Then, of course, we come to the automobile...the wonderful, auto which has revolutionized our world. It's come a long way from the early models that had punctures every thirty or forty miles and kerosene lamps for headlights! But, once more, it is a means of transport that we have embraced heartily.

What does the future of transportation hold? We don't know, of course.

But something indicates to me that even if we begin traveling by solar powered cylinder we will still retain all of our means of getting around...for whatever reason mankind is not inclined to do away with a single way to motivate!

Massive Manhunt Results In Capture Of Suspect Near Cunningham

A lone gunman who held up Reno Quick Stop Tuesday evening resulted in a massive manhunt and capture just outside of Cunningham Tuesday night.

Lamar County Chief Deputy J.D. Clark stated that the Lamar County Sheriff's Department received a call at 10:40 p.m. that the business had been robbed.

Precinct 1 Constable Randy Boren spotted the robbery vehicle in the Sylvan area and gave chase. The chase, Clark reports, continued at high speeds to FM 196 South and continued to just west of the Cunningham community. At that time, reports state that the suspect left FM 196 and raced down a dirt road with Boren in pursuit and other units pouring into the area.

The suspect's vehicle, a gold Chrysler, apparently plowed through a fence and into a field where it became stuck in mud and was abandoned.

Lamar County Sheriff B.J. McCoy co-ordinated a joint effort of Lamar and Red River County Law enforcement officials in the search for the suspect.

Search dogs and a Department of Public Safety helicopter joined the hunt about 12:45 a.m.

At approximately 1:00 a.m. the suspect emerged from the field and surrendered to county officials on FM 196.

Chief Deputy J.D. Clark said the suspect was identified as 34-year-old Walter Terry of Waco. He was

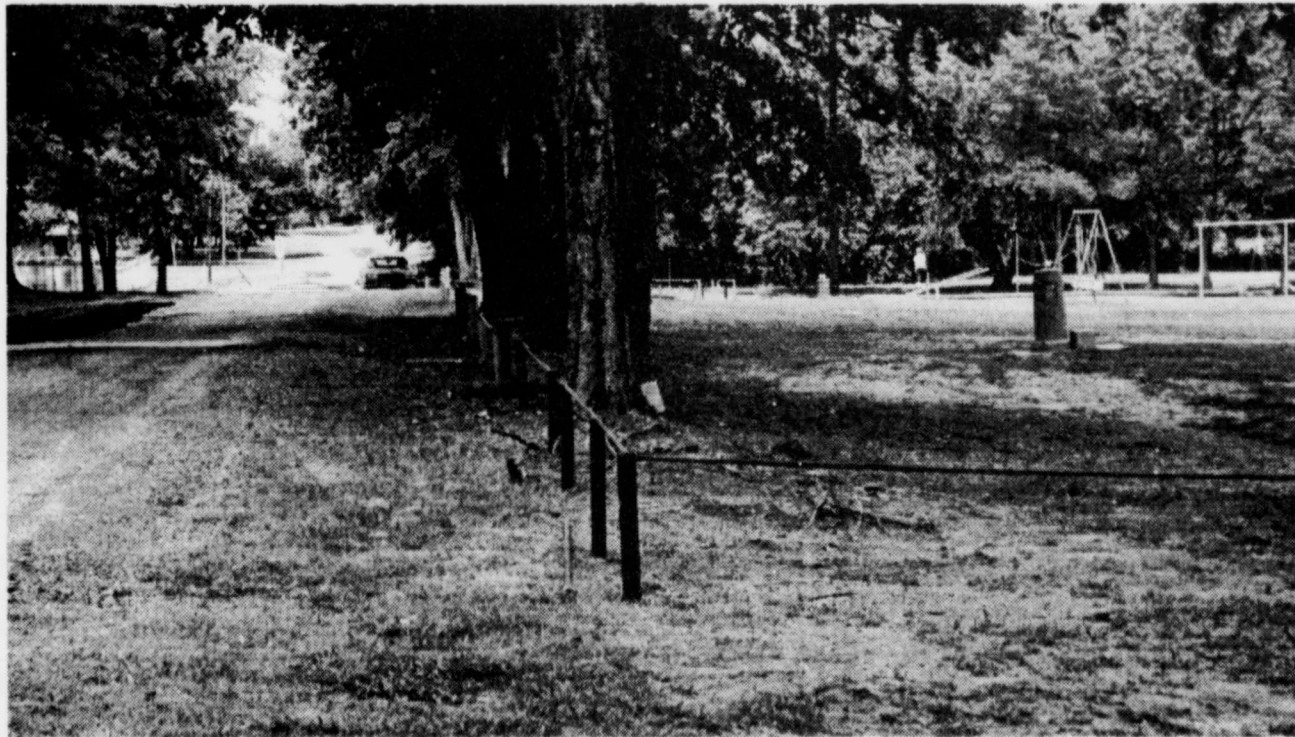
charged with aggravated robbery and is being held in Lamar County Jail.

