County Agent's Report

Springtime Pond Management

Well, ponds are either full to the top or they are empty because the dam broke. The winter of 1992-93 has been as wet as many in the area can remember, unless you consider last winter.

If you are a pond-owner who experienced damage to your dam or spillway, be sure and make repairs by packing clay back over washouts followed by topsoil to provide a place for re-establishing grass cover over the damaged areas.

It is important to remember that new ponds or ponds that otherwise contain no fish should be stocked with certain species based on pond size. For ponds less than one surface acre, channel or blue catfish may be stocked at rates of 100 to 1000 fingerlings per surface area. The maximum rate should only be used if a regular feeding program is initiated using a floating commercial ration. Six- to eight-inch fingerlings stocked in April will gain at least one pound of weight

by next fall, if a regular feeding program is utilized.

Ponds larger than one surface acre have a few more options in terms of stocking. These ponds are capable of supporting catfish as well as largemouth bass and appropriate forage species. Anytime bass are stocked, bluegill should also be stocked to provide an adequate forage base. Additional species such as redear sunfish, golden shiners, threadfin shad and fathead minnows may also be stocked, but they must be stocked in addition to and not in place of the bluegill.

Species that pond-owners should not stock in typical farm ponds include crappie and flathead or yellow catfish. Crappie generally overpopulate and stunt in farm ponds, never reaching edible size. Flathead catfish may grow quite large and feed on all other fish, including bass or channel catfish, and for that reason are not desirable for stocking.

House Hit Twice By Gunfire

Gunshots have blasted the Johnstown residence of the Bruce Christies twice now, according to reports from the Red River County Sheriff's Office and the Red River County Attorney's Office.

The first incident was reported February 16th, at approximately 10:50 p.m. A blast from a shotgun peppered the bay window and some gutting on the house, according to reports. David Fendley of the Red River Co.

Sheriff's Department estimated that two shots were fired from the shotgun.

On March 6th the residence was again hit by gunfire, this time, according to reports, from what appears to be an automatic .22.

Both incidents are being classified as a drive by shooting.

Both the Sheriff's Office and the County Attorney's Office are continuing and ongoing investigation into the matter.

Red River County Awarded \$67,211 Grant

Red River County officials recently received word they will be awarded a Performance Awards Program grant in the amount of \$67,211 from the Community Justice Assistance division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Chief Adult Probation Officer Bill Steven Hale wrote and applied in December for the grant for the county, and it was approved for January 1 through December 31, 1993.

According to Hale, 25% of the funds will be used for substance abuse prevention and treatment programs, electronic monitoring and hospital care due to substance abuse.

"And \$49,611 will be used to establish a county-wide (CSR) Community Service Restitution program," Hale said, "which will utilize the labor of volunteer jail inmates and probationers for various work projects for

non-profit and government agencies within Red River County."

Hale explained that inmates could cut their time served in jail by "working rather than sitting day and night watching the walls."

The Red River County Sheriff will use a portion of the funds to hire a full time certified deputy who will supervise the inmates as they work, Hale said.

"This should help ease the jail overcrowding and also be used by both county and district judges and the court systems as a sentencing tool."

The programs initiated through the grant money will be managed by Hale and Red River County Sheriff Bob Edrington.

Grant funds will be managed and distributed by Red River County Auditor, Shirley Anderson.



Immunization Clinic Scheduled

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at the Texas Department of Health, 1014 N. Jefferson, Mt. Pleasant.

Clinic hours will be from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Parents may call the clinic for an appointment for their child, (903)572-9877, or arrive on a walk-in basis.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guidelines, beginning at two months of

age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.

Effort Made To Keep Six District Offices Open

State Representatives Barry Telford, D-DeKalb, and L.P. (Pete) Patterson, D-Brookston, are joining together in an effort to maintain six Texas Department of Transportation district offices, including offices in Atlanta, and Paris, scheduled for closure this summer. They have sponsored HB 195 which will keep in place the current 24 TDOT districts.

"The closing of these offices won't save the state money considering the logistics involved in maintaining our highway system," Rep. Patterson said.

During the first special session of the 72nd Legislature, a comprehensive bill was passed merging the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation and the Texas Department of Aviation to create the

Texas Department of Transportation. A provision in that legislation reduced the number of TDOT district offices from 24 to 18. The passage of this legislation stemmed from State Comptroller John Sharp's "Breaking the Mold" report which called for the restructuring of state government in an effort to reduce state spending. Realizing the effect of the district office closures, Representative Patterson, supported by other rural legislators, passed a resolution in a subsequent special session which directed the Transportation Commission to postpone the closings until June 1, 1993.

Rep. Patterson said, "I'm confident this legislation will pass during this regular session."

Jalapeno Fudge

1 jar jalapeno slices
1 lb. Alpine Lace non-fat Cheddar cheese or 1 lb. Kraft Free cheese slices
1 lb. Alpine Lace non-fat mozzarella cheese
1/2 cup flour
2 egg beaters
1 can evaporated skim milk

Arrange grated or sliced cheeses into a baking dish, 9 1/2x11. Mix flour, Egg Beaters and skim milk. Pour mixture over the cheese. Arrange as many jalapeno peppers on top as you like. Bake at 350 for 30 minutes.

