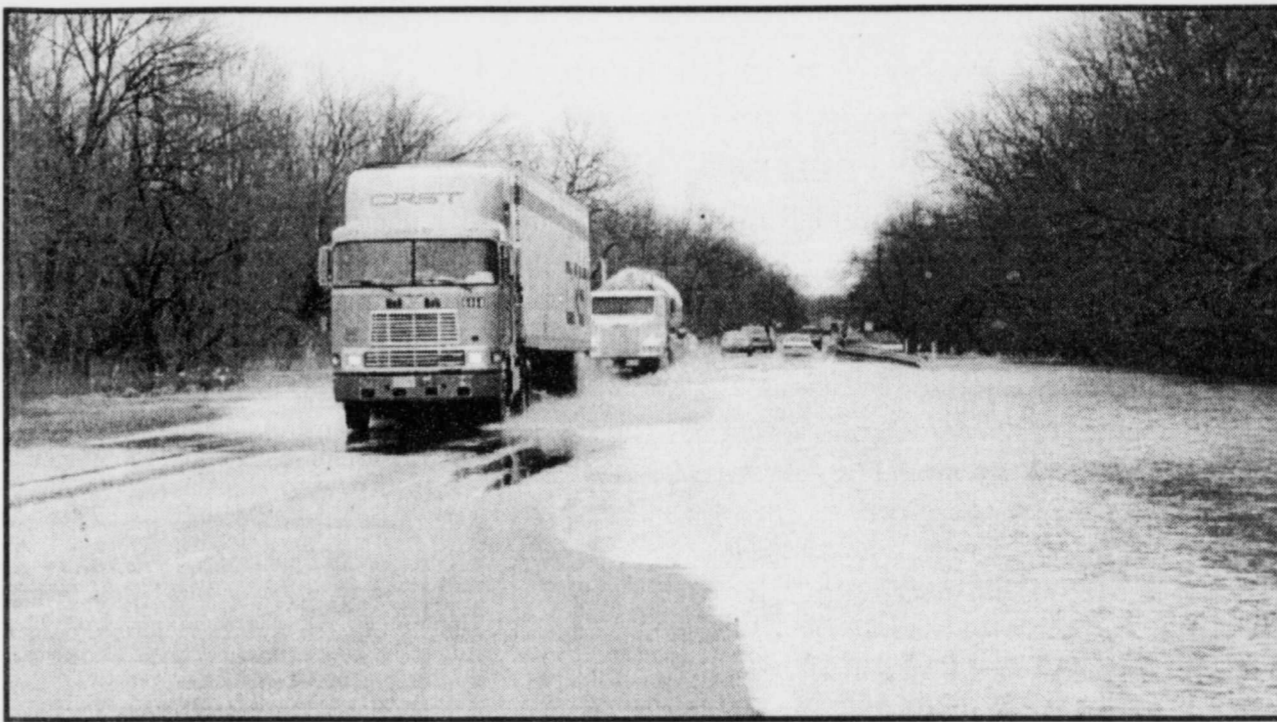

This week's column is dedicated to chicken recipes. What brought to mind chicken recipes you say? Try getting rid of 40 plus birds after culling out six to take for the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Twenty members of the Prairiland FFA and other FFA members from the surrounding areas, loaded up Saturday and left for this yearly event to display their prize chickens. If the kids survive several "sifts" by judges they have the opportunity to earn prize money at this most prestigious livestock show. Several thousand dollars goes to the top twenty birds. With the grand prize bird taking home several thousand of his own...dollars that is, not more chickens! Anyway chickens have been around for many, many years, dating back to the 1500's. To my taste there is not a more tasteful meat than chicken. And guess what, it is healthy too! We have added recipes for the old standby, Chicken Salad. Chicken Lasagna adds a new twist to this popular recipe. Chicken and Noodle Stew... what could be better on some of these wet, nasty days that we have been having. Cherokee Chicken has a little touch of molasses to add a little twang. Chicken Caruso is a quick dish over hot, fluffy rice and Texas Light Fried Chicken was a winner in the Texas Sesquicentennial Fair in Dallas. Hope you enjoy these recipes and we will see you in the kitchen!

February 27, 1997 Chicken Recipes

Chicken Salad
 4 cups diced cooked chicken
 1 can mandarin oranges-drained
 1 cup seedless grapes-halved
 2 tablespoons grated onion
 1 can pineapple tidbits-drained
 3/4 cup celery-chopped
 1 cup mayonnaise
 1 tablespoon mustard
 1 teaspoon garlic salt
 Mix chicken, oranges, onion, pineapple and celery. Add mayonnaise and mustard to chicken and fruit mixture. May be chilled overnight.

