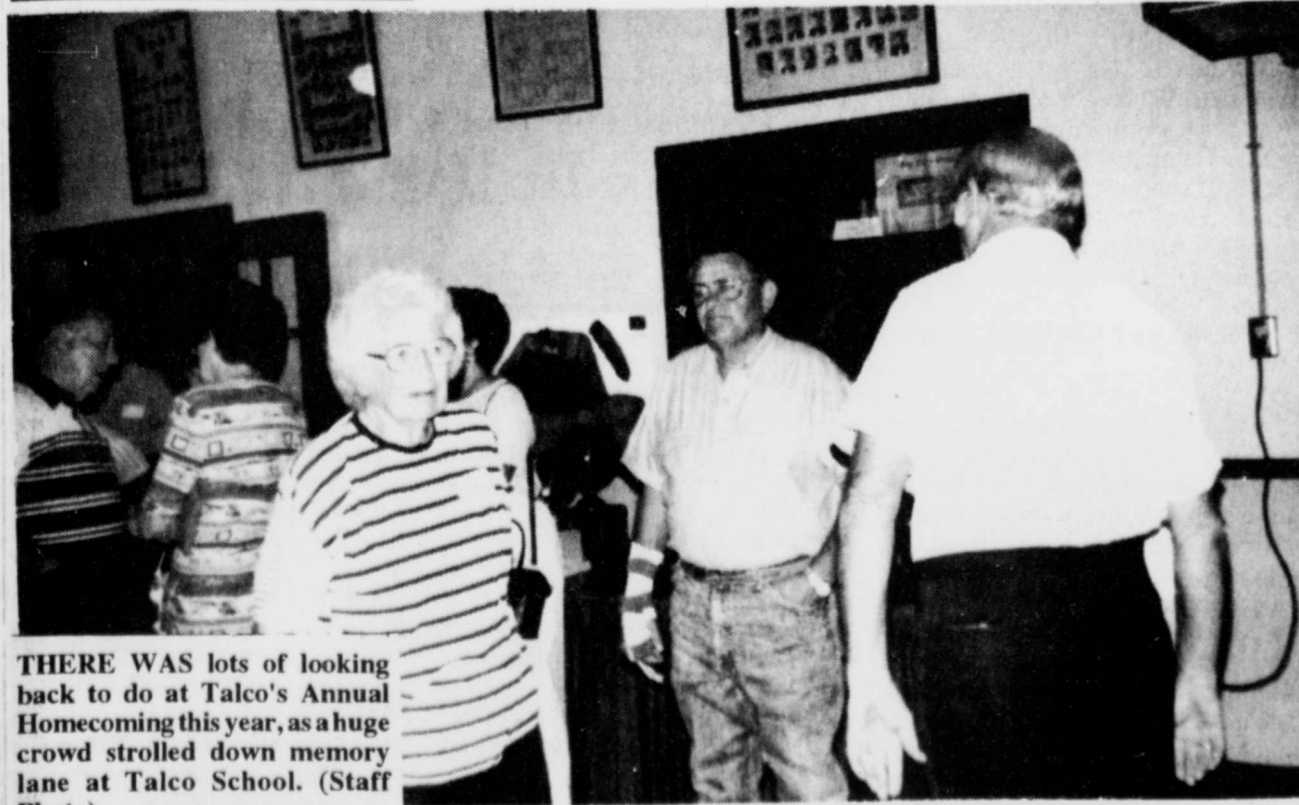

1 or 2 Jalapeno peppers
1-59¢ pkg. Doritos
1-13 oz. can of evaporated milk
Brown meat, add onion, pepper, soup and milk. Simmer five minutes, place Doritos in a 9x12 casserole dish. Add half of meat mixture. Top with cheese and bake at 400 for 20-25 minutes. Serves 6-8.

Sad Cake

1 pkg. BisKitts
1 box brown sugar
4 eggs
1 cup pecans

Agriculture Briefs

Tomato Problems Discussed
Tomato plants in gardens and truck patches need to be checked as several problems have emerged. Heavy infestations of aphids can be found in many gardens, and they must be controlled before they suck the plants to death. Aphids are the small insects on the back of the leaves. They

are reddish in color and have piercing mouth parts for sucking of plant juices. A few aphids on a plant will not cause enough damage to warrant control measures; however, a heavy infestation will cause loss of entire plants. Aphid infested plants will be sticky where the excretion has landed on the leaves and stems.
Malathion and diazinon are two safe insecticides that will control the

aphid. I would suggest that one use either the wettable powder or liquid formulation of either of these insecticides rather than the dust form. A spray solution seems to do a better job on aphids.

