I write from a woman's perspective. There really isn't any other way for me to write for the simple reason of my gender.

But, I would like to take up for the other gender for a while.

I was at a wall paper store over the weekend, and there was a sign posted on the wall that read "Men attempting to match colors must bring a note from home". I cracked up laughing, because it seems to be true that men don't match home decor colors very well. My husband, who also admits to that particular problem, was highly amused too.

But, upon careful reflection, I realized that this is stereo-typing.

I'm not one of these people that thinks this is a case for a harassment suit.. I think most of those suits are unwarranted. But I have most definitely been a woman in a man's world many times, and it isn't always easy

When we were farming for a living I ran into man after man at grain mills and parts stores who automatically assumed since I was picking up parts for my husband that I didn't know what I was doing. I have had to argue more than once that "no, I didn't want THIS, I wanted THAT" because they were just sure I was wrong.

I tried to tell a man at the mill once that we needed to use the dump bed on my old grain truck, because if we used the lift the carburetor would drain, and the fuel pump wasn't strong enough. He insisted on putting the truck on the lift. I announced that when it didn't crank he would get someone to help him pull it until it cranked. I drank a nice cold softdrink under the office air conditioning while he and another man dragged that blasted truck all over the mill yard until it finally fired up! He didn't, however, argue with me anymore.

When I first started in the newspaper business I dealt with prejudice and rejection because women were not usually found at crime scenes, fires, deaths and sports events. My theory was "Do the job well and don't back down and they'll come around". Most of them did.

Over the years I have maintained that there are very few places a woman doesn't belong, but that they have to do the job as well as a man with no special concessions. It doesn't count if you don't do it on an equal basis!

Women have made great strides in being able to choose what career they wanted instead of what was "appropriate"

But, we've backlashed . After seeing the wallpaper sign I began thinking about all those incredibly stupid commercials on TV that make the husband or father out to be a bumbling idiot! While they are cute, they probably aren't too amusing to the men watching them! Sitcoms make men out to be fools, frequently and that's not accurate either. Of course men can run a house if necessary, and of course they can fill roles "traditionally" filled by women. It's as bad to typecast them as it is to typecast females!

I didn't appreciate being made fun of because I was a woman in a "man's world" and I don't figure men appreciate being made fun of in a "woman's world"

What I really can't figure out is why it's necessary to run either men or women down. We're different from one another, that's a fact, but why does that matter? Wouldn't it be boring if all human kind was exactly the same?

It's up to consumers to protect themselves from unwanted phone services

By Nanalee Nichols Remember when you didn't even really need to check your phone bill to see if it was correct? Well, those times are gone with the intense competition within the telemarketing business of today's high-tech world. And, if people aren't very careful, they can end up with charges on their bill for services they can't even use. Please read the following and perhaps it will help you avoid what I went through.

Recently I had a charge for "Voice Mail Services" appear on one of our phones for the newspaper. The services were sold by a company who subcontracted to another company who actually provided the services. The service had nothing to do with the phone company my service is with. I called the toll free number on my bill and learned that a teenager who occasionally answers the phone for her mother had spoken with the telemarketing company. She was asked "do you understand how this card works" and she said yes. That was all it took for voice mail charges of about \$20 per month to show up on our bill...at a location without the capability to use voice mail! And, I learned that anyone can sign you up for these services whether you want them or not! After doing so you can cancel them, but it is very difficult to get those charges removed and many people just go ahead and pay them instead of going through the major efforts to recover their money.

It has been a big hassle to get the service cancelled and the charges removed, and it has taken many letters to the Public Utility Company, the phone company, the people selling the service, etc. to accomplish this.

Upon speaking with other people I have discovered a number of others have gone through the same thing. I discovered that sometimes people thought the were agreeing to a free psychic reading instead of signing up for a service! One customer was signed up by someone who has never even been in his house!

I began questioning and prying into this matter, and have learned that it can be very difficult to protect against this kind of thing, as well as long distance phone companies constantly coming up with new (and often devious) ways to get you to changeyour long distance services.

have spoken with helpful people at the Consumer Protection Division of the Office of the Attorney General of Texas, and the Public Utilities Commission. Here is what I have learned and what people can

1. Be very, very careful when talking to anyone on the phone about any phone services, or free offers. People frequently agree to a 30 day free trial without realizing that if THEY don't call and cancel the service after 30 days it automatically continues and you will be billed for the services.

