Comments From Your **County Attorney**

After a recent misunderstanding regarding whosets the punishment during a ury trial, it should be a god topic to review. In Texas we have a bifurcated jury trial system. This means a 2-part trial. During the first phase of the trial, the jury hears the evidence and is given the law by the judge. evidence and the law. If found innocent, that is the end of the case.

Howev er, if the jury returns a guilty verdict, then the second part of the trial begins. Additional evidence may be introduced at this time. Evidence of a prior criminal record or the lack of that record is often presented at this time. The jury then sets the punishment outlined in the range that is set by law. A 3rd degree felony has a range of from 2 to 10 years. A 2nd degree felony has a range of from 2 to 20 years. A 1st degree felony has a range of from 5 to 99 years or life. A capitol murder felony has a punishment of either life or death. A capitol murder life sentence is a minimum of 40 calendar years before parole can be considered.

In a 1st, 2nd or 3rd degree felony, a defendant may receive probation from a jury if the defendant has never before been convicted of a felony offense. The jury can assess up to 10 years probation.

Chunky Peanut Butter Cookies

1 cup all-purpose flour

1/2 tsp. baking powder 1/3 cup margarine, softened

1/3 cup crunchy peanut butter

1/3 cup sugar 11/4 tsp. Sweet 'N Low granulated sugar substitute

1/2 tsp. vanilla extract 2 tbsp. chopped, unsalted peanuts

In small bowl, mix flour and baking powder. In large bowl, with mixer at medium speed, beat margarine, peanut butter, sugar and Sweet 'N Low until light and fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. Stir in flour mixture and peanuts. On waxed paper, shape dough into a roll about 1" x 9½". Dough will be slightly sticky. Wrap in waxed paper; refrigerate until firm, about 4 hours.

Preheat oven to 375 °F. With sharp knife, mark dough at 1/4-inch intervals, then slice; place 1 inch apart on ungreased cookie sheet. If necessary, reshape cookies gently with fingers. Bake 6 to 8 minutes or until lightly browned on bottom. Immediately remove cookies to wire rack; cool. Makes 3 dozen cookies.

Infant Vaccine Program Is Available Locally

The Texas Department of Health in October launched a new program, "Shots Across Texas," to increase the levels of infant and child vaccinations by the turn of the century. The goal is to immunize fully 90% of the state's 2-year-olds by the year 2000. The Texas legislature passed a law this year requiring all Texans under age 18 to be vaccinated against infectious diseases such as diphtheria, tetanus, polio, mumps, measles and

This goal is a long way from reality at present. The Dallas Morning News of October 22, 1993, contained some sobering statistics on infant vaccination in Texas. According to the story, the national rate for immunization of 2-year-olds is 60%. In Texas, it's 40%. Yet immunizations pay for themselves many times over, according to officials. In Dallas in 1989-90, 238 measles cases were hospitalized at a cost of \$3.5 million. The vaccine for these 238 people would have cost only \$3600. In South Texas in 1991-92, 592 measles cases were hospitalized at a cost of \$2.4 million, while vaccine would have cost \$9100. Twenty-six deaths were associated with measles between 1988 and 1922 statewide.

The new immunization program is available locally. Vaccine from the Texas Department of Health has made it possible for Northeast Texas Rural Health clinic in Winfield to offer vaccines for infants and children for only \$10 per visit. If the patient is Medicaid-certified, there is no charge to the parents, but all children, regardless of family economics, are eligible to have shots at the clinic.

"Because our clinic is Medicare and Medicaid certified, the public may have the impression that we only serve special populations, but in fact anyone can use our services at any time," stated Larkin Tom, manage at the facility. "The health department has made unlimited supplies of immunization vaccine available to our clinic and we would like to give these shots as a public service. I know parents can spend a lot of time and money on what is basically every child's right, and we're trying to make the process easier."

Maude Harper, LVN at the clinic, is responsible for giving the shot and completing the record-keeping that is a part of the process. "The state of Texas supplies us with immunization record cards that parents can show to schools and doctors, and then we keep records here at the clinic of every child's vaccinations. There's not that much paperwork involved, and so far people have not had to wait. I try to get them in and out as soon as possible."

Northeast Texas Rural Health Clinic opened July 1, and on October 1 became an outpatient department of Titus County Memorial Hospital. The clinic is located in a new facility in Winfield, between Mt. Pleasant and Mt. Vernon, on the north side of I-30. The hours are from 8:30 to 12 and from 1 to 5 Monday through

"Now that we're owned by a public hospital, we hope to do even more in the area of preventative care and health education," stated Tom. "Infant vaccines are a necessity, not a luxury."
