After the reception, the couple traveled to Dallas for a short trip before moving to their home in Chicago, Illinois.


Loyd Cavender honored on



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



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Red Ribbon Week observed at Talco-Bogata

Schools will be observing Red Ribbon Week Oct. 28 through Nov. 1. The history of National Red Ribbon Week is as follows: On Thursday, Feb. 7, 1985, Enrique "kiki" Camarena, 37, stashed his badge and his service revolver in his desk drawer and headed for lunch with his wife Mika. Kiki, a U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration agent, had been on the trail of Mexico's marijuana and cocaine barons. He was due to be reassigned in three weeks, having come dangerously close to unlocking a multi-billion dollar drug pipeline, which he suspected extended into the N highest reaches of the Mexican army, police and government.

According to the DEA's reconstruction of events, as he headed to lunch five men appeared at the agent's side and shoved him into a car. That was the last time anyone but his kidnappers would see him alive.

Kiki Camarena's body was found one month later in a shallow grave, 70 miles Michoacan, Mexico. He had

from November 7, 1952

In the news on November 7, 1952 were headlines that read Eisenhower elected president, Richard Nixon vice president along with pictures of the two men. The story stated 142 had applied for 456 tons of hay and it was not to be delivered until the middle of December.

In Humble Camp news; Mrs. Sidney Frugia had returned home from a visit with her mother in Amarillo.


