

Plastic Plants Could Mean New Crops For Farmers

For years, people have been taught that discarded plastics would not biograde. That may change when and if plastics are made from plants. Michigan State University researchers have bioengineered a plant to carry a bacterium that enables the plant to make a plastic polymer. The plastic is the biogradable version of petroleum - based polypropylene, currently used in making containers and wraps.

Once extracted from the plant, the white sanules can be melted into a plastic in that can be molded into bottles, disposable diapers and containers. Researchers hope one day to inexpensively enhance the ability of certain plants to produce and store the polymers much the same way animals store away.

Doesn't this just blow one's mind? Young people, the future is bright and challenging.
