## Post Office to see new home

Work is underway on a new 4,000 square foot building to serve as the Talco U.S. Post Office.

The facility is being constructed by Larry and Barbara Winters from Harrisburg, AR. Work on the project was begun Friday, October 11 and completion date is expected to be mid-January, 1997.

The new facility will house 2,957 square feet of floor space and 760

post office boxes. Each box will have a keyed lock.

New services will include 13 parcel lockers, a vending machine for stamps and a copy machine. All these services will be available 24-hours a day.

In addition, the new facility will offer parking spaces for 29 customers and ten employees.

However, at this time People's Telephone is working on making it possible for Talco residents to call Bogata toll free.

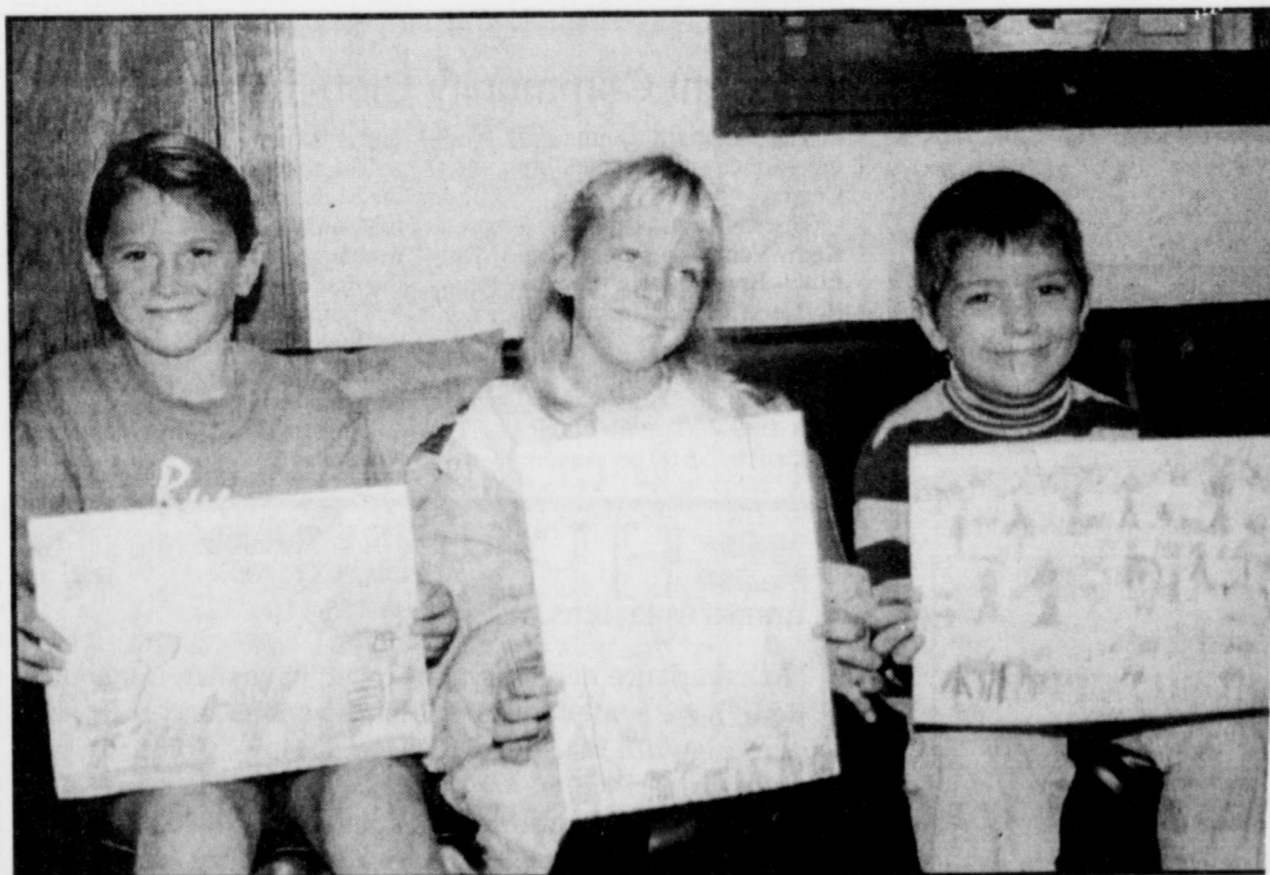

The Varsity Rebels will host Chisum Friday Oct. 18 beginning at 7:30 p.m.



