Our cook of the week is a lady who is quite well known in this part of the country. Joyce Alexander and her husband, Wayman, live in Talco. Joyce was a long time employee of the newspapers. She was the editor of Talco Times for many years. Mr. Alexander is a retired Oilfield worker. I understand that one of his claims to fame is that he has the most beautiful garden in Talco each year. Of course this means that Joyce has much produce to put up.

The Alexanders have 2 daughters, Brenda and Beverly, who both graduated from Rivercrest High School,

and two grandchildren. Joyce is an active member of the First Baptist Church, of Talco. She is active in WMA and is Church Clerk. She is reputed to be at church every time the doors open. This is a nice reputation to have.

Joyce's recipes which she has chosen to share with us this week look wonderful. They are: Never Fail Crunchy Salmon Patties, Banana Nut Cake, Fruit Salad and Sweet and Sour Meat Loaf.

I thank Joyce for letting us feature her and her recipes this week. Hope you enjoy them.

### Never Fail Crunchy Salmon Patties

- 1 (15-16 oz.) can pink salmon
- 1/3 cup minced onion
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 1/2 cups oil

Drain salmon; set aside two tablespoons of the juice. In a medium mixing bowl, mix salmon, egg and onion, stir in flour. Add baking powder to salmon juice; stir into salmon mixture. Form into patties and fry until golden brown in hot oil.

### Banana Nut Cake

- 2 cups flour
- 1 tsp soda
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs
- 3 ripe bananas
- 4 tablespoons buttermilk
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans

Sift flour and soda; set aside. Cream shortening and sugar until fluffy. Beat eggs and add to shortening mixture. Mash bananas. Add to mixture then add flour and buttermilk alternately. Add vanilla and pecans. Bake in layers for 25 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool before icing.

### ICING:

- 1 stick margarine
  - 1 box powdered sugar
  - 2 ripe bananas
  - 1 cup pecans
- Cream margarine and powdered sugar. Fold in mashed bananas and add pecans. Spread on cooled cake.

### Fruit Salad

- 1 can sliced pineapple (drained)
- 1 can Royal Ann cherries
- 1 cup chopped (or small) marshmallows
- 1 cup pecans
- 1 banana, sliced
- 1 large can sliced peaches

Whip egg whites to a stiff peak. Fold into flour and sugar mixture, and add cup of pineapple juice. Cook until thick in a double boiler. Cool and add one cup whipped cream. Fold gently into fruit mixture just before serving.

### Sweet and Sour Meat Loaf

- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
- 1 cup dry bread crumbs
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon instant minced onion
- 1 can (15 oz.) tomato sauce, divided

### TOPPING:

- Reserved tomato sauce
  - 2 tablespoons brown sugar
  - 2 tablespoons vinegar
  - 1/2 cup sugar
  - 2 teaspoons prepared mustard
- Mix together; beef, bread crumbs, salt, pepper, and eggs. Add onion and half of tomato sauce. Form into loaf in 9"x5"x3" pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes. In a sauce pan, combine topping ingredients; bring to a boil. Pour over baked meat loaf; bake 10 minutes more.

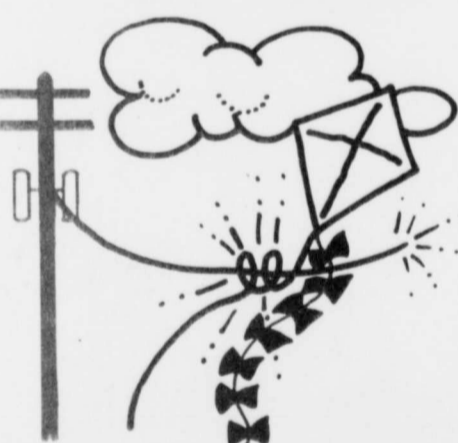

The theme for the program will be "A Song Remembers When".


The Bogata Lions Club will serve the Barbeque and all the trimmings meal at the Bogata Cafeteria, after which the business meeting and program will follow.

