I think this is a requiem for a tree. I hope not, but it probably is.

Every community has one tree that is the largest in town. As a person who regards trees as one of the most magnificent of creations, I tend to take note of these giants, and in this part of the world they are usually oaks or pecans.

Unofficially, the pecan tree at the east end of my parents' lot is the tallest tree in Deport. From flying over Deport, I've pretty well confirmed that fact.

Monday afternoon, lightning struck this ancient pecan, setting it on fire and blasting limbs and huge chunks of bark loose from it. This native pecan has survived huge storms that ripped limbs as big as the trunks of lesser trees from it. It has survived the worst droughts Texas can offer, and the most rains and hail fickle weather can hurl at it.

My dad is 83, and he says that this tree is the one thing that remains as big as he remembered it as a child. As a boy he and his friends would try to climb it, but the lowest limbs were still too high to reach. To be that old when he was young means that it undoubtedly was on hand as pioneers moved into the area, during the Civil War, and all the succeeding years.

As a child I spent many hours playing under it with my friends, and, like him, there was no possibility of reaching those lower limbs.

A tire swing took me to far-away places, becoming my horse, or an airplane.

My older brothers worked on their cars under its shadows during the summer holidays.

Nieces and nephews dug in the sand box beneath its benevolent arms.

Picnics were cooled beneath its sheltering leaves, and in the fall a bountiful harvest of small but delicious pecans fed humans, squirrels and birds alike.

It is fitting that lightning should end its span with a fearful blast of power unequalled in nature.

It makes me very sad to know that it is gone...but, I've made my mind up to one thing...if it doesn't manage to survive, I shall see another one is planted. And that way, hopefully, in fifty years it will be a good sized tree...and in a hundred perhaps it can obtain the stature of its predecessor, and stand a sentinel and a beauty for all to see. My dad won't be there to see it, nor will I, nor will his grandchildren, but perhaps his great-grandchildren (or someone's) will be able to reap the benefits provided by a massive tree. And that is the correct and natural order of things.

Since last night, nearly every news program I turn the television to is singing the praises of broccoli as a possible prevention of cancer, maybe. I've never really been what you could call a broccoli fan, but if it will keep me from having cancer, I will have broccoli pudding, broccoli candy, broccoli salad, and broccoli syrup on top of my broccoli ice cream. That would stand to reason wouldn't it? If I know what is going to help me, why don't I do it? It is getting close to the time for me to go to the doctor and tell him what is wrong with me again, and I have this knot in my stomach, because I know he is going to look at me and then look at the scales and maybe or maybe not, just according to whether he takes pity on me or not, say "Let's see how much you weigh." I am sitting here looking at a heart smart news release. I get them nearly every week. I'm looking at a print ready Health for the whole family article telling about being overweight,

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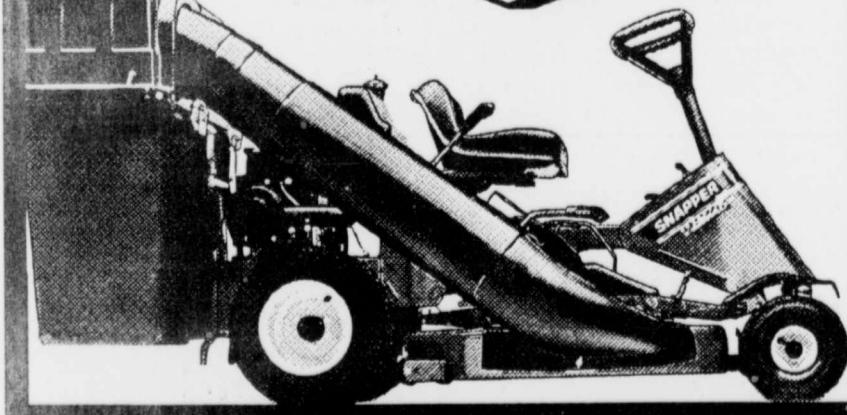
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Nursing Home Has New Owners And New Name

This transaction took place quite a few months ago, but it was necessary to dot all the I's and cross all the T's before making a formal announcement.

