Dial 1-800-4-Cancer

Whether it's 9 a.m. in El Paso or Oklahoma City, telephones at the Cancer Information Service (CIS) begin ringing each Monday through Friday until it's 4:30 p.m. in Brownsville or Tulsa.

And thanks to National Cancer Institute funding, the six CIS telephone lines will ring nonstop into 1997.

The NCI, the federal government's primary cancer research agency, awarded the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center a \$4.74 million contract to continue operation of this successful public education program based in Houston.

The CIS at M.D. Anderson Cancer Center is one of 19 regional offices located at NCI-designated Comprehensive Cancer Centers, such as M.D. Anderson, and other major hospitals across the U.S. It will serve the 20 million residents of Texas and Oklahoma.

"I am extremely pleased to see that this successful and important program has received the support and acknowledgement it so richly deserves," says U.S. Rep. Mike Andrews, D-Houston. "An educational and informative program such as this is one of the vital keys to increasing public understanding of this most feared disease."

The CIS provides access to state-of-the-art cancer information in English and Spanish through its telephone service and community outreach programs.

By dialing 1-800-4-CANCER, callers in the two states are connected automatically to the CIS in Houston. Information Specialists answer questions on cancer prevention, detection, diagnosis, treatment and rehabilitation. NCI publications written in English and Spanish also are mailed free to the caller as a follow-up to the discussion with the information specialist.

To help callers address the physical, financial and emotional chal-

lenges presented by the disease, the CIS maintains a resource directory of more than 3,000 cancer-related services and programs in Texas and Oklahoma.

"One of the great things about the program is that we help callers locate resources for assistance in their own community," said Jo Ann Ward, CIS coordinator. "Cancer is one of the most difficult challenges a person can face in life. We strive to help callers make the ordeal less stressful."

To help residents learn how to prevent cancer or detect the disease early when treatment is most successful, CIS outreach coordinators work with private and public health care agencies and the media to promote educational messages and materials which address specific cancer problems in their geographic region.

Special efforts target high-risk populations including African Americans, Hispanics and Native Americans.

More than 315, 000 callers from all backgrounds have called the CIS since its inception at M.D. Anderson 16 years ago. CIS Community outreach programs, such as health fairs and community presentations, have reached another 129,000 people since 1976.

Nationwide, the CIS responds to more than 500,000 requests annually for cancer information. The majority of calls to 1-800-4-CANCER come from cancer patients, their family and friends, health care professionals and the general public. The CIS staff uses a variety of resources to respond to inquiries, including NCI's Physician data Query data base of current information on the early detection and standard treatment of cancer. The data base also provides a nationwide listing of NCI-approved clinical trials that study new ways of treating cancer and may provide patients with more options.

Low fat Chocolate Chip Cookies

1 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup sugar
1 cup Smart Beat Margarine
2 1/2 cups self rising flour
2 eggbeaters
2 tsp. vanilla
1/4 cup mini chocolate chips of New mini Fun Chips (Mayberrys)

Cream together sugars, margarine, Egg Beaters, and vanilla. Add flour and mix until blended well. Chill dough for one hour. Drop dough by rounded teaspoonfuls onto cookie sheets sprayed with non-fat cooking spray. Press 4-5 choc. chips into each dough ball. Bake at 375 degrees for 8-10 minutes or until golden brown.

1/4 tsp. pepper

Cook macaroni according to package. drain. Rinse macaroni with cold water. drain again. Combine mayonnaise and pepper; pour over macaroni mixture, stirring well. Chill.

1 can Eagle Brand condensed milk
1 can cherry pie filling
1 no. 2 can crushed pineapple drained
1 large container Cool Whip

Mix all ingredients together. Pour into cupcake liners which are placed in muffin pan; freeze.

