

This is the time of year that fresh fruit is usually on hand and is ready for the picking. Because of the inclement weather that we had during the winter, the early fruit and most of the rest was lost. We have to rely on crops that are shipped in from California, Florida or the Rio Grande Valley. A lot of these areas also lost most of their crops due to the cold weather and a lot of flooding, not only bringing on a shortage of crops but the usual. . . . high prices. But what little fruit that was grown, there is no better way to prepare it than a fresh, hot, fruit cobbler.

I can remember sitting in front of a very large(at the time it seemed to be gigantic) metal washtub, filled to the brim with water and fresh, mouth watering peaches, waiting to be peeled. I preferred mine half-green with a lot of salt and ate as many as I peeled. Apples were also abundant and we peeled, sliced, diced, cooked, preserved and froze many, many bushels. I ate a lot of these too, but peaches were my favorite.

Blackberry Cobbler is also an all time favorite, if you can get past the thorns. Nowadays, they have the thornless berries, but they just don't taste the same. There are several varieties of the Peach Cobbler. One is for a Sugarless for folks that are trying to cut back! Also included are two crust recipes. I use the Never-Fail recipe. I can't count the times that my crust has ended in the gar-

bage and it took me several years to "perfect" my pie crust. There is also a all-purpose recipe for using different varieties of fruit.

Included is a recipe for an Old-Fashioned Vinegar Cobbler. A variation for this is to add 4 tablespoons of margarine. This recipe was used before the Civicl War and was used much when fruit and berries were not available while traveling by covered wagon and riverboat, when supplies were limited. Also used in the Depression days, when money was scarce, making do with what was on

There is also a Bread Pudding recipe that several folks have asked for and we will see you in the

An afternoon and evening in Galway is a good way to spend time. One of the neatest things we did was wander through an antiques and jumble sale around the old city walls of Galway. Here people had everything from furniture to penknives for sale. It's probably for the best we couldn't ship most of the things we

wanted back....it kept us in line! A live band entertained the crowd, and we adjourned from that after a little while for a walk along the beach o pick up a few sea shells.

Our bed and breakfast that night was on Threadneedle Street, a lovely two story home called Clare Villa.

Inside our B&B we chatted with some Australians who were staying their also, then went down to Drumcliffe to Yeats House to eat. It was across from the churchyard where the poet, W.B. Yeats, is buried.

It occurs that not all readers may be familiar with a "B&B". This means, obviously, bed and breakfast, and that's exactly what one gets. The rooms are attached to a private home, and the family lives in another part of the house. Ours all had ensuite bathrooms. There is a central sitting room where tv, books and radio are available. At Benbulben Farm we visited with Mrs. Cummins and learned that the family has six girls and one boy. The boy had minigitis at age 9, and is almost completely deaf.

"I fear we indulge him too much" she said. As well behaved and friendly as the children we met were....no

We asked if there was an orphan lamb Medora could feed, since she had never done that. In short order "Bobby" came around behind the three youngest girls, who were so sweet and attractive. At a park in Inniskellig we stopped on the spur of the moment to see swans and fishermen. The fishermen were sitting in chairs on the riverside, with long poles, bobbers and a reel. They would use a bean flipper or throw out by hand dry fish food and small larvae around the hook to attract the fish. My cousin, the fisherperson extraordinaire, was fas-

We drove through land that was much less rocky and very lush. Of course, by this time my cousin was thinking I was quite nuts...I had told her it rained nearly every day and to bring her raincoat and umbrella. We had about two 15 minute showers the whole trip! Well, I could only judge by our first time, I didn't know it would be dry!

Back into the Republic of Ireland we made our way towards Dublin, and stopped off for the highlight of the trip for me, at least. Newgrange is an ancient burial tomb, known as a passage tomb. It was constructed 500 year before the pyramids, making it 5000 years old. We'll cover more of that next time...and our "brush" with the Druids! Now that was interest-



Texas traffic deaths increased in 95

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(1) F150 4x4 Ext. Cab

Traffic deaths increased by 1 percent in Texas in 1995 compared with the year before, but the number of fatalities per 100 million miles driven dropped to the lowest level in the state's history, Department of Public Safety statistics show.

