About 30 minutes later, Thomas stopped by.


Sure enough, he piled a bag of cat food, ice cream (same flavor), a loaf of bread and a frozen pizza (also the same flavor).

Do any of us want to give up local control of our schools?? No!



passed a criminal justice package which includes:


1. creation of regional 'state jails" with 20,000 new beds by September

4. increase minimum time served for capitol murder to 45 years The House should be acting on these proposals soon. Hopefully these kinds of measures will help the overcrowding problems. In about a month this session fo the legislature will be finished. I will report the final crime package at that time.