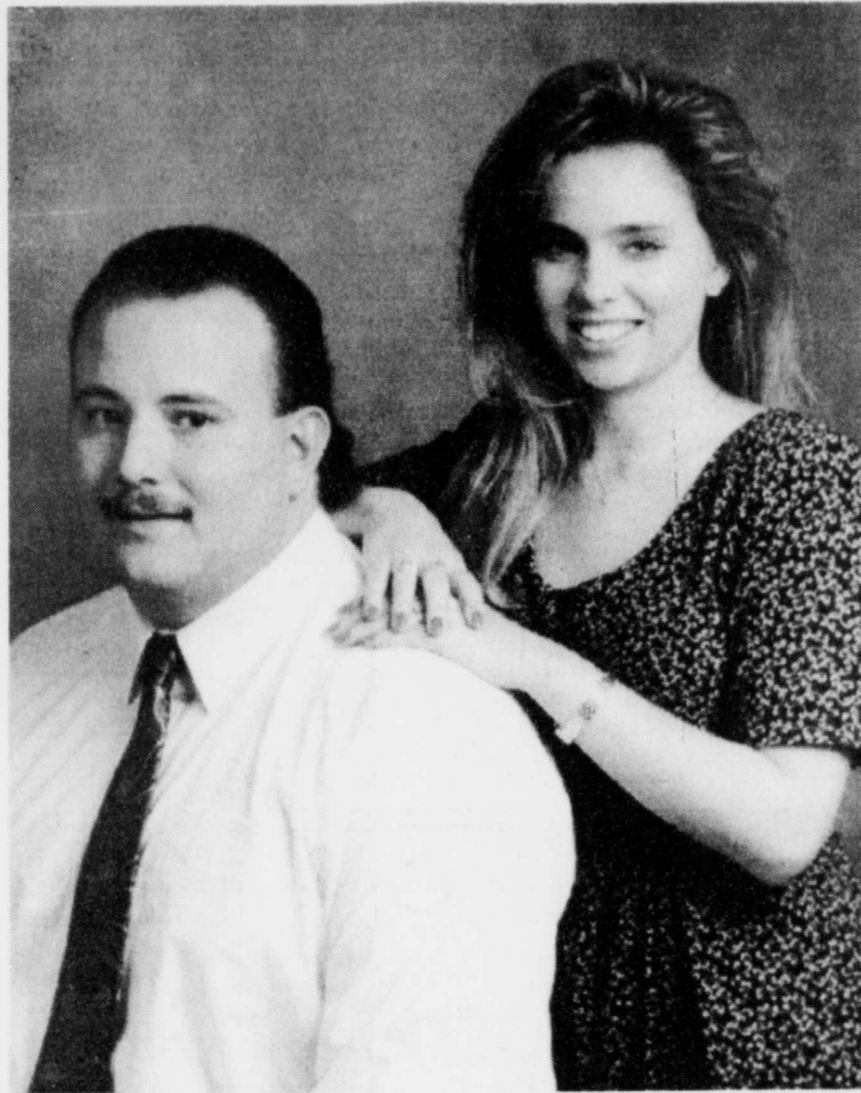
50th Class Reunion Is Great Success

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Statement of Intent to Change Rates

In accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, Texas-New Mexico Power Company announces the Company's intent to change rates for its entire Texas operations. The effective date of such change is May 5, 1994. All classes of customers will be affected by said proposed changes. The proposed rates will produce an increase in gross revenues to the Company over test year revenues adjusted for test year customer growth and weather and annualization of test year rate increases of \$34,802,920, or 8.92%. Texas-New Mexico Power Company provides electrical service to more than 170,600 customers located within the state of Texas.

A complete copy of the requested rate filing package is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin, Texas, and with all cities served by Texas-New Mexico Power Company which have retained original jurisdiction. You may inspect a copy of the filing during normal business hours at each business office of Texas-New Mexico Power Company in your area.