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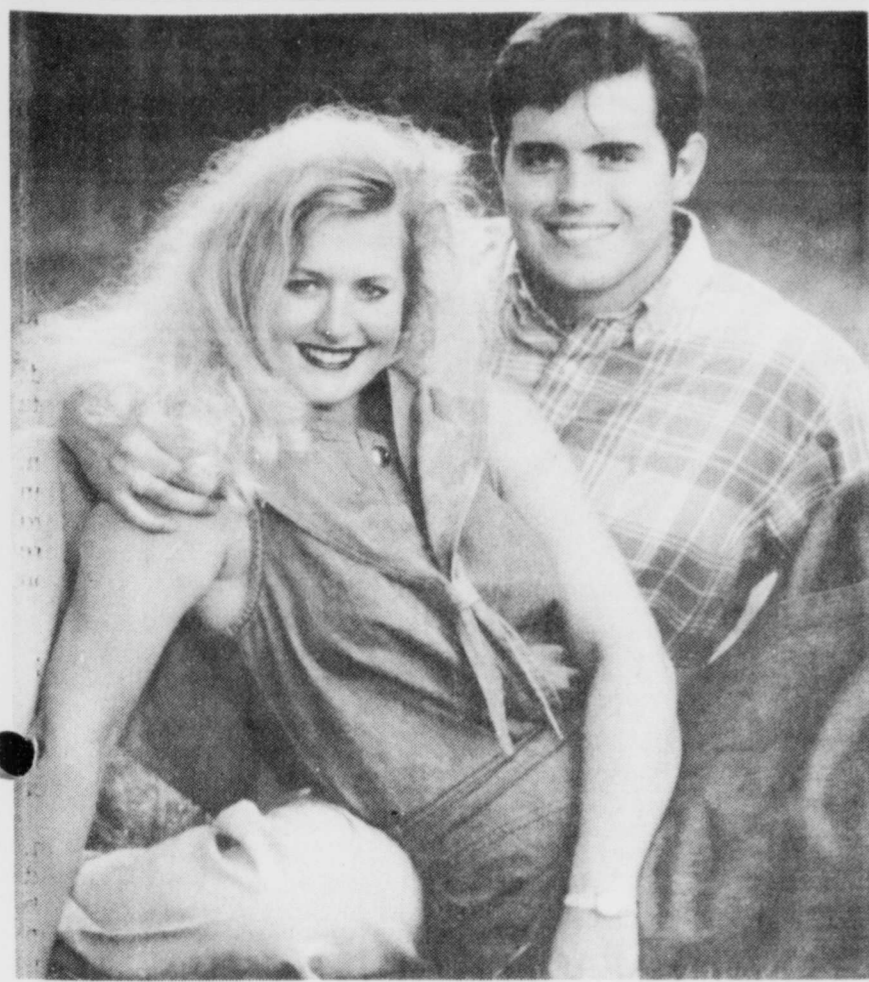

The Social Security Administration's "downsizing" of its workforce makes it necessary to periodically evaluate the way business is done and make appropriate changes according to Hudson. "We are careful to insure that these changes in no way diminish the level of public service provided to the citizens of Clarksville or the immediate surrounding area. It is our hope these changes will re-

sult in better service to the public by allowing more flexibility, and at the same time allow us to operate our agency in a more efficient manner considering our limited resources," Hudson stated.

Teleservice appointments will continue to be offered, a service which was made available several years ago.

The contact station at the Elderberry Center handles in-office visitors on a first-come, first-serve basis but to alleviate lengthy waits, the individuals are offered teleservice appointments. Hudson said, "Any individual wanting to make such an appointment can call the Elderberry Center on the Tuesday of our visit, or leave a message for us to call them. We have a box for such messages. They can also make appointments by calling the Paris office number 1-903-785-0761, Monday through Friday, 9:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m., or calling the Social Security's toll-free number 1-800-772-1213 business days between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m."

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
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

A Twelve-Year Old's View Of Russia

Young Gymnast Sees Country Up Close

When you were twelve years old, would you have gone, without your family, with a group to Russia? Many twelve-year olds wouldn't, but for NeLeigh King, and the other youngsters in her group, it was simply another challenge to be met.
NeLeigh is the daughter of Dicky and Jayne King of Reno, and the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Travis King of Fulbright and Mr. and Mrs. Travis Bishop of Annona.
She has been involved in gymnastics since she began going to kindergarten. Along the road she has won numerous medals including state competitions.
She was among a group of thirty people-coaches, parents and girls, who have just returned from two weeks in Russia.
Randy and Kay Brown of Paris Gymnastics went, as well as Larry Matthews and daughter Kimberly, Amber Blackburn and Keri Pinalto. The rest of the group was from Georgia.

