These lems must include cleaning up the land, breaking, harrowing, bedding, planting, chopping, hoeing and cultivating at current wages paid in other lines of work, and must include soil depreciation, taxes and interest on the in-

vestment.

I will furnish blank forms upon ap-plication, to be filled out, and return to this office when the crop is laid by. In order to be able to price the crop we must know the cost of production, and in order to sell for the cost of prodaction and a profit, the farmers must make the farms self-supporting and make the cotton a surplus crop, and be able to enforce the demand for a cost plus price. #### Admittedly of Violent Temper, but With Strong Powers of Self-Control-Naturally Melancholy.

The Father of His Country would hardly have funcied himself in the role of a demigod-as folks nowadays are disposed to regard him. He was very human.

When a young man, his hair was decidedly red. At the age of fifty he was quite gray, and on occasions of ceremony his locks (done up in a queue) were freely powdered, as was the custom of the day.

His teeth from early manhood gave him a great deal of trouble. They were, in fact, budly decayed-dentistry at •that period being an undeveloped art -and this circumstance rather marred his good looks when he shilled or laughed.

He was also considerably pockmarked, having suffered an attack of smallpox at nineteen years of age, while in Eurbados with his invalid brother. Those were days when people, had smallpox sooner or later, vacchation being as yet unthought of. At fitty-seven (when inaugurated as President in New York), he had lost nearly all of his teeth. He then wore a false set of hippopotanus lvory, which made him very uncomfortable. In sitting for his most famous portrait, pointed by Gilbert Stuart, his lips were padded our with a wad of cotton. He seems to have had little sense of humor, and unquestionably was of a most melancholy temperaturent. The dinners he gave in New York were described by his guests as dull affairs. As a rule, he sat silent, rather sad of isage, and taking little part in the onversation. While others talked, he ould keep tap-tapping on the tablelige with fork or spoon-a curious mbft he had. He had a pronounced weakness for cambling-though always held in neck by a reluctance to commit himself imprudently. A born speculator. he was constantly engaged in land deals. He subscribed to every lottery and raffle that came along, and would spend many hours at a stretch with a pack of cards, though usually a loser. To attend and bet on a horse race, he often went to Annapolis, or even as far as Philadelphia. Spelling was by no means his forte. To the end of his life he wrote "winder" for window, "latten" for Latin, etc. Nor is this surprising, inasmuch as his education was finished in a village school. The style of his penmanship, so neat and clear, followed the

stereotyped copies of the "Young Man's Companion," which was the guide of his bayhood.

At Mount Vernon he had a very decent collection of books, but his reading seems to have been restricted mainly to works on farming and milltary science. How he managed to evolve the classic literary style that marks his public and private writings is a puzzle not easy to solve.

The discussion here attempted, however, is not of Washington's many perfections, but of his human weaknesses -to show that, like the rest of us, he was far from godlike. This most admirable of men had certainly a terrific temper. He could swear on occasions with alarming emphasis. A story, well authenticated, is that he pitliessly beat an Alexandria butcher with a horsewhip because the meatmerchant had exposed for sale a deer that was recognized by the master of Mount Vernon as killed on his own plantation.

In 1759, a few months after his marriage, he wrote : "I am now, I believe, 1 \* fixed at this seat, with an agreeable partner for life; and I hope to find and bustling world."

Note, if you please, that Washington\* was then only twenty seven years old. Yet his attitude of mind was elderly, with a touch of sadness



On his return to Mount Vernon, after the war, he wrote to Lafayette: "I called to mind that I was now descending the hill I had been fifty-two years in climbing, and that, though blessed with a good constitution, I was of a short-lived family, and might soon expect to be entombed in the mansion of my fathers. But I will not repine. I have had my day."

Think of writing in such terms at fifty-two years of age !- a time of life at which men nowadays consider that they have barely reached their heyday. Washington, as a matter of fact. had still fifteen years to live, eight of which were to be spent in administering the affairs of the nation as its President.

But he was always a melanchly man. For many years before his death the prospect of his departure from this world seems to have been constantly in his mind. Whence, presumably, the great interest he took in the removal of the old family burial vault at Mount Vernon, which was being undermined by an underground stream.

He never saw a rallway locomotive, a steamboat or an electric light. But he still lives as the predominant figure of American history and the annals of American statesmanship record no state paper that even approximately compares with his farewell address.

#### JUST A BOY

(By Phebe K. Warner.) "My mother is dead. My father is a carpenter in Kansas City. And I am going to California to pick oranges because there is no work for me at home This is the brief but pathetic story told in both Amarillo and Canyon City Just week by the little 14 year old boy whose mangled body was picked up last Friday morning beside the Santa Fe tracks in Canyon City. No one knew how it happened, no one knew who he was. But he was somebody's

boy. Somebody suffered that he might live. Yes, and even though this brave little fellow died motherless and homeless, friendless, penniless and jobless, somebody suffered when his young life was crushed out, for as his body lay in the Griggs Undertaking Chapel, a-waiting identification, somebody's mo-ther came into the room, bowed in grief over his pale, cold face, then covered the dead child's form with flow-

ers and left the chapel in silence, some living mother had evidently lost a boy. She knew the cost of his life and its loss to the world and she tried

and its loss to the world and she tried to ease her own aching heart by doing something for his own dead mother. But why was this child lying there dead and alone in a strange city and a strange State? Why was he 600 miles away from anyone, who might have known him, struggling 'through life, looking for a job'at 14 years of age? Answer—'His mother was dead." And evidently he had no home. The boy seemed to be an honest little fellow so far as anyone who re-members him can recall. Just out in

members him can recall. Just out in the word looking for something to de the word looking for something to de when he should have been in a good school somewhere. And crushed to death in a land of plenty looking for a way to support himself. There was plenty of men in Amarillo and Canyon too, who would giadly have taken care of the boy and given him a home or provided a comfortable place for him to live and work and be honest and and they had only those there safe, if they had only known there was such a boy. But those men had never heard of the homeless child and the child had never heard of those men. Boys do not know yet that anyhody is interested in them except their mother. And that is why a boy feels utterly lost and alone in this world when he loses his mother. Most boys believe as long as they have a mother in this world they are sure of

at least one friend. The story of the fate of this boy has brought the tears to many of our eyes. And many of us had scarcely dried our tears since we heard a few weeks ago of another boy, a Texas boy, who was choked to death in one of our own institution. But what good do our tears do a boy after he is choked to death or crushed to death stealing a ride looking for a way to earn his living honestly.

Wouldn't it be hetter, wouldn't it be happier, and wouldn't it be cheaper for us all to get together in spirit some way and plan a way to save such boys no matter what it might cost? Who knows what the world lost when that child fell beneath the grinding wheels of the Santa Fe train? There was something worth saving in that boy or he wouldn't have been looking for a job. Think of the nerve it must take for a 14 year old child to get out in the world, without a cent of money, without a friend to help him, without any education at that age to rely upow




