Wade continued that "It is regrettable that either of these incidents occurred. Those involved are good people and the district has tried to handle the situation as fairly as possible and still uphold the local policy and the laws of the State of Texas. A reprimand, once it is documented is reviewed in the future"





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


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376 Bomb group has annual reunion

Jean and I left the farm on Monday the 23rd of September at about 9:45 A.M. to begin our annual trip to the 376 Bomb Group Veteran's Reunion. This was our eighth one to attend. It was in Charleston, South Carolina this year. We drove to Lake Palestine and spent the night with Marjoree Glover. We had invited both my sisters, Marjoree and Dora Thompson to go with us.

We loaded Marjoree's van with enough luggage to last the four of us at least a month the night that we arrived at Marjoree's. The next morning we left the lake in the wee dark hours of early morning. It was beginning to rain. By the time we got to Tyler the rain was really coming down. It rained on us until we got to Alexandria, Louisiana. We drove to Fairhope, Georgia the first day. A cousin of ours, Maurine Grayson Starkey, lives there and we wanted to visit her. When we got settled in a motel we called her. She and her husband, Al, met us at a nearby restaurant and we had dinner and a nice visit. The next morning we went to her home. Maurine took Jean, Dora and Marjoree for a tour of Fairhope while Al and I sat and visited. When they returned, Maurine guided us to our highway. On the way to I 10 we stopped and went through a Greed Orthodox Church built in the

We left Fairhope and drove to Jacksonville, Florida where we spent the night. The next day, the 26th of September, we drove to Savannah, Georgia where we did a short tour of the old town area. It was very pretty and impressive. Then we finished our trip to Charleston. We checked in at the Hilton, which was where our reunion was being held.

That evening, the 26th, we had a welcome reception. At this time we renewed acquaintances from past reunions and made new friends. There was some 440 people at this year's

On Friday morning, 27th, we boarded buses for a city tour. Our tour guide told us that any building over seventy five years old could not be torn down. It must be renovated. We walked along a sea wall where the Ashley River emptied into the harbor. Tort Sumter could be seen in the distance. Then we visited Patriots Point and went aboard the Aircraft Carrier, Yorktown. Anchored beside the Yorktown was the submarine, Clamagore. After seeing the Clamagore, I knew that I had made the right choice when I joined the Army Air Force fifty four years ago instead of the Navy. At the end of our Squadron meeting we had our Squadron picture made. At noon we had our luncheon. The speaker was the commanding officer from the air base. He was a very interesting speaker.

After our luncheon we boarded buses for a tour of the Magnolia Gardens. This plantation was started well before the Civil War. The Reverend John Drayton turned a Cypress Swamp into a garden well before the war between the states. The plantation house has been restored and is furnished with period furniture.

On Sunday, about 11:00 A.M. we boarded buses for downtown Charleston. We visited a market. It was a building which was the full length of a block. It was probably a hundred feet wide. It was completely filled with shops. Very tempting. We ate lunch while in the area. After lunch we boarded our buses again for a trip to "Boone Hall." This plantation was used in the filming of the television mini series "North and South" and Queen" and for the background of the filming of "Gone With the Wind." We returned to the hotel at 3:00 P.M.

After resting for a short time, we dressed for our Banquet Dance. The music was furnished by a local band whose leader was a member of the 376th. His first time at our reunion was last year at Kansas City. Of course, they opened with the Air Force song. "Off we go into the Wild, blue yon-

After we left the dance we had a lively session in our room. At the banquet we met 2 young couples from Minnesota. The lady's father had flown with the 376th. Her mother and father had divorced when she was a young girl and her father had died when she was thirteen. They had found out about our reunions and were coming to them to find out some of the things that her father had experienced. They joined our bull session.

Fred Russek was the only one of my crew members at this reunion.

On Monday the 29th, our last morning, we had our Memorial Breakfast. This is always an emotional time for me. We have our Flag Ceremony first. Cutter, Ingham, anchored nearby. We Also The Pledge of Allegiance. After our meal we have a short speech at which time the names of those who have died since our last meeting are read. After this we begin our goodbyes, car loading, billy paying and then hit the road homeward bound.

This year we weren't ready to head straight home. We went from Charleston to Williamsburg, Virginia. We got there just before dark. The next morning we toured Old Town Williamsburg. We stayed there until about 3:30 or 4:00 P.M. While there we visited the old courthouse. They held a trial for us. I was selected to serve on the jury. The judge left no doubt in his charge to the jury as to how we were to vote on the case. After leaving there we drove to Richmond and spent the night.
