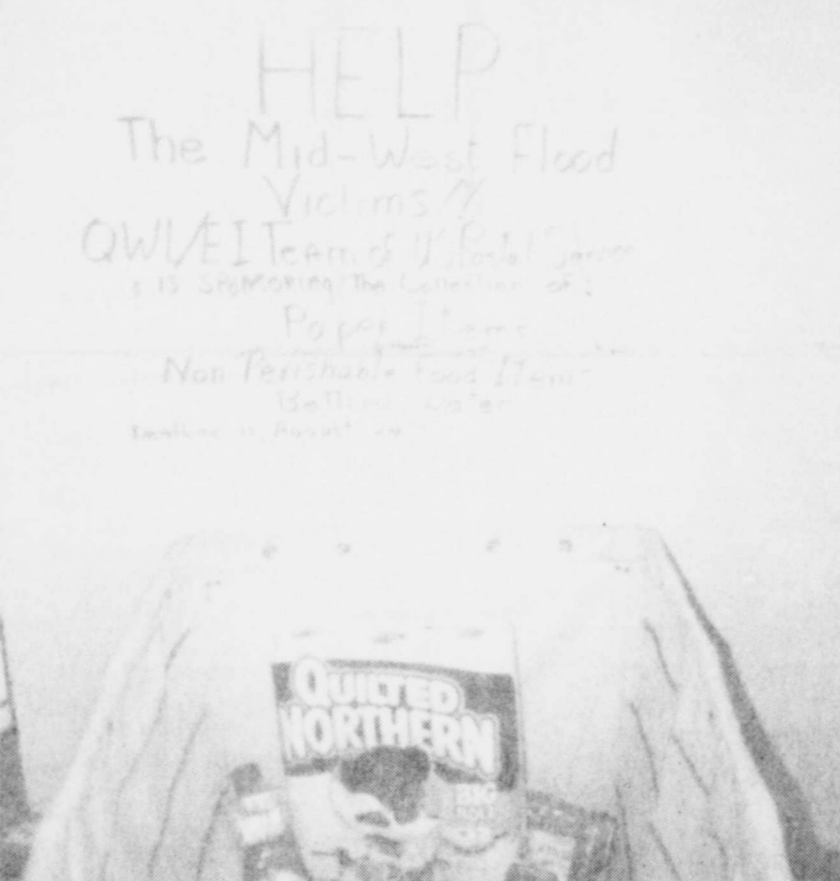

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at the Texas Department of Health, 1014 N. Jefferson, Mt. Pleasant.

Clinic hours will be from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Parents may call the clinic for an appointment for their child, (903) 572-9877, or arrive on a walk-in basis.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guidelines, beginning at two months of