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. A request to intervene or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Austin, Texas 78757. Further information also may be obtained by calling the Public Utility Commission's Public Information Office at (512) 458-0256, or (512) 458-0221 for text telephone. The deadline for intervention in the proceeding is 45 days after the date the application was filed with the commission.

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NASA Hall Of Fame Honors Former Bogata Resident

Kenneth Castleman, 1960 graduate of Bogata High School, has been inducted into the Space Technology Hall of Fame. The United States Space Foundation conferred the honor at the Tenth National Space Symposium in Colorado Springs on April 7. The awards dinner was attended by more than 500 government and military officials and industry executives from the American space program. Sponsored by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) the Space Technology Hall of Fame honors individuals and companies that use NASA-- developed technology for non-space purposes that benefit all people.

The University of Texas at Austin where he received a PH. D. degree in electrical engineering in 1969. From 1970 through 1985 he worked at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena California. During that time, he also taught at the California Institute of Technology (Cal Tech) and conducted medical research at the University of Southern California and UCLA. He published a college textbook on the subject of digital imaging in 1979. In 1985 he teamed up with Donald Winkler to start Perceptive Systems, Inc., a medical instrument company based in Houston.

This year "digital imaging" was one of two technologies selected by a panel of space industry experts for hall of fame honors. Digital imaging is the technique of using computers to process pictures. Originally developed to enhance pictures sent back to Earth from space probes, digital imaging has since been used in a variety of medical applications. Many of the modern medical imaging systems now used in the diagnosis of disease are based on digital imaging techniques that grew out of the early days of the space program.

During his research career, Dr. Castleman developed computer-controlled instruments to detect muscle disease in tissue samples, cervical cancer in Pap smears, leukemia in blood samples, and genetic (inherited) diseases in newborn and unborn babies. His company now sells instruments for detecting genetic diseases to hospitals all over the world.

After graduating Bogata High School in 1960, Castleman went to

Teachers Establish Legislative Agenda

Texas educators recently issued a call to state legislators for increased health insurance, support for public school choice within districts, and increased funding to combat school violence.

Those were among several official positions adopted by the 62,300-member Association of Texas Professional Educators at its annual convention held April 7-9 in Dallas.

Republican gubernatorial nominee George W. Bush also addressed the group. Bush supports "home school districts" and decreasing the regulatory powers of the Texas Education Agency.

The group's president said ATPE does not support sending public dollars to private schools, and it will be among those opposing private school vouchers when the Legislature meets

in January.

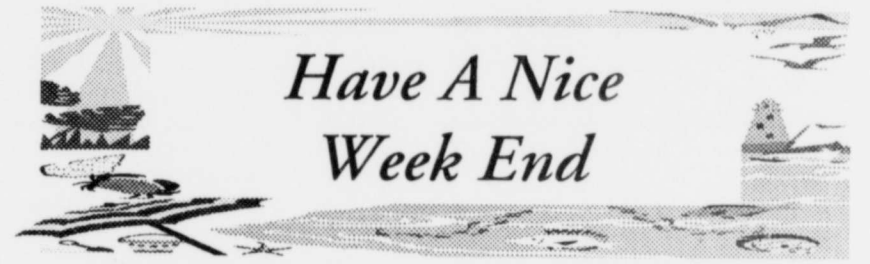
"We, as much as anyone, want to improve our public education system," said Beth Graham, ATPE state president. "Rather than creating another tier of education, the state Legislature should make public education a higher priority by providing the funding necessary for all children of Texas to receive a quality education."

The group made headlines last year when its convention delegates voted for a state income tax dedicated to public education.

Attending the ATPE convention from the Talco-Bogata ATPE local unit were Kay Kennedy and Brenda Gunter.

ATPE is the largest educators' group in Texas and the largest such non-union group nationwide.

FmHA Offers Outreach Program

The Farmers Home Administration has activated a loan program designed to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, acquire land for farming (FO) and operating expenses (OL), according to L. George Ellis, State Director, and Frank B. Stroud, Red River County Supervisor.

