## Talco & Bogata Schools Provide Free/Reduced Meals For Students

The Talco-Bogata School serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.20 and breakfast for \$.55; Rivercrest High School lunch, \$1.50; breakfast, 65¢. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFCD for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.


To get free or reduced price meals for your children, you must complete an application and return it to the school. Applications cannot be approved that are not complete.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Your eligibility may be checked a any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children

If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get

meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.

You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physicial has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, DC 20250.

She didn't know about any committee. I know I heard the report on the committee having been appointed. She said that she would investigate further to see if it was possible that I was mistaken about which government agency had appointed the committee. I am now waiting until I hear from her so that I can correct my story

I should probably let this be a lesson to me and not write about anything other than what we did on our vacation or how to make a blueberry pie, but I don't foresee that happening, because we don't take vacations very often and I 'm not crazy about blueberry pie. I will try to be a little more accurate when I write about someone.

I have discussed this with the folks who didn't tell me about this wonderful clipping service, and as they enjoyed my discomfort, they admitted that possibly they should have warned me, but I think maybe I am not the first person to get "clipped" without advance warning.


