



Make plans to attend all the festivities. There will be a reception following the program in the gym.

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
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This week I am going to share with you a Christmas gift that I received from my family. It is a bread machine and I love it.

The first week I made, I don't know how many loaves of bread. I experimented with just plain white bread and then I would go on to something else. The recipe for Banana Bread is delicious and the Raisin Bread is my favorite. You can make all types of breads, including French and Garlic. You can make Hot Rolls and even Doughnuts.

Several years ago, one of the teachers at school bought one. That was when they were so expensive and the bread came out dry and tough. I thought then that I would not like one, but modern technology has changed and they are great!

Just add all of the ingredients and boom...there it is... a complete loaf of bread and with lots of butter, you will soon look like the Pillsbury Doughboy! So, I have had to cut back and not make so much, although I am experimenting with whole wheat flour and ways to cut out the calories. . . . IMPOSSIBLE! Because everyone knows that it doesn't taste near as good if it doesn't have the calories! Right?

Oh, by the way... this reminds me of one of my stories. This one is about a District 4-H Food Show. We always had to travel some distances to district food shows, so with three girls in the show, we tried to choose recipes that could be prepared as

much in advance as possible. Jamie, the oldest, decided to make homemade bread. She mixed it up as late as possible on Friday night and let it rise the first time. It rose to double in bulk. She punched it down, kneaded it and layed it out on the bread board and covered it with a light towel to let it rise the second time. . . . the phone rings! It is our neighbor telling us that the bank has been robbed in Detroit and the robbers are escaping down Highway 82 in the woods down our way. Our house is parallell to Highway 82 or " as the crow flys", about a mile and a half from the bank. The girls and I dropped everything (Jim was at work), grabbed a gun, nevermind that I couldn't shoot it(it was loadedtoo), jumped in the truck and headed to Blossom to a friend's house to stay until Jim came in. There I was careening down F/M 1502 with three young kids and a loaded deer rifle! This was between 6:00 and 7:00 p.m. ( Keep in mind that bread only needs to rise about 1-1/2 to 2 hours.) Jim comes in about 12:00 p.m. and goes into the house check all the closets and under beds and we return safe and sound.

Where is the bread you ask? It has risen to several times it's size and is all over the cabinet and running down the sides. It looked like a giant Blob! We punched down the remains, Jamie made it into rolls and she received a blue ribbon the next day and had quite a story to tell.

The bank robbers? They were hiding in an abandonded barn on the other side of the tracks right outside of Blossom.

Any way, I am sharing some of the recipes from the book and if you get a chance get a bread machine and play with it. They are a lot of fun, very versatile, and can be programmed to have a hot loaf of fresh bread ready for you when you come home from a hard day working or in the morning for breakfast!

Country White Bread

ounces water 2-3/4 cups bread flour tablespoons dry milk tablespoons sugar -1/2 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons butter or margaine Add liquid ingredients to pan. Then

add dry ingredients, except yeast and outter and tap pan to settle. Place butter into corners of pan. Shape well into center and add yeast. Do not stir. Set imer and select program Garlic Bread

ounces water cups bread flour tablespoon dry milk tablespoon sugar -1/2 teaspoon salt tabelspoon dried parsley flakes 1/2 teaspoons garlic salt

Add milk to pan, then banana and rest of ingredients except butter and yeast. Add dry ingredients and tap to settle. Place butter in corners; make well and add yeast. Set program. French Bread

9-1/2 ounces water 3-1/2 cups bread flour -1/2 teaspoon ssugar tablespoon butter teaspoons yeast

Add liquids to pan. Add dry ingredints and tap to settle. Place butter in corners and make well for yeast. Set rogram.

#### Basic Dinner Rolls

7-1/2 ounces water 3 cups bread flour 2 tablespoons dry milk 3-1/2 tablespoons sugar I teaspoon salt 3 tablespoons butter or margarine 2 teaspoon yeast

Add water to pan. Add flour, milk sugar and salt. Tap pan to settle and place butter in corners. Make well and add yeast. Program for DOUGH. When machine stops, remove dough and place onto floured surface. Let rest for 15 minutes. Finish as desired. Place on greased baking pans and allow to rise at room temperature. Brush with butter and bake at 350 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes or until golden brown

Raised Doughnuts

6 ounces milk 2-1/2 ounces water 3-1/2 cups flour 1/4 cup sugar I teaspoon salt 4 tablespoons shortening 2 teaspoon yeast

