Talco-Bogata CISD Adopts Resolution In Special Meeting

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District met in Special Meeting, October 4, 1993, at noon in the Rivercrest High School Board Room.

Trustees present were Jerry Russell, President; Frank Stubblefield, Vice President; Mollie Williams, Secretary; Eddy Brown; Ricky Franks; Sandra Ingram; John Ward. Superintendent Freddy Wade was also present.

The meeting was opened with prayer led by Ricky Franks.

The board discussed joining the litigation challenging the adequacy of the State's funding for public schools in Texas.

A motion was made by John Ward, seconded by Ricky Franks, to adopt the Resolution concerning the adequacy of the State's funding for public schools in Texas; the motion carried unanimously.

The Resolution is as follows: WHEREAS, THE Board of Trustees of Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District is charged by law with the responsibility to manage and govern the public free schools of the district.

WHEREAS, we, the individual members of the Board of Trustees, are public officers who have taken a solemn oath to support and defend the constitution and laws of the United States and the State of Texas.

WHEREAS, Article VII, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixes upon the Legislature of the State the duty to make suitable provision for the support and maintenance of an efficient system of public free schools.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District is charged by law with the responsibility to manage and govern the public free schools of the district.

WHEREAS, we, the individual members of the Board of Trustees, are public officers who have taken a solemn oath to support and defend the constitution and laws of the United States and the State of Texas.

The Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District further authorizes the Board of Trustees of the TASB Legal Assistance Fund to retain attorneys to file this suit and to make other decisions regarding the conduct of this litigation.

October 7, 1993

Tony's Tiger Bites
 1 10 oz. pkg. (about 40) regular marshmallows
 1/4 cup margarine
 1/3 cup peanut butter
 7 1/2 cups or one 10 ounce package Kellogg's Frosted Flakes cereal
 1. Melt margarine in large saucepan over low heat. Add marshmallows and stir until completely melted. Remove from heat.
 2. Stir in peanut butter until mixture is smooth. Add Kellogg's Frosted Flakes cereal, stirring until well coated.
 3. Using a buttered spatula or waxed paper, press mixture into a lightly greased 13 X 9 X 2 inch pan. Cut into 1 1/2 X 2 inch bars.
Ham Balls
 1/2 lb ground ham
 1/2 ob. ground lean pork
 1/2 cup Pet milk
 1 or 2 eggs
 1 cup bread crumbs
 1 Tbsp. flour
 1/2 cup warm water
 1 Tbsp. prepared mustard

1/2 cup Brown sugar
 1 Tbsp. vinegar
 Mix first 6 ingredients and shape into meat balls. make a sauce of the remaining ingredients and pour over meat balls. Let set for 1 hour in refrigerator. Bake at 325 degrees for 30 minutes - turn and cook for another 30 minutes.
Jalapena Chicken
 Boneless chicken breast fillets
 1 large onion chopped
 1 bell pepper sliced
 1 Jalapena pepper diced
 About 1/3 cup soy Sauce
 2 heaping tablespoons brown sugar
 1/2 tsp garlic powder
 Spray Wok or large skillet with Pam. Roll chicken fillets which have been cut into bite sized pieces in flour and brown in Wok. Add onion and peppers. Cook and stir until chicken is done. Add soy sauce and brown sugar and garlic powder. You really shouldn't need much salt because the soy sauce is salty. If this is not hot enough for you add more peppers. Let mixture cook until liquid is reduced. Serve with rice.

Dear Editor:
October is National Fire Prevention Month. The winds of winter carry one of the deadliest seasons for home fires. Woodstoves, fireplaces and alternative

heaters are often necessary to fight the cold, but if not used properly they can become fire hazards. The increase of fires during the winter months is particularly ominous for the state of Texas, which ranks among the nation's top states in fire deaths. The need for fire safety information is critical. Fire kills close to 5,500 people in the United States every year-- more than all other natural disasters combined. October has been deemed Na-

tional Fire Prevention Month, we hope you can do a story on the hazards of fire, particularly in the state of Texas, to warn your audience on how to avoid them. The United States Fire Administration (USFA) has issued the following recommendations to reduce the number of fire related deaths this winter: **Alternative Heaters**- *Use space heaters in well-ventilated rooms * Place heaters where they will not be knocked over easily and away from curtains, furniture and other items that burn. *Plug heaters directly into wall sockets, not into extension cords. * Unplug heaters when they are not being used. **Woodstoves and Fireplaces** *Use seasoned wood and protective screens at all times. *Clean interiors, hearths and chimneys yearly. **Sleep Safety Practices**- *Never Smoke in bed * Use only electric blankets approved by testing labs. * Don't run cords under beds or trap against walls. **Safe Cooking Practices** - * Don't leave the stove unattended while cooking. * Keep clothing, curtains and other fabrics away from the stove. * Make sure the stove is off

and all small appliances are unplugged before going to bed. Don't forget- A smoke detector is useless without a working battery. Check them often.

