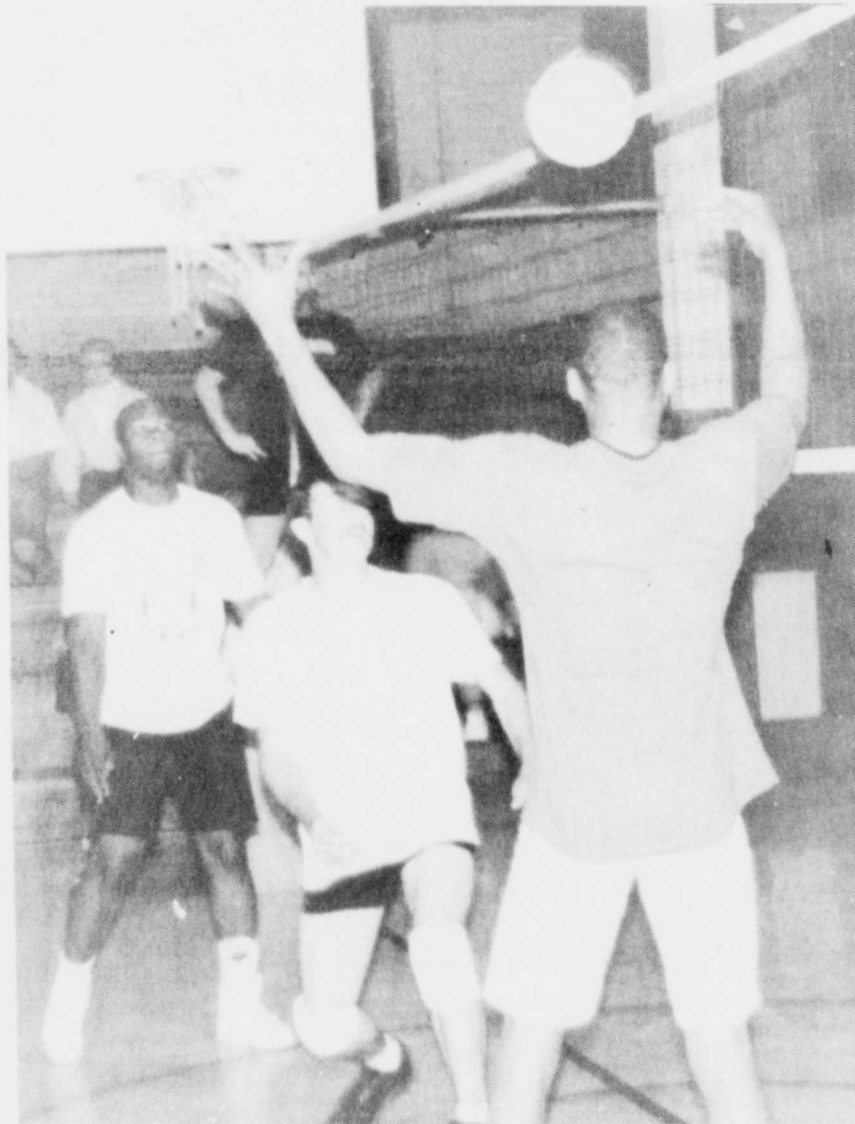

cate are: Earnestine Houston Brown and Mildred Petty Unsell.