Chicken Lasagna
 3/4 cup chopped onion
 3/4 cup chopped green pepper
 1/2 cup diced celery
 3 tablespoons butter
 1 can cream chicken soup
 1/3 cup milk
 1-12 ounce can sliced mushrooms
 1/4 cup chopped pimentos
 1/2 teaspoon basil
 8 ounces lasagna noodles
 1-1/2 cups cottage cheese
 3 cups cooked chicken-diced
 12 slices American cheese
 1/2 cup grated parmesan
 Cook onion, pepper and celery in butter until tender. Stir in soup, milk, mushrooms, pimentos and basil and continue cooking slowly for 10 minutes. Set aside. Cook noodles according to package directions. Rinse in cold water and drain again. Place half of noodles in 13x9x2 casserole dish. Cover with half each of sauce mixture, cottage cheese, chicken and other cheeses. Repeat layers. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

Chicken and Noodle Stew
 1-1/2 cups cooked chicken
 4 cups chicken broth
 2/3 cup evaporated milk
 1/2 cup chopped celery
 1/2 cup chopped onion
 1/2 cup chopped pimento
 1 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning
 1/8 teaspoon pepper
 6 ounces noodles
 2 tablespoons flour
 1/4 cup cold water
 In large Dutch oven, place chicken, broth and milk. Bring to a boil. Add chopped celery, onion, pimento, salt and poultry seasoning and pepper. Bring to a boil and add noodles slowly. Boil

uncovered 10-15 minutes or until noodles are tender. Combine flour and water; pour into stew. Stir continuously until thick and bubbly. Serves 6.

Chicken Cherokee
 6-8 chicken thighs
 salt and pepper to taste
 2 tablespoons butter
 1/2 clove garlic
 1 medium onion-chopped
 1/2 cup water
 2 teaspoons Grandma's molasses
 1 teaspoon worcestershire sauce
 1 teaspoon flour
 cooked rice
 Sprinkle chicken thighs with salt and pepper. Brown them in butter with garlic over moderate heat in heavy skillet. Remove chicken. Brown onion in remaining butter. Add water, molasses and worcestershire sauce; blend. Cook 1 minute. Return chicken to pan and cover tightly; reduce heat to low and simmer 1 hour; basting often. About 10 minutes before chicken is done, sprinkle with flour, baste and recover; let thicken slowly. Serve chicken with rice with remaining juices poured over both.

Chicken Caruso
 2 whole chicken breasts
 garlic salt and pepper to taste
 3 tablespoons butter
 1-15 ounce jar spaghetti sauce
 1 teaspoon Italian seasoning
 2 cups celery
 3 cups hot cooked rice
 parmesan cheese
 Bone and skin chicken. Cut into thin strips. Season with garlic and pepper. Saute 2 minutes in butter. Stir in sauce and Italian seasoning. Cover and simmer for 10 minutes. Add celery and cook until tender-crisp. Dish over fluffy rice. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese. Serves 6.

Texas Light Fried Chicken
 6 chicken breasts
 season salt
 mayonnaise
 seasoned bread crumbs
 Place 2 cups onion and garlic croutons and 2 cups seasoned croutons into blender and reduce to crumbs; set aside. Sprinkle each breast with seasoned salt. Rub each breast with "real" mayonnaise and roll in seasoned bread crumbs. Bake at 350 degree oven until brown approximately 45 minutes to 1 hour.

 The Red River County Extension office and the Extension Beef and Forage committee will again sponsor a bull fertility and management clinic to be held Tuesday, March 11 at the Hardy Stewardson Animal Hospital located on Highway 82 West in Clarksville. Dr. Stewardson will fertility test bulls from 9:00 a.m. until noon. The cost of testing is \$20.00. Ivomec wormer for all bulls tested will be provided by Merck Agvet.

Lunch will be served at noon and is being sponsored by North Texas Production Credit Association and Federal Land Bank. At 1 p.m., Terry Kirkpatrick of Merck Agvet will present a program on the Ivomec SR Bolus, a sustained-release parasite program. This could be an opportunity to have your bulls fertility tested and dewormed at a reasonable cost. All area producers are invited to bring bulls and/or attend the meeting.

