As we sped off into the morning the cyclist was stock still on the sidewalk looking after us with a wide-eyed, stricken look. We ran eleven red lights...I counted them. Our speed reached 70 or 80 several times. We made a 35 minute trip in 20 minutes and caught our flight.

Our driver got a big tip...but not just because he put so much effort into getting us there on time.

You see, this man was not in the least concerned about hitting a bicyclist...running red lights, passing on the right hand side of the road or breaking the speed limit.

The only time he ever really hit the brakes and stopped was when a poor mama dog wandered out into the road way. Then he honked...stopped and patiently made sure the dog was safely on the other side. A good man...without doubt! I confess that I like our driving habits around here much better...I just don't quite have the attitude necessary to survive down south of the border!

Papers Win Nine Awards At NETPA

Thunder Prairie Publishing has once more captured a wide range of awards at the North and East Texas Press Association's annual convention. Two seconds, two thirds and five fourths were given in April to the Deport and Bogata Papers. Contest rules dictate that the three other papers cannot be entered in this contest under certain circumstances.

In Division Six, which is for Weekly Newspapers under 2,000, The Deport Times won Second place with their editorial concerning the annual Chili Cookoff.

The Bogata News won Second Place in Advertising, crowding out the Deport Times, which won third place.

The critique reports that "The Bogata News was in close competition with first place in this division. Ads are a little crowded but of a nice variety."

The Deport Times' critique read "Good whoing in this division, even though third place. Overall these ads are better than many entries in large division."

The Bogata News won third place in Feature Writing with the story of Jack Lucas being "found".

The Critique said "Quick moving story with good detail and use of

quotes. Could have been a very "sappy" story, but writer held back using too much sugar and let the sources tell it. Guess that makes it "naturally sweet". Writer keeps good control of the story.

The Deport Times claimed fourth in Features with the story about IGeneva Norwood's journey to Russia. "The phone call sets the scene nicely in lead. Good contrast imagery used. Nice use of quotes and detail".

The Deport Times won Fourth in Photography, with the critique that they had "Nice Accident Shots...watch the sky on some photos as it is washing out". Sports photos needed to be "sharper".

The Deport Times also won fourth in Newswriting, for which there were no critiques.

Nanalee Nichols' "Nichols Worth" Column won fourth also. There were no critiques on that division either.

The Bogata News did not receive an award for their coverage on the "AIDS Story" but comments were: Good job in trying to be a calming factor in the community when this became such an important part of your community, especially with the major media blitz and focus on your

readership. Keep Up The Good Work. Judges were: Keith Shelton, a 20 year plus writer, reporter and Journalism Teacher; Roy Moses, Journalism teacher for 30 years and has worked for Corpus Christi, Denton and smaller papers; Reg Westmoreland, former Dallas Times-Herald Department Head; Jim Rogers, with 35 years experience on small dailies, weeklies, journalism educator and administrator; Carmen Mitchell, many papers, including Fort Worth Press; Beth Richardson, former photographer for Harte-Hanks papers in the Metroplex, currently grad student at UNT.

Krispen Spencer, 20 plus years in advertising, creative design, marketing, etc.; Jim Albright, 30 plus years in professional advertising; Winn Skinner, reporter, editor, page design, copy editing at Denton Record-Chronicle, Austin American-Statesmen, Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Cathleen Cole, magazines writer and freelancer, teaches reporting, feature writing.

Highway Improvements Set For U.S. 271

Plans to add shoulders to a section of US 271 and level up a section of US 67 near Mt. Pleasant have been approved by the Texas Department of Transportation.

According to Construction plans, a 3.6 mile section off US 271, from FM 1896 to 3.6 miles south, will have part of the old pavement removed, shoulders leveled up, and the entire surface repaved. Once completed, the existing 12 foot traffic lanes will have four-foot paved shoulders on each side. All drainage structures along the route will also be widened and safety features improved on all culverts.

Buster Paving Co., Inc. of Sulphur

Springs was awarded the contract for the construction with a low bid of \$989,000. Work on this project should begin in June and be completed by December of this year.

The roadway of US 67 between Winfield and Mt. Pleasant is also scheduled for improvements. About a 2-mile section of the highway from 2.8 miles west of interstate 30 to 2 miles east will be leveled up and repaved to improve its rideability.

Buster Paving Co., Inc., was also awarded the contract for this project with a low bid of \$494,386. Work on this project should begin in June and be completed by September of this year.

Talco-Bogata CISD Trustee Election Results Released

Superintendent Freddy Wade has released these results of the Talco Bogata CISD School Board election, which was held on Saturday, May 1.