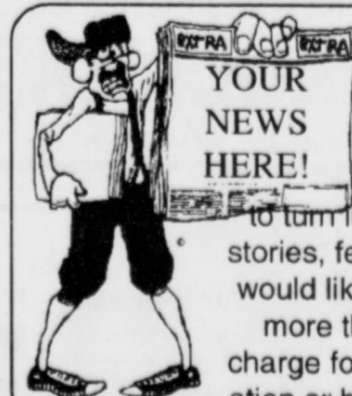

Of course, these are the best type of recipes too! The goulash recipe is her husband Larry's mother's recipe and is easy to prepare and everyone really enjoys it.

Tammie is a freshman at Paris

She keeps her parents busy with volleyball and basketball and both girls are on the rodeo circuit. They are associated with the Piney Woods Rodeo Association, Oklahoma Youth Rodeo Association, 4-States High School Rodeo Association and the Regular 4 High School Rodeo Association. They run barrels and poles.  
She and Larry have lived around this area for many years and the children have lived her all their lives.

**Blonde Brownies**  
2 cups all-purpose flour  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
2/3 cups butter or margarine  
2 eggs-slightly beaten  
1 cup chocolate flavored chips  
1/3 cup chopped nuts(optional)  
2 teaspoon vanilla  
2 cups firmly packed brown sugar  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon baking soda  
Mix flour, soda, baking powder and salt. Melt butter in saucepan; add sugar. Blend in eggs and vanilla. Add flour mixture gradually, mixing well. Spread in 13 x 9 greased pan. Sprinkle with chips and nuts. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Cool in pan and cut into bars. Makes 48.

**Iron Skillet Chocolate Pie**  
2-1/2 cups sugar  
4 tablespoons flour  
2 tablespoons (rounded) cocoa  
1 stick margarine  
4 separated eggs  
2-3/4 cups milk  
2 teaspoons vanilla  
2 baked pie shells  
Mix sugar, flour and cocoa. Melt margarine in iron skillet; add sugar mixture and mix lightly. Combine beaten egg yolks and milk and add to mixture, stirring constantly. Cook slowly until thick. Add vanilla and blend well. Pour in pie shell. Let cool and top with cool whip.

**Cherry What-ever**  
2-1/2 cups flour  
4 tablespoons sugar  
2 sticks margarine-melted  
Mix and press into a cookie sheet or large pizza pan. Bake at 350 degrees until golden brown. Let cool.  
Mix together:  
1 package cream cheese  
1 package dream whip  
2 cups powdered sugar  
1/2 cup milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Put on top of crust and refrigerate until set. Top with cherry pie filling. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

**Pecan Pie Bars**  
Crust:  
1 package yellow cake mix  
1 egg  
1 cup chopped pecans

1/2 cup melted margarine  
Filling:  
2/3 cup reserved cake mix  
1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar  
1-1/2 cups corn syrup  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
3 eggs  
1 cup chopped pecans  
Grease bottom and sides of 13 x 9 baking pan. Combine first four ingredients, reserving 2/3 cup cake mix. Mix until crumbly. Press into baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes or until light and golden brown. In a large mixing bowl, combine all remaining ingredients, except pecans. Mix at medium speed for 1-2 minutes. Pour filling over partially baked crust. Sprinkle with pecans. Bake 30 to 35 minutes at 350 degrees or until filling is set. Cool and cut.

**Kathleen's Goulash**  
1 pound ground beef  
1 medium onion(diced)  
1 medium bell pepper(diced)  
2 tablespoons cooking oil  
1 box Kraft Macaroni and Cheese  
1 can cream of mushroom soup  
1 small can tomato paste  
1/2 cup pimientos  
1/2 pound Velveta cheese catsup  
In an electric skillet brown onion and pepper in oil. Add ground beef and cook until done. Cook macaroni in a saucepan as directed on box. Add cooked macaroni, soup, tomato paste, pimientos and cheese. Add 2 soup cans of water. Stir mixture and add salt and pepper to taste. Sprinkle on top of mixture powdered cheese that came with the dinner. Sprinkle catsup on top of cheese. Simmer in skillet for 30 minutes on low.

**Zippy Taco Salad**  
1 pound ground beef  
1-15 ounce can Ranch Style Beans  
1/2 cup picante sauce  
1/2 pound cubed Velveta cheese  
Tortilla chips  
3 cups shredded lettuce  
3 cups chopped tomato  
Brown meat; drain. Stir in beans and sauce. Cover; simmer 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add cheese; stir until melted. For each serving, top chips with meat mixture, lettuce and tomatoes. Serves 6.