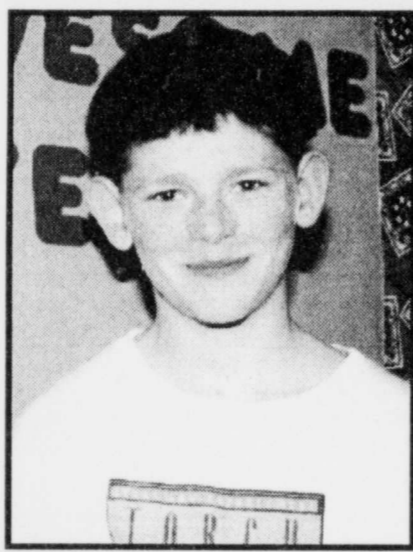

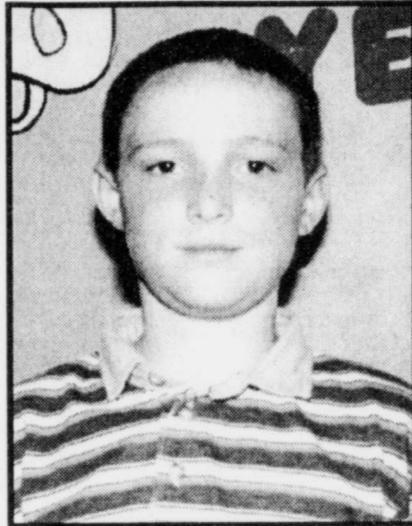

Little Dribblers meeting held

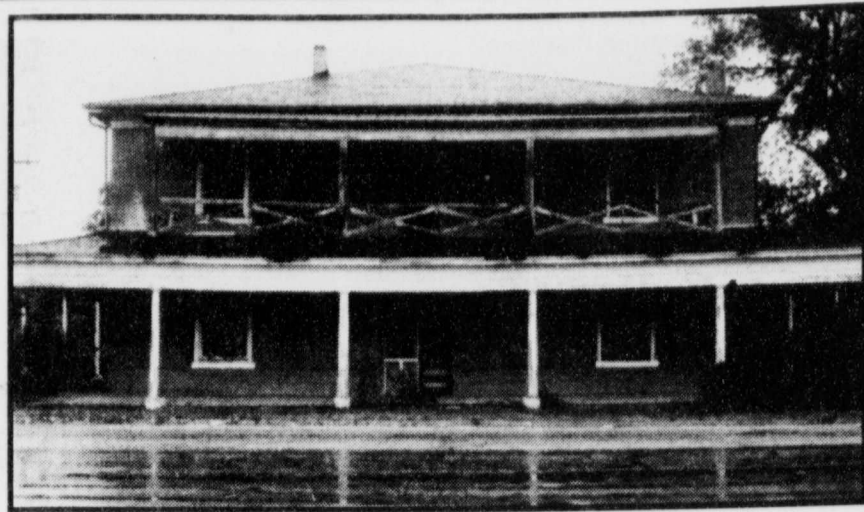

About the old Bogata Hotel

 Looking north, up Main Street in Bogata, was the hotel, which was built in 1912 by Mr. and Mrs. Sam Patterson. It was a large brick structure. It was a two story building consisting of twelve rooms with a wide porch on the south, west and north sides. They named the place "Hotel Maple". It was a very popular place for traveling men to stay over night as transportation in and out of Bogata was a little slow, just one train each way per day. Mrs. Patterson set a good table and many people took their meals there. It was a real treat to eat there on Sundays. The house was full of boarders and transients all the time. Several of the town people boarded there from time to time. Mrs. Patterson had one son, W.D. (Billy) Harvey, by a former marriage. The Pattersons sold the hotel to Mr. and Mrs. Joe Griffis. They car-

ried on the business for several years. Mr. W.H Whitten bought the hotel in 1943. His daughter, Mrs. Cleone Sullivan, sold it to the United Methodist Church after she moved a few years ago. The building has been torn down. It had been a great asset to Bogata. By Iva Lassiter Hooker. The Methodist Church built their Fellowship Hall on this place in 1992. It was dedicated to Mrs. Laura Dumpy Barnard who had been a very active member of the Bogata Methodist Women. She was the wife of Clifford Barnard and mother of Mary Margaret Vaughan. She died in 1988. A BHS class reunion is held in this building each year. Other Civic groups use it at times also. "In 1997 we still find this to be a very busy corner in Bogata" Thanks to Morris Foster for the picture that he took in 1983.