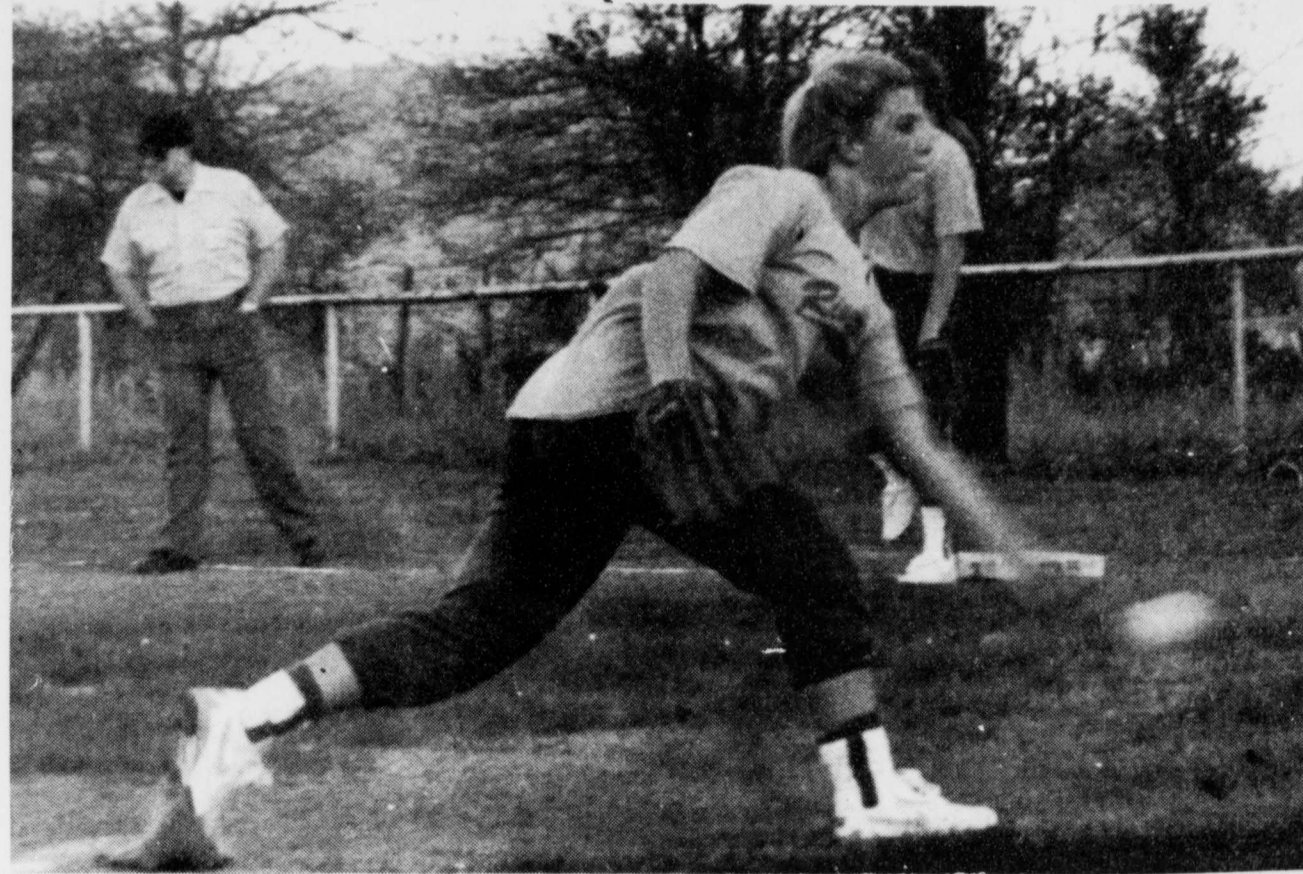

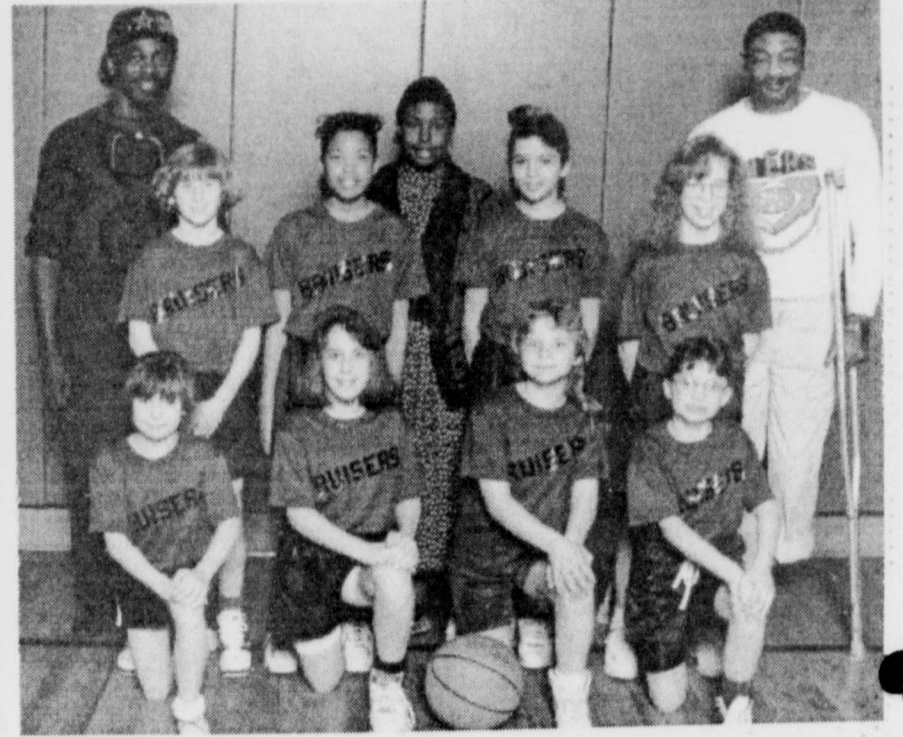

**Poison Prevention  
Week Being Observed**

The third week in March is designated as Poison Prevention Week. This annual event is designed to raise awareness of the dangers of accidental poisoning, and to inform people of the necessity of keeping potential poisons, including medicines, away from children at all times.

The number of pediatric poisonings reflects a need to focus poison prevention efforts on toxic substances found in the home. People should always:

Keep all medicines out of the reach of children  
Never assume that Child-Resistant containers are child PROOF containers.

Carefully store drain openers, solvents, anti-freeze, kerosene, gasoline, pesticides or other toxic material out of the reach of children.

There are Poison Control Centers throughout the United States that maintain information for health care professionals and the public on recommended treatment for the ingestion of household products and medicines. They are familiar with the toxicity of most substances found in the home, or know how to find this information. Their phone number can be found on the inside cover of the yellow or white pages of the phone directory. Advise all of your patients to post this number on their telephones. If they need to call a Poison Control Center in an emergency, they will need to give the following information.

The victim's age and weight  
Existing health conditions or problems.

The substance involved: was it swallowed, inhaled, absorbed through the skin or splashed into the eyes?  
If any first aid has been given  
If the victim has vomited  
Their location and how long it would take them to get to a hospital.

Parents could call their Poison Control Center or physician immediately if children ingest medicines.

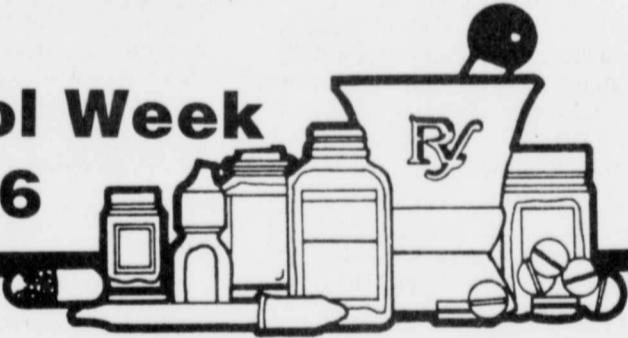
they should follow first aid instructions on the product label, then call their Poison Control Center or physician. If unable to reach either of these they should call 911.