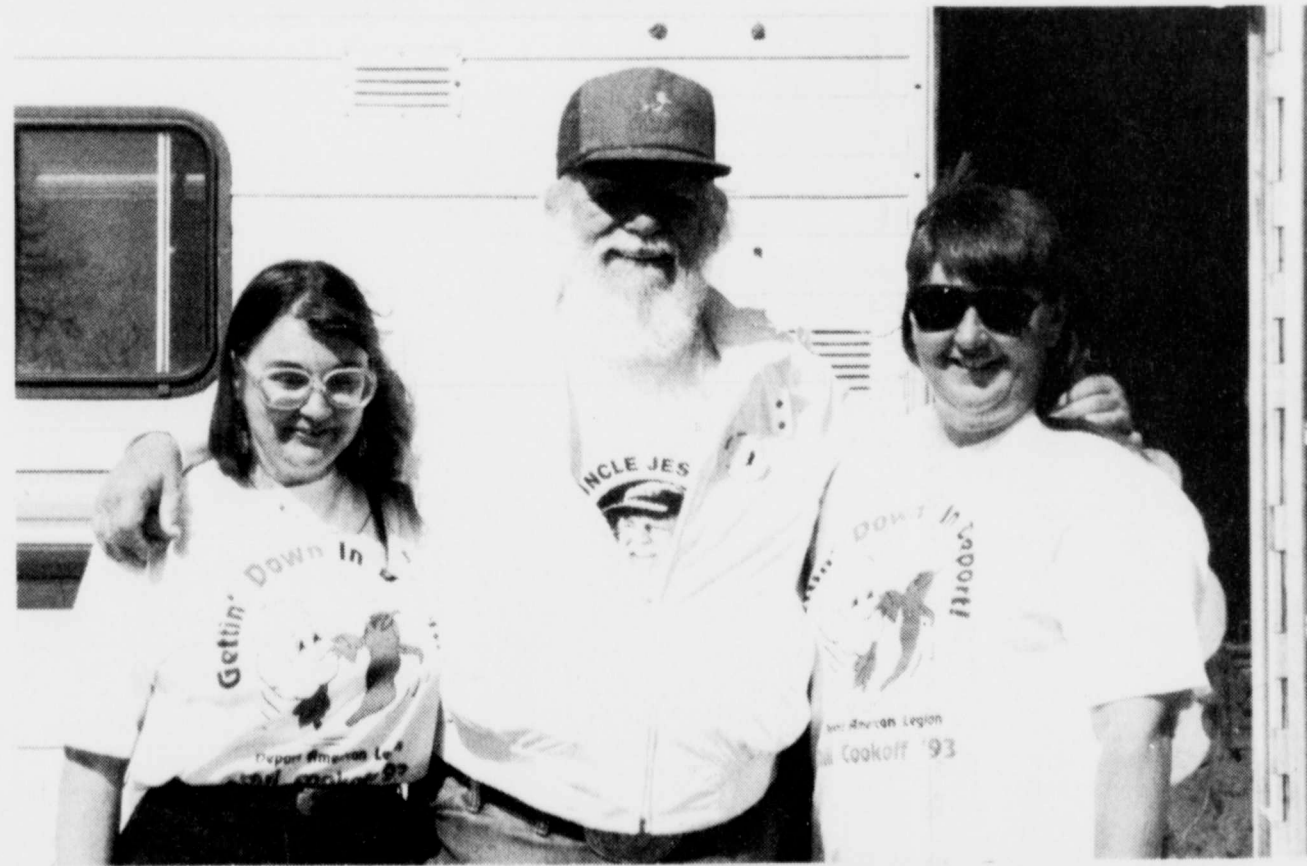

Talco Pastor Reports On Trip To Russia

Bro. David Webb, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Talco, arrived home Wednesday after an eight day trip to Moscow, Russia with 23 other people.

The purpose of the trip was to work out an agreement with a Russian Baptist group for a joint mission effort in that country.

Bro. Webb said it was a humbling experience to listen to their simple but obviously sincere expressions of thanksgiving for their meager provisions. Deep need in every area of life has taught Russian Christians how to depend on God and to glorify Him for His faithfulness to them. Their peace in the midst of poverty stands out in sharp contrast to America's pandemonium in the midst of plenty.

Economically, both the people and the churches have tremendous needs. According to the Russian tour guide, the average monthly salary is \$35.00. Some pastors indicated they need

financial relief for the elderly in their churches. The elderly receive 5,000 roubles (approximately \$7.00) a month from the government while boots which are a necessity, cost 18,000 roubles, approximately \$26.00. People are dying from starvation and they said that cats or dogs are not seen on the streets in their country because they have been slaughtered for food.

The people of Russia are also spiritually hungry. The communistic philosophy of Athiesm could not minister to man's innate need to know God. The fall of the communistic regime left the people without a viable worldview and philosophy of life. The people are therefore searching for something to fill the emptiness in their spiritual lives. The field are white, the laborers are few, but the Lord of the harvest is visibly working in Russia.