The trip came about through coach Gary Goodson, who knows a Russia gym coach who moved to the U.S. and they take a group over every year.
The group left from DFW to fly first to Frankfurt, Germany, then on to Saint Petersburg, Russia.
From their hotel overlooking the Gulf of Finland the girls quickly established a routine. For ten days their days followed roughly the same pattern.
Up at 7:00 a.m. they ate breakfast at 8. The meal usually consisted of a fried egg and bread. The girls would bring jars of peanut butter down with them (they had been warned and came prepared with peanut butter, crackers, chocolate mixes and snacks) to help make the bread more palatable.
They rode the thirty miles from their hotel into Saint Petersburg, and worked out at a gym from 10:30 until 12:30. Then they would eat lunch in a restaurant and go sightseeing during the afternoon.
Late in the afternoon they would work out again at a different gym, then go back to the hotel for their evening meal.

The Russian girls that the American girls worked with all spoke some English. The American girls gave them tee shirts, blue jeans and even gym bags. They were thrilled, and tended to wear the clothing each and every day after that.
Although it is well known that Russian athletes receive excellent treatment, the girls only had one gym outfit apiece.
In fact, the very little girls practice in only their underwear. One knows they have the potential to be a good gymnast when they earn their gym practice outfit! The gyms were cold, with no heat.
"Goody Bags" filled with gums, candies and small items were received by these young Russian gymnasts with obvious delight.
After ten days in Saint Petersburg, the group boarded the famed Orient Express to travel all night across the huge country to Moscow. Of course, if they stayed awake they could see the country going by...the nights are currently only about an hour or so long. One of the things they noticed were many nuclear power plants.
In Moscow the girls were delighted to find that they had hot water daily! They could also drink the tap water...something they were not supposed to do elsewhere in the country because it could cause sickness. Cokes were available for between \$1 and \$2. Otherwise it was hot tea to drink.
In Moscow they worked out at different gyms morning and evening, went shopping or sightseeing.
NeLeigh says one of the first things they were taken to see was Lenin's body... literally, his body, lying in a glass "box thing".
They saw Red Square and the Kremlin, the famous St Peters Basilica with its swirling onion domes and gilt, and went to a place called Scott's which was a blackmarket. Shopping there is an accepted thing, and it was there that the girls found the best prices, and the best goods.
A beautiful hand made porcelain doll, with flaxen hair and hand beaded silk dress cost the young shopper \$20. The "stack dolls" that are so well-

known were inexpensive, as were lovely handpainted lacquer boxes.
Tee shirts in Russian, clothing and books lined the booths.

A meal at the world's largest McDonalds prompted the record in her diary "Today-Real Food". Mostly, she says, they were served chicken, cucumbers and bread...and more chicken, cucumbers and bread, along with the ubiquitous "Borsch" (beet soup).

What does this young gymnast remember most when asked?

That there was no hot water, that public restrooms expect you to bring your own toilet tissue, that poverty was everywhere and there were beggars outside the churches.

She says that "all the cars look alike, no matter what color or how old, they are all boxes with four doors".

She will tell you in awe that they were served egg and onion pizza, and that on the streets almost everyone wore dark clothing.

She will tell you about a U.S. Coach in a bakery giving an old woman enough money to buy a loaf of bread, because she didn't have enough to buy a slice of bread.

And, she will tell you about the going away party...where all the girls and coaches they had worked with gave the American girls gifts.

The girls actually have nothing to give...literally nothing. So, they had coaches and others bring things that could be spared.

Among the gifts are a baby rattle, post cards, a menu planner (at least that's what she thinks it is) and a book of Russian Fairy Tales, tattered and obviously much-used.

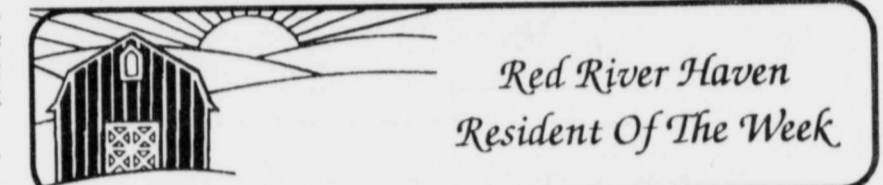
The generosity behind these offerings is obvious...the poverty equally so.

The group from Paris returned Saturday, tired, but much enriched. Working on their gymnastics skills was the smaller portion of all they learned. They encountered a culture most of us basically know little about.

NeLeigh will tell you that she might go back, and had a grand trip. She learned several words of Russian in the two weeks there... "yes", "no", "thank you", "tea", the word for grandmother and the phrase which she greeted her parents with. "Ya Dona" she cried, running full tilt into her mother's arms... "Ya Dona, ya dona"... "I'm Home, I'm Home".

