David Cannon's beloved grandmother, family and childhood

memories create children's book with a positive theme

David Cannon, grandson of Roger and Edna Bell and born in Deport, has written a book entitled "Mamaw's Cafe" which is about his memories of, and the time spent growing up in the community.

Even though it is written on a 4th-5th grade level, the places and people in the book will hold appeal for many Deport natives.

Cannon says that the book is a special tribute to his grandmother, Edna Bell. She was a woman of modest means with solid values who had a positive impact on his life and scores of other people." Hopefully, as youngsters read about my memories of Mamaw Bell, they will be encouraged to develop a closer bond with their own grandparents," Cannon said.

The book takes readers from the journey in the Dallas Metroplex to Deport, where he recounts events that unfold at Mamaw's Cafe, and afterwards. Among the experiences is going fishing with Mamaw, who was a master fisherman and how she understood the secrets of living a long and fulfilling life. "Most important though," Cannon says, "she taught me about patience, persistence and positive thinking."

Stories of a rare albino mockingbird, an eccentric neighbor, the king of all catfish and more create a true feeling for Deport during the 1950's. Relatives and friends who still live in and around Deport, as well as many who are long gone, appear in teh book. In addition to his grandparents, and especially his grandmother Edna, there are many others in the book familiar to many Deport locals. Among them are his aunt and uncle, Mac and Regina Webb and their children Karen and Tom, another aunt and uncle, Delbert and Bocky Norman and their toddler Abbey, Cannon's brothers John, Roger and Terry and his mother (Tommie Bell Cannon, another Deport native) and his father.

The dishwasher at the cafe, "Little Dad", Russell Lawler, Fred Swint and his famous stock pond, James Grant, and Dr. T.H. Glover are among others touched upon in the book.

This is not Cannon's first book. "A Secret Prize in Every Box", his first book with Appleseed Books, looks at the temptation of shoplifting and "The Legend of Motley Mansion" deals with senseless vandalism. Both books take place in the Dallas Metroplex area, and again are aimed at young readers and are based upon true stories. "Purloined Epistles", which was released in 1995, deals with his awkward and ill-fated experiences as a seventh grader.

Cannon is a former Dallas County probation officer and founded CJFT, a non-profit group which sponsors community projects and scholarships. It's main focus has been the publication of Appleseed Books, a series for children which teaches basic values such as honesty and respect for property and people. He speaks to over 100 Texas elementary schools about the problems and challenges of growing up each year. He and his positive series of books have been the subject of a feature in the "Today" section of the Dallas Morning News.

It is obvious his memories and the lessons his beloved Grandmother Bell taught him are very important. His love of small town summers and visits to his family are as real as the shiny hardcover on his book....and he is trying to use them to provide positive lessons for youngsters at an early age.

He is as generous as his grandmother, taking care to send copies of his book to relatives and people who helped him with his research. He even dedicated a book to one of his mother's old friends. He takes great care in acknowledging various people who helped him with the book including personal thanks to Deport natives Tom Webb, Karen Walker, Regina and Mac Webb, Bocky Norman, his mother and brothers, plus Nanalee Nichols and the Deport Times staff.

In December he plans to return to Deport and donate a copy of "Mamaw's Cafe" to the Deport Elementary School Library.







Curtis Jones of Moorcroft, Wyoming, played on the Moorcroft high school football team that recently won the Wyoming State Championship.



Generous by nature, she is always quick to give away her creations, or to take home cooked food to those who are ill or having a difficult time.


She shares some of her best recipes with us this week. And, by the way, I'd like to wish her a special "Happy Birthday" too!

In the last few years I have become interested in learning who my ancestors were. It would have easier on me if I had developed this interest before my mother died. I would never have believed how much pleasure you can get out of finding just one more link to the past. We went to Mississippi back in the

summer. We went to the Archives at Jackson and found a census from 1860 which showed that my great great grandparents had 8 children instead of the 2 children we had thought they had. This meant that my great grandfather had seven brothers and sisters rather than one brother.

