Volunteer Firemen's Wives Deserve Recognition, Too!

Much is written about the good work and outstanding dedication of Volunteer Firefighters. And, every word of praise they get they deserve and more. But there is another volunteer group that needs praise too-and that group is made up of the wives and mothers of those firefighters.

I am a volunteer fireman's wife, but I'm much luckier than most. I go to fires, wrecks, deaths and emergency group that needs praise too-and that group is made up of the wives and mothers of those firefighters.

I see, under these circumstances things that are tragic and terrible. But I'm still much luckier than those wives who are at home or at work while their husbands are performing their duties as a volunteer.

If it is night these women wake when their husbands do, and listen as they scramble into clothes and head out the door. Then, they must worry and wonder until their spouse is safely home again. Hours pass, and they have no way of knowing exactly what is happening. Is their loved one

safe? Will he be out all night? What is he having to do? Will he be home in time to go to work?

Day or night, these women worry until they have their fireman home safely. They know that he may have been inside a burning building, standing in the middle of a highway directing traffic around a wreck or freezing in an ice storm clearing downed timber. They know he may have provided comfort to those suffering a loss, done CPR on a heart attack victim, or crawled through an attic looking for a mysterious source of smoke.

Volunteer firemen's wives are prepared to see him depart in the middle of a kid's birthday party, during meals, or when they were painting the house together!

And, there is much more to their job as a volunteer fireman's wife.

Laundry can be quite a challenge when the clothes to be laundered have been soaked with smokey water, stained with ground-in dirt and soot, and smell of burnt shingles or electrical wiring! The clothing bill for a volunteer fireman can get pretty steep, since they frequently don't have time to seek out and put on "old" clothing.

And, carpets sometimes require rigorous spot cleaning after a sooty footprint finds it's way onto the carpet.

These women know to never plan anything or need help around the house on fire meeting nights. That means at least two nights out of every month.

They know that when funds are needed they will be called upon to bake cakes and pies for auctions, provide sandwiches or chili and stew for meals, then work hard at these events serving, cleaning, taking tickets or conducting games and events.

Volunteer Firemen's wives are patient, understanding women. They spend more time wondering, worrying and waiting than most women do.

And, like the firemen they love, they are prepared to do it without complaint, knowing that at any time it could be their home ablaze, their child in an accident, their family in need of help.

And, like the firemen, they are deserving of respect and praise for the patience they show. For it is true that "they also serve who sit and wait".

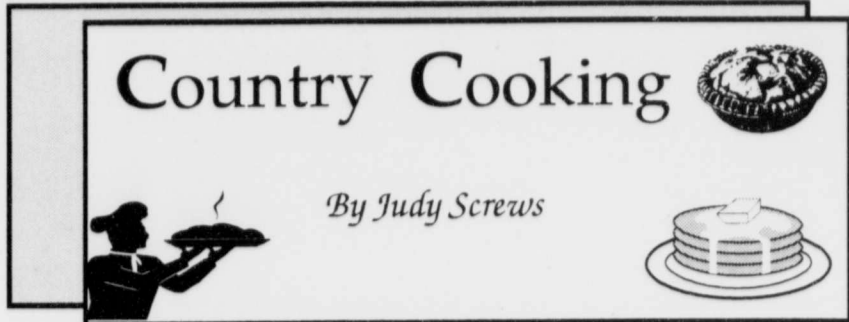

I received an invitation to enter a recipe in a contest recently. I've never had the nerve to do that because I have always been afraid I would leave out an ingredient, or that someone would make my recipe and it wouldn't taste right. I also would want to win. I'm not really a great loser. Anyway, I did not enter the contest, but I learned a couple of interesting things in the instructions they gave and in the advice they were giving to prospective contestants. They said the obvious things such as make the recipe and write down the ingredients in the order they are used. Always put in the can size, weight, brand name (if essential to the quality of the recipe), whether or not to have ingredients at room temperature, melted, softened, chopped, drained, sliced, sifted, packed, and such things. They also had some tips to help you be a better contestant. I'll share a few of them with you. *Read and re-read the entry form. *Type or clearly print a detailed version of your recipe, with instructions for all steps. Detail even the most obvious directions, such as specific equipment to use and how to test for doneness.*

Create a catchy title to attract judges' attention * Be sure your recipe showcases the sponsor's main ingredient. If the contest is sponsored by the chicken industry, you wouldn't want your main ingredient to be pork chops. * Ask a friend to prepare your recipe at home. See if it comes out as well from another kitchen. *Keep today's trends in mind (convenience, nutrition, ethnic style meals, etc). Use basic preparation methods and common ingredients that are readily available and suitable for amateur cooks. *Use simple garnishes. They should be able to stand at least 30 minutes at room temperature. *Keep trying.

4 (6 inch) flour tortillas
1 1/2 cups Mexican Velveta
1 cup chopped chicken
1/2 cup picante sauce
1/2 cup chopped green peppers
1/2 cup chopped tomato
1/4 cup pitted ripe olive slices

Preheat oven to 350. Place tortillas on cookie sheet and sprinkle 2 Tbsps. cheese on each. Bake about 4 minutes until cheese is melted. Toss chicken with picante, and spread on tortillas. Top with remaining cheese. Bake 7 minutes or so, or until thoroughly heated. Top with remaining ingredients.



