When I think about "oil booms" I think of prosperity, fortunes, wildcatters and how dangerous working on old-time oil rigs was. The terms "Black Gold" and "Texas Tea" come to mind. I remember the stories of Talco, back when folks were living intents and shacks and when things were wild and wooly in Kilgore and the law there would chain miscreants to a wire strung between trees because the jail was full. Saturday revealed something about old-time oil booms I had never given a thought to.

One of the most fascinating aspects of the museum is a collection of recordings of actual people who recall the days during the depression when the discovery of oil changed Kilgore forever.

These voices include those who drilled, owned land, ran businesses or simply lived in Kilgore during those hectic, amazing times.


The one I listened to was the granddaughter of landowners who had oil discovered on their property.

She related what life was like for a child in Kilgore, a safe, sleepy town of only about 800. "I had a pony, and I could go

anywhere I wanted" she recalled.

She related how she and friends could have picnics, go visit one another, ride to grandparent's homes and generally have the run of the town. Everyone knew everyone else.

Think on this, call it what you want. I can't explain why these two items survived this fire unscathed-all I can say is, "It's a wonder!"


Virgil Jones is named "Citizen of the Month"

mother told her that she couldn't leave the house that day, for any reason. She couldn't imagine why! Later that same day her grandfather came to tell her that her beloved pony had been hit and killed by an oil truck.

Within 24 hours Kilgore went from 800 people to 8000 and frantic activity changed a child's universe!

Suddenly her freedom was gone. Of course she and her friends couldn't wander around anymore.....there were traffic jams and dangerous equipment everywhere. The quiet fields they had played in were covered with derricks, drilling rigs, tents and supply stores. Most of the people flooding into the area were good people devastated by the depression...but some weren't, so caution had to be ingrained into children who never thought not to trust someone before.


Can you imagine waking up in your town or city and finding it increased by the ratio Kilgore was? There would have to be chaos.

A short recording of an elderly woman recalling what changes occurred in her life in the 1930s reminded me of something I suppose we all know deep in our hearts. Even prosperity, money, expansion and modernization comes with a price to pay.







The only catch is that you must have a lot of time. These recipes are not quick and easy. They do take time. But try them out sometimes and we will see you in the kitchen!

Prepare pie crust according to directions. Heat oven to 375 degrees. In small bowl combine flour, brown sugar ad mix well. With fork cut in margarine until mixture is crumbly. In large bowl. combine sugar, cornstarch and cinnamon. Mix well. Pour into crust lined pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 35-40 minutes or until filling is partially set in center. Sprinkle evenly with topping mixture. Cover edge of crust with strips of foil to prevent excessive browning fo an additional 12-15 minutes.


Mrs. Jones, who was born in Rosboro, AR, lived in Riverside for 35 years. She was a nurse's aide for 25 years for several employers before retirement.



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