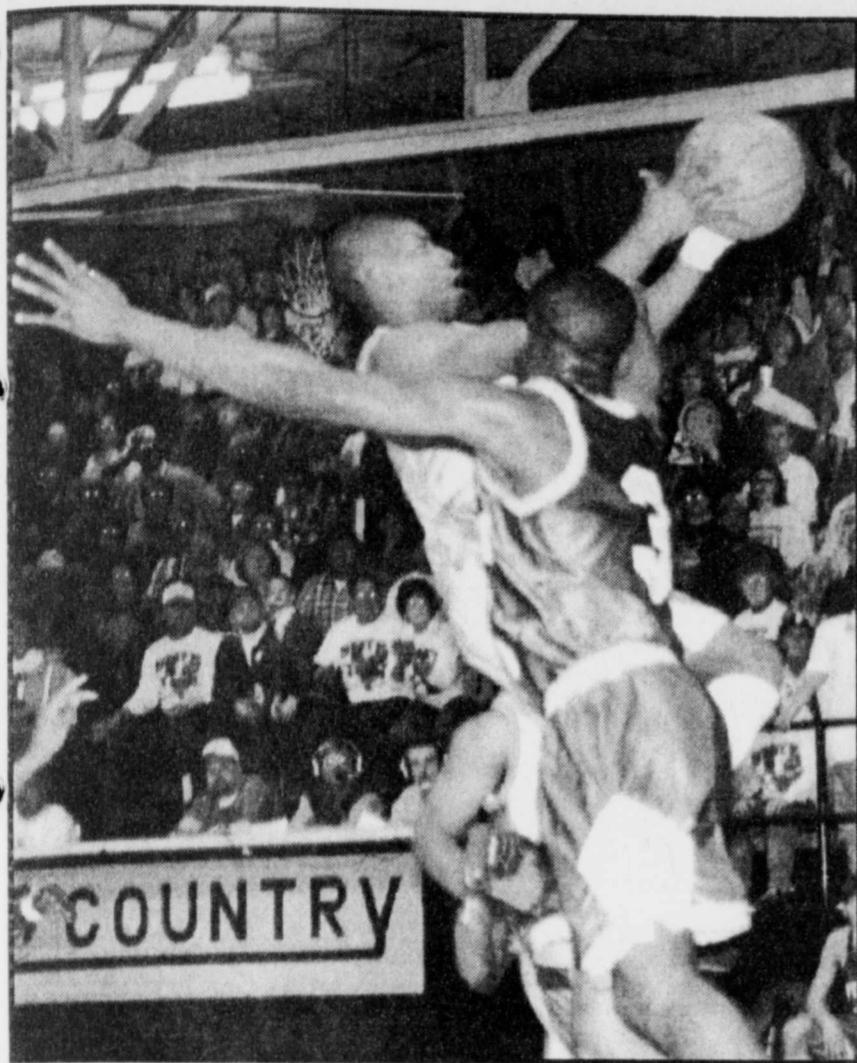

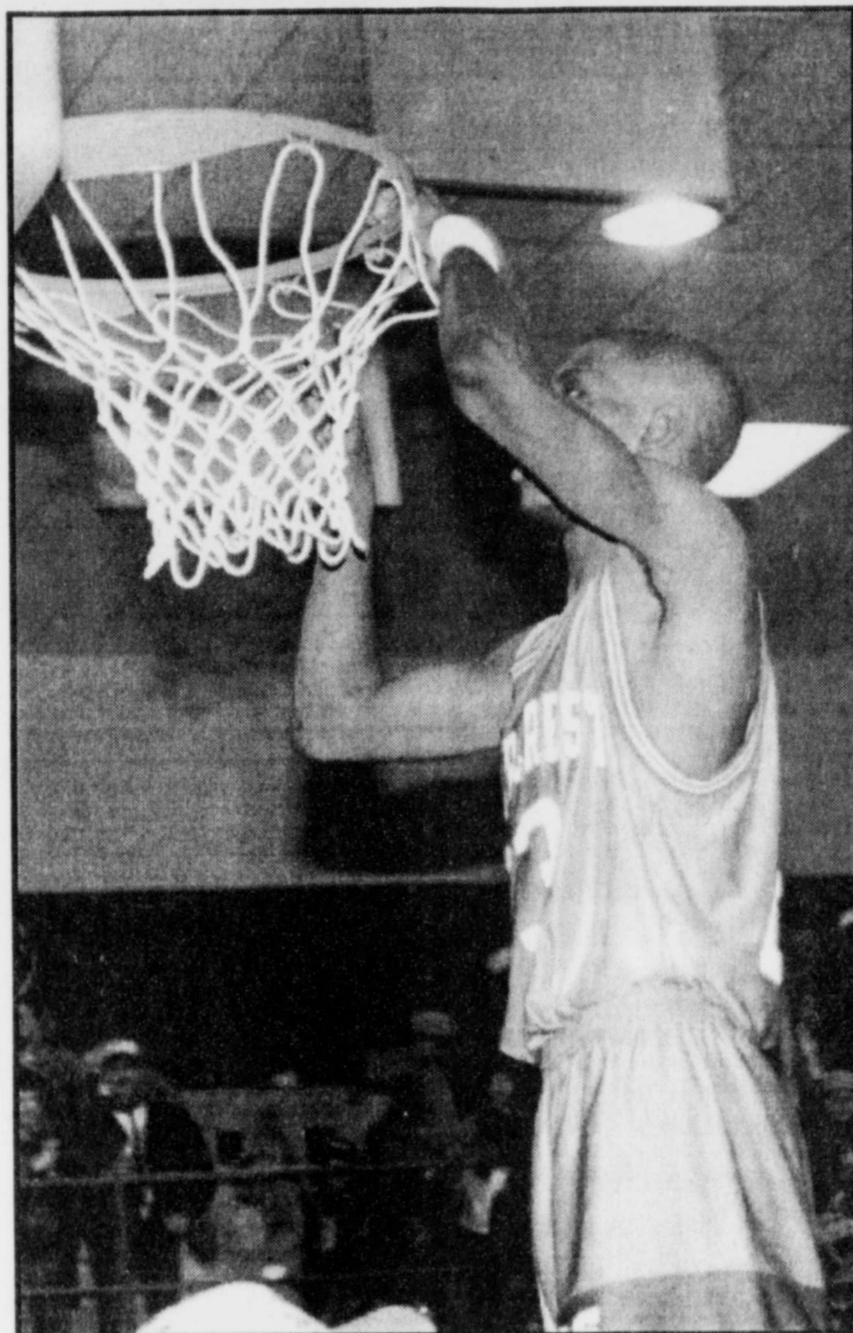

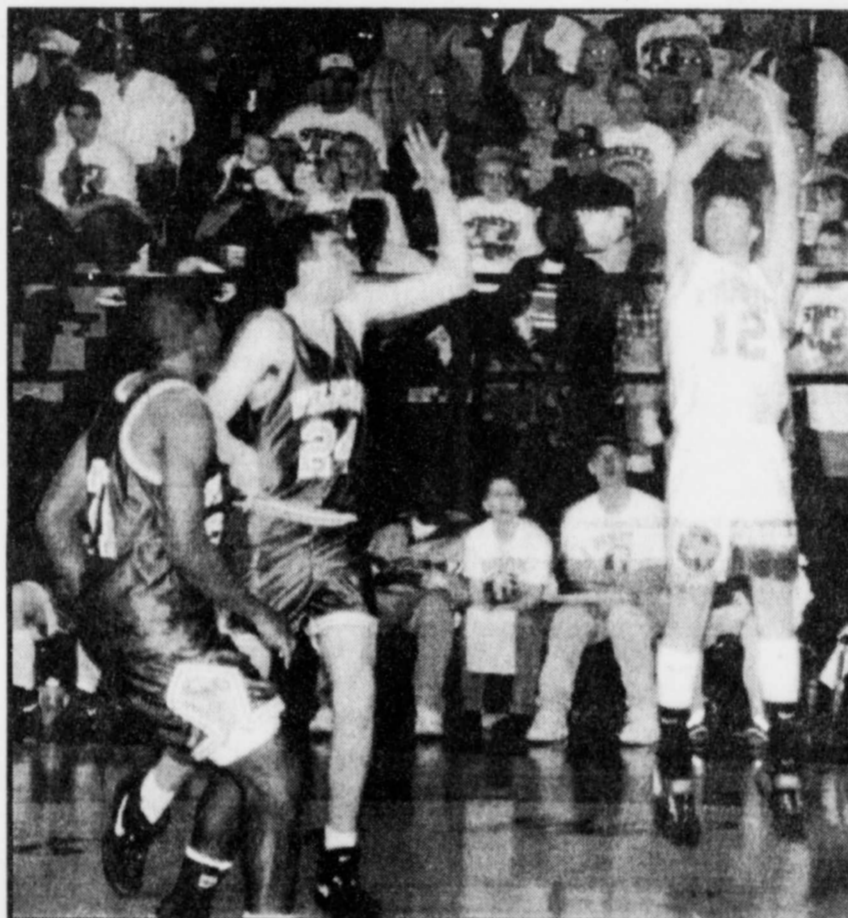

St. Joseph's, physicians to build ambulatory surgery center

Protect your rights! "Render" your taxable property by April 14th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office...or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income--such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

• You give your opinion of your property's value.

If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

• You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

• You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1996. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1997.