According to Clark, Terry has outstanding warrants of aggravated robbery, aggravated assault and sexual assault in Austin, Texas.

Reports indicate the vehicle used in the Reno robbery was stolen. Terry reportedly told arresting officers that he had thrown a gun out the window of his car during the chase.

Chief Deputy Clark stated that the weapon was recovered approximately 1/4 mile from the point where Terry's vehicle was abandoned.

Search efforts continued in the area until 4:07 a.m. to make sure that the suspect had acted alone and that there was no one else in the vehicle with him.

Ballots Will Be Mailed To Phone Customers For Toll-Free Calling

Fifteen exchanges have been listed in a petition signed by a number of people on the Bogata telephone exchange and filed with the Public Utility Commissioner on May 31, 1994. Of those fifteen two, Blossom Telephone Company and Peoples Telephone Cooperative will not be included in the request for Expanded Toll-Free Local Calling because Peoples is a co-op and Blossom because they have fewer than 10,000 access lines.

The petition requested the ability to call other exchanges within a 22 mile radius of their exchange without long distance charges as allowed under a new law which went into effect in September of 1993.

Under the new law the maximum additional charge that could be made even if all areas are approved as requested would be \$3.50 per month on

residential phone bills of persons on the Bogata Exchange.

The charge might even be as little as twenty-five or fifty cents per month.

The PUC set Monday, August 29 as the date for distribution of ballots to persons on the Bogata exchange to vote on the request. The ballots will be mailed to the subscribers, who have 15 days to mark their ballots and return them by mail.

Organizers of the petition say that it is very important that persons voting understand they need to vote for access to all towns listed on the ballot.

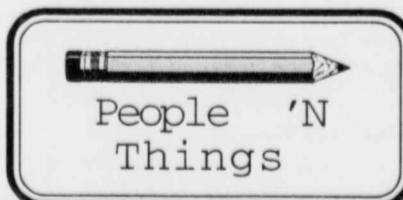
Exchanges that will be listed will be Bogata, Deport, Birthright, Detroit, Winnsboro, Winfield, Clarksville, Mt. Vernon, Sulphur Springs, Talco, Paris, Mt. Pleasant and Cooper.

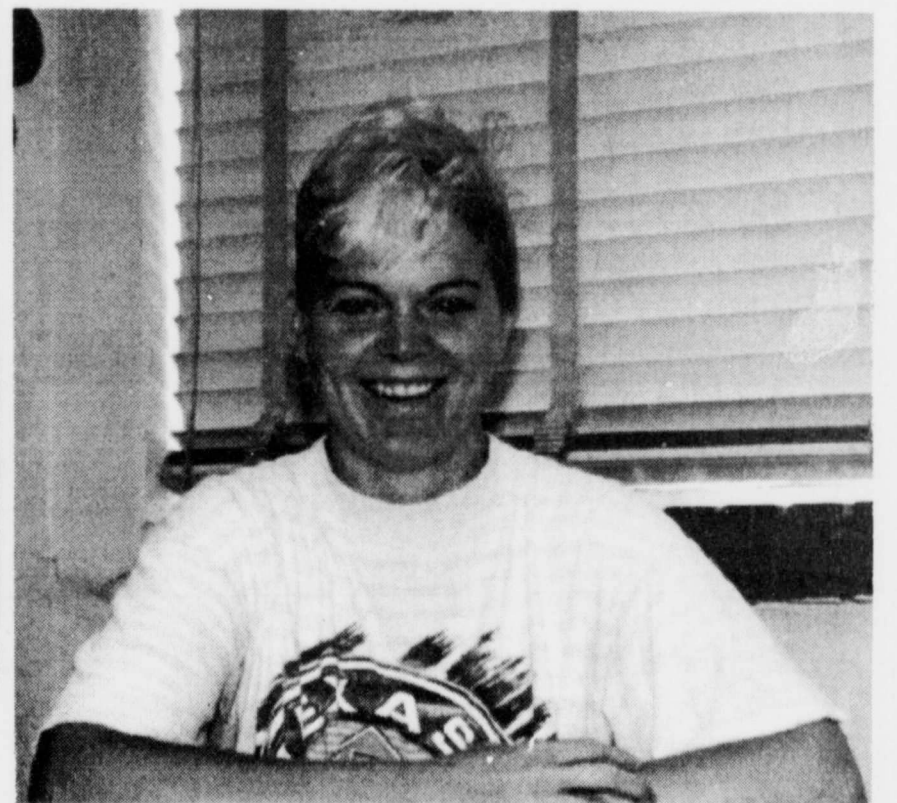
Community Garage Sale Set For August 6 In Talco