2. Some very unethical companies will even tape conversations and splice voices so that it appears you have agreed to services when you didn't. Don't say "yes" or "Okay" to anything. In fact, in my opinion, the best thing to do is simply say "No" or "not interested" and hang up. Don't worry about being rude, these people are often being worse than rude!

3. Check your telephone bill carefully. Always look at every page. The charges for all kinds of services will be listed on there and usually have a toll-free contact number. This is not the telephone company's number. Whether we agree with the practice or not phone companies routinely have contracts to place billing charges from various companies on their bills. My phone company was, however, very helpful in assisting me with removing charges.

4. If you have a charge on your phone bill don't just wait for it to be corrected. Call immediately and be firm about wanting it cancelled and removed. If youare asked to put something in writing do so immediately. Document all phone calls, get names or operator numbers, write them down and keep a record of everything you do and are told and on what date.

5. Calling Consumer Protection or the PUC is all right to begin with, but I was told that to really help stop these things they need written letters. It's a lot of trouble, but do it, write them. The more complaints they have, the quicker they can investigate and make sure companies are operating within legal bounds.

Remember, telemarketing has very few controls, and it is basically up to the consumer to protect himself or herself. The most important thing is to not agree to anything without really knowing what it is, what it costs and how it works.





Mrs. Rena Graham dies July 30



### CRP extends forage available during drought

Many livestock producers in Red River County are taking advantage of a USDA program that allows for emergency haying or grazing of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) lands during the 1996 drought. The program, in effect since February 1996, allows for CRP participants to graze their fields or lease them to a neighbor for a limited time period, provided they obtain a grazing plan from the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

Originally, the grazing period was set to begin in February and end on April 1. Counties experiencing a 40

percent or greater loss of available grazing during the January through March 1996 period were initially eligible for the program. The USDA extended the grazing period as the drought deepened and the program was recently extended through the summer and now expires in September. The cost to the producer for grazing the CRP land is five percent of the annual rental payment per month, not to exceed 25 percent of the total payment.

The USDA-NRCS is currently working with people to assist with stocking rate recommendations, graz-

grazing management. Most of the people who take advantage of this program are owner/operators who are utilizing the grazing opportunity with their own livestock. However, some of the participants are leasing acreage to other producers. The nature of the leases vary. Some are leasing to

ing schedules, and other aspects of

their neighbors at cost and others are charging for the grazing on a per head per month basis.

This has been a good program all the way around for livestock producers. In addition to providing low cost emergency forage, grazing the CRP is giving ranchers an opportunity to rest their pastures. Allowing desirable grasses enough time to recover their vigor and develop seed is critical for future productivity. Controlled grazing is also beneficial for the CRP fields. Most of the grasses established under CRP are well adapted to grazing. A grazing cycle or two will remove thatch, increase tillering, and even allow for additional seedling development over the long term. The fact is, grazing older CRP fields will increase plant vigor and rejuvenate the established stand that may be a little decadent from lack of grazing.

USDA-NRCS employees have been kept busy this year helping producers realize the benefits of CRP grazing and how to avoid the pitfalls of overgrazing. These grazing plans include a recommended number of





livestock to graze in a given field over a prescribed period. The agency has had to move away from that concept somewhat, as the program has been extended through the spring months. The rain that has been received has resulted in good growth in many fields. USDA-NRCs is now focusing on assisting producers to maintain adequate grazing heights on their important forage grasses. The amount of forage available has been increased by pulling livestock for a time and allowing CRP fields to recover before another grazing cycle.

address the Emergency Grazing Proyisions. At least 25 percent of the forage in the CRP field must be maintained for wildlife cover. The recommended procedure is to fence off 25 percent of the field which will remain ungrazed. As an alternative, the entire field may be grazed if the stocking rate is reduced by 25 percent and/ or the minimum stubble height is increased proportionately to leave the required cover.