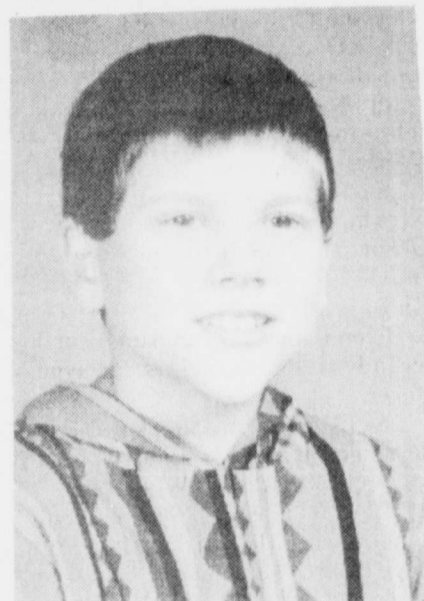
Under the program, FmHA will make loans to persons in those categories who are interested in farming and who can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency would also be prepared to sell or lease to them a farm held in its inventory if any are available in that county.

FmHA can also provide operating loans and technical assistance, if needed, to help the borrowers get started.

Funds have been reserved for farm purchases and OL loans based on the population of socially disadvantaged persons.

Those who believe they might be eligible and who are farming or who would like to become farmers are urged to contact the FmHA County Office serving their area.

The Federal Equal Credit Opportunity Act prohibits creditors from discriminating against credit applicants on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, marital status, handicap, age (provided that the applicant has the capacity to enter into a binding contract); because all or part of the applicant's income derives from any public assistance program; or because the applicant has in good faith exercised any right under the Consumer Credit Protection Act. The Federal agency that administers compliance with the law concerning this creditor is the Federal Trade Commission, Equal Credit Opportunity, Washington, D. C. 20580.

Huddleston Family Strongly Approves Of Funding Research

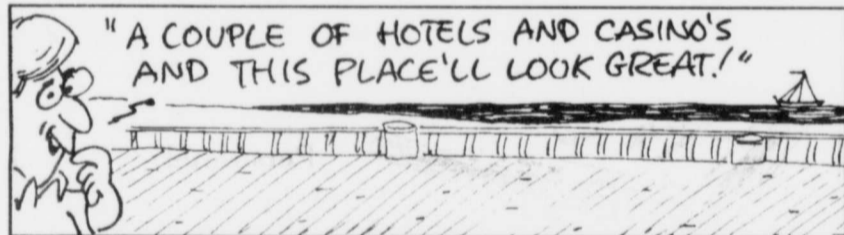

It's Time To Order Fish Before Warm Weather

The time is once again rapidly approaching to stock your ponds and lakes. By June, water temperatures are usually too warm to safely handle fish.

The Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District is now taking orders for fish to stock ponds and lakes in the county. This is a service to the district cooperators in order to get the fish delivered to the county at a reasonable rate.

Delivery date has been tentatively set for the middle of May, 1994. The individuals who order fish will be notified prior to delivery concerning the exact date, time, and place to receive their fish.

Many people who are interested in purchasing fish to stock their ponds and lakes are familiar with the proper stocking rates. The USDA - Soil Conservation Service normally recommends channel catfish in ponds less than one surface acre. A commercially available catfish ration can be fed, or fathead minnows can be stocked for the catfish to eat. If largemouth bass are already in the pond or lake, stock catfish that are at least eight inches long and do not stock fathead minnows. You can feed catfish a commercial ration which bass will not eat.

In large ponds, several combinations of fish may be suitable. Species often recommended include largemouth bass, hybrid bluegill, channel catfish and fathead minnows. Stocking recommendations should be tailored to each water body.

The prices this year are: Channel Catfish, 3-5 inches - \$.25; 4-6 inches - \$.30; 6-8 inches - \$.40; Florida Bass - \$.50; Native Bass - \$.30; Hybrid Bluegill - \$.30; Black Crappie - \$.35.00/100; and Fathead Minnows - \$.6.00/lb.