In Position 3, Eddy Brown was unopposed. He received a total of 307 votes. John M. Ward received a total of 243 votes, and Mark Hawk-

ins garnered 219, making Ward the trustee for Position 6. In Position 2, Sandra Ingram received 318 votes, and Bobby Kuhl had 150. Ingram had been appointed to serve out Kip Stansell's term when he resigned, and won another term at the polls on Saturday.

The meeting dismissed.

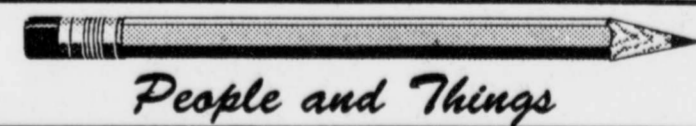

1 lb. lean hamburger or ground turkey
1-8 oz. can whole stewed tomatoes
1-3 oz portion sliced mushrooms
1-8oz can Cream of Mushroom Soup
1/4 c. chopped onion
1/2 tsp olive oil or 1/4 tsp veg. oil
1/4 C. chopped green pepper
1 Jar pre-made spaghetti sauce

In a large skillet, brown the meat, onion, and pepper in the olive oil. Pour off fat. Add remaining ingredients and simmer for 45 minutes. Serve over cooked noodles or rice.

Strawberry Upside Down Pie
2 C. fresh or frozen strawberries chopped
16 oz. Cool Whip Whipped Topping
1 slice shortcake- crumbled
1 box strawberry jello
1 Graham Cracker Crust

Pre heat oven to 350 degrees. Wash and skin chicken pieces. Dip in olive oil, and arrange in a baking pan. Sprinkle on garlic and Parmesan cheese. Top with Spaghetti sauce. Cover pan tightly with foil and bake for 1 1/2 hours. Remove from oven. Carefully lift foil off and arrange slices of Mozzarella over chicken. Turn off oven, and replace pan in warm oven until cheese melts. Serve with rice or pasta.

CATHY'S CORNUCOPIA PIE
Pastry for a two crust pie
1 1/2 C. Cranberries coarsely chopped
1 C. peeled, cored, & diced apples
1/4 C raisins
1/2 C chopped pecans
1 1/2 C sugar (+1/4 tsp)
2 Tbsp Flour
1 tsp cinnamon
1/2 C cranberry juice
1 tsp vanilla extract
4 Tbsp butter
1/4 tsp Allspice

Pre heat oven to 425 degrees.
Line a 9" pie dish with pastry. Sprinkle lightly with 1/4 tsp sugar. Toss cranberries, apples, raisins, and pecans with sugar, flour, cinnamon, allspice, cranberry juice, and vanilla. Spoon into pie shell, dot with butter. Create a lattice over the top with remaining pie crust cut into 1" slices. Bake 40 minutes until fruits are tender and pastry is brown. Allow to stand before serving.

Lore Bush will Compete in Austin

Lore Bush will compete at the University Interscholastic League state academic spring meet. The meet will be held at Thompson Center on the University of Texas campus in Austin on May 7. She earned eligibility by placing second in Newswriting and third in Headline Writing at Regionals in Tyler on Saturday, April 24. She will be accompanied by her advisor, Mrs. Ann Roberts.

"Although the UIL is more often associated with athletic competition, more students compete in the academic contests," said Dr. Bailey Marshall, UIL Director. "In fact, the League began as a debating league in 1910 and then later merged with a track and field association to form the basis for the current organization. Each year, more than a third of the total participation in UIL activities involved academic contests."

Texas has the nation's most comprehensive slate of academic contests. "Long before the development of other academic-based competitions, the UIL was sponsoring contests in writing, speaking, mathematics, and science," Marshall added.

UIL academic contests cover several subject areas including math, science, business, language arts,

journalism, speech, and theatre. Recently, contests in current issues and events and computer science were added last year.

The purpose of the UIL academic program is to use competition to develop students' higher order thinking skills. "A primary objective for League directors is to maintain a high correlation between what is taught in the classroom and what is required of students involved in extracurricular competition," said Janet Wiman, UIL academic director. "Consequently, as much emphasis is placed on the educational context of the contests as is placed on the contests themselves."

Students who compete at the UIL State Meet also qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. This year, the TILF is awarding more than \$700,000 in scholarship grants to 534 college students who compete at the UIL State Academic Meet. In 1993-94, the TILF expects to award an estimated 550 new and renewed grants, valued at more than \$700,000. The TILF funds are made possible through grants from foundations, individuals, and families. The TILF receives over \$500,000 in annual donations and has over \$2,000,000 in endowed funds.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of nine women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

I. 35-40 years of age-One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age-A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over-An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. A symptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.