A one-ounce bottle of syrup of ipecac is a good thing to keep on hand for each child or grandchild in a home. But, before administering ipecac, Poison Control or physician should be contacted as it is not recommended for every poisoning situation.

Poison Prevent

The Texas Dept. of Health will hold Immunization Clinics on the first, second, and third Thursday of each month. Hours are from 9-11:30 am and 1:00 - 2:30 pm. The clinics will be conducted at 1300 Highway 37 north in Clarksville. Parents are reminded that all children must be accompanied by an adult and bring the child's immunization records and Social Security Number if it is available.

**Poison Control Week  
Is March 20-26**



**An Ounce of Prevention ...**

- Keep household products and medicines out of reach and out of sight of children, preferably in a locked cabinet or closet.
- Never leave children alone - even for a moment - with medicines or household products.
- Store medicines and poisonous household products in their original containers - never in cups or soft drink bottles.
- Read a product's label before using it, and pay special attention to instructions regarding poisoning or harmful exposure.
- Always turn on the light before giving or taking medicine.
- Refer to medicines by their proper names, not as candy.
- Try not to take medicine in front of children, and never take liquid medicine directly from the bottle. Children imitate adult behaviors.
- Get rid of old medicines periodically by flushing them down the drain, rinsing the containers with water, and then discarding them.
- Dispose of hazardous household products in accordance with local ordinances. Always call your local recycling center for instructions on how to properly discard hazardous household chemicals.
- Ask for and use household substances which are available in child-resistant packaging. Insist on safety packaging for prescription medicines.
- Keep a bottle of ipecac syrup on hand. In the event of accidental poisoning, call your poison control center or physician. Do not use ipecac until instructed to do so.
- Have the numbers of your local poison control center and physician near the telephone at all times.

For more information on poison prevention - ask your pharmacist.