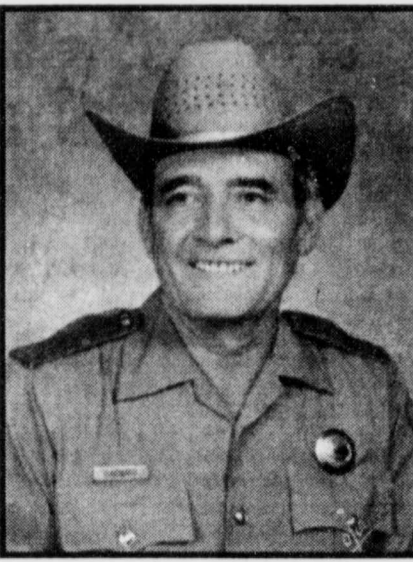
**Eightieth birthday celebrated**

Gay and Fay Burns were married October 16, 1946 in Sulphur Springs. They have one daughter Linda Burns of Hagansport, 3 sons and

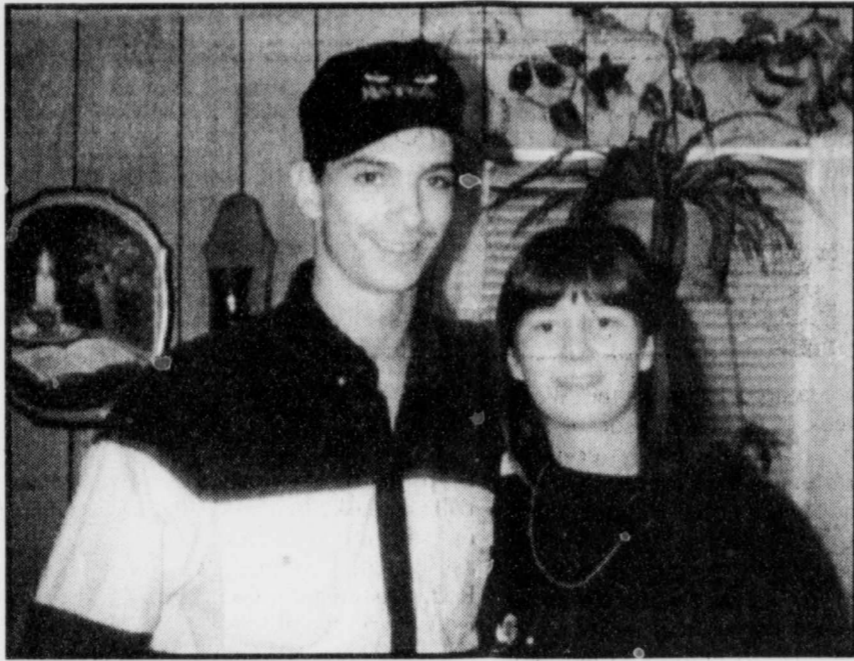

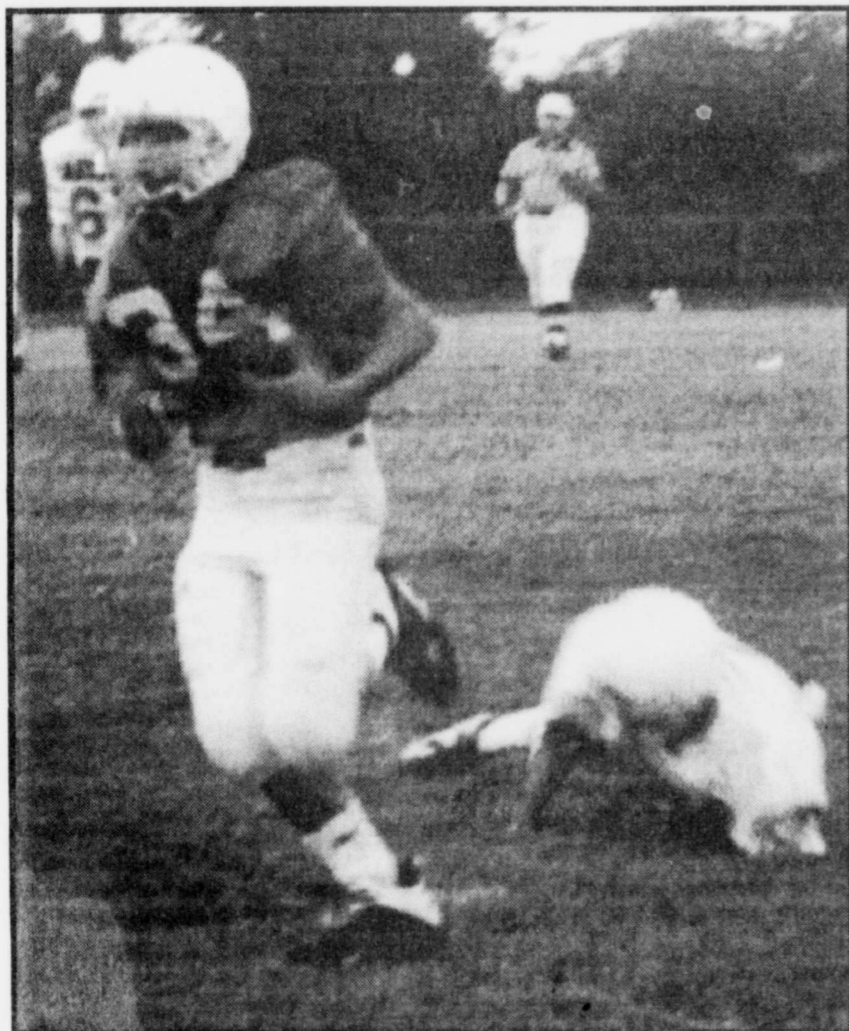




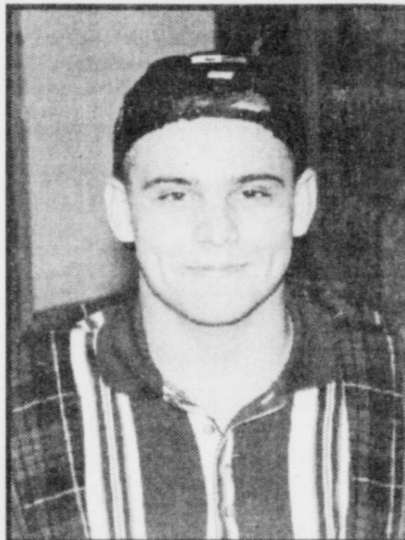

Vera's chores included hoeing and picking cotton, milking cows, making soap, helping put up meat after hog killing, chopping and bringing in wood to use in the cook stove and for heating, brining in water from the cistern, cooking, washing, ironing and sewing. In her spare time (when was that, one wonders?) she enjoyed embroidering, knitting, crocheting and tatting.

As a teenager she worked in a mercantile store and later in a drug store, which also had a post office. She was hired as a bookkeeper, but found herself filling prescriptions, putting up mail, jerking sodas and doing janitorial work.

She recalls that Sunday afternoons the citizens of Fulbright, (which was named after her grandparent) would all gather on both sides of the street. There was a bandstand in the middle of the street that was used for music, singing and other forms of entertainment. There were also vendors. Everyone enjoyed this weekly event, she says.

Vera married James "Jimmie" Grogan on December 7, 1919 at the

age of 22. One child, Jo Eva, was born in November of 1926, she lived a little over two years, not surviving a bout of influenza and pneumonia.

The Grogans continued farming until 1936, when they moved to San Angelo to help Vera's parents with ginning. One of the gins was located on Ave. K, the other in Paint Rock.

After retiring from the gin business, Jimmie worked for West Texas Utilities Company for 19 years.

The two families lived together, her father died in 1945, but her mother, who lived to be almost 102, became blind after developing diabetes. Vera cared for her and also took care of her husband when his health failed. Her mother died in January of 1977 and Jimmie in September of the same year. At that time Vera was 74.

She continues to live in the family home where she has resided for 58 years.

Vera never misses a service at the Southgate Church of Christ, where she is a member. Usually she comes in leading to blind friends, Joan Cox and Kay Schneider, one of each arm. The church makes tri-weekly hospital visits and Vera delights in taking her turn.

In her early 80's Vera decided to travel some. Her first trip was to Hawaii, then to Alaska and a cruise on the SS Norway.

This past fall Vera helped rake leaves and carried about ten bags of them to the alley. She declared they weren't heavy.

