Arbor Day Planting Reduce Energy Use

With proper planning, trees planted in observance of Arbor Day this month can help reduce the amount of energy it takes to cool homes, according to Texas-New Mexico Power Company.

Deciduous trees planted on the west, east or south sides of a home can produce enough shade to reduce

air conditioning costs by 20% to 40%, studies have shown. During the winter, sun penetrates through the bare branches to provide natural solar heating.

Trees can also reduce energy use if they are planted to provide shade for heat pumps and air conditioners, said Gary Petty, Bogata district manager. However, he warned the shade plants

shouldn't block the air flow.

Evergreen trees planted on the north and west sides of a home can reduce cold air infiltration during the winter by blocking cold winter winds. These should be planted about 50 feet from the house. Also, low trees and shrubs planted close to a home

reduce wind currents and create a "dead air" space that helps reduce heat loss in winter and buffer a home from hot outside air in summer.

Another energy-saving landscaping idea is to plant deciduous vines. These can absorb and reflect the sun's rays in the summer but let sun in during the winter. Vines also have the advantage of being fast-growing and requiring limited ground space. Vines should be trained on a trellis to ensure adequate air circulation and minimize potential for moisture and other damage to the building.

When planting trees, homeowners should be careful not to plant near power lines and to make sure no lines are buried before they dig. If uncertain, they should call their local utility offices.

Local nurseries can offer tips on which trees will thrive in specific areas, but homeowners should take care to avoid trees that are weak-wooded or short-lived.

Make Your Own Compost

If you've always wanted to build your own compost heap, but you weren't sure which ingredients to use or what purpose it would serve, now is your chance! Compost heaps play two positive roles: they cut down on landfill usage and they provide an inexpensive and readily available source of nutrients for your garden.

In many communities, leaves, tree trimmings and grass clippings alone make up to 20% of the solid wastes buried in the increasingly crowded landfills. So why not benefit your lawn and garden by building your own compost heap?

Composting is the process of turning clippings, leaves and other yard materials into a rich soil additive for use in gardens or around plants and shrubs. Compost heaps work by generating intense heat and biological activity. This activity breaks down the compost materials -- grass clippings, plant residues, leaves and carefully selected household garbage -- into a rich organic substance.

Compost heaps are clean and odorless, and several studies have shown that commonly used pesticides degrade rapidly in compost piles.

To create your own compost heap, look for bins made out of coated wire or wood. Check out your local garden center for inexpensive prefabricated bins or ask for advice on building our own bins at home.

Fill the bottom of your bin with a 4" to 6" layer of organic materials from your landscape. These sub-

stances, such as leaves, grass clippings and plants, are high in carbon and provide a good base for your compost heap.

Next, sprinkle a material high in nitrogen, such as cotton seed meal or a chemical fertilizer, on top of your base. Then layer several inches of garden soil and a dusting of ground limestone or wood ashes.

Place these sets of materials in alternate layers in your compost heap until you've reached an approximate height of 5'. Don't add so many materials that your heap goes above 5'. If it gets too tall, there may not be enough oxygen reaching the interior of the heap.

Compost heaps are a good place to "throw away" your grass clippings and other organic material, but they should not be considered garbage dumps. Make sure you do not include diseased or infested plant materials, meat scraps, fats or non-biodegradable household wastes in your compost heap, such as plastic containers, garbage bags, etc.

Your compost heap should reach 140-160 degrees F. within 4 to 5 days. At that time, it will begin settling and going to work. After 5 to 6 weeks, you should turn the outside of the old material into the center of the pile and water if necessary.

After 3 to 4 months, your compost heap will become uniformly dark and crumbly. At this point, it will be ready to use. So, get a headstart and develop your own compost heap now.

Immunization Clinic Scheduled

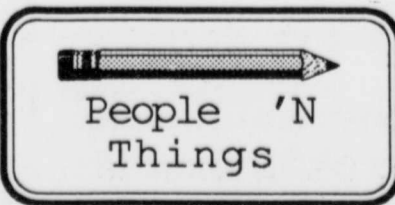
The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at the Texas Department of Health, 1014 N. Jefferson, Mt. Pleasant.

Clinic hours will be from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Parents may call the clinic for an appointment for their child, (903)572-9877, or arrive on a walk-in basis.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guidelines, beginning at two months of

age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.

Beef Stew
By Lore Roach

2- #2 cans of tomatoes
1 can of cream style corn
1 1/2 lbs. of stew meat
1 large onion
salt
chilli powder
1/4 cup sugar
Add water to make stew as thick as you like. Cook meat until real tender, put salt in meat, add onion and cook for a few minutes. Then add other ingredients and boil slowly. Stir often to keep corn from sticking to the bottom. I got this recipe from my mother-in-law, Mrs. Lee Roach. She used a lot of fat on the meat to make it rich, and lots of chilli powder. I cut the fat and use artificial sweetener when I make the stew now.

Diabetic Cake

1 cup water
1 cup raisins
1/4 cup sweet 'n low
3/4 cups corn oil
1 tsp soda
2 cups all purpose flour
1 1/4 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp nutmeg
1 tsp vanilla
1/2 tsp salt
1 cup applesauce (unsweetened)

Pre heat oven to 350. Cook raisins in the water until soft and water is absorbed. Drain if necessary. Mix remaining ingredients thoroughly. Fold in raisins. Bake in greased and floured 9X13 pan until done. May substitute 1 1/2 mashed bananas or 1 cup fruit cocktail of 1 cup crushed pineapple for applesauce.