The record-low death rate of 1.7 means that the chance of being killed in a traffic accident in Texas was the lowest it has ever been.

There is concern that the actual number of deaths was up slightly, but considering our large population, rapid growth and the amount of driving we do in Texas, the situation certainly could have been much

Statistics compiled by the DPS show 3,172 persons died in traffic crashes in 1995, up 1 percent from 1994, when 3,142 fatalities were re-

Another encouraging sign seen is that alcohol and drug related traffic fatalities were down in 1995. Accidents involving intoxicated drivers were down 2.7 percent. Still, intoxicated drives accounted for 1,138 deaths; 35.9 percent of all fatalities.

Though the speed limit on some Texas highways increased beginning Dec. 8 last year, it is too early to tell what effect this will have on traffic safety in the state. Even so, motorists need to keep in mind that exceeding the speed limit is dangerous.

Traffic fatality reports for 1995 showed a slight increase in the number of motorcycle fatalities and an increase in pedestrian traffic deaths.

No traffic fatalities were reported in Texas on Feb.28,1995, the only day during the year no traffic deaths occurred. Twice during 1995, single accidents claimed six or more victims. Texans are encouraged to obey speed limits, wear safety belts and avoid alcohol when they plan to drive. Keeping traffic safety in mind can save lives during 1996.

Emergency farm loan applications being accepted

loans for damages and losses caused by excessive high temperatures, drought conditions, unseasonably cool temperatures, and an early freeze, which occurred August 1 through December 31, 1995 in Oklahoma, also contiguous counties of Bowie and REd River are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Mt. Pleasant, Sheila L. Osbourne said today.

Bowie and Red River Counties are included in 20 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture, Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from damages and losses caused by excessive high temperatures, drought conditions, unseasonably cool temperatures, and early freeze conditions which occureed August 1 through December 31, 1995.

Ms. Osbourne said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual production losses resulting from damages and losses caused by excessive high tempratures drought conditions, unseasonably cool temperatures, and early freeze conditions which occurred August 1 through December 31, 1995.

Ms. Osbourne said farmers may be eligible for loan of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loans needed to cintue in business or

Applications for emergency farm \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commerical lenders the interest is 3.75 percent.

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"As a genral rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent oss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Ms. Osbourne said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program wil have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until January 6, 1997 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Ms. Osbourne said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers hwo work at and rely on famring for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers hwo are U.S. Citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S> citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Mt. Pleasant is open from 8:00 to 5:30 Monday through Friday.

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



*Beware of Montezuma's Revenge , in reality a virus or bacteria that's not confined to Mexico. It can strike you in places the angry Aztec never even heard of: Nepal, Fiji, anywhere. So, don't drink the water (unless it's been thoroughly boiled) or suck the ice cubes. Stick to bottled water, particularly the bubbly kind. Also, refrain from buying street vendor's edible wars. Dairy products-including ice cream - are potentially dangerous, as are any fresh fruits or vegetables for which you don't peel the skin yourself. Thoroughly cooked and promptly served meals are your safest bet. And skip salads on return flights; most airlines meals originate in the country of departure.

As a preventive measure, take two chewable Pepto Bismol tablets four times daily - before meals and at bedtime - if OK'd by your physician. If Montezuma does strike, switch from Pepto Bismot to Imodium AD and an antibiotic prescribed by your allergies and medications.

* Travelers using public modes of transportation should watch out for cold and flu viruses. Crowded airplanes, buses and trains are ideal places to pick up bugs, especially on unfamiliar terrain where you're not immune to the various viruses going

To prevent colds, which are spread through physical contact, wash your hands often. Influenza, which is airborne, is a little harder to avoid. Ask your doctor is you should get a flu shot before bonvoyage-ing.

