





Our featured Cook of the Week this week is Blossom resident Irene Bryant. I was looking for someone that knew something about blueberries and remembered Irene's story of several years ago when she and the late Carol Pilip went blueberry picking and came home not only with a load of blueberries but also a load of chiggers. Irene had never been introduced to chiggers before and decided right away, that chiggers needed to be left in the woods!

Irene is a RN Case Manager with Magnolia Home Health out of Paris. She enjoys flower gardening and plants, reading, sewing, crafts and traveling. She and her daughter Marleena have returned from a recent trip to Washington state where they visited Irene's mother, Margaret Akehurst.

Marleena is a 21 year old senior student at East Texas State University in Commerce. Irene has been a Girl Scout Board member for several years and is chairman of the Finance Committee. 

keep about 12 months. Irene washes her first two times and then lays them out to air dry, then puts them in freezer bags to freeze. They keep up to two weeks in the refrigerator. They contain vitamin A and C, calcium, phosphorus and potassium and have only 84 calories per cup. If a recipe calls for a can of blue-

berries, you can make your own by using 2-1/2 cups berries, I tablespoon corn starch, 1-1/2 teaspoon lemon juice, 1/8 cup water and cook until thickened and clear. Cool before using as a substitute.

Some of her recipes comes from a handout from the Storey Orchards at Avery and others she had collected and improvised to her own liking. They include her very favorite recipe, the Blueberry Delight. She says that when she takes it anywhere, she always comes back with a clean dish. Everyone really enjoys it. Her second favorite is the recipe for Marie's Blueberry Muffins. It calls for cream cheese and a yellow cake mix. She leaves some of the cream cheese lumpy to get the added flavor. There is also a recipe for Blueberry Cream Cheese Pie, Blueberry Ice Cream, Blueberry Yum-Yum and Blueberry Sour Cream Pancakes.

We hope you enjoy these blueberry recipes and we will see you in the kitchen!

saucepan and simmer for 3 minutes. Mix together sugar and cornstarch, then add 1/3 cup water. Combine this with the blueberries and boil for I minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, allow to cool 3-5 minutes. Pour over cream cheese mixture and refrigerate. For pie: Blend powdered sugar and cream cheese until smooth. Add Cool Whip and blend all until smooth. Spread in a pie shell and cover with slightly cooled blueberry sauce.



By Jack Dodd The difference between a fairy tale and a Texas Tale; A fairy tale starts out "Once upon a time", a Texas Tale starts out " You ain't' gonna believe this, but". This short story is somewhere in between.

In 1956 the family consisted of parents, 2 daughters, one over 1 year old and the other 3 years old and a brother of mine, David who had joined us in late 1955. Every time David and I get together, the conversation always turns toward Big Piney after these many years, 40 to be exact.

I had a company furnished 1955 Ford Station Wagon. A rock went through the windshield and we needed a new one. This happened in May of 1956. Things had just started thawing a little. It was mid June before the snow left us. So one Saturday David and I took the station wagon to Kemmer, about 70 miles south and the closest place to replace the windshield. The owner of the Frontier Motel and Grocery Store asked me to bring the old windshield back for him to use on something or the other.

We put the car in the garage, got a new windshield and the garage put the old windshield in the new windshield box. A Big box, big enough to hold a body. We loaded this box up in the back of the station wagon and headed for Big Piney.

On the way back I told David about an aunt of ours, Cathlene, not quite 5 feet tall and youngest of 10 children. Catt took me to the first State Fair in Dallas in 1936. Now you talk about a country boy getting wide eyed, I did. We saw everything including the stage show "The Alamo", boy, that was great, and we visited the Texas Rangers building. President Roosevelt was to speak that evening at 7:00 p.m. in the Cotton Bowl. We arrived just after 6. There was a platform in the center of the field for the president.

