But consider the lowly handle. It ranges from the ordinary, ignorable to the functional and all the way to the realm of fancy and fantasy!

The minister says that while his first thought always is with the church, he also can do carpentry and handyman work in general. He also drives a school bus for the Talco Schools.


Rocky has been cooking since he was fourteen years old. He said his dad believed that boys should be able to cook so that they would marry for love and not just so they would have someone to cook for them.

A collage of family portraits arranged on the walls throughout provide insight of Grandma's love for her family.