I had just about given up hope of going any farther back than my great great grandfather. He was married in Mississippi in 1840, so I thought he probably was born in Mississippi. There was no evidence to support this in any of the Mississippi census reports, but it's hard to tell about a census after you get back so far because they quit having the name of the children on them. They just have

the name of the man of the house and the gender and age of the rest of the family members. We went to visit a cousin of mine last week and I had a neat surprise. She had the Bible which belonged to her mother, who was the sister of my grandfather. There was the name of my great grandparents and underneath the name of my great great grandfather my aunt had written "came from Penn ." This was all she wrote, but from the excitement I felt you would have thought I had discovered America. Now I have a whole new direction in which to go.Pennsylvania.

The whole reason for this article is to tell people what a good job the folks at the Red River County Genealogical Society are doing and to urge you to not to wait until later to start keeping good records and putting on paper anything you know about your families. When putting pictures in albums or boxes, be sure to label them with names and dates. You can either write on the backs or use stick on labels. Someone in the future will appreciate this so much. It is so depressing to look at old pictures of people who are obviously family members and not have a clue as to who they are.

When you have a chance visit the Red River County Library-the genealogical section. They have good resource material Also, the Society meets on the second Monday night of each month.

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

This Rebel team is undefeated so. far this season and if you enjoy a good basketball game these are the youngsters to come out and watch. Go Rebels!!!

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
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
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

Homecoming plans progress

The class of 1957 hopes that you are busy and excited about Christmas 'just around the corner'. We hope that you are thinking about Homecoming 1997 as you exchange greeting cards with friends. "Merry Christmas see you at the Homecoming" Sounds Great! We are getting information together for a book. We want to share with you this week the history of the Bogata Funeral Home.

The Bogata Funeral Home is located today on North Main Street. As early as 1900, Mr. Milton Igo owned a furniture store in Old Bogata and also sold coffins. The coffins came unfinished on the inside. You could buy some padding and nice material such as silk from Mr. Igo and he would "trim the coffin" as it was called. He did not deliver, nor help with the service in any other ways. When Bogata relocated near the

When Bogata relocated near the railroad about 1910, Tom Keith built a two story building on the corner of Main and Halesboro Streets to house his furniture business. He also sold coffins and by this time they came "trimmed." Tom Keith sold this building to house the First National Bank in 1913. He moved his business up the street north of the theatre where George Marshall in recent years had a business.

Curtis Wilkinson, a brother in law, went to work for him about 1925. They started delivering and assisting in the funeral service and later got an ambulance. An advertisement in 1932 was as follows: Ambulance Service. Few towns of Bogata's size can boast of Ambulance Service as excellent as that we offer. Our ambulance is ready to go anywhere at any time. Come to us for furniture-floor coverings-Undertaking Supplies, Funeral Direction., Tom Keith Bogata, Texas. In 1936, Tom Keith sold the funeral home business to Mac Grant

Dixon funeral home was located on the southwest side of Main Street just north of 271 where the flower shop and old drugstore were. It was a beautiful building with a recessed front with plate glass windows and column type posts.. a lovely building.

After Dixon, a Mr. Mikel from Clarksville was in the business in the early 40's. The funeral home was behind where the Care 1'st business is and across from the Fire Station on 909.

In 1955 Mac Grant and his son, James Grant of Deport, purchased the funeral home. They purchased the Tom and Marion Keith home on North Main Street and moved the business there about 1959. Since Tom Keith was in the funeral home business so many years, it seems fitting that the business is housed in his home today.

Curtis Wilkinson, who had spent close to forty years in the funeral home business in Bogata retired in 1963. Curtis died December 3, 1978.

James Wood came to Bogata in 1972. He entered into a partnership with James Grant in the Deport and Bogata Funeral Homes in 1977. James Grant sold his part of the business to James Wood in 1993.

James Wood graduated from DeKalb High School in 1962. and from the Dallas Institute of Mortuary Science in 1963. He married Dee Green of Gadsden, Alabama. They have three children; a son, Tim and twin daughters, Juliann and Denise. James and his son, Tim, are co-

James and his son, Tim, are coowners. Tim graduated from Rivercrest High School in 1985, from Paris Junior College in 1987, from East Texas State University in 1989 and from Dallas Institute of Funeral Service in 1993. Both James and Tim have National Funeral Licenses.

In 1936, Tom Keith sold the funeral home business to Mac Grant and Byron Dixon. In the early 40's Dixon purchased Grant's interest. The 2007 homecoming committee: June Stanley, Sue Huffman, Mary Jo Porterfield, Patsy Ward, Neil Rozell-Address Box 21, Bogata.