While you are applying an insecticide to your tomatoes, add a fungicide to the spray mixture for control of the Early Blight and Septoria Leaf Spot. You will recall that this disease starts out on the lower leaves as brown spots. Entire leaves turn yellow and then brown. As the disease spreads up the plant, most of the leaves often are killed leaving the tomatoes exposed to the hot sunshine. You must keep a film of a fungicide such as Dithane, Manzate, Fore or Captan on the leaves to prevent the infection from occurring. These fungicides are contact fungicides and are easily washed off of the leaves by a rain. I am not aware of a systemic fungicide that is labeled for use on vegetable crops.

We have also received several phone calls from you with regards to the black spots on the blossom-end of tomatoes. This condition is called Blossom End Fruit Rot. It is not a disease. Applying a fungicide to your fruit will not help. It is caused by a condition. Sometimes we can blame too little water, sometime too much water and other times we can attribute it to unavailability of calcium nutrient. If it has been three or four years since you limed your garden space, then you need to add some agricultural limestone this fall to your soil and till it into the soil.
Carpenter Bees Are Active
Carpenter bees have really been active this summer constructing new galleries and cleaning out old ones in rafters on houses and sheds. They are not the Bumble Bee nor Honey Bee, and neither are they the Africanized Bee. They will sting if they are bothered while they are busy preparing to reproduce themselves. Carpenter bees, like most bees, are sensitive to insecticides such as sevin. You should be aware that you cannot knock down bees with sevin. They must get the insecticide inside them. So, the control method is to wait late

in the afternoon when they have retired for the day. Apply the sevin to the area around the hole and into the hole. Then, use some caulking material to stop the hole. If you desire to knock down the Carpenter Bee, use one of the aerosol products.

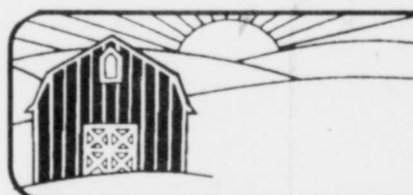

Easy Savings on Energy Bills

Area residents looking for ways to trim their energy bills often need to look no further than their thermostat, according to Texas-New Mexico Power Company.

Inaccurate thermostats or thermostats kept on settings that are too high or too low can waste a significant amount of energy, said Gary Petty, Bogata district manager of TNP.

"For every degree that a thermostat is set above the recommended setting in the winter, there is a 6-8% increase in the amount of energy used," Petty said. "In the summer, the same increase applied for every degree below the recommended setting."

The recommended settings are 68 degrees in the winter and 78 degrees in the summer.

Some homeowners may think they have their thermostat on the recommended setting when they don't because of a faulty thermostat. The easiest way to check a thermostat for accuracy is to place a regular thermometer beside the thermostat for about 30 minutes and compare the reading. The thermostat should be able to maintain the temperature within three degrees of the desired setting. If the thermostat doesn't have the same reading as the thermometer, it needs to be repaired or replaced.

A thermostat can also cause energy use to escalate if it has a short cycling period. If a resident notices

their heating or cooling system cycling on and off every two to three minutes, the cycling needs to be adjusted so that the system comes on and off about every 10 minutes.

Thermostat placement is another factor affecting energy use. A thermostat located near an exterior door or near a lamp, television or other heat-producing appliance will adjust the temperature to the immediate environment, even though the rest of the house may be too cool or warm as a result. Putting a thermostat in a room with a high ceiling is not preferable either.

Another way to save energy with a thermostat is by purchasing a setback thermostat. This device lets the thermostat automatically adjust the temperature at night or during times when the house or apartment is unoccupied. TNP recommends adjusting the temperature down by 10-15 degrees in winter and up by 3-6 degrees in the summer.

The setback thermostat can quickly pay for itself. For instance, a 10 degree setback for 8 hours reduces energy use by 14 percent, research shows. A 5 degree setback saves 10-11 %.

In mild weather, there's an even easier way to save energy. Petty reminded. Residents can simply turn the thermostat off and enjoy the weather.

