Two-Vehicle Accident Claims One Life

One man died during impact and two were taken to Titus County Memorial Hospital with injuries which resulted from a two-vehicle accident on Highway 271 North in Talco around 7:45 a.m. on Saturday morning, July 2.

According to Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper Bruce Gatlin, Glenn Cortines, age 48, of Cason, was killed when his southbound white Mustang crossed over the center stripes and smashed into a one-ton truck carrying barrels of cooking oil, which was traveling north. There was no apparent explanation as to why Cortines crossed

into the other lane. The driver of the truck and one passenger were reported in stable condition in a report from the hospital following the accident.

Mt. Pleasant firefighters received the call at 7:50 a.m. and assisted the Talco Volunteer Fire Department at the scene.

The jaws of life were used by firefighters to pry open the Mustang's roof in order to remove the body from the back seat area of the vehicle.

Mt. Pleasant firefighters, Talco Volunteer firefighters and the Titus County Sheriff's Deputies assisted at the scene.

What are we going to do about our trash? I'm not talking about the trash containers we put out at the street on Wednesday for the truck to empty. I think they are wonderful. Well, they are wonderful if we don't forget to put them out. But how do you get rid of a battery? What do you do with an unworking refrigerator or air conditioner? You can't even put them in the container on the days of the year which are designated as clean-up days and on which folks are encouraged to get rid of all their junk. It's against the law to bury them on your own property.

There are planes and helicopters which fly around overhead to watch landowners and make sure they are not disposing of their trash on their own land. I know that I am not the only one who has figured out that the landfill north of Paris burys this stuff on land. They only have to cover it with 6 inches of dirt before they leave in the afternoon. This is land which the state laboratories charge thousands of dollars to test (often) to make sure there is no underground stream and to make sure that water supplies are not threatened. When they are full, where is the site we are to take them to dispose of them. Can you remember everytime you go to Paris to take your trash with you to recycle? Country Cooking

In my first attempt as a "food editor", I decided to use someone that was on the road more than I was, if that can be believed. Everyone says "You never stay home. I can never catch you." That is not true, I am always home...that is when I am not gone. But Neita Denison and I pass each other every day going down our road, only she goes toward Detroit and I go toward Blossom. We wave at each other. You see, we are next door neighbors and our friendship started back in 1967 when she married Carroll Denison and I was her matron of honor in her wedding and exposed all of her wedding pictures that we took. I guess that was the beginning of my newspaper career, because I am still good at exposing film.

Carroll and Neita have two daughters, Heather is married to Harold Oney and they live in Detroit and both are RN's. Harold works at Clarksville and Heather works at St. Joseph's. They have a daughter, Madison, who is 21 months old. Tiffany just graduated from Detroit High School and will enter PJC this fall, majoring in horticulture and com-

plete her education at Texas A&M. Both of the girls are excellent cooks and have competed in 4-H food shows at all levels for several years.

Neita is a second grade teacher at Detroit Elementary School and Carroll has been employed with Campbell Soup for 29 years. The entire family is involved with 4-H work and Neita is club manager for the Midway 4-H and they attend Martin Memorial Methodist Church in Detroit. Needless to say, she enjoys cooking and sewing and loves counted cross stitch. She is also involved with many school functions and activities.

Her favorite dishes are desserts and if someone wants something special, they just call Neita Faye and ask her to bring it. She did tell me that she does not eat that many desserts, but her family really enjoys them. She is sharing her 3-Day Coconut Cake recipe, her son-in-law's favorite Layered Strawberry Cream. Neita had made some fresh Zucchini Bread a few days before and she also gave me her recipe for Peanut Butter Pie.

July 7, 1994

Layered Strawberry Pie

by Neita Denison
3 small boxes fresh strawberries
1 small box strawberry jello
1 small box instant vanilla pudding
1 pound cake/sponge cake
1 small Cool Whip

Prepare jello according to directions. Place in refrigerator to soft set. Prepare instant pudding according to directions; add Cool Whip and place in refrigerator. Stem and sugar strawberries. Let set until juice forms. Cut up cake into small pieces. Layer cake, pudding and Cool Whip mixture, jello and strawberries. Repeat layers and refrigerate. You may not need all the cake, depending on the size of the cake recipe. A friend uses a pound cake mix. I use a sponge cake recipe. This is a delicious recipe for fresh strawberries. (This recipe came from the Friends and Family, a Mennonite Cookbook)

3-Day Coconut Cake

1 pkg. butter flavored cake mix
2-6 oz. packages frozen coconut
2 cups sugar
1-16 oz. sour cream
1-1/2 cups Cool Whip, thawed

Prepare cake mix according to package directions, making 2 eight inch layers. When completely cool, split both layers. Combine sugar, sour cream and coconut, blending well; chill. Reserve 1 cup sour cream mixture for frosting; spread remainder between layers of cake. Combine reserved sour cream mixture with 1 1/2 cups Cool Whip and blend until

smooth. Spread on top and sides of cake. Seal cake in airtight container and refrigerate for 3 days before serving. It may be kept for weeks sealed in the refrigerator. (This recipe came from a Mennonite cookbook-Measured Treasures from Mulberry Springs.)

