

School Board Amends Policy





in the Dallas area and do not visit as often as their parents would like.



Community Council Has A Multitude Of Services

As was previously announceed, the Community Council of Red River County, Incorporated will begin serving lunches to children in Clarksville, Bogata, Annona, Detroit, and Avery on June 7, and will continue to serve them until August 20. There are very few restrictions as to who is elegible for the service. First you must be between the ages of 0 and 18. You must be able to get to where the meals are being served, and you must not carry anything edible or drinkable out of the building when you leave. They prefer that the children be able to feed themselves or that someone who will feed them come with them.In cases where babies need a bottle or baby food, they must know in advance. All children should sign up in advance also, so that they will know how many sack lunches to bring. These people will come in, serve the lunches, and clean up when they are through. All they ask is that there be one local adult on the premises. There are no income requirements, no religious requirements, and no race requirements. The funds are for the county to use, and they do not care whether you make a million dollars a year, or 500 dollars a year. This is for working mothers and fathers, parents who would like a free hour to walk on the walking track, or whatever. Just sign the children up.

A Look At Religious **Revivals In 1923**

date.

In 1923, a religious "revival" at a Bogata church was truly a revival of the faith. The Rev. J.L. Sullivan, then pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South (now the United Methodist Church) reported to the Texas Christian Advocate that a 15-fday revival January 30-February 13 had resulted in 111 conversions. Eleven others were "reclaimed"

The Rev. W.M. Bowden and party, an evangelist from Ft. Worth, led the services. Revivals in those days normally involved morning and evneing services seven days a week, beginning and ending on a Sunday. "Brother Sullivan" reported that during the 1923 revival people were turned away for lack of seats even though three to eight services were offered daily.

All Bogata's business houses closed from 10 to 11 a.m. each day. Sullivan noted. By the third day, more than three hundred people were singing in the choir. The town was divided into four sections, and well-attended prayer meetings were held in each section. Seven "family altars" were built--does any of these survive, the News wonders.







For Wood Armstrong of Bogata this dream has come true not once but twice

Wood is a familiar figure in Bogata, a friendly, active eighty-eight year old who knows hard work and leads a simple life, attending church regularly and helping others when he can.

His journey towards luxury dream trips began sixty-six years ago. Wood was a young, hard-working man who attended church at Morris Chapel Baptist Church, south of Rugby. 