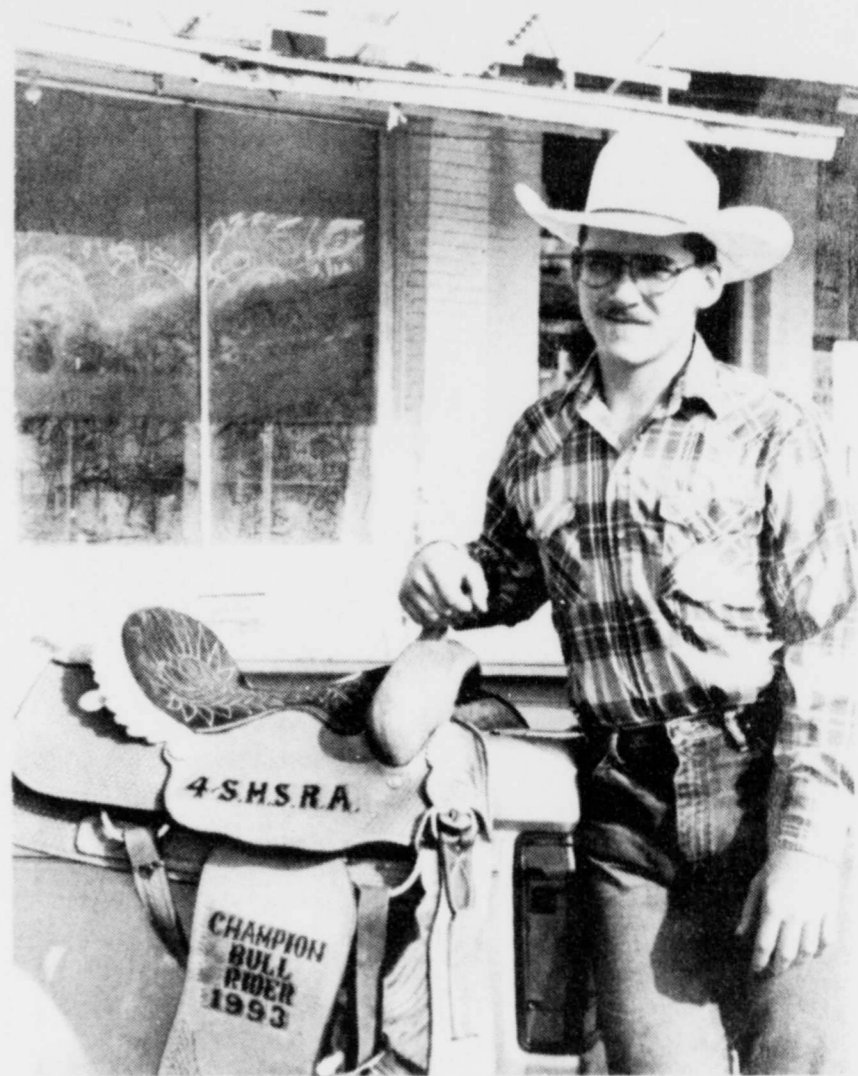
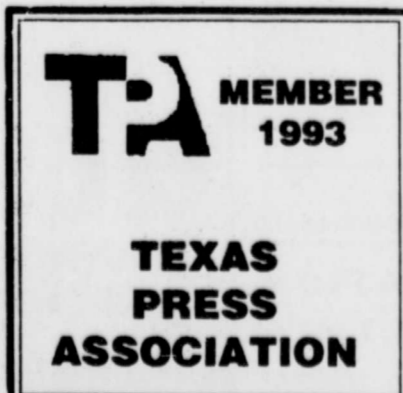
age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenza type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.

1 medium onion chopped
3 Tbsp. Butter
1 can cream of chicken soup*
1 can cream of mushroom soup*
1 cup chicken broth*
*Mix these three together
1 small can green chiles (chopped)
1-2 to 3 lb chicken cooked and boned
1 pkg. corn tortillas
1 lb longhorn cheese grated

Saute onion and chiles in butter. Add soups and chicken. In a large baking dish, place layers of soups, tortillas, and cheese and repeat with cheese on top of casserole. Cook 30 minutes at 350 degrees, let set 10 minutes before serving.

Nettie L. Provence Dies In Midland

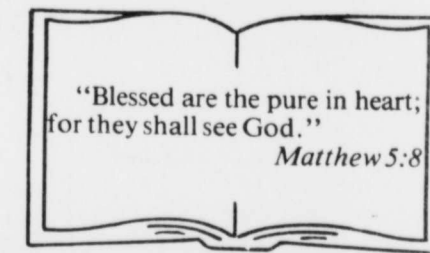

J.W. Stinson's football season in Forney, TX early last year and so did his hopes of gaining a scholarship at a four-year school.

He tore the anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee on November 13 during Forney's third play.

Instead of spending the off season weighing offers, the two-time all district lineman was forced to spend it making offers by selling himself and rehabilitating the knee. With the help of his parents, Jackie and Katy, he found a place to play. SMU asked if he'd be interested in walking on, but the Stinsons felt he'd get more of an opportunity at a junior college. He found his best bet was the junior college route, and on June 23 he signed with Navarro in Corsicana and will report to practice on August 14.

He toyed with a lot of defenders on his way to being selected as a first team all district and all county lineman his senior year, but the fun was replaced by hard work as Stinson

began trying to come back from major knee surgery. The Stinsons felt they were in good hands with Dr. Pat Evans, the former team doctor for the Dallas Cowboys, performing the surgery.

The knee, so far, looks good, with only a pair of four inch scars, two small dots, where the arthroscopic camera was inserted, and some slight puffiness advertising the November mishap. He's anxious to prove he belongs at a four year college, plus something else. "I've got an uncle that told me I couldn't play with 'em, so I wanna prove him wrong, plus a bunch of other people that doubted me."


He's been lifting weights, running two miles a day and has full mobility in his leg. The next step is regaining confidence in the repaired knee.