About 6:30 a man rode out into the stadium on a big white horse and wore a big white hat. He circled the arena a few times, came to Catt and me, reined up his horse and asked if I wanted to ride with him. Before my Aunt could object I jumped on behind the rider and away we went, my aunt hollering for me to come back the whole time.

Around that arena we went, him waving his hat and m a holding on. After 3 or 4 laps he took me back to my aunt. I got off while Catt scolded him for going so fast and asked, "Just

the United States." and off he went. Catt said,"Let's not tell anyone about this. "I haven't until now, Sorry Catt. I saw some men carry the President up the ramp and wondered why. It was a long time later before I knew he had Polio.

I think it was Clay and Tony who went to see Bunky Smith the other day and an old hound dog was chewing on a hub cap in Bunky's front yard. Clay said, "Bunky, that sure is a tough old dog to chew on a hub cap". Bunky said," Yeah, you won't believe it (a Texas Tale), but that was a full sized pickup 10 days ago."

About 1970 in Sunday School my mother was visiting us and the subject of drugs came up. Mother was born in 1902 and had been around awhile. She told me that when prohibition was talked about being repealed that people said the young people would all be alcoholics. Now she says I hear talk about drugs being legalized and I hear people say "Our young people will all become drug addicts." Her advice and observation was, "Don't by misled, when alcohol

became legal the 30 to 50 aged people became the alcoholics of the day, not necessarily the very young, so I think you can expect the same from drugs.-Best leave them like they are. There is nothing wrong with our youth of today that good parenting, schooling and lessons learned in Sunday School will not correct. Our youth may have the "Urge to merge" more than we did, but family can correct that. I have respect for our youth and see a brighter future for us now than 50 years ago. The leadership is there and will come forward when needed."

We moved to Clarksville in 1942. We lived in a big 2 story house on College Street. The first house with electricity and inside toilet. High class, moving up. When we moved we took Old Blackie, a good Jersey milk cow with us to keep in back of the house. One night Ruth Wooley was having a party at her house starting at 7:00 and already dark during the winter. Daddy said I could not go since It was on a school night. I went up early to study, so I said. My room was upstairs at the front and there was a back set of stairs to the kitchen below. I waited until about 7:30, changed clothes and slipped out and went to Ruth's party.

While I was gone, Old Blackie got out and Daddy asked Mary Lee, my sis, to get me to put Blackie back in who are you?" "Lady, I am Cactus her pen. Naturally I was gone and

Jack Garner, the Vice President of Mary was quick to tell Daddy I wasn't in bed.

> I left the party about 10 and slipped up the back stairs, down the hall to my room. Took off my shirt and sat down on the bed to take my shoes off and sat down right in the middle of Daddy's stomach. He grunted, I turned on the light. Daddy got up, looked me over and went downstairs to his bed. That happened in 1942 and Daddy died in 1969 and never brought that situation up. Never. And something else, when I see Daddy in Heaven, I am not going to ask him about it either. He left that an open item. Talk about educating a son, he knew how.

> Back to the box with the broken windshield. We arrived back in Big Piney rather late. Took the box to the hotel and no one was home so we took it to our log cabin we lived in . The coal bin was by the back door. A porch closed in about 12 X 20 then a door to the kitchen. David and I were removing the box with the windshield when Ann came to the door by the coal bin. We asked her to hold it open for us so we could put the big box inside.

> She casually asked what was in the box. To this day I do not know why I gave her the answer I did. "The undertaker in Kemmer asked us to bring this frozen Indian for Tanner for burial", Tanner being our local undertaker. "What happened", she asked, holding the door closed. This old Indian was found frozen about 2 months ago so they boxed him and put him on the roof until the ground could be dug up for burial. So we are going to hold him here 'til Tanner returns on Sunday. "Not in this house, you're not," she says. " Oh get out of the way, he's frozen," says I. "You just put him back in the station wagon. He's not being left here," says she. "But it's just a couple of days." I pleaded. At this point Ann was protecting that back door like never before. David and I just kept coming toward the door with the box. She finally ran when we started to open the box to show her the Indian was still frozen.