QUESTION: Why does some of my mail have stickers or writing on them that say my address is wrong? I have been getting my mail at this address for years.

ANSWER: There are a couple of good reasons why we would like for you to use your correct address. First, The Postal Service is going to automate the way we process mail. That means that a machine will

sort your mail by the address that is on it. So if the wrong address is on it, your mail may go somewhere else or be returned because the address is not a current one. Second: Because I am new here and I am not familiar with the different families, I can very easily sort your mail to someone else. The bottom line is it costs more to deliver your mail if it has the wrong address, and this in turn will keep the cost of

postage stamps going up.

QUESTION: I would like for my mail to be held on the day my checks come in and I will pick them up later in the day. Will you do this?

ANSWER: Yes, we will hold your checks on the 1st and the 3rd. Starting with the Month of November, we are starting a new method of doing this. I have a form that you must sign stating that you would like for us to hold your mail on these stated days. We also will not hand any mail until after 9:30 a.m. The reason for this is the Rural Carrier must have time to case his mail. There will be forms available at the Post Office for you to sign. Mail will not be held if this form has not been signed. **THIS IS FOR THE 1st AND 3rd CHECKS ONLY.**

Keeping Healthy

Appendicitis

Symptoms of appendicitis may include slight fever, nausea, constipation and abdominal pain. The pain does not always begin on the lower right side of the abdomen where the appendix is located. It may start in the center of the abdomen and then move to the lower right side. The swollen appendix, filled with pus and fluid, may block off its supply of blood and its nerve supply. When this happens, the person may get some relief from pain, but with it's blood supply cut off, the wall of the appendix weakens and sometimes ruptures. The pus which breaks through may infect vital organs in the abdominal cavity. This is called a perforated appendix. In some patients, particularly infants and children, the interval between onset of pain and perforation may be a matter of hours.

Although not every pain in the abdomen indicates appendicitis, any such pain that is persistent and that is accompanied by loss of appetite, nausea, vomiting and fever should be reported to a physician.

Rev. and Mrs. Huffman Lead Locals on Tour

Virginia Cox and Sue Beard of Bogata and Ella Brakefield of New Orleans, LA flew out of the Houston airport on July 18 to visit with the Rev. and Mrs. Wayne Huffman - Assembly of God Missionaries to Romania. They were met in Vienna, Austria by the Huffmans. After staying several days at the Assembly of God Headquarters in Vienna, they left for Germany.

Austria and Germany were beautiful with an abundance of flowers, but extremely cold for July. The highlight was riding a ski lift to the top of the Alps. From Germany we went on to Rome, Italy, where we toured the Roman Ruins. Very impressive was the place where the Christians were fed to the lions. We visited the Vatican, toured Venece, the city surrounded by water.

On July 26 we left Bari, Italy, by ship for Greece. In Greece we went to Phillipi where Paul was in jail. Part of the cells are still standing among the ruins. We stayed in Tessonalika Greece, where the book of Tessonalians was written. We visited the ruins and saw where Paul spoke. Italy and Greece were very hot and

dry.

From Greece we left for Bulgaria. The conditions in Bulgaria are very poor. Crops are still carried in from the fields by donkey wagon. Vegetable stands are plentiful along the side of the road. People were washing clothes in streams by beating them on rocks. They could be seen carrying their water in hand-pulled carts.

After leaving Bulgaria, we arrived in Romania. Hot, tired, and bone weary only to wait seven and a half hours at the border while everyone working took a break for supper then another break. We arrived in Bucarest, Romania, at 3 AM. What a sad sight! Little children, called street children, were everywhere begging. An estimated 1500 young children live on the streets and sleep in the underground sewer systems. This is a country of very little. Going into a store, one will find bare shelves. Water is a luxury. Now, each time I turn my faucet on, I am thankful for Bogata water. Food is scarce.

The Huffmans buy most of their food in Austria or Hungary and hope they get back into Romania with it. Either way, it is a two day ordeal. The

Romanian people have gone through so much and have so little, yet they want to share what they do have. We were entertained by a lovely family of 14 in a four room apartment, but they fixed us their best.