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 1997 renditions is Monday, April 14. Call your appraisal district for the last date the rendition may be postmarked, if mailing. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 14 deadline.

BUSINESSES MUST FILE PROPERTY TAX RENDITIONS

State Comptroller John Sharp has reminded Texas businesses they must render their property with the county appraisal district by April 14, 1997. To render is to list the taxable property that businesses owned or managed as of January 1, 1997.

While state law requires business owners and operators to render, any property owner-including homeowners, farmers and ranchers-may render their property with county appraisal districts.

Sharp also announced that property owners who render are in a better position to exercise their rights as taxpayers. They are ensuring that the appraisal district has their correct address so that they will receive notices of any actions that affect their property or tax bills.

If the collector cannot deliver a tax bill because of an incorrect or old address, the property owners are responsible for paying the taxes, plus late payment penalties.

State law requires anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 to render with the local appraisal district.

"For example, businesses must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment and other tangible personal property by filing this annual report."

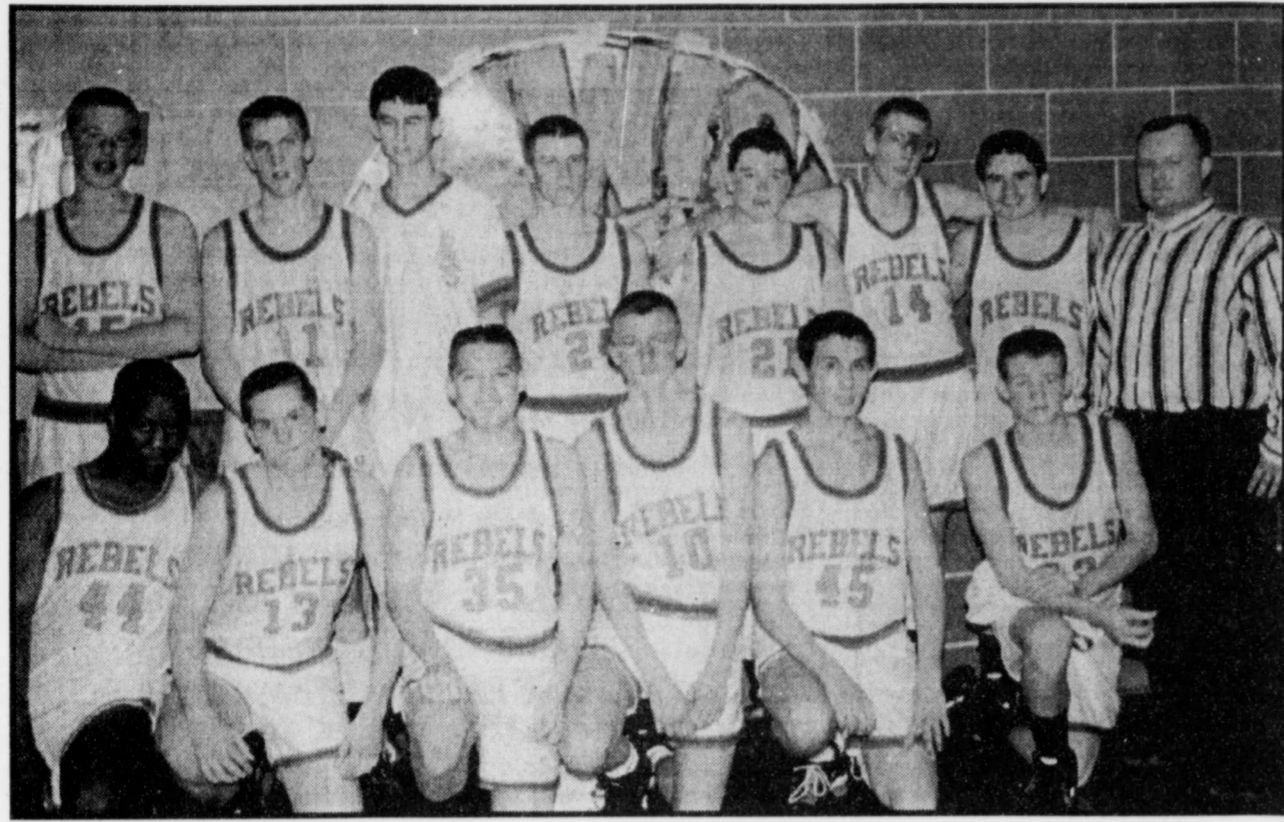
"Appraisal districts use the reports to set business property values. When a business owner doesn't render his or her property, the Chief Appraiser estimates the value."