Country Cooking

Wheeeeeww!! These two folks will tire you out! Our featured cook this week is Virginia Cleveland of Post Oak, but it wouldn't be fair if I left out her husband, Buford Cleveland. For folks that are retired, they sure lead a busy life.

Mrs. Cleveland has been on my list for County Cook for a long time and it took a while to chase her down. They are the only folks I know of around that can their own chicken. I haven't heard of anyone doing this process in a while. The reason Mr. Cleveland is so important in this story is that he raises and butchers them for Mrs. Cleveland. I learned of them doing this, several years ago when our two daughters raised chickens for the Houston Livestock Show. They could only take 6 to the show and Mr. and Mrs. Cleveland bought the rest and canned them. They have put up over 60 pints of this and is still not through yet. Her Dumpling recipe below is one of the favorites to prepare for a large group and she says they don't last long.

Mr. and Mrs. Cleveland showed me the many shelves of canned goods that they have prepared for this season from their own garden. They can and process all of their own vegetables. She said that nothing goes to waste around her.

Mrs. Cleveland collects thimbles and lamps. They both collect gnomes and have an extensive collection. She enjoys sewing and cooking and sharing stories and pictures of her children and grandchildren.

The couple moved here from Oklahoma City in November of 1973 into the home that Mr. Cleveland built himself. They are in the process of doing some remodeling and he has added more shelves and kitchen space for her as well as paneling the bedrooms and adding another fireplace. Mr. Cleveland also built the Masonic Lodge and had it dedicated to him, that is located on highway 196 outside of Blossom a few miles. He also does rock cutting and design, leatherwork and woodwork. He loves fishing and is a member of the Blossom Volunteer Fire Department and can always be counted on to sell raffle tickets or take part in any part of the organization. He retired as captain from the Oklahoma City Fire Department and Mrs. Cleveland worked for the three county commissioners, there in the city.

They have two sons, Ronnie Cleveland and his wife Linda, who live in Tarpley and they have a son, Brett and his family and they live in Kansas. Paul lives in Moore, Oklahoma and is married to Robin and they have three children, Jeffery, David and Kenna.

They are both members of the East Post Oak Baptist Church, where Mr. Cleveland is a Deacon and Mrs. Cleveland is a Sunday School secretary and works in Bible School.

They are both members of the Eastern Star. She, with 34 years in November and he has 33 years this past June. Their mother chapter is Deport and they hold a dual membership in Clearksville. They hold the offices of Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron and are the star points of Ruth and Marshall.

Buttermilk Cake

Virginia Cleveland

3 cups sugar
1 cup shortening
6 eggs
1 cup buttermilk with 1/4 teaspoon soda added
3 cups flour
pinch salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon lemon flavoring
Cream sugar and shortening. Add other ingredients as listed. Beat well and pour into a greased and floured Bundt pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

Creole Eggplant

3 eggplants (peeled and sliced)
3 onions (sliced)
6 tomatoes (peeled and sliced)
3 green peppers (cut into rings)
6 tablespoons melted butter
parmesan cheese
salt and pepper
Layer vegetables in buttered casserole, seasoning each layer. Sprinkle top with cheese, cover and then pour butter over top and bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. Uncover and bake for 10 more minutes.

Mock Apple Rings

6 gallons of cucumbers
peeled, cored and sliced 1/2 inch thick. Soak in 2 cups of lime and 1 gallon of water overnight. Rinse well and cover with ice and water for three hours. Add ice as needed.
Mix 6 cups of white vinegar, 6 cups of water, 10 cups sugar, 2 tablespoons of alum, 2 tablespoons of salt, 1 ounce of red food coloring, 1 six ounce red hot and 8 cinnamon sticks.
Add cucumbers and soak 6 hours, then bring to a boil and simmer for 30 minutes. Put into jars and seal.

Dumplings

1 stick oleo
1/2 cup hot water
2 cups flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
Melt oleo in hot water from faucet, then mix with four and salt. Use extra flour to roll out as thin as possible. Cut in strips and put on wax paper to freeze. Break up and put in ziplock bags. Keep in freezer until ready to use.