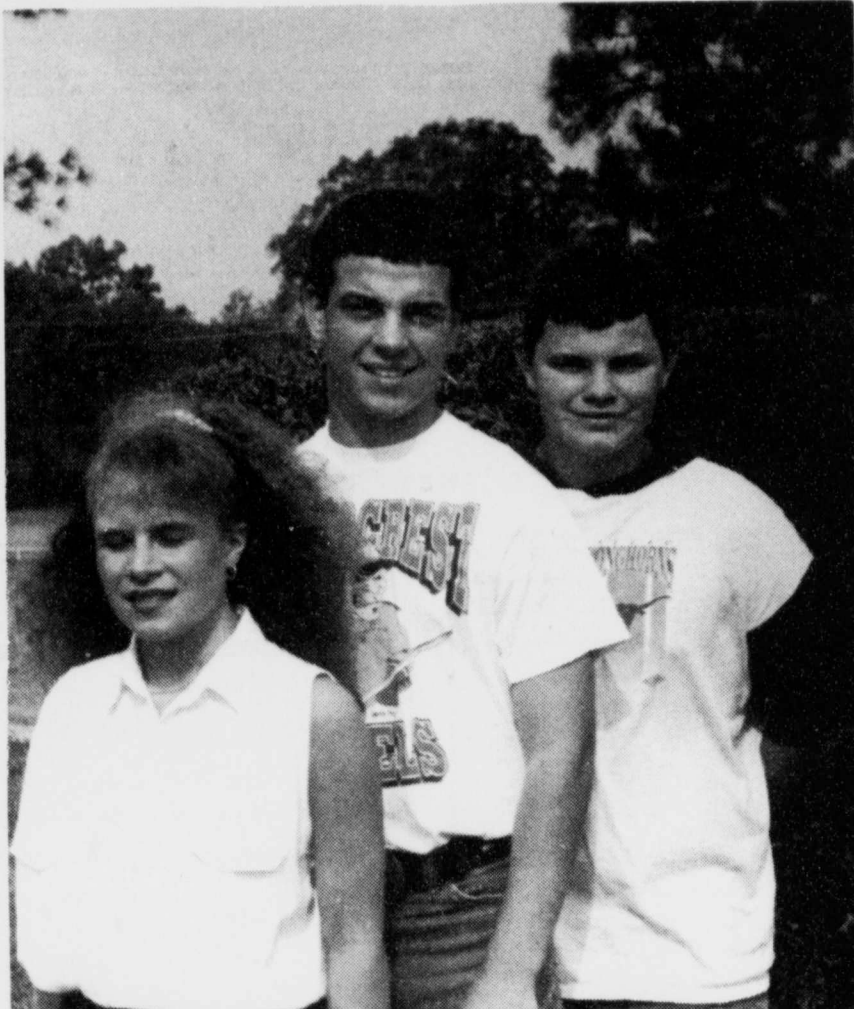

ETSU December Graduates Awarded Diplomas

A total of 498 students at East Texas State University received diplomas in the Winter Commencement exercises.

Four graduations were held Saturday, Dec. 18, 1993, for students in the College of Arts and Sciences, College of Business and Technology, Graduate School, and College of Education.

ETSU awarded a total 357 bachelor's degrees, 127 master's degrees, and 14 doctoral degrees.

Speaking to undergraduate students at their three graduations, Dr. James A. Grimshaw noted Commencement is indeed a happy occasion.

"To me, the Commencement ceremony is a reminder of what we are all about in this process of education. It symbolizes your accomplishments and shares that recognition with others," said Grimshaw, a professor in the department of literature and languages.

In discussing a "formula for happiness" with the graduates, the professor pointed out this topic has been studied since the philosopher Aristotle.

Grimshaw, who earned a doctorate from Louisiana State University, borrowed some ideas for personal well-being and happiness which he first heard from a friend. "Sell away, give away, throw away and maintain," the professor told the graduates.