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
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Who Says Cows Can't Fly?

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry bid bon voyage to Texas Brahman heifers bound for Thailand through the TDA export pens at Houston Intercontinental Airport on Monday. The Brahmans are part of a record-breeding sale to the Thai government.

Over 700 Texas cattle, costing more than \$840,000, will be sent to Thailand in three air shipments. Thai government farms have been purchasing Texas breeding stock since 1986. A 1991 Brahman purchase by Thailand was the largest of its kind at the time.

"Texans don't know the meaning of the word impossible. We've learned that cows can fly and be happy living somewhere people don't speak in a Texas twang," Perry said. "Texas

has long been known for excellent cattle genetics, and the Thai have had great success with our Brahmans. The climates are similar, and our Brahman have helped the Thai improve their own cattle stock."


Ausswin Wongwan, director of Complete Agriculture Systems of Thailand, purchased the cattle for the Thai Department of Livestock Development. The Thai government runs 32 farms and the Brahman heifers will be distributed over those farms to improve the quality of Thai Brahmans.

On Monday, 310 heifers were loaded onto special 747 jumbo jets bound for Bangkok. The cattle were selected from 69 Brahman breeders across Texas. The total economic impact of the deal is over \$2.6 mil-

lion. In 1991, The Thai government purchased 660 head of Texas Brahman, the largest single Texas cattle purchase by any foreign country in the past 20 years and the largest effort ever by Thailand.

Under Perry, TDA began a marketing program called "Texas Livestock...Best in Any Language," which promotes the excellent quality of Texas livestock around the country as well as to foreign countries.

Texas has now exported over 3,000 head of livestock valued at over \$3 million through Houston Intercontinental since January, and over 300,000 head through all TDA export pens. Over 2,000 sheep were shipped to India through the Houston pens a month ago.

Governor Signs Bill For Inmate Work Programs

Governor Richards signed into law House Bill 864 which will allow incarcerated inmates in county jails waiting to be transferred to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice to volunteer for county inmate work programs. Current law only allows persons who are in jail awaiting trial, or who have been convicted of a misdemeanor to participate in such programs.

"Implementing meaningful work, rehabilitation and educational programs continue to be major issues that face today's criminal justice system. Encouraging positive work ethic is a vital component to the mission of TDCJ," said Governor Richards.

"I commend Rep. Johnson on sponsoring this bill and local sheriffs for supporting it. The state needs more of these productive work programs for inmates."

Rep. Johnson echoed the Governor's sentiments. "The general public wants inmates to work. Most inmates would rather work than sit in a cell all day, and our local communities can benefit from inmate work programs."

Rep. Johnson worked closely with East Texas sheriffs in formulating

the bill and credits them with the idea. "They were instrumental in developing the idea," he added.

"The result of passage of H.B. 864 is a win-win situation. Many people have felt that these prisoners should be utilized in a productive manner. County projects and a cut down in disciplinary problems are only a few of the benefits from this program," stated Sen. Haley (D-Center).

H.B. 864 clarifies existing law and permits local sheriffs to institute work programs and have all qualified inmates participate voluntarily. Studies show that skills the majority of the inmates claim to have do not prove to be valid.

Provisions in H.B. 864 also allow for inmates who voluntarily participate in these programs to be awarded good conduct time earned. It is the responsibility of the local sheriff to certify any good conduct time earned. The disposition of the good conduct time will be used by the director of TDCJ.

Sponsors of H.B. 864 are Rep. Jerry Johnson (D-Nacogdoches) and Sen. Bill Haley (D-Center). The bill will become effective on August 30, 1993.

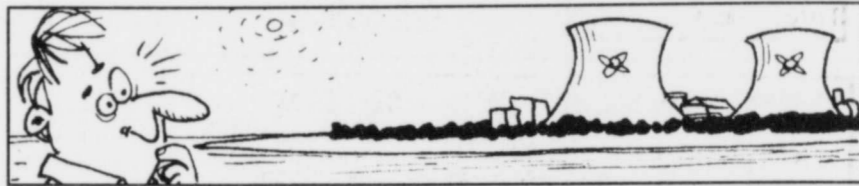
Microwave Maple-Bacon Oven Pancake

- 1 1/2 cups Bisquick® baking mix
- 1 1/2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese or process American cheese
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/4 cup maple-flavored syrup
- 1 tbsp. sugar
- 2 eggs
- 12 slices bacon (about 1/2 pound), crisply cooked and crumbled


Grease and flour microwavable pie plate, 10 x 1 1/2 inches. Beat baking mix, 1/2 cup of the cheese, the milk, syrup, sugar and eggs with wire whisk or hand beater until only small lumps remain; pour into pie plate.