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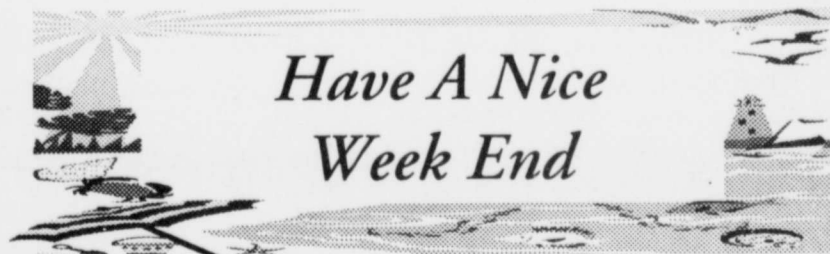
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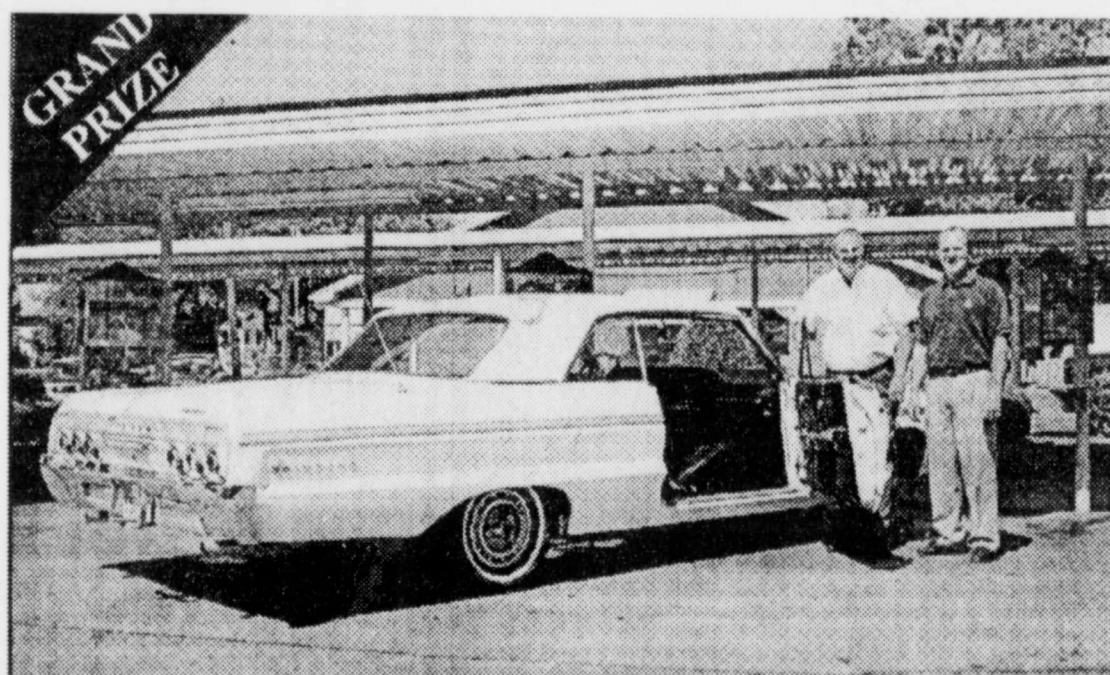

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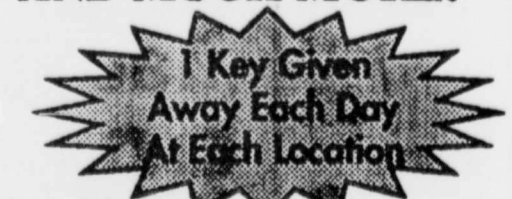

Immunization Clinic Scheduled

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 4 & 5 office, announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at the Texas Department of Health, 1300 Highway 27 North, Clarksville. The next clinic will be held on August 11, 1994.

Clinic hours will be from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Future clinics will be held on the first, second and third Thursday of each month. Parents may call the clinic for an appointment for their child, (903)595-3585, or arrive on a walk-in basis.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guidelines, beginning at two months of age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.

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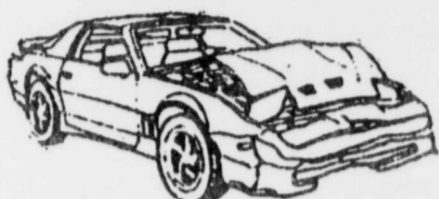

Credit Clean-Up A Dirty Deal

A good credit rating is one of your most valuable "possessions." Unblemished, it can lead the way to purchasing such things as your dream home or a shiny new car. Stained and soiled, it can put a damper on your financial capability.