After leaving Romania, we travelled through Hungary to the airport in Vienna, Austria.

We learned that the countries we were in had only one traffic rule: do not let anyone pass no matter that you are on a mountain curve or cliff or whatever. The center stripe of the highway is for the cars to drive on and see which one chickens out first.

On my passport envelope these words by O'Henry stayed with me my entire journey "Never does the American flag look as good as when it's flying on foreign soil."

Bogata looked so good when I returned. Let's all take time to be thankful for the things we take for granted and pray for our home town foreign missionaries.

Wayne Huffman will be remembered for his volunteer work and gospel singing at the area nursing homes.

He is the grandson of the late Tom and Vada Cox.

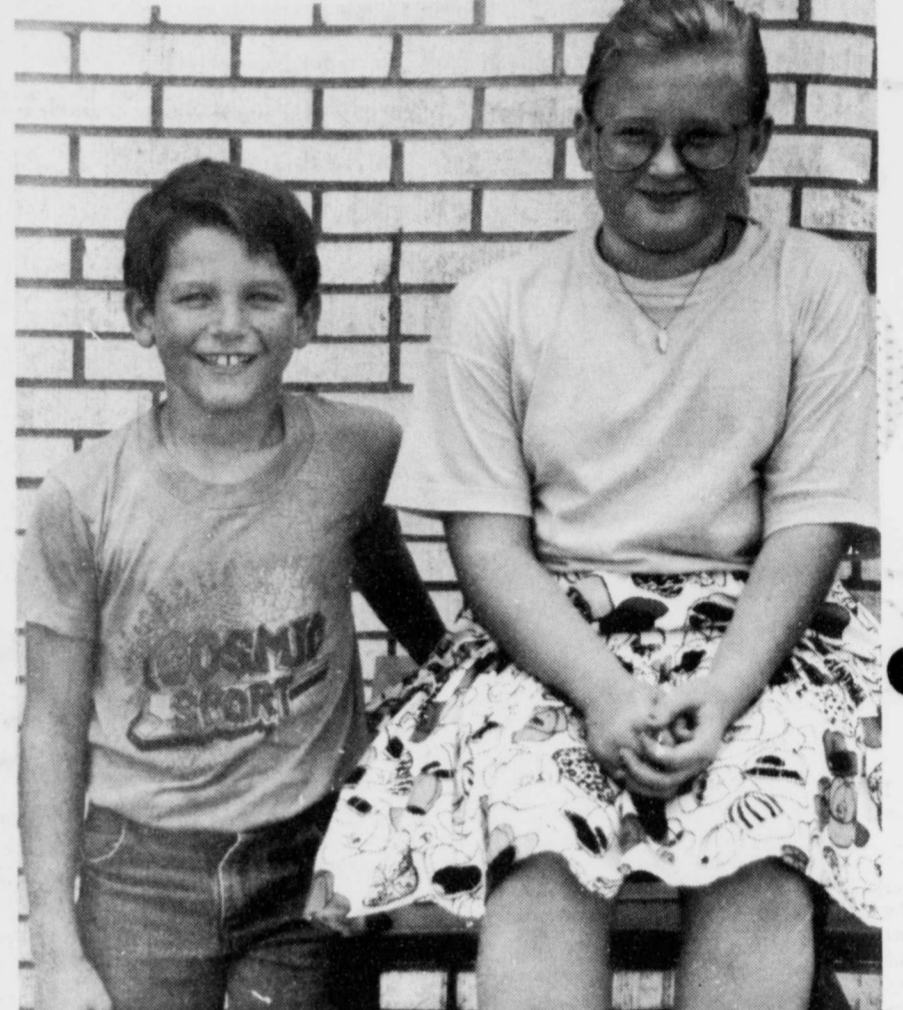

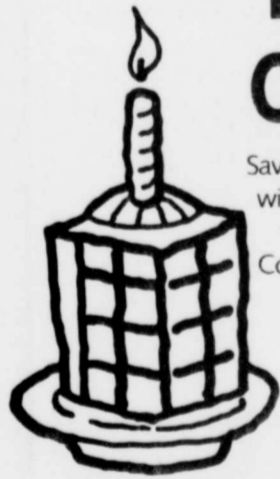

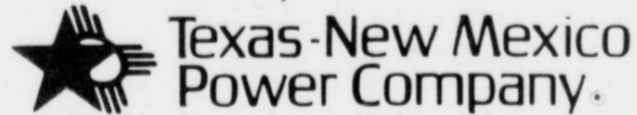