Property owners who had property damaged by a storm, flood or fire last year may file a special decreased value report that could lower their final tax bills.

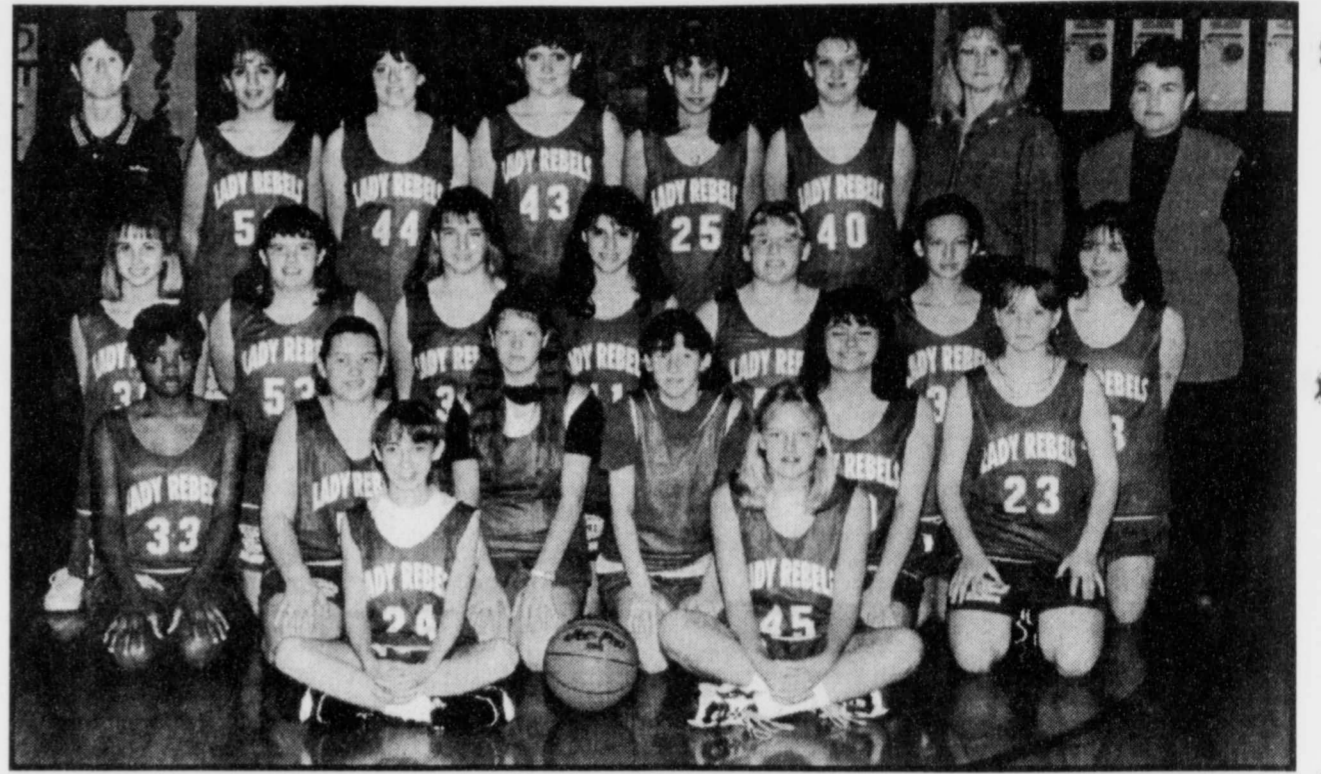
Property owners may ask the Chief Appraiser for additional time-through April 30-if the owner can show good cause.