Last March she made her annual visit to the doctor for a check-up. After a thorough examination, he asked her what her secret is to staying

young. Her answer was that she sleeps well, eats whatever she wants (especially pork), and she does a lot of rocking in her favorite chair. He asked "Who does your cooking?" She replied "I do, also my own laundry and housework, but I will have to admit I don't keep it clean like I used to". The doctor stood looking at her, then turned on his heel, saying "I'll see you next year; just keep doing what you are doing".

Her current driver's license expires this month, but she says she won't have it renewed. A couple of years ago, she decided on her own it was time to quit driving her 1965 Ford sedan she and Jimmie bought back in 1964. At the time, the odometer read 28,000 miles. After making this decision she gave the car to one of her cousins, "So I won't be tempted to drive it".

Her only living relatives consist of two first cousins, two second cousins and two third cousins. Four of them live in San Angelo.

On October 24 of this year Vera will be interviewed by Pat Attebury on the "West Texas at 5:00" TV program.

At any given time, one can call Vera and ask her if she wants to go somewhere. The answer is always in the affirmative. If you ask her when she will be ready she always answers "Honey, I'm ready right now!"

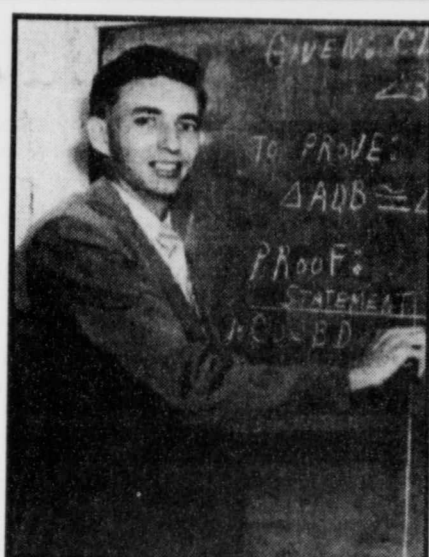

#### Mervin and Genetty by Pat Hanson Welch

Just as giant redwoods would stand out in a forest of pine trees, so Mervin and Genetty Childers stand out in my life. Their influence on me not only as their student but as a friend has lasted almost half a century. The year my class entered B.H.S. in 1949 was Mervin's first year to teach. Lucky us! He taught like a brand new mother caring for her first child. He may not have had the experience he does now after a whole lifetime of teaching, but he cared deeply about us collectively as his very first class and also individually as unique, important

human beings. Enough so, to give 110% of himself. We really had to struggle to learn some of those hard algebra facts. Now, looking back, I realize it must have been tiring on him, going over and over those simple facts that were simple for him, but not for us. But he was never annoyed or impatient. Never. He never drew deep, long breaths or acted like teaching us was such a burden. He seemed to just love it when we finally did grasp the concept he was trying to share.

He probably doesn't even remember my asking him one time why a person needed to learn algebra - what good would it ever do us? He said it was just like doing push ups - exercise for our brain. We felt our brains were already pushed to the limit. But he didn't.

When Mervin fell in love with Genetty, his soon to be bride, and brought her to B.H.S., we all worried that she would somehow change him. He was just perfect like he was, we all thought, and we cringed at the thought of anyone changing him. But our fears were unfounded. If Genetty changed him at all, she only made him better.

Genetty's presence in the office at B.H.S. is something I remember to this day. No one could think of her without that great big radiant smile that lit up the whole office. Soon we were all just as sold on Genetty as we'd been on Mervin. They each deserved the very best, and they had truly found it, in each other.

Their influence on us did not end when the bell rang. They poured them-

selves into our spiritual lives at church maybe even more so than at high school. I remember the concepts and truths in their Training Union classes made a bigger impact on me than what I learned in algebra. I never asked Mervin what good this was going to do us. They were both glad to give advice when we asked for it, and there never seemed to be a problem too big for them to help us understand. They never made us feel like it was a bother or imposition when we needed to talk something through. All this took time, and now decades later as an adult, I understand and appreciate even more all the time they spent with their students. I didn't understand back then, but now I do.

There's no way I can ever thank people who have helped shape my life as much as Mervin and Genetty. Their influence on me will live as long as I do. When we had our 40th reunion back in the spring 1993, they were still at it - still guiding and inspiring us. Mervin took a tattered and torn story out of his billfold and read it about a man's life being a bridge for those who follow. Their lives were and continue to be a bridge that was laid down in Bogata, Texas. They embodied all that is good and decent and honorable, not only by their wise words but by their actions as well. Their walk matched their talk. I salute them as two of the finest bridge builders I've ever known. Their influence on my life will live as long as I do.