Peanut Butter Pie

Small pkg. vanilla instant pudding
3/4 cups powdered sugar
Small container of Cool Whip
1/2 cup peanut butter

Combine sugar and peanut butter. This mixture will be coarse. Take out 1/2 cup and mold the rest in a baked cool pie crust. Mix vanilla instant pudding according to directions and pour over mixture. After this has set, top with Cool Whip and sprinkle remaining mixture. Let chill.

Spicy Pineapple Zucchini Bresad

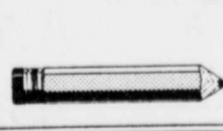
3 eggs
2 cups sugar
2 teaspoons vanilla
1 cup walnuts (finely chopped)
1 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
3 cups flour
1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup cooking oil
2 cups Zucchini, coarsely chopped
1 cup raisins
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
2 teaspoons baking soda
8-1/4 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained
Beat with electric mixer, eggs, oil, sugar and vanilla until thick and foamy. Stir in Zucchini, mix remaining ingredients and blend well. Bake in two loaf pans at 350 for one hour.

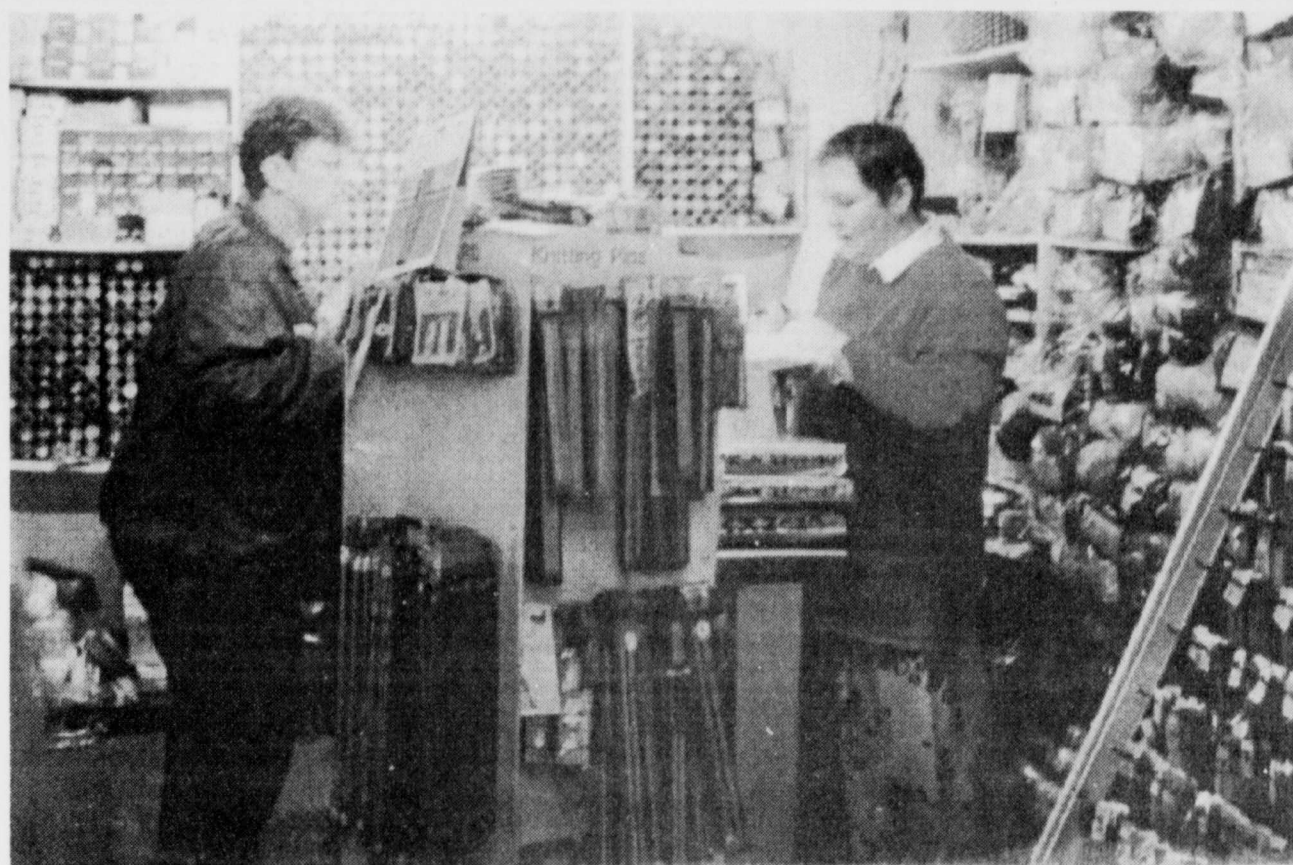

Vacation In Ireland, Monastaries & Mountains

I want to tell those of you who have called or written just how much I appreciate your telling me that you enjoy these articles. A special thanks to Mary Morehead who says "I love your travel reporting. Those of us who are to old to travel still need to hear about places we didn't make it to! It's so gratifying to know that readers are enjoying my sometimes lengthy tales. We welcome input from other travelers too.

Early on a misty, golden morning, our group set out from Dublin for the ancient monastery at Glenlough (I don't think I have that spelled correctly). Along the way we went through more beautiful scenery, deep rolling breakers, tinged almost turquoise blue and green, with enough power to be awe-inspiring, gentle hills and stately trees.

At the monestary we found mountains unsurpassed peace. It was easy to stand among the huge stones that had comprised the cathedral and lift eyes up to towering mountains and feel the beauty of God's creation. It was interesting to hear that the small niches in the walls had once held clay jars...which helped the acoustics!

It is an area filled with legends and tales. Ann showed us an oddly shaped stone basin, filled with a few inches of water. A larger stone next to it has finger shaped impressions in it. Legend says that if one can fit fingers into the impressions, then put the fingers of the other hand into the bowl (this requires squatting down) a wish can be made and it will be granted.

The small basin never goes dry, and is said to have been formed centuries ago. St. Kevin resided at the monastary, and is said to have been able to communicate with the animals much as St. Francis did.

A man came with his newborn twin sons to St. Kevin, saying that his wife had died and how could he feed the infants. St. Kevin spoke to a doe, who then came twice daily and filled the basin with milk, and this the man used to feed his sons.

Legends aside, the stone is most probably a grinding stone and never

goes dry because of a small spring beneath it. Standing with the cool wind whispering prayers through the evergreens, looking at a vallev with an almost other-worldly grace, the legend was much easier to believe.