Country Chicken With Cream Gravy

1 1/2 cups corn flakes, crushed
1 tsp. paprika
1 tsp poultry seasoning
1/2 tsp whole thyme
1/2 tsp salt
1/2 tsp pepper
3 Egg Beaters (3/4 cup)
6 (4 oz.) Skinned, boned chicken breast halves

Place cereal, paprika, poultry seasoning, thyme, salt, and pepper in a shallow dish, stirring well to combine. Pour Egg Beaters in a shallow bowl or dish. Dip chicken breast halves in Egg Beaters to coat. Dredge in cereal mixture. Place coated chicken in an 11x7x2 inch baking dish with thickest portions towards outside of dish.

Cover with wax paper, and microwave at high for 12 minutes. Rotate dish every 4 min. You can also cook in the regular oven for 35 min. at 350 degrees.

CREAM GRAVY
2 TBS liquid Butter Buds
2 Tbs Flour
1 can evaporated skim milk
1/2 cup canned chicken broth
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
3 Tbs chopped fresh chives

Combine Butter Buds and flour in saucepan on top of stove. Over low heat gradually add milk, broth, and stir until smooth. Cook until thickened. Add salt and pepper. Serve over chicken. Each serving has 3 grms of fat.

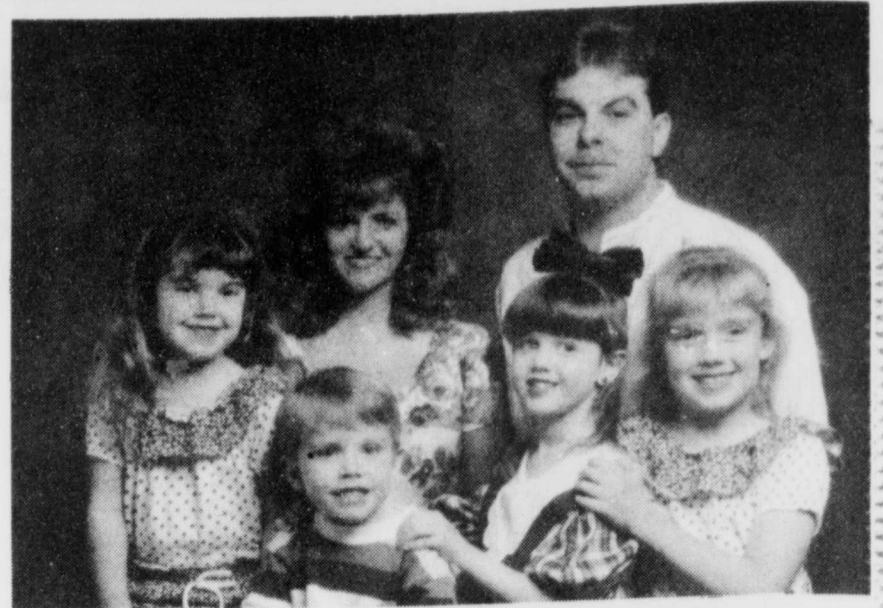
To The Editor:

Substance Abuse Felony Punishment Facilities

Eligible offenders who have committed crimes after October 21, 1992, can be sentenced to this program. It is intended for those who have a chemical addiction to drugs or alcohol. The program excludes capital murder, murder, aggravated kidnapping, aggravated sexual assault, aggravated robbery or any offense involving a deadly weapon.

A criminal defendant can be sentenced to a term of not more than a year or less than six months. After that time has expired, a person can be placed on probation.

The program is conducted inside a state prison. It has an intensive treatment program. Up to five hours a day is spent in group therapy, chemical dependency education lectures, and a 12-step group program. Each prisoner is required to have a job and receive vocational or GED training. The goal of the program is to instill responsible behavior and teach socialization skills.

This type of program can possibly rehabilitate some criminals. There are limited number of prison beds available for this program and they are filling up fast. We have sent several people from Red River County to the SAFFP since the first of the year.
