try to the nation and to the world. Students will be involved in activities to promote and publicize the activities and the value of their experiences through the agricultural education program to their communities.


National FFA Week is conducted each year during the week of George Washington's birthday to recognize his leadership and commitment to American agriculture.

Farmers know down time costs money!

The legislation allowed the PUC to set rules for communities with less than 10,000 telephone lines, and outside of metropolitan areas, to expand local calling areas where there is a community of interest, such as county government, churches, a school district, hospitals an doctors. The service is called expanded local calling

The law, passed in 1993, allows the additional costs and investment, as well as lost long-distance revenues associated with ELC, to be recovered by assessing customers in the requesting community a monthly charge of no more than \$3.50 for each residential line and \$7 for each business line. Revision of the law in 1995 limited the number of distant calling areas that can be added to the local calling area for the \$3.50 and \$7 minimum charges to five. Additional calling areas over the five limit will include an additional \$1.50 a month for both residential and business lines for each additional calling area

When approved by the PUC, customers in areas with ELC service who are not paying the maximum \$3.50 residential or \$7 business rate will see charges for ELC increased to the maximum. Customers not paying an ELC charge will receive a \$1.06 monthly surcharge per line.




With these things happening all around me that I don't understand, but seem to be the way of the future, I sometimes feel left behind.

est hands of any player we have ever had. Alvin can really be a gamer at times," said Coach Wood.



While there are many reputable check-cashing services, those that ignore the law should know that they will be targets of investigation.

How It Works

Fort Hood troopers, who are stationed in Killeen, were getting caught in a "check-cashing loop." Encouraged to establish an account, the soldiers were given \$100 in cash immediately in return for writing a post-dated check in the amount of \$150. Some enlisted soldiers lost half their pay to "fees" every month.

Military personnel are not the only residents of Texas to suffer. Consumers who regularly use check-cashing services can easily spend three times more than those who use banks for basic financial services. It is tragic, but true,

Campaign signs, highway right of way don't mix

dates for statewide public office brought the start of the campaign season. To avoid a deluge of illegally placed campaign signs, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is reminding candidates of the laws on signs along highways.

Under Texas law, it is a class C misdemeanor to place any sign on highway right of way without a license and permit. The fine for violating this law can be as much as \$500

It is also illegal to place a sign, even off of state right of way, along most major highways in the state without a license and permit. Violation of this class B misdemeanor is punishable by a fine of as much as

The recent filing date for candi- \$1000 per sign. Within city limits, the placement of signs along roadways may also be regulated by local ordinances so candidates are encouraged to check with local municipalities for election sign laws.

"These laws are designed to keep roadsides clean and uncluttered so that official traffic control signs are clearly visible for the safety of the traveling public," said Keith Hollje, right of way agent for the Paris District of TxDOT

TxDOT is mailing information about the placement of illegal signs to statewide candidates. Local candidates may also obtain this information by writing to Mr. Hollje at the department's Paris District office at 1365 North Main, Paris, Texas 75460.

Genetic defect responsible for disease

A genetic defect responsible for a common form of heart muscle disease has been discovered on chromosome 1, say heart specialists at Baylor College of Medicine and the Methodist Hospital in Houston.

Familial dilated cardiomyopathy (FDCM) runs in families and usually leads to heart failure. The ventricles enlarge, resulting in loss of pumping strength.

The scientists detected the chromosomal defect after analyzing the genetic make up of 46 living members spanning four generations of an afflicted family living in California and Utah. Eighteen cases of FDCM, eight of them fatal, have occurred in

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'We have achieved the first major step -- isolating the gene," said co investigator, Dr. Robert Roberts, a professor of medicine and cell biology and chief of the cardiology section at The DeBakey Heart Center of Baylor and Methodist. "Now, we want to identify what is responsible for the defect. No gene defect has ever been identified for this disease.'

While several genes are suspect on chromosome 1 and the culprit has not been pinpointed, the research team say their findings pave the way to screening to look for genetic markers on and around the chromosome among family members with the dis-

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Going, going, gone: After being in place for 120 years,

the rails that were put down in 1873-1876 from Texarkana to Paris by the Texas & Pacific Railroad through are gone.

The last train, one 1950's era diesel engine and four box cars passed through Blossom 3 weeks ago, on track so decrepit that speeds of only 5 to 8 miles per hour were possible.

During the Golden Days of the Railroad in the 1920's and 1930's as many as seven passenger trains, both east and west, stopped at the Blossom depot. You could connect going east at Texarkana with Missouri Pacifics "Sunshine Special" to all points north to St. Louis. You could connect in Paris to the Santa Fe south to Dallas or north on the Frisco to points in Oklahoma and Arkansas enroute to Kansas City and St. Louis, whre connections could be made to such "name" trains as the "Spirit of St. Louis" or the "Broadway Limited" to the east, or west on the "Super Chief" or the "Golden State Rocket". Connections could be made in Denison to the "Katys", "Texas Special" to Kansas City to the north or San Antonio to the south.

As may as ten to twelve freight trains rumbled through Blossom each day, many stopping to discharage carago and to load cotton and other products from the area and during WWII days from 1841 to 1945 many Pullmans, coachs and GI "box Cars" loaded with troops from all over the country passed through enroute to Camp Maxey.

This I remember wll as I was on one of 'em.

So, an era has passed, the sound of a steam whistle or diesel horn will never be heard again in our community. The present owners of the system have decided they can haul between Clarksville and Texarkana cheaper than from Paris.

The demise of our railroad is not merely sad, it is a mistake of no small significance. This railroad did not simply die, it was killed by years of neglect, substandard track, service and equipment and our present day state of mind that everything must move by car or truck. The End. **Ed Gardiner**




Children who get involved with the roughest sports tend to show more aggression, both on and off the playing field, than their peers, a sport psychologist has reported.

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
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
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

She notes that people used to go straight from childhood into the working world of adults, so that adolescence is a recent phenomenon.


Potatoes potent against disease-causing agents

COLLEGE STATION - When it comes to disarming disease- causing agents in the body, potatoes pack a punch more powerful than many other veg-

New research has found that while vegetables such as bell peppers, onions and carrots remain valuable dietary sources of disease-preventing antioxidants, potatoes rank near the top of that category.

"We were surprised to find that potatoes are second only to broccoll in terms of antioxidant activity," said Dr. Creighton Miller, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station potato breeder based at Texas A&M University. He said people should not only put potatoes on every

plate, but should eat them skins and all. Discovery of the potato's high antioxidant activity is reported in the current issue of the Journal of Food Sci-

Asian ambrosia beetle spreading through state

COLLEGE STATION Entomologists across the state are keeping a wary eye out for the Asian ambrosia lems in several nurseries in southeast and northeast Texas.


Four counties - Brazoria, Burleson, Grimes and Van Zandt - have been added to the list of infested counties this year. Hunt County was added late in 1994. This brings to 41 the total number of counties where the ambrosia beetle has been found since specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service first began monitoring its movement across the state in 1994, said Bill Ree, Extension entomologist.

The pest attacks numerous woody plants, and its damage may be identified by the toothpick-like spines which protrude 1-1/2 inches from the host plant. These spines are the "sawdust" left after the female beetle bores into the host to make brood galleries, or nurseries.

The ambrosia beetle bores horizontally into the tree, not vertically like most wood pests. That eventually causes more damage to the different sections, or layers, of the branch, notes the Texas A&M University-based entomologist.

The pest has been found in Shumard oak, burr oak, chinquapia, red bud, Chinese pistachio, Mexican plum, golden raintree and Bradford pear in Texas nurseries. It also may attack pecan trees.