"The first three rules involve eliminating clutter from your lives--stuff stored in the attic and in closets. The physical aspect is clear. Remove clutter from one's mental outlook--the attic of our mind, the closet of our heart--is also included," Grimshaw said.

"Sell away, give away, throw away, maintain--in other words, simplify, simplify, simplify."

Speaking to master's and doctoral graduates in the Graduate School, Dr. Ruth Ann White said they can gain much from Robert Fulghum's insights in "All I Really Need To Know I Learned in Kindergarten."

A professor in the department of counseling and guidance, White discussed several of Fulghum's lessons for life, such as "share everything," "play fair," "clean up your own mess," "live a balanced life," and "when you go out into the world, watch out for traffic, hold hands, and stick together."

White, who earned her academic degrees from ETSU, recalled the Dick and Jane books and the word "look"--one of the first words that youngsters learn.

Taking Fulghum's insights and applying them to Graduate School, the professor and licensed professional counselor said "share everything" could mean to publish and share knowledge and experiences through teaching, service, research, or publications.

In closing, the professor said that the graduates have demonstrated that they learned the biggest word of all--"look."

"You have looked at many things since kindergarten and I hope you continue to model that lesson in your life for that is the greatest thing you can ever learn."

Tax Rebates For April Total \$113.3 Million

A total of \$113.3 million in April sales tax rebates was delivered by State Comptroller John Sharp to 979 Texas cities and 111 counties, a 14.4% increase over the payments of one year ago.

This month's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in February and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in March.

"Continued construction growth in all major metro areas of Texas has

helped push statewide employment to its highest level in more than four years," Sharp said, "with total employment up 3.4% over the same period in 1993."

Ten special purpose districts around the state were sent monthly payments totaling just over \$1 million, up 21.8% above last year's \$892,181.

Long-term Caregiving Can Be Stressful

Caregivers sandwiched between their children and aging parents can defuse stress by planning for a marathon of care rather than a series of short sprints. "Long term caregiving can be increasingly stressful if you do not pace yourself," said Dr. Nancy Warren, a psychologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Rather than sprinting from task to task, caregivers need to reserve themselves." Caregivers frequently feel they must give their all, but this feat is impossible when added to the other responsibilities of home, bread-winning and children. This group, often called the sandwich generation, is literally sandwiched between two

sets of caregiving responsibilities. "Giving your all can result in social isolation, depression, anxiety and illness," Warren said. "Caregivers often lock their focus on the present, robbing themselves of time to make their own retirement plans."

A good way to keep a reserve, Warren says, is to carve out time for yourself. "Each day do something unrelated to caregiving--exercise, have lunch with a friend, meditate, work on a hobby," she said.

Warren, who directs Baylor's Family Transition Program, suggests these additional strategies for taking the sprint out of caregiving. -Set limits on demands from family and others. -Reach out for emotional, physical and financial help from extended family members. -Divide up the responsibilities. Teens in the household can do their share to lighten the load. -Be careful not to rob family members of tasks they are capable of doing. -Seek out community resources. -Join a support group. Find someone with whom you can share your feelings.

"You do have to plan more because caregiving can be the spunky wheel that gets all the attention," Warren said. "Maintain a sense of balance by learning to take care of yourself."

Moths Damage More

Research indicates that moths (webbing cloth moths), along with black carpet beetles and furniture carpet beetles, extensively damaged intimate blends of wool/synthetic fabrics.

Studies conducted by the United States Department of Agriculture found that among various blends, the greatest damage was done on 35/65 wool/polyester fabrics, and the least damage was done on 30/35/35 wool/

acrylic/polyester fabrics. Therefore, the use of wool/synthetic blended fabrics may lull many into a false sense of security, because they believe that insects do not attack fabrics containing synthetic fibers. Interestingly, based on microscopic examination, the synthetic fibers ingested along with wool fibers passed out of the insect's digestive tract unchanged.

When the fabric was not of intimate blend yarns, the insects attacked only wools. Thus, when the warp (lengthwise) yarns were wool and the filling (crosswise) polyester, the insects selectively damaged only warped yarns.
