
Jerry works for Exxon and he and his wife, a teacher at Rivercrest High School, have two children, Greg and Jerilyn.







Refrigerate dough from 1 to 24 hours depending on your schedule. Let dough soften again before rolling out. Roll one half of dough on lightly floured board to 1/4 inch thick. If it is sticky, put some flour on your hands. Cut with 3 to 5 inch dinosaur cookie cutter. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Add chocolate chips, laying them sideways around the back and down the tail of cookie and one for the eye. Repeat with remaining dough. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven for 12 to 18 minutes or until golden brown. Cool slightly before removing to wire racks to cool completely

Fresh Fruit Salad

4 cups fresh strawberries, halved 2 cups fresh blueberries

2 to 3 kiwifruit, peeled and sliced 2 bananas, sliced

2 cups seedless grapes, halved 1 carton (8 oz) plain or vanilla yogurt

2 teaspoons lemon juice 1 teaspoon sugar

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

In a large salad bowl, combine strawberries, blue berries, kiwi, bananas, and grapes. In a small bowl, combine yogurt, lemon juice, sugar and vanilla; mix well. Serve with fruit. Yield 8 - 10 servings

There is a young man from The United States who is over in Singapore awaiting the decision as to whether he will have to suffer the punishment to which he has been sentenced for a crime he committed. The young man was sentenced to 4 months in jail, a fine of \$2200.00, and being struck with a cane 6 times. The punishment may or may not fit the crime, but it is the punishment which their courts have set for that particular crime. His crime was vandalizing cars. These cars didn't happen to belong to him. They didn't belong to his parents. They belonged to someone he probably didn't even know. I would not appreciate anyone vandalizing my car, and I do not know anyone else who would appreciate it. I think the young man in question would be furious if someone vandalized his or his parents' car. So why would he think that he should not be penalized for what he has done? I think you all can answer that question as easily as I can. He doesn't think he should be punished because if he had done the same thing in the United States, things would

This would have taken years and unbelievable amounts of money for everyone concerned. 




