A quick trip across the gravel in the driveway....use the sandals. A few duck eggs to gather ... get


that faithful footwear Well, last week the faithful foot-


When I mow my feet are HOT because they are encased in shoes.



## Hunter Safety Course Being Offered At Mt. Vernon

A course in hunter education is scheduled for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights, August 22, 23, and 24 from 6:00-10:00 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building at Mt. Vernon High School. Bruce Hunnicutt, a local vocational agriculture teacher will be the instructor for the hunter education class.

The course is open to adults and to young people under the age of 18 and will include instructions in hunter responsibility, wildlife conservation and management, firearm, bow, muzzleloading, handgun safety, wildlife identification, game care, survival and first aid, water safety and hypothermia and other special concerns in hunter safety.

Everyone above the age of 12 that passes the exam with a minimum score of 70 at the conclusion of the course will receive a lifetime hunter education certificate that is recognized by Texas and other states. Those below 12 years of age must take the course over again for proper certification.

With dove season beginning in September and deer season and squirrel season set to begin in October, this is a good opportunity for hunters to take the safety course before the fall hunting season gets into full swing, according to Mr. Hunnicut. He also urges everyone to get certified now.

# Chip Adams Is Bull Riding Sensation

Chip Adams a Kilgore High School Graduate recently won \$2300 at a bull-riding competition in Lufkin. This is the most money he has ever won at one time, Adams said.

Chip's other rodeo awards have included several thousand dollars in prize money this year and five belt buckles.

During the winter, Adams usually rides in four to six rodeos monthly, but during the summer he is able to make about 12 to 16 a month.

The most hectic part of the year for him is around the fourth of July. This is known as Cowboy Christmas, because there is a rodeo every day and sometimes two.

Adams goes to rodeos and rides bulls all over the United States. He has competed in Cody, Wyo-

ing, where the arena is up in the mountains, and in San Juan Capistrano, California.

While in California, Chip and friends went to the beach wearing boots, Cowboy hats, and shorts before the evening bull riding

Adams enjoys riding bulls because he gets to travel all over the United

States and meet all kinds of people. His parents enjoy watching him ride, but it bothers them when he is out of town often.

He has learned to be very responsible because there'a no one to take care of him when he is traveling.

Most of all he enjoys riding because there is nothing like the feeling you get when you jump off a bull and hear the crowd going wild. You realize that you've just conquered a 200 pound animal.

Adams started riding during the winter on 1990 with the help of Nicky Wheeler, a qualifier for the National Finals Rodeo in 1977 in the bull riding rven.

During his four years of rodeoing adams has traveled with many different people. He has met many people from all over. He really enjoyed that. The only drawback to his riding career is that he doesn't have much time to be with his friends, and to be active in School.

Practice is essential for bull riding. and he only gets to practice once or twice a month. The more you practice, the better you ride. He has had

a broken jaw, hurt knees and ankles and lots of bumps and bruises. There isn't any part of him which hasn't been sore at one time.

Chip plans to ride as long as he's healthy and making money. He will quit when he stops enjoying it.

Adams plans to go to enough professional rodeos to make it to the Texas Circuit finals and next year he wants to go to as many rodeos as possible.

His long term goals include going to the NFR, riding all 10 bulls, and winning the world championship ..

Adams recommends that anyone starting as beginners in bull riding get with someone who knows the sport well and get on as many bulls as possible







### Marijuana **Stoppers Program Started**

With marijuana use and concealed growing operations on the rise, the Texas Department of Public Safety Narcotics Service has established rewards for those providing information leading to the seizure of growing marijuana.

A new toll free phone number will allow the public to call the authorities when operation of an indoor or outdoor growing site is suspected. Callers who identify themselves and he situation can receive a cash re-/ard

"It is like Crime Stoppers, but it is targeted at marijuana," Narcotics Commander Jim Murray said.

Murray listed several things that may indicate an indoor growing operation: \* covered or blacked out windows; \*loud humming sounds (from fans or ballasts); \* strong musty odor; \*large amounts of potting soil, \* containers, fertilizer, hoses, halide

light system and ballast; \*use of guard dogs; or security systems.

Many times marijuana is grown outdoors on public land. Indicators may be: large purchases of fertilizer, garden hoses, PVC pipe, and camouflage netting; "No Trespassing" or "Keep Out" signs; guard doge; unusual structures or items in remote forested areas (buckets, garden tools, fertilizer bags)

'Marijuana growers can be dangerous; investigations should be left to the law enforcement officers, Murray said.

When a caller who notifies the authorities, the exact location, address, landmarks, and whether persons or vehicles are in the area they may be able to assist the officers in their investigation.

The majority of the clover in East Texas is established by broadcasting the seed into existing sod. The soil should be disked or scratched by some means and the existing grass cut one to two inches high. The seed should be covered lightly after broadcasting by using a drag or roller. The important thing is to get the seed in good, firm contact with the soil and have a short grass sod.

soil phosphorous and potassium levels should be brought up to the medium or high levels on our soil test. The pH should be above 6 and it would be good to apply 10-20 pounds of nitrogen per acre to get the clover started. Soil tests are important in clover establishment. The pH, phosphorous and potassium levels are very critical in obtaining a stand of clover. Clover should be planted in October or November.







# Texas Newspapers Close The Recycling Loop

Texas newspapers are closing the recycling loop by using significant amounts of recycled newsprint, according to results of the 1993 Newsprint Survey conducted by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) in cooperation with the Texas Daily Newspaper Association (TDNA) and the Texas Press Association(TPA)

Survey results show at least 22 percent of all newsprint bought in Texas contained a minimum amount of recycled material. This means that Texas newspaper publishers have more than doubled the amount necessary to meet the 10 percent goal set by the State Legislature in the 1991 Omnibus Recycling Act.

"This is a great example of how business- in this case newspaper publishing-can help reduce our dependence on virgin materials,"said John Hall, TNRCC Chairman. "This in turn helps create markets for recycled products."

By establishing a series of goals for the use of recycled-content newsprint, the 1991 law challenged newspaper publishers to ensure that at least 10 percent of all newsprint purchased in the state contains at least 25 percent post consumer materials by the end of 1993. The Act also stipulates that publishers use at least 20 percent recycled content newsprint by the end of 1997, and 30 percent by The expanding market for recycled content newsprint has also affected the rate of recycling newspapers in

the rate of recycling newspapers in Texas; the recovery rate for old newsprint in Texas has increased from 19 percent in 1993 to 35 percent, the equivalent of 330,000 metric tons of newsprint that is being kept out of Texas landfills.

The price paid for newsprint also has increased in Texas. While some communities previously had difficulty finding markets for old newspapers, many larger cities like Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, and Austin, are now being paid \$20. to \$30. per ton for their recyclable newspapers.

The TNRCC surveyed newspaper publishers in December to obtain information regarding the amount of recycled newsprint purchased in Texas. More than half of the state's newspapers responded.

The TNRCC, TDNA and TPA are working on better ways to ensure that every newspaper publisher receive survey reporting forms. Publishers who did not receive a 1993 survey should call Sherry Steiner at (512) 239-6779. TNRCC is also working with the Legislature to make it easier for central printing plants and commercial printers to complete reports for their client newspapers.
