That was the scene early Monday morning at our house.



# TU's Generating Unit 3 Will Be Rebuilt By 1995

generating Unit 3 of the Monticello power plant will be repaired and restored to service.

The 750,000 kilowatt unit has been out of service since November 14. 1993 when it was damaged in the collapse of its emissions chimney.

"Unit 3 will be rebuilt and operated as a lignite/coal fueled generating unit because it will provide TU Electric's customers with low cost power," said Gordon Hall, Titus/ Camp County manager for TU Elec-

Because the costs will be covered by insurance, the decision to rebuild was not affected by the recent potentially adverse ruling on TU Electric's rate request by the Public Utility Commission.



The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/ diptheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.






Dear Editor,

# Comptroller Sends January Tax Rebates Totaling \$123.3 Million

"Consumer confidence proved it- lion of last January. Counties received Christmas shopping in November," Comptroller John Sharp said today, as he delivered more than \$123 million in January sales tax rebates to 985 Texas cities and 111 counties.

"This represents an impressive, near 25% increase over the monthly sales tax payments delivered a year ago," Sharp said.

self when Texas set out on some early a total of \$12.6 million for their January rebates, a 20.6% increase over January 1993 payments of \$10.4 million. These payments include taxes collected on November sales and reported to the Comptroller in Decem-

"For the fourth consecutive month, year over year employment increased statewide," Sharp said, "for an average of 2.1% above last year's fig-

The city of Houston received a monthly payment of \$15 million, the largest city sales tax rebate for this month, a 15.1% increase over last year's \$13 million.

The \$9.9 million payment to the city of Dallas was the second largest payment for January, up 29.4% above the \$7.7 million sent to the city for the same period last year.