About eighty years ago, the only means of securing an education in the Talco community was by attending a subscription school which was taught by a highly cultured young lady by the name of Miss Lizzie German. Miss German taught the school in her own home, which was located on the hill south of Mrs. W.H. Crawford's residence. Miss German, after marrying her childhood sweetheart, M.H. Beauford, returned with him to their home in Missouri.

The next school that we are able to get a record of is the old Binion School, which was located about one mile south of Meadows Curve on the old Binion farm. This was the first free school in the community. The building was made of logs with a fireplace in one end. The first teacher to occupy this building was Professor M.C. Cray, who was followed by C.D. Fishback, an uncle of our neighbor, Jim Moore, of the old town.

Following this school was another located on the Adams Lovelace property in the old town, Goolsboro. If the house was standing today it would be in the center of the highway, a little west of the home of Mrs. John Hargrove. It was one long room, boxed and stripped, with double doors in the west end and a single door in the south, and in the winter a stove stood in the center of the room.

There were no desks, and the seats were long, home-made benches, which the children drew up around the stove in order to keep warm. There was a small blackboard on the east wall. This building was also used for church services and other community gatherings. Following are some of the names of principals of the school: C.D. Fishback, Mrs. Carrie Mauldin, W.L. Hudspeth, later a member of the state legislature, P.E. Rogers, a minister of Titus County until his death, Will Cameron, now of Mt. Pleasant, Mr. Robinson and George Morrison, who is now a well

known lawyer in Clarksville.

The third building was also used as a church. Here many young men preached their initial sermons, among them was W.B. Glass, who served as a missionary in China for thirty-seven years. Mr. Glass was the first teacher in this building. The next teacher was Miss Leslie Ferguson of Bogata, who is now the wife of the elder Dr. Grayson of that place. Some other school principals of this school were Wallace Kelley, Jim Hull, now a hardware man in Greenville; Mr. Harbour, Mr. Miller and Mrs. W.O. Keith, whose husband was the first banker in Talco, and who is now postmaster at Cookville. Mr. Kelley is an uncle of our townsman, R.R. Kelley, and was one of the most outstanding teachers we ever had. He created a wonderful spirit of cooperation among the young people, besides encouraging and inspiring them to seek the best in everything. He bought the first library for the Goolsboro school, which consisted of about one hundred books. There are now twenty of these books in the Talco library, all of which are classics by such authors as Tennyson, Byron, Holmes and Emerson.

It was about this time when the name of the post office was changed. In 1912, Mr. Lovelace, the postmaster received a notice to suggest a new name for the office, since the Goolsborough and Goolsboro names were often confused. He suggested names three different times, the names being refused each time. He became disgusted and remarked that if the department wanted to change the name it could do so. Later he received another notice saying that the post office would be discontinued if no name was received from him by a certain date. This notice threw Mr. Lovelace into a state of panic. Dallas Fry, Everett Lewellin and J.H. Brown, who were in the store in which the post

office was located, tried to help Mr. Lovelace. One of them seeing "Talco Candy Company" on a packing box under the counter, suggested, "Talco". The name was sent in and accepted.

The fourth school for Talco was a two-story brick building which stood where the home economics building is today. The following principals occupied that building: Ira Masters, A.Z. Hays, who is now teaching a rural school near Mt. Pleasant, R.C. Marshall and Roy Bray.

Our next school was the brick building which now stands on our campus. The superintendents of this school were Joe B. White, now county superintendent, and Fred Blackard. These are five townspeople who served as assistant teachers in former days: Mrs. Hopwood taught with Ira Master. Mmes. Onis Welch and W.W. Barber and Fred Blackard with Joe B. White and Miss Beulah Smith with A.Z. Hoys, R.C. Marshall, Joe B. White and Fred Blackard.

At present we have the same eight room brick cottage which under the supervision of B.E. Dunagan have almost been surrounded by shacks in which are housed about 700 school children and twenty-nine teachers.

Soon we are to move into the magnificent white brick building on Geiger Heights. This is another big stride toward our goal, "Talco School, Second To None!"

Ed. Note: This article was not written by Ray Miller, Rivercrest Principal, as last weeks paper mistakenly printed. He sent the article to the paper after finding it in his office files. The article was apparently written by a member of the Talco graduating class of 1937-38. Mr. Miller graduated from Rivercrest in 1966, the last senior class to graduate at the Talco High School building. At the time of the writing of the article, the school was where the Calvary Baptist Church is now located.
