Afternoon Session:** Begin at noon with the students having the opportunity to eat lunch at school and continue until the end of the regular school day.

If interested in enrolling a student in a pre-kindergarten class for the 1993-94 school year or should there be questions concerning the program, please direct your questions or requests for enrollment to Utley Nowlin, Counselor, who is located on both the Talco and Bogata campuses weekly.

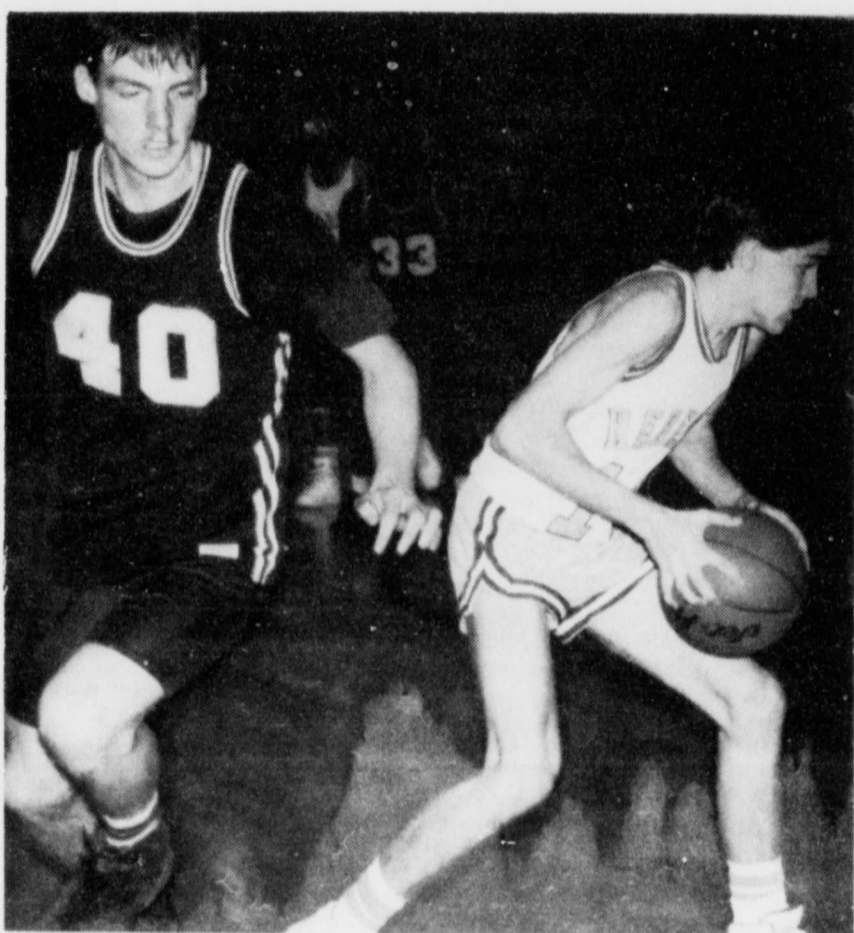

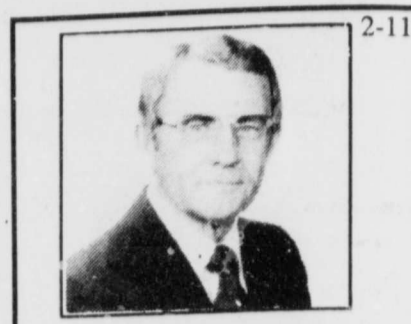

## MRI Available At Titus County Memorial Hospital

Titus County Memorial Hospital has announced that Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI), one of today's most advanced diagnostic tools, is now available in Mount Pleasant. A mobile MRI unit will begin Tuesday and Thursday service at the hospital on February 9.

"By sharing this equipment with other hospitals," said administrator Wayne Ogburn, "we can offer patients the latest diagnostic technology at a lower cost and save people the inconvenience of traveling out-of-town for the test."

The trailer, which is operated by Maxum Health Corporation of Dallas, TX, is self-contained and carries all equipment and supplies necessary to perform state-of-the-art MRI procedures. Maxum staff technologists perform the exams, and results are interpreted by TCMH radiologists.

Dr. Curtis Everts, Medical Director of Radiology Services at Titus County Memorial Hospital, said the MRI unit was going to expand the hospital's scope of imaging capabilities to a level equal to any other medical center.

"This is a new modality that offers a vast amount of information not available in any other modality," Everts said. "MRI complements the information we receive from CT Scans and Myelograms."

Magnetic Resonance Imaging is a painless, non-invasive technique which uses no radiation. The technology allows early diagnosis of certain diseases in their more treatable stages and has no pain and no known side-effects.

MRI uses a giant circular magnet and radio frequency waves to create images from within the body. Patients lie on a table and move through a gantry, allowing the computer to view the body from many different angles. Detailed cross-sectional images of tissues or organs are reconstructed and permanently stored for interpretation.

"We're very enthusiastic about have MRI available here at Titus County Memorial Hospital," said George Burns, director of Radiology Services at TCMH. "It means faster diagnosis and more rapid treatment, which translates into better care for our patients."

Especially useful in diagnosing problems of the brain and spine, MRI also gives definition of soft tissue including organs, muscles, nerves and blood vessels.

The service is added to TCMH's existing radiologic services, which include such specialty diagnostic procedures as Nuclear Medicine, Ultrasound, Mammography, CT Scan and Angiography.

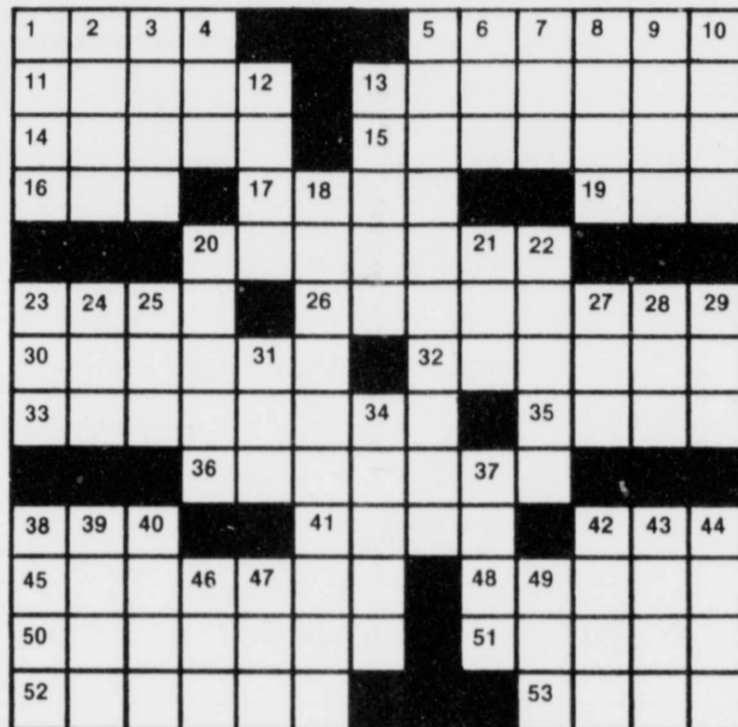