Fried Squash
Wash squash well and cut in thin slices. Salt and Pepper. Put about two cups flour in a paper bag. Shake squash in bag and drop in deep oil which is very hot. Cook until brown. I use a Fry Daddy. Drain on paper towels.

Blackberry Cobbler
3 cups fresh blackberries
2 cups sugar
dash of salt
7 cups water
Mix, and put in long pan and start cooking on top of the stove. For crust, Mix 1 cup of Crisco, a dash of salt, and enough flour to make it look like meal. Add a small amount of cold water to make dough. Roll half of dough real thin on dough board or wax paper. Slice in thin strips and drop in the blackberries which should be boiling by now. Keep boiling a few minutes. Now, roll out other half of dough, cut in thin strips. Turn heat off under berries, place strips on top of them and put lots of butter on top. Bake until brown.

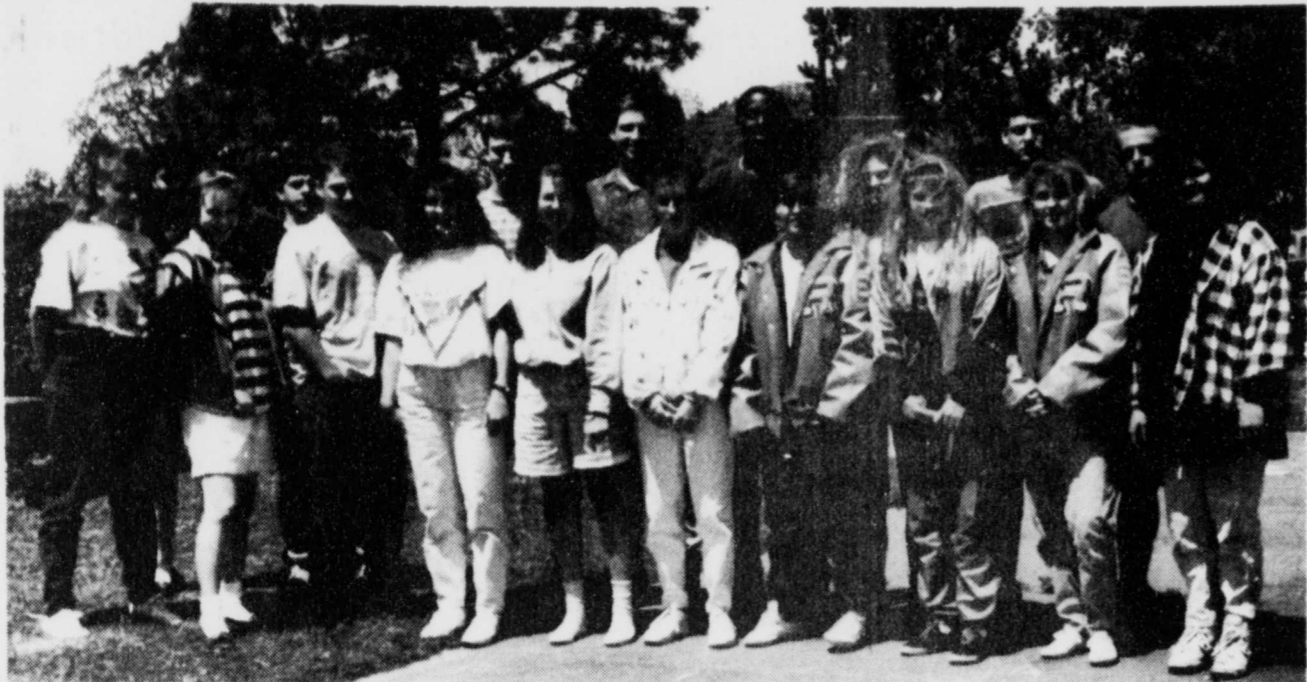

Insects To Look For In April

March and April bring on a number of insect pests each year, and I'm sure this year will not be any different. In fact, this year may be a year when insect pests can be found in high numbers. Some of the most common insects that will be found around homes include:

Eastern Caterpillar - Webs of this insect will be appearing on wild plum and cultivated fruit crops. The insect overwinters as an egg mass on the stems of these plants and the larvae will hatch from the eggs as the plants begin to put on new leaves. If left uncontrolled, this insect can completely defoliate the fruit tree. It only has one generation in a year and can be controlled with sevin, malathion or one of the biological worm killers such as Dipel or Thuricide.

Aphids - Aphids will be appearing very early on roses, daylilies and various garden plants as warmer weather approaches. Aphids can transmit disease and build up heavy populations in a short period of time. Aphids can be controlled with malathion or other similar products.

Pecan Phylloxera - This gall insect can be found on pecan and hickory.

If homeowners have had problems from this insect in the past, they should have already applied a dormant oil. Dormant oils need to be applied prior to bud break; however, if they have not applied a dormant oil, they can suppress this insect with applications of insecticide timed at early leaf stage, such as malathion, diazinon or zolone.

Termites - Of course, the subterranean termite is the most damaging of all structural pests in East Texas. Homeowners need to be on the alert for activity of this insect. Any obvious structural wood damage or mud tubes are an indication of termite activity. Also during warm spring rains in March through May, swarms of adult termites will appear near infested structures.

If wood damage or wing forms of the termites are found, homeowners need either to treat the structure or have a professional pest operator inspect the home and give an estimate of control costs.

If individuals are planning to build a new home, treatment of the soil before the home is built is a good safeguard against future infestations.
