Sunday afternoon we went
to the pasture to check on the

While my husband was wandering around on foot looking at each one, I moved over towards the edge of the woods which border the creek running through our place.

There was not a single manmade sound except that of my own breathing.

The sounds that were so overwhelming were those of insects, locust or cicadas (whichever you prefer to call them) the "thik" of grasshoppers leaping on a leaf, the buzz or whine of flies and mosquitoes.

But slowly as I sat there, I began to hear tiny rustlings, minuscule sounds of movement

and a sense of presence.

It came to me that the wild world exists almost separately from our so called civilized one. We co-exist, not perfectly, and certainly we tend to create more havoc in the wild world than it does in ours.

But there, only a few feet away from me was this world populated by fascinating creatures which we seldom see unless they are a highway statis-

Squirrels scampered by overhead, chasing one another happily. I saw the v-marks of that amazing (if aggravating) little digger, the armadillo. Although I could not see them I know there was a family of raccoons close by, they had left their human-looking pawprints in two sizes, adult and child, along with the remains of their crawfish

Deer were sleeping somewhere in those woods, their tracks also revealing this year's fawns alongside of their mother.

Rodents abound, a short walk sent several scurrying away. Pack rats, field rats and field mice live in a complex world one must get down to ground level to see.

Earthworm castings, crawfish holes, and on softer, sandier soil moles and gophers inhabit a world that is literally beneath our feet. Up in the sky the ubiquitous vulture circled, ready to exist on the death that stalks all

things.

Coyotes raise their young on the mice and rats, rabbits and even grasshoppers and crickets. It is, for the wild creatures so close and yet so far from us, a time of plenty, a time of growth and storing fat for the hard months of winter when life can be desperate.

I can only see the edge of that civilization, only hear tiny echoes of it, only feel the shadow of a hawk when it passes over or smell the musky odor a snake leaves behind. But that is enough to fill me with a sense of wonder that the "wild world" does exist, and that I can briefly glimpse fascinating bits of it. That is enough to fill me with gratitude for being able to experience it at all. I wonder if the wild things enjoy the glimpses they get of us?



Buckman is high Texan at internationals

In Ft. Stockton, Texas July 28 through August 4 it may not have been the Olympics but it was serious competition to some of over 300 handgun shooters who braved the humiliation of heat, winds and a changing mirage at the Twentieth Anniversary Internationals, the annual championships of the International-Handgun Metallic Silhouette Association. With over 1200 entries and representation from Brazil, Canada, New Zeeland, Australia, Germany, Norway and the USA, the match had its share of disappointments and excitement. Bill Buckman with wife, Joyce, as spotter and time keeper were there to compete and visit friends and fellow shooters from many different parts of the country, some acquaintances from their first Internationals in Phoenix in

Bill said being 1996 State Champion caused a little added pressure and to make it even more difficult he was afraid he had "peaked out" a bit early a couple of weeks prior in Norman, Oklahoma where he shot his all time high aggregate of 151/ 160. (Bill's 1986 aggregate of 148/ 160 was a Texas state record until 1995 when Miles Miles of Houston shot a 150 at Pearland Gun Club). This aggregate of 151 consisted of a 39 Revolver Freestyle, 40 Production Freestyle, 40 unlimited Freestyle and a "whopping" 32 Production Standing. This 151/160 is currently ranked in the top five highest aggregates shot in 1996 throughout the United States.

"I knew anything even close to 151 (or a 302/320 at the Internationals) would put me in Top Ten at Ft. Stockton. I was just wondering if it wasn't too much too soon," Bill related.

On arrival at Ft. Stockton, it was obvious that the range was going to be difficult by checking the scoreboard which showed lots of missed 200 meter RAM Targets. All three of the Sweetwater teammates had posted 78/80 in Production category. Two teammates, Richard Porter and Mondo Renteria were 80X80 Production shooters from past Internationals.

shooting time so he also chose his Production gun to "break the ice". This was his first big taste of the mirage but after over 2 hours on the firing line, Bill still managed a respectable 77/80. For Tuesday afternoon shooting time Bill decided to go for the hard Production Standing category. Although heat and mirage worsened, Bill shot more relaxed and finished with a trophy winning 52/ 80. Bill and Joyce enjoyed a day off Wednesday with a tour of Ste. Genevieve Winery and more visiting. Afternoon came quickly and it was time for Bill to shoot his final gun of 4-gun aggregate, Unlimited Freestyle. Bill took his custom built CP 100 bolt action handgun and "mowed down" all 80 targets for a trophy winning 80X80 and a 4-gun aggregate of 285/ 320. Soon after Bill came off line, Mondo finished with an 80X80 and a fine 281/320 aggregate boosting the team aggregate to a second place trophy of 1122/1280. Friday morning Bill shoots his final time slot with a new category for him called Unlimited Standing. With a hardly 3 week old barrel set up for his single shot RPM XL-H pistol, Bill commenced to shoot a 61/80, good for First place in AA class and combined with the 52/80 Open Sight Standing score produced a Third place Bigbore Standing aggregate trophy. The 285 4-gun aggregate received trophy of fifth place in over all Bigbore aggregate champions. It was also high aggregate amongst his team members and all Texas shooters attending. Receiving six trophies at the awards ceremony Saturday afternoon, Bill proved to indeed be worthy of the

Free or reduced/price meals available at Talco-Bogata schools

The Talco & Bogata school serves this by calling or writing: Freddy meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.20 and breakfast for 55¢. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price. Rivercrest High School lunch is \$1.50, breakfast 65¢.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your child, your child can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your child can get free meals or reduced-price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced-price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

To get free or reduced-price meals for your child, you must complete an application and return it to the school. Applications cannot be approved that are not complete.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the child you are applying for, the application must have the child's name, a food stamp or AFDC case number for that child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for the child you are appplying for, then the application must have the child's name, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that you child should get free or reduced-price meals.