Put a Boy Scout to shame with your preparations. Pack antacids and Pepto-Bismot.; Neosporin or another antibiotic ointment; Band Aids; your lotion for itching; Dramamine for motion sickness; Benadryl to control allergic reactions (don't forget prescription medications you may take occasionally for surprise reactions); and sunscreen of SPF 15 or higher.

Bring enough of your regular prescription medications to last twice as long as your trip, packing half in one bag and half in another; If one piece of luggage is lost, stolen or misrouted, you'll still have the proper dosage for the duration of your travels. Keep all medications, not just prescriptions, in their original bottles so customs won't nab them. Carry copies of your prescriptions and a list of your drug

* When the climbing gets high, even the experienced can get altitude sickness. Expect shortness of breath and a headache when you reach oxygen light, mountainous areas at least 8,000 feet above sea level, such as in the Andes. Eat sparingly, skip alcohol and take it easy the first few days. If nosebleeds have been a particular problem in the past, use nose drops. For severe shortness of breath, quickly get to a lower altitude and seek a doctor's care. If you're prone to altitude sickness, your doctor may prescribe Kiamox as a preventive.

* To avoid insect bites use a topical repellent that's 25 to 35 percent DEET or N, N-Diethylmetatoluamide, the most effective solution for keeping six and eight legged creatures at bay.

Also try not to wear bright clothing and jewelry, and don't use colognes or scented hair sprays, deodorants or soaps, all of which attract

* See a physician as far in advance of your trip as possible, as certain preventive treatments require months to become effective. The hepatitis B vaccine, for example, needs to be started six months prior to departure.



LICENSE **SUSPENSION:** WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT

URING the past legislative session, the Texas Legislature approved a measure that gave my office the authority to suspend the professional, driver's and recreational licenses of parents who are delinquent in their child support payments. On September 1, 1995 the new law, one of the most comprehensive in the nation, goes into effect.

What it means

Non-custodial parents who hold state-regulated licenses, owe more than 90 days of past-due child support, and are not in compliance with an existing repayment plan, will face suspension of those licenses.

The license suspension bill was designed as an enforcement tool that would reach the most troublesome cases involving delinquent parents. Many of those parents have attempted to avoid automatic wage withholding for child support by various means, including skipping from job to job, working for cash, or taking on self-employment. We aim to stop non-compliance.

It would be wonderful if we lived in a society that did not re-

it is comfort or money that it values more, it will lose that too.

quire the government to become involved in people's personal lives and force them to live up to their parental responsibilities. Unfortunately, the grim reality is that government is - and must be involved in the process. In Texas, hundreds of thousands of children's lives are affected by the payment or non-payment of child

Voluntary Compliance Process

This September we will begin statewide campaign to inform non-custodial parents who are delinquent on child support that their license privileges are in jeopardy. We hope that this information will encourage voluntary compliance to pay up. If you are a non-custodial parents in this situation, you can set up a repayment plan to avoid the possibility of having your licenses suspended. A repayment plan can be worked out at any time.

There will be penalties, however, for those who do not obey the law. Delinquent non-custodial parents will be put on notice. While we really do not want to suspend anyone's license, we will not hesitate to do so if necessary.

The Suspension Process

Those who fail to meet their lawful obligations will be faced with a number of administrative sanctions.

If we cannot get voluntary compliance from a non-custodial parent, we here at the Office of the Attorney General will petition the administrative hearing officer for license suspension. Due process requirements will be met by proper service and hearings.

Non-custodial parents who enter into repayment agreements will be allowed to keep their licenses, so long as they comply with those repayment plans.

On the other hand, if a noncustodial parent does not enter into a repayment agreement and keep up with the payments, the final order to suspend his or her license is sent to the appropriate licensing agency and the license will be suspended. A noncustodial parent can appeal the suspension to a state district court.

The Legislature and the Governor have acted. Now it is our turn. If you are a non-custodial parent and you plan to meet your obligations, we applaud you. But if you fail to meet your obligations, we will seek you out on behalf of your children and take away your state-regulated license.