Add water, milk and egg. Add flour, sugar and salt to pan. Tap to settle. Place shortening in corners and make well and add yeast. Program for DOUGH and start machine. When done, remove from pan and place on floured board and let rest for 15 minutes. Roll into a rectangle and cut with doughnut cutter and leave on counter to rise. Let rise, covered for 35-40 minutes. Fry in three inches of hot oil. Turn over as they rise to surface. Remove and place on paper towel to

Pizza Dough 6 ounces water2 tablespoons oil 2 cups flour

1/2 teaspoon sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 teaspoons yeast

Add water and oil to pan. Add flour sugar and salt. Tap to settle. Place yeast in well in center of dry ingredients. Program for DOUGH and start. When done, remove and place dough on floured surface. Knead for I minute and let rest 15 minutes. Roll dough out to fit 12-14 inch pan and place dough sprinkled with cornmeal in center of pan and press into pan, forming an edge.Let dough rise for 20-25 minutes and spread sauce evenly over crust and top with favorite meat. Bake at 425 degrees for 25 minutes or until



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

# New Ground In The Bottom

I walk a short distance and now I stand at the foot of my grandmother and grandfather Scoggins graves, which I have done many times before. I see myself as a young child, running as fast as I can away from the old box house that was almost always too hot or too cold. I run on toward mama's house that was the same. I loved to watch mama sit in a straightback, cane bottom chair. Taking her braided hair from her head, I marveled as she unbraided her long hair, almost to the floor when she stood up, and pulled it into her lap, where she combed and brushed it many, many times.

I remembered when she died, I told my dad, crying, I did not want to go to the funeral. He hugged me with tears in his eyes. It was the first time I had seen my dad cry, and the first time I can remember him hugging me. He said, "Son, you don't have to go if you don't want to. We can't help mama anymore now." I did not go, however, now I wish I had. Dad and I visited her grave almost every week for many months as his grief remained strong. Several years later dad and I were working on her grave, to remove every sprig of grass that came up every time it rained. I looked at my dad and tears were running down his cheeks. I looked down quickly so he would not see my tears too. We completed the task, loaded thetools in the old pickup truck and drove several miles before either of us exchanged words. I now look north, a hundred yards or more, toward where my great-grandfather was laid to rest many years before my birth. I between the bottomland and the golf wondered if his life had been any different than my father or his father. I wish I could talk to him. I wish that I could ask questions of a man who must have had a hard time starting a new life in a land called Texas, a man I regret I never got to

Scoggins a name that originated 400A.D. descended originally form the Boernicians. The ancient race from the north were a mixture of Scottish Pecks and Anglos. Last year as I had several times before, I visited Europe. In the border country between Scotland and

England, I wondered how my ancestors had lived in this beautiful countryside of rolling hills. An old Scotsman told me in a language I could hardly understand "Son" he said "Sheep were more important than people in the 16th and 17th centuries. The bloody English kings banished your ancestors to the colonies. From this area of the motherland came the Armstrongs, Grahams, Scots, Kerrs, Bells, Nixons, Dicksons, Rutherfords and most names ending in "son". In 1246 A.D., six chiefs from the Scottish side of the border and six chiefs from the English side met at Carlisle and produced a set of laws for the border territories. These were unlike any laws in Scotland or England. For example, it was a great offense to refuse to help a neighbor recover his wife, sheep, cattle or horses. Refusal could get you hanged instantly without a trial. I think my dad could have fit into these clans, just as his ancestors had. I hope God in his infinite wisdom will cut out 50 acres of good bottomland in heaven, give four good mules to my dad and say Homer, you can share crop this land for

me if you want to. Although I think more like my mother there are streaks of Scoggins in me. There is only one way to do a job. It's my way, bear with me a few years so my dad can work for a landlord he has loved the last 57 years. I am sure he will, with God's help, build a golf course on the hill next to that fifty acre strip of bottomland. Dad can drive his mules up under the big tree course. I'll drive the golf cart over and mom will join us with a big box lunch as she used to do when I was very young. We can talk about the good days, not about the good old days, as we have many times before, where the weather never gets too old or too hot, the ground never gets too wet or too dry, where man or beast never gets tired, working the new ground in the bottom, of a new land.

This tribute is from a son that loves his father very, very much. Harley Scoggins

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