Sprinkle with remaining cheese and the bacon. Microwave uncovered on inverted plate just until cheese is melted, 1 to 1 1/2 minutes longer. Serve with maple-flavored syrup if desired. 8 servings.

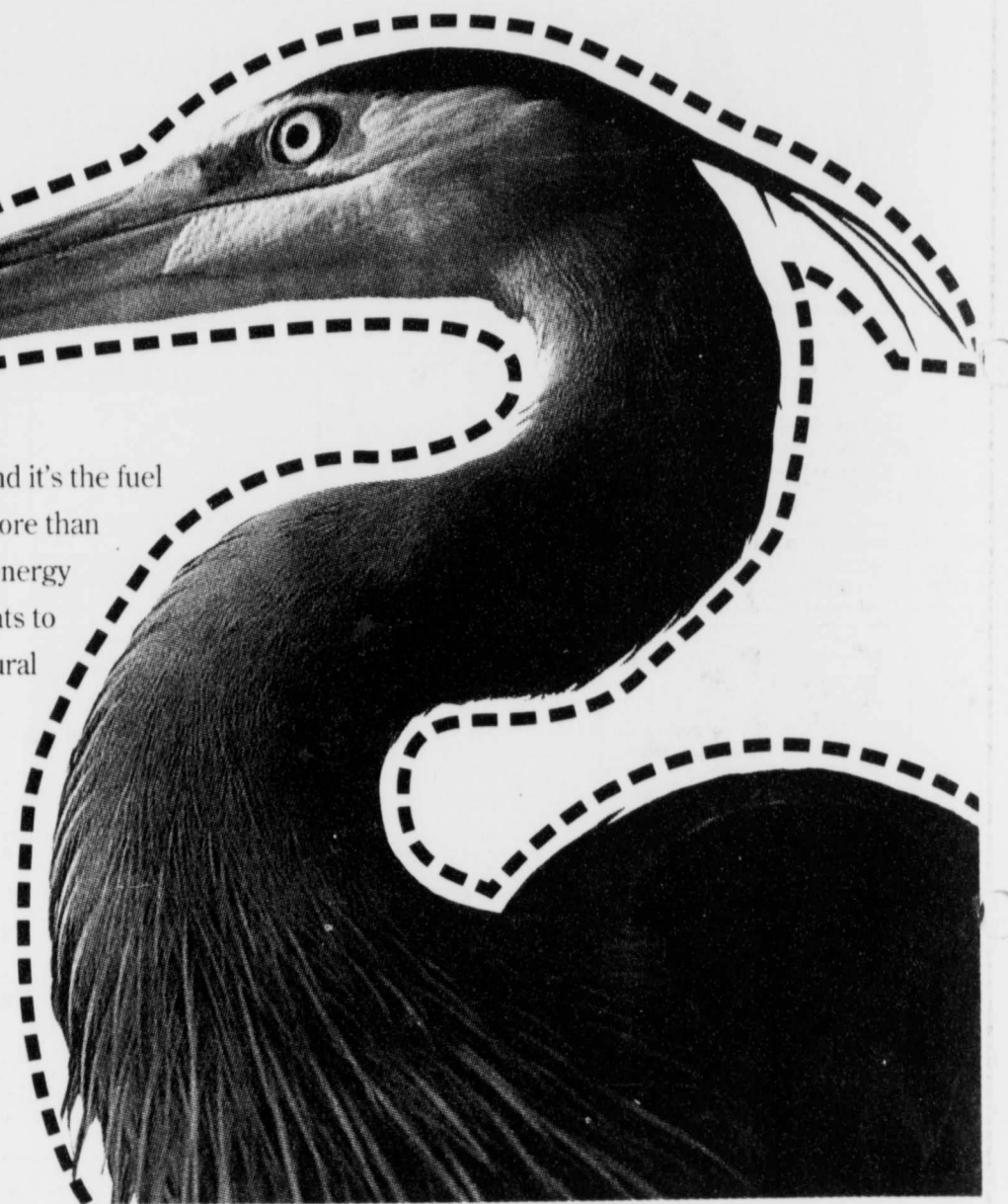