The drive back definitely put our driver, Joe, through his paces, since the roads were narrow and winding and the bus could barely make the turns. Joe once more proved equal to the task, making what is a difficult job look easy.

Once back in Dublin we roamed around town again, once more impressed with the friendly folks we came in contact with.

The next morning wedeparted for Sligo, cutting across the country through scenery that wasn't as outstanding, but was interesting to those of us who enjoy seeing farming operations in progress. A swan surrounded by cygnets, an old man carving in front of a cottage, a young woman hanging washing while smiling at a little girl all stand out in my memory.

In a village we witnessed a hearse going through the streets, the family and friends walking behind it.

At Sligo we had a wait before hotel check in time, and after lunch wandered down the street, for the first time in the rain. Five of us found an ice cream store and huddled in an archway out of the wet to eat and watch the world go by. Shortly a young man and his little boy drove through the arch. I mentioned the scuba diving logo on his van, and soon we were deep in conversation with him. We learned that the ice cream is all homemade there in the shop...and that scuba diving off the coast at Sligo is some of the very best in the world. "Why?" we asked and learned that the water was very clear and pollution free and that many of the ships that were a part of the Spanish Armada foundered along the coast. This means that treasure, armor, weaponry and the remains of these long-sunken ships make fascinating diving.

A small group of us decided to go to the famous Belleek china factory.

This factory is just inside of Northern Ireland. Along the way we heard

much more about the problems that face the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland.

We were treated to incredible seaside scenes again, and caught glimpses of the castle that Lord Montbatten had once lived in. We were shown the harbor where the Montbatten's boat was blown up by terrorists back in 1979. The IRA apparently wished to show just how close to the throne of England they could strike.

We crossed the border to the china factory, and enjoyed watching and hearing about the handmade parian china. The lustrous white ware, frequently studded with a few shamrocks is something of a hallmark, but we watched in fascination as the handwoven baskets and other items were created. Every step was painstakingly done, with quality checks performed after the various firings.

There are no rejects, no seconds with Belleek.

The museum displayed gorgeous pieces of china from the past, and of course the gift shop was well stocked with a wide selection of "goodies".

The next day was another cold day, with some rain. We wandered around the churchyard where the poet W.B. Yeats is buried. There on his grave are the cryptic words "cast a cold eye on life, on death, horseman, pass by".

A court barrow gravesite proved to be a highlight for me, as I looked as the stones used in burials that were not centuries old...but thousands of years old!