REBEL SPORTS REPORT

Turkey Stocking Nears Completion

After some 70 years of attempts and failures by the state to restore wild turkeys to East Texas the task finally appears near completion, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. A time frame might indicate, to say the restocking effort has met with some setbacks would be an understatement.

With wild turkey populations in East Texas dwindling--by 1942 estimates pointed to less than 10 birds--Texas has looked to practically every conceivable means of restoration. From 1924 to 1978, over 4,000 combinations of wild-trapped Rio Grande turkeys, pen-raised Easterns and pen-raised crosses were introduced into East Texas--none resulted in viable populations.

Why? In a nutshell, Rio Grande turkeys can't adapt to East Texas climates and pen-raised birds are not hearty enough to survive in the wild.

By 1978 it became apparent if East Texas was to have wild turkeys again wild-trapped Easterns were the only solution.

The problem, however, was the difficulty in obtaining wild-trapped Eastern wild turkeys for broodstock. Texas had no remnant flocks to trap from, and other states were in the process of expanding their own populations and we didn't have any species of interest to other states to barter for turkeys. So, from 1978 to 1986 the program stumbled along with 20 birds released at 11 sites in eight East Texas counties.

Then in 1987, a breakthrough occurred when the TPWD and the National Wild Turkey Federation teamed to negotiate the acquisition of wild-trapped broodstock from other states for \$525 apiece to compensate for the cost of capture and transport. This alternative to wildlife swapping

opened the door for broodstock acquisition. The only factor limiting the number of turkeys was how many birds could be trapped.

A grassroots effort helped provide funding for the program, including appropriations through TPWD's Fund 9 (sale of hunting and fishing licenses) donation of portions of revenue generated from tracts of private timber company land enrolled in TPWD's public hunting land and sales of Texas' Turkey Stamps. In addition, the U.S. Forest Service, National Forests and Grasslands in Texas has contributed cost shares for turkey stockings on National Forest lands and the NWF has contributed funding their Super Fund banquet program.

Through this concerted effort, since 1978, 3,593 wild turkeys have been released in 38 East Texas counties at a cost of nearly \$2 million. And, according to TPWD Eastern Wild Turkey Program leader John Burk, the investment is coming to fruition, with the potential for spring gobbler hunting in some East Texas counties in the near future.

According to Burk, the initial phase of the restocking program could possibly be completed by March of 1995, depending on the availability of broodstock. Burk has identified 64 release sites in 20 counties, which would require 930 turkeys for the 1994 stocking season.

"We are also looking toward the southern Post Oak region for potential Eastern turkey stocking sites, but this region has not been evaluated yet," Burk said. "Although we are approaching the end of the initial phase of the stocking effort (the blockstocking of prime habitat in all counties with Eastern turkey range) we will probably never be out of the restoration business, however, after

we stock all of the prime sites, including southern Post Oak, the remainder of our restoration stockings will be done with Texas turkeys.

"Other states are committed to giving us birds, but it all depends on how many birds they can catch," Burk went on to add. "If there's no snow and you can't bring the birds in, to feed, you can't rap them."

Even so, Burk anticipates completion of block stocking efforts in several counties in the Pineywoods, which in turn, sets in motion the timetable toward establishing a huntable population. Research involving turkey restoration in other states has shown typically, that huntable populations are achieved some five years after stocking.

"That five year gauge is based primarily on data collected during stocking efforts in the '60's and where predator populations was considerably lower" emphasized Burk. "But, from observations we've had by our field staff in Red River County where some of the first turkeys were stocked indicate there is a huntable population."

Burk noted he is recommending a spring gobbler season in Red River County for the spring of 1995, based on ample evidence of reproduction and fall flock sightings of 20-40 birds in some areas. "An area is considered to have a huntable population when you begin seeing flocks of 12-20 birds over 50% of the habitat.

Other counties may be close behind, but cannot be considered until stocking in those areas is completed. "We just don't have the data to recommend hunting anywhere else right now. The brood survey cards distributed in August and the deer hunter observation cards we're distributing this fall will help," said Burk.

Lamar County may well be having some turkey stocking this very week.

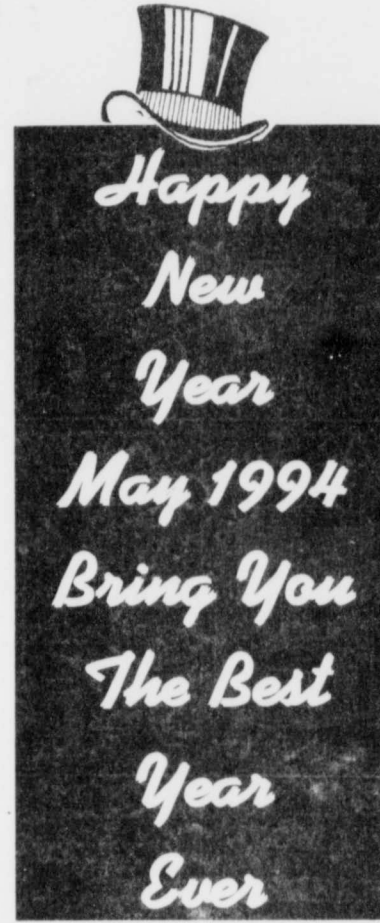
Society To Hold Beginner's Workshop