In exchange for sky-high fees, bogus credit repair outfits often promise you the moon. They tell you they can "erase" bad items on your credit report. But in reality, the only effective way to restore a good credit rating is to pay bills on time and pay them in full.

The Pitch

Several so-called credit improvement companies have set up shop in Texas. They promise to fix your credit and erase negative items on your credit reports. But many of them are unable to keep these extravagant

promises. What they do keep are their high fees, which range anywhere from \$50.00 to \$500.00.

Typically, credit improvement companies write credit bureaus and have false items corrected. But you can do the same thing yourself for free. Under the federal Fair Credit Reporting Act, consumers have the right to have inaccurate information on their credit report corrected. The credit reporting agency cannot charge you for the necessary corrections.

Fixing Negative Entries

Although there are legitimate credit improvement companies, some are scam artists. They prey on consumers who are desperate to improve their credit rating, and deliver little or nothing in return for their fees.

Some companies may appear effective because they exploit loopholes in the procedures established

by credit bureaus.

For example, say you had a car repossessed three years ago. You pay a fee to an outfit that says they'll erase the entry. The outfit writes to the bureau, which informs the repossessing firm. If the firm is slow in responding, you may have the repossession erased from your record, but only temporarily. As soon as the repossession firm responds, the negative item will reappear. Paying for that kind of service is the same as throwing away your money.

What you should do

If you are denied credit, you have the right to get a free credit report from the credit reporting bureau that denied you. If there are erroneous entries on your credit report, write the bureau and insist that they take the mistaken items off your report.

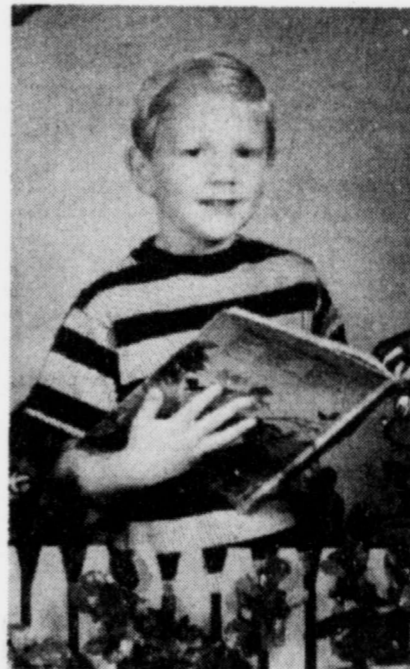

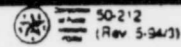

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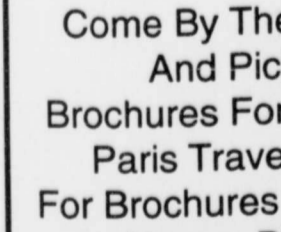

Make Your Child's First Day At School A Good One

A child's first day of school can be an "A+" if parents do a little homework of their own.

"A parent's attitude about school plays a big part in how the child accepts this new responsibility," said Dr. Lou Ann Mock, a child psychologist. "Put aside any anxieties you may have about your own school experience."

Mock encourages parents to build excitement about the first day by emphasizing that school is the beginning of a wonderful adventure.

"If your child has been in day care, make clear that this change is a real accomplishment and that now they are grown up enough to go to 'real' school," she said.

However, children may have concerns about this new experience.

Rather than make assumptions, Mock says, ask if the child has any questions about going to school. "The concerns may be as simple as wondering where the bathroom is or what will happen if they get sick at school," she said.

Parents often make the mistake of trying to fit too many activities in at the end of summer. It is better to slow

down a child's schedule as the start of school approaches.

The Dr. suggests the following techniques to prepare a child for the big day.

-Visit the school during the summer.

-Begin the appropriate bedtime and wake-up schedule a week or two in advance.

-Figure out the best morning routine.

-Let your child pick out first-day clothes and lay them out in advance.

-Get up earlier on the first day, so the morning will not be rushed.

"If possible, arrange to go to work a little later that day. This will put less pressure on you."

The doctor encourages parents to make the first day separation go as quickly as possible. Parents can always call the school later to make sure all is well.

At the end of the day a family celebration with the child picking a favorite meal or restaurant is recommended.

Be encouraging and supportive as your child takes this important step into the world.