We went over small country roads, seeing farmers digging and bagging peat by hand. We had to stop while a flock of sheep trotted along before us. At Aracan we ate at a bed and breakfast, finding the curried vegetable soup and sandwiches good, plus desserts that were absolutely sinful. Many of the shops were closed for lunch but we found some tapes of Irish folk music to take home with us. At a fishing village we saw the big factory ships, the smaller fishing boats and learned that Iceland, Japan and Russia routinely violate tiny Ireland's fishing rights ad they fear for their fishing.

In Donegal we bought lace and gifts for the people back home, walked in the rain and visited with some more "locals", who, as usual, were happy to talk with us.

That evening we had a great sing-along in the hotel lounge, and we'll finish with it and our last full day in Ireland next week.

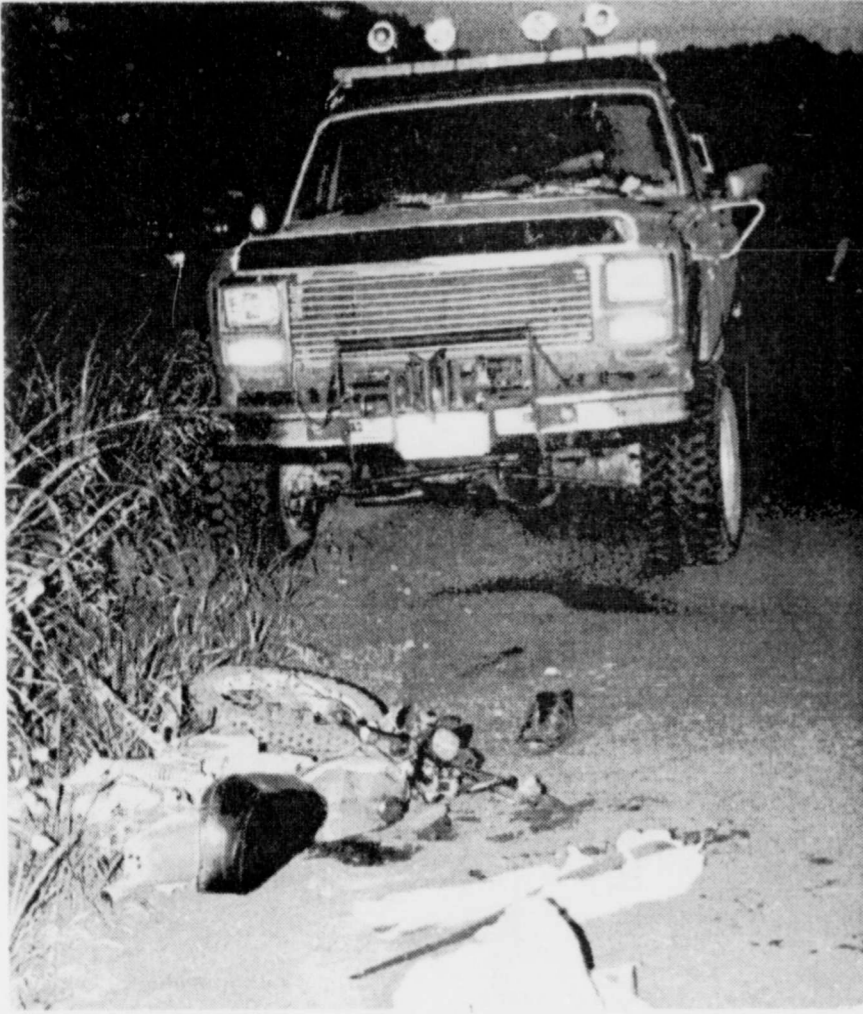
collision on an "S" curve with a 1985 Ford pickup driven by Barry Dewanie Woodall of Pattonville.

Man Arrested in Connection With Blossom Post Office Fire

A blaze set shortly before midnight Monday inside of the Blossom Post Office caused more than \$2,500 in damage in fire, smoke and water damage to the structure.

A videotape led authorities to arrest and charge John Frederick Warren, age 26 of 545 Bois d'Arc in Blossom with arson following the early morning incident.

Lamar County Sheriff's Deputy J.D. Clark stated that the fire was started in a large trash can within the post office. It then spread throughout the front room of the building, causing damage to floor, walls and ceiling before Blossom Volunteer Firemen extinguished the blaze.

According to Clark, witnesses who discovered the fire saw a vehicle drive around the building several times.

A vehicle matching the witnesses' description was located at a public telephone and the driver was questioned about the fire. Later in the morning the driver was arrested at his residence after a video recording from security cameras at the post office was viewed.

A previous arson incident in 1993 had led to the installation of the camera.

Warren was charged with arson and arraigned before Justice of the Peace David Merritt and bail was set at \$100,000.