On the renditions, property owners can record opinions of their property's value. By stating their opinions, property owners make sure that the appraisal district sends them a notice before placing a higher value on their property. This notice allows property owners the time to gather information to protect the appraisal if they believe the appraisal district's value is too high.

If more than one appraisal district appraises a property, the property owner should render in each appraisal district office. Taxpayers may contact the county appraisal district office for the rendition forms, or they may call the Comptroller's property tax hotline 1-800-252-9121.

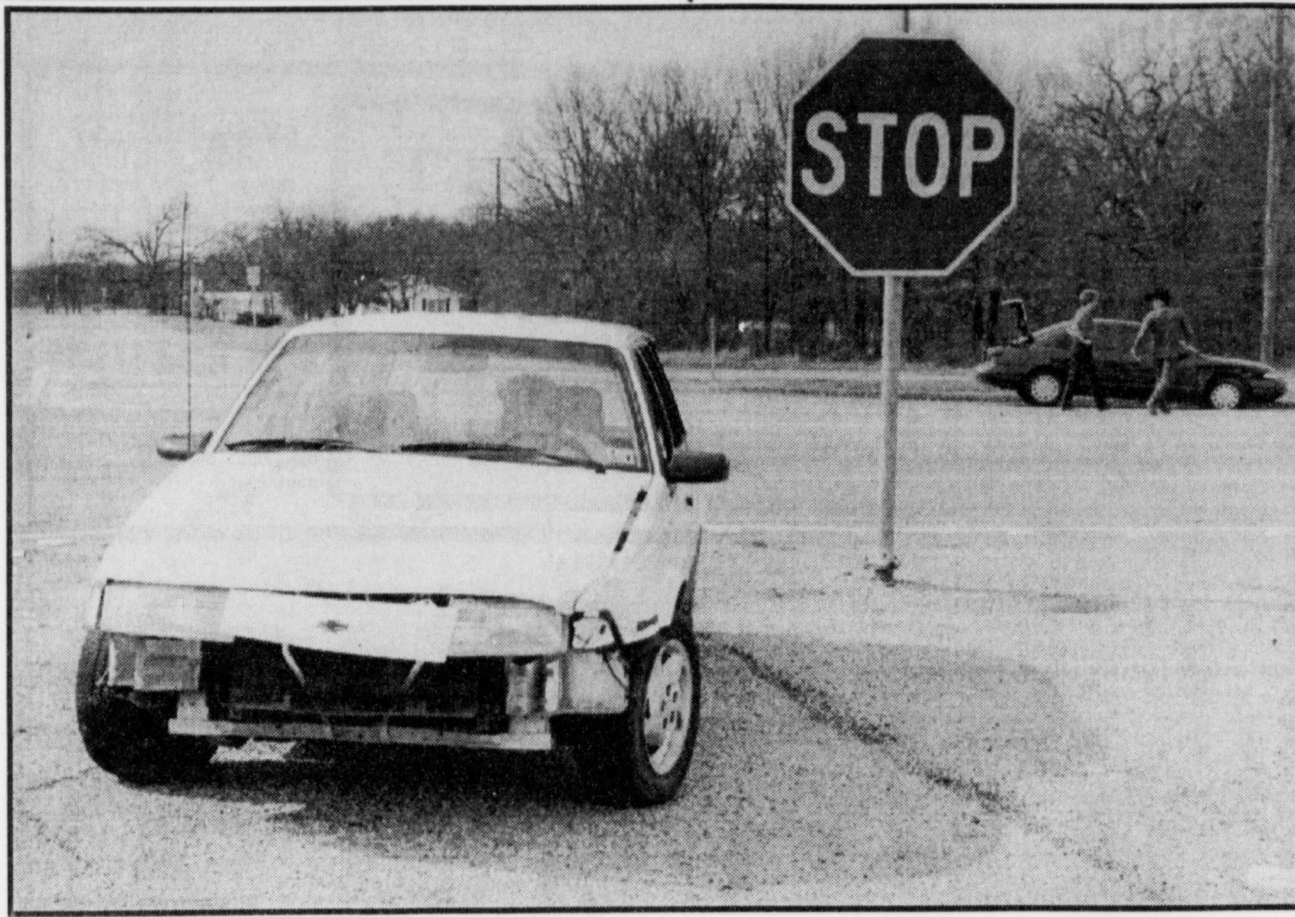