After about 2 hours we finally drug Ann out to the back porch and held her while we showed her the broken windshield, because I knew she would not sleep or let anyone else sleep while that frozen Indian was out back.

We laugh about it now, but at one time in 1956 my young wife was quite upset at her husband and brother in law. Such is life.





After a day in Dublin what would any tourist want? A good hot shower, a hot cup of tea and a bit of a rest before dinner.

What did we actually get? Well, it wasn't so good, but it is worth a lot of laughs now!

We were scheduled to spend two nights at Aaronleigh B&B, Ballsbridge Court, Dublin. We spent only one, and here is why.

Our typically efficient guide, Robert, had called ahead, located the place and told our hostess we would arrive about 4:30 p.m. We drove up, unloaded our bags and rang the bell, only to discover no one at home.

Well, we sat on the sidewalk waiting, and after a bit here came a young couple in a car. They breezed past us with no real apology for being late, and we entered our "house of horrors"! Now folks, we live with three dogs and five cats. I've happily eaten my lunch sitting in the corral, but I didn't touch the food in this place!

The day made up for it, though, as we drove down to Kilkenny, where we went through the design center, which is world famous, saw the castle and then headed on to Kinsale. Just outside of town we went through the ruins of Ft. Charles, used by the English to guard the harbor from 1770-1780 and currently under restoration. Kinsale is a picturesque fishing

village, with expensive yachts anchored in the harbor and shops of all kinds meandering up and down the hills of the town.

Kinsale is considered the gourmet capital of Ireland, so we donned our best duds to go out and eat at a place called Man Friday. This place featured hand made pottery, a fabulous view, perfect service and what has to be the very best meal I've ever eaten.


Crab claws, oysters, Dover sole, mussels and scallops were set off by homemade rolls, the ubiquitous potatoes and more. Inormally can't abide oyster on the half shell, but these were so mild and sweet that they were delicious. Indeed, we agreed with the gourmet reputation Kinsale has, but of course we made up for no purchases in the shops that afternoon...it went to the meal.

Could it really be Thursday already! Next morning it was, and it didn't seem possible. It was only a short distance to Killarney, and we were soon there, and met our guide's cousin, Michael, who is one of several people who operate jaunting carts out to Muckross House. The house sits amid hundreds of acres of national park. The sidecar we took was pulled by an Irish draft horse, and the trip took about thirty minutes through beautiful woods, past lakes and then out into the open for the first view of magnificent Muckross. The structure has 365 windows, one for each day, and 52 chimneys, one for each week. It is furnished with inlaid furniture handcrafted by Killarney artisans, silver, crystal and lovely paintings. That afternoon we had our notorious fishing expedition, which was featured in my column recently.

We spent that night in Ardfallen House, which is operated by Noreen Downing, Robert's wife. They couple have three children and Robert's mother lives next door. Since Robert is away quite a bit on the job, Noreen told us that operating the B&B kept her busy. We spent one of our most pleasant nights there. What cleanliness, and how comfortable we were.

Some good "pub grub" and getting our laundry done completed a busy day for us all.

It seemed impossible our trip could be coming to a close so soon.

Oral arguments were held before the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals on June 12 in Austin regarding the appeal of James Henderson. Henderson was sentenced to death for the murder of Martha Lennox after a 4 1/2 week trial.

The principle issues raised at oral argument centered around a tear-drop tattoo on Henderson's face. This tattoo was placed on Henderson in the Dallas County Jail after the murder of Ms. Lennox and after the arrest of Henderson. Henderson was required to stand in front of the jury and display the tattoo. The significance of the tattoo was that it was a badge of honor for killing someone.

The defense argued that this violated Henderson's 5th amendment right to remain silent. I feel the argument of the defense was weak and the case should be upheld on appeal. We don't know when the final decision will be handed down.