Broccoli Cheese-Rice Casserole
2 boxes Uncle Ben's Long Grain and Wild Rice (5 minute variety, cooked using liquid Butter Buds)
2 pkg. frozen chopped broccoli (prepared as directed)

1-14 oz. can chicken broth, low salt variety
2-8 oz. cans chopped mushrooms, drained
2-8 oz. cans whole water chestnuts, drained
2 cups grated non-fat Cheddar or 16 oz. Kraft Free cheese slices, chopped
1 cup homemade low-fat prepared croutons or Weight Watcher brand, crushed with rolling pin
1-1/2 tsp. Mrs. Dash salt-free extra spicy seasoning

Prepare the rice as directed. Add the cooked broccoli, mushrooms, water chestnuts, and chicken broth to the rice mixture. Add seasoning and grated non-fat cheese. Spoon into a large casserole dish that has been sprayed with non-fat cooking spray. Top with homemade low-fat croutons. Bake at 350 30-35 minutes covered. Remove cover the last 10 minutes.

Shrimp Scampi

2 lb. large raw shrimp
1/2 cup liquid Butter Buds
1/2 tsp. lite salt, optional
6 cloves garlic, crushed
1/4 cup chopped parsley
2 tsp. grated lemon peel
2 Tbs. lemon juice

911 Emergency Services Are In Effect

The 911 emergency service for Red River County is now in effect. There remain many details to be worked out and much information to gather but this is the best system in existence and this county is fortunate to have it. The 911 number is keyed into the county-wide fire departments, the ambulance emergency service, they have an emergency line into the sheriff's office, it handles police calls and calls for the highway patrol.

The dispatchers that work this service are trained especially for emergency work and are efficient and dedicated.


When a call comes into this system there may be a delay that seems excessive but it is built into the system and can not be avoided. Please do not hang up the receive. The dispatcher is not hearing what may appear to the caller to be unanswered rings. Your address appears on a monitor when you call 911 and other information pertaining to your location will appear also if that information has been provided. To insure that your location is in the system please use

the enclosed form to provide this information. These forms may be mailed into the address shown or left for pickup at the People's National Bank in Bogata or the Community National Bank in Detroit.

As soon as the dispatcher determines what service you need she starts the process and that service is notified while she gathers what other information you can provide. Even if you are unable to speak you should not hang up help will be sent to determine what service is needed and with modern communications your needs will be served.

Please allow the system to work by not hanging up before your call is answered.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION MAY 1, 1993

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to redistribute among other school districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a school district. The amendment would also allow the legislature to create county education districts with the taxable property of existing school districts in one or more counties combined. County education districts may levy, collect, and distribute ad valorem taxes as authorized by general law. The legislature would be allowed to set the rate of the ad valorem tax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may authorize the board of trustees of each school district or county education district to set the rate, provided that the rate of county education district ad valorem taxes may not exceed \$1.00 per \$100 valuation of taxable property, unless a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the amount of ad valorem taxes redistributed among school districts by the legislature and effectively redistributed within a county through county education districts may not exceed 2.75 percent of the sum of the state revenue appropriated for public schools and the revenue from local ad valorem taxes levied and collected for public schools. The term "state revenue" does not include revenue from ad valorem taxes, revenue for the provision of free textbooks, or contributions to a retirement system. Finally, the amendment provides that it does not affect the distribution of the available school fund under article VII, section 5, of the Texas Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schools, authorizing the legislature or local districts to set

a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 2 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that, except for state educational mandates imposed in compliance with the Texas Constitution or federal law, or unless enacted by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the legislature, a school district may not be required to comply with an obligation requiring expenditure of school district funds unless the obligation is fully funded. The amendment also requires the legislature to provide by law a procedure for determining whether an obligation is fully funded. In the absence of such a procedure, and at the request of a school district's board of trustees, the comptroller of public accounts shall determine whether or not an obligation is fully funded. This amendment applies only to state educational mandates enacted after December 31, 1993.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes an amendment to article VII, section 5(b), of the constitution, which currently authorizes the legislature to provide for using the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts and certain education-related revenue bonds issued by the state. The amendment would repeal the provision authorizing

the use of the permanent school fund to guarantee state revenue bonds, but would permit the legislature to provide by law for the issuance of general obligation bonds or revenue bonds of the state for the purpose of making loans to, or purchasing bonds of, school districts for the purpose of acquisition, construction, or improvement of instructional facilities, including all furnishings. The amendment also provides that the state, pursuant to general law, may forgive the payment of principal and interest on all or part of a loan made to a school district under the amendment to partially finance an instructional facility. The cap of \$750 million on the amount of bonds that could be issued under article VII, section 5(b), as amended, would be retained. The amendment would repeal the current provision of the constitution permitting the legislature to authorize bonds in excess of \$750 million by two-thirds record vote of both houses of the legislature. While any of the general obligation bonds issued under the amendment or any of the interest on those bonds is outstanding and unpaid, there would be appropriated out of the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, the amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that matured or became due that fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive payments of loans made to a school district for partially financing facilities, and repealing the authorization for \$750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund."


County Attorney, Sheriff Issue Statement On Hot Checks





The clinic will be conducted from 9-11:30 and 1-2:30 at 1300 Highway 37 North, Clarksville, Texas.

Future clinic dates will be held on the first, second and third Thursday of each month. Parents may call the clinic for an appointment for their child, (903)572-9877, or arrive on a walk-in basis.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children

who meet the family income guidelines, beginning at two months of age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.



Comptroller Representative To Offer Local Tax Help



