### Letter To The Editor



To the Editor:

It would appear that we will all be killed with a gun if you watch the television news. This violence is a terrible thing and I udnerstand the fear and frustration suffered by the victim and survivors of victims. Something must be done to curb this wave of senseless violence.

The authorities and Congress are under a lot of pressure from citizens to put a stop to these acts of violence. A majority of the Congress has decided that laws must be made banning some types of firearms and restrict the availability of all firearms. These laws range from registration of ownership, taxation on guns and ammunition, waiting periods for purchase to a complete ban on private ownership. On first thought some of these laws appear relatively harmless to the law abiding citizen, however, each law that is made becomes stricter than the last and before long the average citizen will no longer be able to afford a weapon. The Nibbler law is being applied by those who advocate total gun control because they know the public would not stand for one law to ban private ownership of all firearms. Ask yourself who will benefit from more restrictions on firearms and who will comply with these laws. I ask that you look past what you see and hear in the media and think about what is actually happening.

Do you believe that criminals will actually turn in their guns? Do you believe a criminal will be able to purchase a gun through

some illegal source? Do you see a trend toward the total ban of gun ownership or to make them too expensive for the

average citizen? Do you want your neighbor to be fined or sent to prison because he

did not comply with the law and kept a gun to protect his family? Do you see the criminal element smile every time a restriction is

I urge everyone to write or call their President, Senators and Representatives to let them know their feelings on this and any other subject they consider important. If they take no action and do not give their opinion, then the rules they live by will be set by the few who do let their opinions be known.

### Please Don't Drink The Water

A word of advice for travelers venturing into less developed areas of the world: Avoid ice cubes.

In places with poor sanitation and hygiene, wise travelers will shun anything made from water that May not have been properly treated, said Dr. James. H. Runnels of the Travel Medicine Service at Baylor College of Mecicine Service at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, and that includes ice cubes, usually made from

"For liquids, your best bet is carbonated beverages or drinks made with boiled water," he said. "Even bottled water should be carbonated. Otherwise, it may be nothing more than a bottle that was refilled at the

Chlorination is also no guarantee that water is safe, even though it does reduce the microorganism count.

In areas where water may be dangerous, travelers should avoid nondisposable glasses and cups, and straws can help avoid contact with the possible contaminated tops of

beverage bottles and cans. Untreated water also should not be used for brushing teeth, rinsing dentures, cleaning contact lenses or washing hands before eating. Water for these activities should be vigorously boiled for one minute for each 1,000 feet above sea level.

Food can also be a health problem in poor-sanitation areas.

It is suggested that you also avoid cold-meat platters, buffets and foods sold by street vendors.

Uncooked vegetables are also suspect because they may have been grown in contaminated human or animal feces. Fruits, nuts and vegetables with thick skins or shells are safer, provided they have been peeled under sanitary conditions.

In restaurants, order meat or fish well done and check to see that they are served steamiung hot.

CAnned milk is also recommended over fresh products.

Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/ diptheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Tornadoes can occur any time during the year, but are most frequent in Texas during the months of April, May and June.

Tornadoes can occur at any time of the day, but are most frequent in Texas between 3 p.m. and 6 p.m.

Sometimes tornado outbreaks occur where tornadoes cause widespread damage over an extensive area. During the afternoon and evening of April 3rd and the early morning of April 4th, 1974, a "super outbreak" of 148 tornadoes across 13 states

The average number of tornadoes killed more than 300 people, injured more than 6,000, and caused \$600 million in damage.

Most tornadoes (about 7 out of every 10) are weak with wind speeds no greater than about 110 mph, and a path length which averages 3 miles.

Nearly 3 out of every 10 tornadoes are strong, with wind speeds between 110 and 200 mph, and a path length which averages 9 miles.

It has been rumored that rivers, hills, and valleys protect an area from tornadoes. This is not true. Tornadoes have been observed to cross rivers and valleys and to climb over mountains with little change in in-
