
The new facility will house 2,957 square feet of floor space and 760


Bogata can call Talco toll free, Talco to Bogata toll free coming soon



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Fulbright native celebrates 99th birthday

Thursday, October 17, 1996

Vera Hannon Grogan has recently celebrated her 99th birthday. She was born September 29, 1897 in Fulbright, a daughter of George Copeland and Dama Russell Crocket Hannon. She lived at Fulbright until moving to San Angelo in 1936. She is a long-time subscriber to the Bogata News.

In addition to her mother and father and a sister, several others lived in her childhood home, a grandmother, an aunt, an uncle and four orphaned children, two older than her and two younger.

Farming their land required each family member to do their part of the work. Vera's chores included hoeing and picking cotton, milking cows, making soap, helping put up meat after hog killing, chopping and bringing in wood to use in the cook stove and for heating, brining in water from the cistern, cooking, washing, ironing and sewing. In her spare time (when was that, one wonders?) she enjoyed embroidering, knitting, crocheting and tatting.

As a teenager she worked in a mercantile store and later in a drug store, which also had a post office. She was hired as a bookkeeper, but found herself filling prescriptions, putting up mail, jerking sodas and doing janitorial work.

She recalls that Sunday afternoons the citizens of Fulbright, (which was named after her grandparent) would all gather on both sides of the street. There was a bandstand in the middle of the street that was used for music, singing and other forms of entertainment. There were also vendors. Everyone enjoyed this weekly event, she says.

Vera married James "Jimmie" Grogan on December 7, 1919 at the

age of 22. One child, Jo Eva, was born in November of 1926, she lived a little over tow years, not surviving a bout of influenza and pneumonia.

The Grogans continued farming until 1936, when they moved to San Angelo to help Vera's parents with ginning. One of the gins was located on Ave. K, the other in Paint Rock.

After retiring from the gin business, Jimmie worked for West Texas Utilities Company for 19 years.

The two families lived together, her father died in 1945, but her mother, who lived to be almost 102, became blind after developing diabetes. Vera cared for her and also took care of her husband when his health failed. Her mother died in January of 1977 and Jimmie in September of the same year. At that time Vera was 74.

She continues to live in the family home where she has resided for 58 years.

Vera never misses a service at the Southgate Church of Christ, where she is a member. Usually she comes in leading to blind friends, Joan Cox and Kay Schneider, one of each arm. The church makes tri-weekly hospital visits and Vera delights in taking her turn.

In her early 80's Vera decided to travel some. Her first trip was to Hawaii, then to Alaska and a cruise on the SS Norway.

This past fall Vera helped rake leaves and carried about ten bags of them to the alley. She declared they weren't heavy.

Last March she made her annual visit to the doctor for a check-up. After a thorough examination, he asked her what her secret is to staying

young. Her answer was that she sleeps well, eats whatever she wants (especially pork), and she does a lot of rocking in her favorite chair. He asked "Who does your cooking?" She replied "I do, also my own laundry and housework, but I will have to admit I don't keep it clean like I used to". The doctor stood looking at her, then turned on his heel, saying "I'll see you next year; just keep doing what you are doing" Her current driver's license expires

this month, but she says she won't have it renewed. A couple of years ago, she decided on her own it was time to quit driving her 1965 Ford sedan she and Jimmie bought back in 1964. At the time, the odometer read 28,000 miles. After making this decision she gave the car to one of her cousins, "So I won't be tempted to drive it".

Her only living relatives consist of two first cousins, two second cousins and two third cousins. Four of them live in San Angelo.

On October 24 of this year Vera will be interviewed by Pat Attebury on the "West Texas at 5:00" TV program

At any given time, one can call Vera and ask her if she wants to go somewhere. The answer is always in the affirmative. If you ask her when she will be ready she always answers "Honey, I'm ready right now!"

Editor's Note: we are so glad that this story was sent to us by an admirer of Mrs. Grogan. It is a fascinating look at a productive life that covers a vanishing portion of history. We wish Mrs. Grogan a very Happy Birthday and many more.










Mervin and Genetty by Pat Hanson Welch

Just as giant redwoods would stand out in a forest of pine trees, so Mervin and Genetty Childers stand out in my life. Their influence on me not only as their student but as a friend has lasted almost half a century. The year my class entered B.H.S. in 1949 was Mervin's first year to teach. Lucky us! He taught like a brand new mother caring for her first child. He may not have had the experience he does now after a whole lifetime e of teaching, but he cared deeply about us collectively as his very first class and also individually as unique, important

and the deeper it sinks into, the mind.

human beings. Enough so, to give 110% of himself. We really had to struggle to learn some of those hard algebra facts. Now, looking back, I realize it must have been tiring on him, going over and over those simple facts that were simple for him, but not for us. But he was never annoyed or impatient. Never. He never drew deep, long breaths or acted like teaching us was such a burden. He seemed to just love it when we finally did grasp the concept he was trying to share.

He probably doesn't even remember my asking him one time why a person needed to learn algebra - what good would it ever do us? He said it was just like doing push ups - exercise for our brain. We felt our brains were already pushed to the limit. But he didn't.

When Mervin fell in love with Genetty, his soon to be bride, and brought her to B.H.S., we all worried that she would somehow change him. He was just perfect like he was, we all thought, and we cringed at the thought of anyone changing him. But our fears were unfounded. If Genetty changed him at all, she only made him better

Genetty's presence in the office at B.H.S. is something I remember to this day. No one could think of her without that great big radiant smile that lit up the whole office. Soon we were all just as sold on Genetty as we'd been on Mervin. They each deserved the very best, and they had truly found it, in each other.

Their influence on us did not end when the bell rang. They poured them-

maybe even more so than at high school. I remember the concepts and truths in their Training Union classes made a bigger impact on me than what I learned in algebra. I never asked Mervin what good this was going to do us. They were both glad to give advice when we asked for it, and there never seemed to be a problem too big for them to help us understand. They never made us feel like it was a bother or imposition when we needed to talk something through. All this took time, and now decades later as an adult, I understand and appreciate even more all the time they spent with their students. I didn't understand back then, but now I do.

There's no way I can ever thank people who have helped shape my life as much as Mervin and Genetty. Their influence on me will live as long as I do. When we had our 40 th reunion back in the spring 1993, they were still at it - still guiding and inspiring us. Mervin took a tattered and torn story out of his billfold and read it about a man's life being a bridge for those who follow. Their lives were and continue to be a bridge that was laid down in Bogata, Texas. They embodied all that is good and decent and honorable, not only by their wise words but by their actions as well. Their walk matched their talk. I salute them as two of the finest bridge builders I've ever known. Their influence on my life will live as long as I do.