You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do Income Chart

Wade, Superintendent, Rt. 1, Box 253, Bogata, TX 75417, (903)632-If your child gets free or reduced-

price meals because of your income. you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your child gets meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

School officials use the information on the application to decide if your child should get free or reducedprice meals. Free and reduced-prize eligibility information may be subject to release to other federal, state and local education, health or other means-tested programs. Some programs already identified are the National Assessment of Educational Progress and officials collecting data for Title I allocation and evaluation purposes.


You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, liek a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your child, you may then complete an application.

Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, DC 20250.

You will be notified when your application is approved or denied.



TxDOT allows highway right-of-ways to be harvested

Though the ground cover along highway right-of-ways is mostly bermudagrass and Bahia grass, farmers should consider harvesting it only as a last resort, says an agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Exten-

"It's generally of low quality and there's always the danger of baling up foreign matter like cans and broken glass," said Dr. Sim Reeves, an Extension agronomist serving East Texas and based at the Texas A & M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton in Rusk County

There's also the risk of Traffic accidents when working along side highways where the speed limit is now 65 or 70 miles an hour, Reeves

A 1997 law allows the grass along the state's 77,000 miles of highways to be mowed and baled for livestock feed during emergencies. Farmers must first get a permit from their local Texas Department of Transportation(TxDOT).

The permit paperwork is fairly light, said Paul Montgomery, assis-

tant director of maintenance for the TxDOT district office in Tyler. The form consists of one page to be filled out by the producer. The producer must first check with the property owner who land adjoins the right-ofway. By law, the property owner is given first harvest rights to right-ofways. The producer must notify the property owner of his intent to harvest and get their permission. In legal parlance, this is called "first right of

The producer lists the names of the property owner on the form and takes note of when they were notified. The form then goes back to local TxDOT

TxDOT personnel will then most likely approve the permit. It's not exactly a routine approval process. TxDOT personnel make spot checks to see if producers are actually contacting landowners, Montgomery

Producers first need to call their local DOT maintenance office and ask for a permit form. Strictly speaking, the permit is to work alongside the highway, not specifically to harvest hay. But if the producer asks for a "permit to mow or bale," the local DOT manager will know what they are talking about, Montgomery says.

The TxDOT county maintenance office should be listed in the local telephone directory under the "Texas,

State of" heading. Alternately, producers may call one of the four TxDOT district offices to get the number of their county maintenance office.

The Paris district office serves Rains, Hopkins, Franklin, Red River, Delta, Lamar, Hunt, Fannin and Grayson counties. It's number is (903) 737-9300.

The Tyler district office serves Smith, Rusk, Gregg, Wood, VanZandt, Henderson, Anderson and Cherokee counties. It's phone number is (903)510-9100.

The Lufkin district office serves Nacogdoches, Shelby, Sabine, San Augustine, Angelina, Polk, San Jacinto, Trinity and Houston counties. It's number is (409) 634-4433.

The Atlanta district office serves Bowie, Cass, Marion, Harrison, Panola, Upshur, Morris, Titus and Camp counties. It's phone number is (903) 796-2851.

In many states, producers may dial 1-800-558-9368, a toll free number, and automatically be connected to their district office.

In addition to the hazards of dodging traffic and baling up foreign material, there's also the problem of johnsongrass. When stressed, johnsongrass may build up toxic levels of prussic acid and nitrates. Though the danger of prussic acid will disappear in a month to six weeks after baling, high nitrate levels will continue to pose a health risk to livestock, Dr. Reeves said.

Because johnsongrass grows tall enough by mid summer to restrict vision, TxDOT crews will be spraying johnsongrass stands in right-of-

ways this time of year. Not only does spraying increase the risk of high nitrate and prussic acid levels, the herbicide used could be a health risk to livestock. TxDOT crews across the state use a mixture consisting primarily of Oust with some Roundup. The Oust is not labeled for livestock grazing or haying.

The crews do not spray all rightof-ways, but only those areas within 30 feet of the roadside where the concentration of johnsongrass is

When producers call their county TxDOT offices for permits, it would be a good idea to find if the area in question has been treated recently, Dr. Reeves said. Even if it hasn't been sprayed yet. Reeves recommended not to harvest any areas where the concentration of johnsongrass is

Montgomery said the effects of the Oust/Roundup on johnsongrass becomes apparent within three days of treatment. Commonly, johnsongrass will turn brown and wilt within that time, he said.

Montgomery also noted that TxDOT only allows harvesting along roadsides. Because of safety issues, baling is not allowed in grassy meridians between lanes of divided high-

If producers are lucky, they can expect right-of-ways hay to have 6 to percent protein. He recommended saving the hay and feeding it only under emergency conditions and then only to dry cows. Because dry cows require lower levels of nutrients than lactating cows, the lower protein and energy content of the hay should not present a problem.

Dr. Reeves did not recommend feeding right-of-way hay to horses under any conditions. Horses' digestive systems are more likely to be damaged by foreign material in the hay. Horses also require a forage with more nutrients.

"Cows, with their two stomachs, can handle a lot poorer quality forage than horses can," Dr. Reeves said.
