
National School Bus Safety Week

Gary VanDeaver, Rivercrest High School Principal, who also serves as the Transportation Director for the Talco-Bogata CISD, reports that school bus safety is a subject everyone needs to be reminded of as often as possibel. Mr. Van Deaver reports that our local district currently runs seven bus routes each day as well as other buses being used to shuttle students between campuses and to carry students on extra-curricular trips. "Our routes alone total approximately 420 miles daily. When you think of the number of buses, carrying a large percentage of our students, traveling that many miles daily, you realize the awesome responsibility that is shared by the bus drivers and other motorists who share the roads with the school buses. Our main concern in dealing with the transportation of students is safety. We maintain our buses in safe condition and all drivers are required to successfully complete training in school bus driving.

One of the greatest hazards comes from motorists who do not observe the school bus lighting system. In Texas we use an 8 light school bus warning system. These lights are located on the front and rear of the bus near the top where you see the SCHOOL BUS sign. The lamps are used to warn other traffic about what


the school bus is doing. When the bus is approaching a loading or unloading area, the yellow lights will flash. Red lights will flash when the bus is stopped to load or unload students and the newer buses are equipped with a stop arm which will be extended from the side of the bus. This system was adopted a few years ago because it more closely follows other traffic regulations. The alternately flashing yellow lights mean CAUTION to other motorists because the bus is preparing to stop. The flashing red lights and stop arm mean STOP. Motorists are required to stop at least 20 feet from a stopped school bus that is displaying flashing red lights.

One of the most frequent complaints of school bus drivers is that other motorists do not obey the school bus stop law. Each time a motorist violates the school bus stop law, he or she creates a real hazard for the students who are boarding or leaving the bus.Mr. VanDeaver adds,"We are fortunate we haven't had anyone injured in a bus related accident. I would like to remind everyone to think about the precious cargo that is on board each time you see a school bus going down the road.



gible for free breast cancer checkups. October is National Breast Health Awareness Month, and women age 50 or older who cannot afford preventive health care can get a physical, including a breast cancer checkup and Pap test, at no cost.

These services are available through the Texas Department of Health. Over 3000 women have been served since the Texas Department of Health began offering free checkups in 1991.

Physical exams are free fro women who meet age and income limits. To receive services at no cost, a woman must be age 50 or older and meet income limits. For example, a single woman can make up to \$14,646 a year and recieve services at no cost; a woman in a family of two can make are offered by the Texas Department up to \$19,582 a year and receive free services.

As women get older, their chance for developing breast cancer increases. However, if breast cancer is found early (before you feel sick), a woman has the best chance for successful treatment.

As part of her regular check-up,

for Free Checkups Possible Women 50 or older may be eli- every woman age 50 or older should have a mannogram and a breast checkup by a qualified health professional every year. A mammogram is an xray of the breast that can find lumps too small to feel by hand.

> Unfortunately, many women either don't know that aging puts them at risk, don't get breast cancer checkups because they don't feel sick, or can't afford preventive health care services.

> Families of women age 50 or older can play a major role in finding breast cancer before it spreads. Families should encourage a breast check-up for mothers, grandmothers, and aunts. Some women are more likely to get a check-up if it is suggested by a family member.

> The free breast cancer check-ups of Health and are available throughout the year, not just October.
