Braid the ropes together Place in pan and cover loosely with a damp cloth and let rise in a warm place until almost doubled for 30 minutes Preheat oven to 425 degrees and brush dough with slightly beaten egg. Bake until top of cake is golden brown;25-30 minutes. Made be glazed.





Deport, Texas 75435 has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (Commission) for renewal of Permit No. 10741-001 which authorizes a discharge of treated domestic wastewater effluent at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 183,000 gallons per day from the City of Deport Wastewater Treatment Plant.

The plant site is approximately 1000 feet south of U.S. Highway 271 and 1400 feet west of the intersection of Farm-to-Market Road 1149 and U.S. Highway 271 in Lamar County, Texas.
