





The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced plans today for the continuation of the on-going immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations.


The next clinic will be held May 20.

May is Older American Month. This year, during May, Older Americans Month will once again salute the contributions of older persons and signal a commitment to renewed efforts to enhance the quality of life for the nation's senior citizens.


Today, the elderly account for an increasing percentage of the world's population. In the United States, the population aged 65 and older grew at a rate more than twice that of the population as a whole during the 1980's and the trend will accelerate as the Baby Boom generation begins to reach retirement age in the early part of the 21st century.

FmHA Has Loan Funds Available For Some


The Farmers Home Administration has loan funds to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, buy land for farming or operate farms in Lamar County, Joan M. Salisbury, said today

Under this program enacted by congress, socially disadvantaged populations are Hispanics, Native Americans, African Americans, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

FmHA tries to find members of those groups who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA

farm ownership loan. The agency can sell or lease to those who are eligible a farm held in its inventory or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market, Salisbury said.



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

Rebates Offered To Customers Who Buy Heat Pumps

Texas-New Mexico Power Company recently announced changes in the rebates it offers to customers who purchase high efficiency heat pumps for central heating and cooling.

Under the new rebate structure, heat pumps must have a minimum Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio (SEER) of 12.0 to qualify for a rebate. If the unit is equipped with a two-speed or variable speed compressor, the minimum SEER is 11.0.

The new rebates are \$200 per qualifying heat pump. A company spokesperson said the changes were implemented to simplify the rebate program and to raise the standards above the federally mandated standards placed on heating and air conditioning manufacturers.

Rebates of \$200 are also being offered for high efficiency central air conditioning systems. Central air conditioning systems also must have an SEER of at least 12.0. Customers can contact their nearest TNP office for more information about rebates for heat pumps or central air conditioning systems.

A heat pump supplies heating in the winter and air conditioning in the summer. The reason it is so energyefficient for heating is that it uses electricity to transfer heat, not to create

In the summer, a heat pump absorbs heat from indoor air and "pumps" or transfers it outdoors. In the winter, the reverse happens. Heat is absorbed from the cold outdoor air and transferred indoors. This is possible because even at 0 °F, the out-

door air still contains almost 80% of the heat it has at 100°F. When the outdoor temperature approaches freezing, some types of heat pumps rely on a supplemental back-up heating system to help keep a house warmer.

High efficiency heat pumps can offer significant savings to customers who are needing to replace older resistant heating systems or air conditioning equipment, according to research done by the Texas Energy Extension Agency. For instance, by using a high efficiency heat pump to replace an electric furnace and cooling system with an SEER of about 5, a customer can reduce the amount of energy it uses for heating and cooling by about half.

This makes a noticeable differ ence in overall energy use since heating and cooling are generally the single biggest energy users in a home. Recent advances in heat pump technology have also helped reduce the amount of energy needed for heating and cooling.

One of these advances is the variable speed compressor and fan. Heat pumps using variable speed compressors and indoor fans keep temperatures within 1 degree of the desired thermostat setting. They do so by cycling on and off at a rate and speed dictated by the temperature difference between the house and the thermostat. A regular compressor has to turn on and off at full speed to correct even a minor sway in the temperature settings.

County Agent's Report

Tomato

The tomato is by far the most popular plant in the home vegetable garden. The large diversity available in tomato varieties gives us many different types for every gardening need and every tomato lover's taste. In addition, new hybrids make gardening easier by providing more disease resistance, more vigorous growth and higher yields that are bred right in. The gardening experts with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service say to consider the following guidelines when choosing tomato varieties for your garden:

1. Look for disease resistance. One of the first things you'll notice when choosing tomatoes is some or all of the letters V, F, N, T after the variety name. These include the variety's resistance to Verticillium wilt, Fusarium wilt, Nematodes or-Tobaccomosaic. Recently, U.S.D.A. scientists have separated fusarium into two races. Those tomatoes you now see with an F are resistant to race one; those resistant to both races are marked FF or F1&2. 'Celebrity,' 'Quick Pick,' 'Floramerica,' 'Floradade' and 'Mamma Mia' are examples of the latter.

2. Consider growth habit. There are basically three types of tomatoes. "Determinate" tomatoes are bushy plants that reach a certain height and stop growing. All of the fruit tends to ripen at the same time so these are the best type for canning, sauces or juice. 'Solar,' 'Super Bush,' 'Celebrity,' 'Carnival,' 'Big Set,' and 'Tiny Tim' are examples of these. The opposite is the "Indeterminate" tomato, which continues to grow until killed by pests or frost, producing flowers and fruit in spring and early summer and again in early fall. Most popular among these are 'Beefmaster,' 'Better Boy,' 'Whopper' and 'Early Girl.' A third

Grow Everyone's Favorite - The class has just been developed, known as ISI (Indeterminate short-internode). The first variety to fall into this category is 'Better Bush,' a compact, stocky plant with fruits the size of larger tomatoes. This new class combines the bushiness of determinate with the fruiting qualities of indeterminate.

3. Check the days to maturity. This number is usually found after the variety name and indicates the length of time until fruit is first picked. In general, the smaller the fruit, the earlier it ripens.

4. Decide upon type. Which type of tomato do you prefer? 'Sweet 100,' a cherry type, is one of the sweetest ever developed, high in Vitamin C, and perfect for salads and dips. The beefsteak types (named for the early variety 'Beefsteak' which is no longer available), such as 'Beefmaster,' 'Whopper,' 'Big Boy' and 'Better Boy' are perfect for slicing, salads and sandwiches. They do have many problems with pests, fruit cracking and blossom-end rot. The pear or conservation projects, badgework, plum tomatoes, such as 'Roma' and nature lore, campcraft skills and 'Chico,' are the choice for paste, sauces boating (as qualified).