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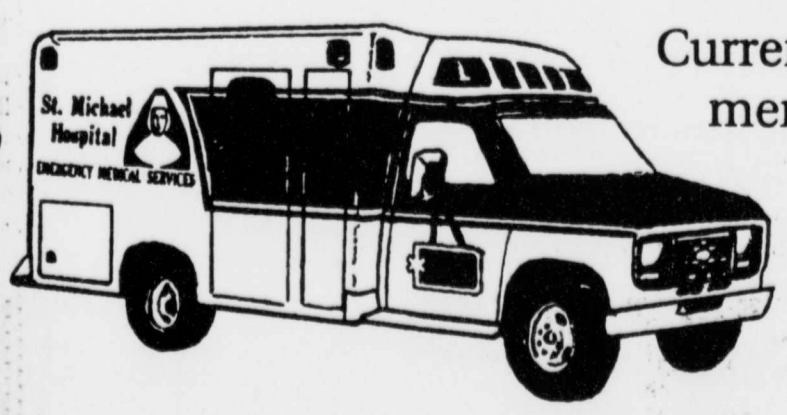

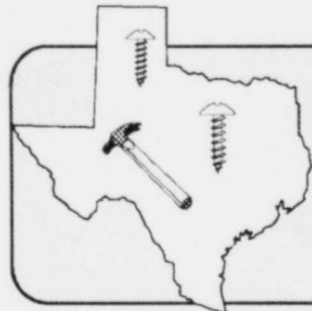

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Comments From Your County Attorney
 Jack Herrington
State Boot Camp
 You probably have heard of boot camp but wondered what it is and who is eligible to participate in the program. A district judge can sentence someone to the institutional division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice (prison) and retain his jurisdiction for 90 days. After 75 days, but before the 90 days after the convicted person is received into custody, the judge of that court that imposed the sentence may place the person on community supervision (probation) and recommend placement of the person in the state boot camp. A court may recommend a person for placement in the state boot camp program only if:
 1. the person is otherwise eligible for community supervision;
 2. the person is 17 years of age or older but younger than 26 years;
 3. the person is physically and mentally capable of participating in a program that requires strenuous physical activity;
 4. the person is not convicted of an offense punishable as a state jail felony.
 This program is available for the younger offender who demonstrates a desire for help and who in the opinion of the court, may be salvaged with the help of the State Boot Camp Program.

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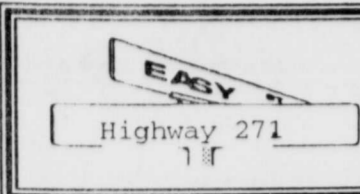

TDH To Improve Pediatric EMS

Fiction abounds of ambulance personnel, firefighters and police officers performing nick-of-time rescues of children—near-miracles performed by skilled, trained and precisely equipped heroes.

In real life and death situations though, children are less likely than adults to receive the exact emergency care they need after a traumatic injury. Traumatic injury remains the leading cause of death for U.S. children younger than 14.

According to Dr. David R. Smith, Texas Commissioner of Health, who also is a pediatrician, "This state's excellent emergency medical services (EMS) reflect the values Texans place on human life and the prevention of suffering."

"However," Dr. Smith said, "EMS is basically prepared to serve adults. Because children lack the physiological and anatomical development of adults, the emergency procedures, equipment and dosages for adults often are ill-suited to treating children. Children are not just small adults."

Dr. Smith explained that ensuring a child's survival and minimizing traumatic damage sometimes requires special equipment and medications, as well as specific training for the emergency personnel.

To adapt the state's EMS systems to better serve children, the Texas Department of Health Bureau of Emergency Management began two years ago to train emergency personnel in a 16-hour pediatric EMS course. The course is funded by a

federal program to improve emergency medical services for children nationwide. About 1,000 Texas medics and instructors will have been trained by the end of this year. Already, 71 nurses and 61 physicians, mostly from rural areas, have received a related course.

The state's EMSC program gained an added boost this year when the legislature passed House Bill 2385, a law requiring TDH to expand the EMSC program. It is the second such state law in the country. Only New Jersey has passed a similar law.

Effective September 1, the Texas law establishes a seven-member Pediatric Advisory Committee, made up of experts in managing prehospital care, emergency room, acute care, children's hospitals and rehabilitation services.

The committee's main job will be to advise the Texas Board of Health on creating a Texas pediatric emergency service system, including children's injury prevention; hospital designations; triage, transfer and transportation policies; prehospital procedures; rehabilitation services; equipment needed at all stages of care; and data collection and analysis.

"As a pediatrician, I have seen the tragic results of EMS' lack of specialized treatment for kids. I welcome the state's new priority for EMS. As health commissioner, I see this as long needed authority to help reduce the number of deaths and disabilities in among Texas children," Dr. Smith added.
