



Our Cook's Column this week deals with the lowly tea leaf. Many a problem have been worked out over a cup of tea or glass of iced tea.

Tea is a beverage prepared by pouring boiling water over processed tealeaves. It ranks as the most popular drink in more countries than any other beverage.

India has always played a dominate role in world tea production. Today, India produces about 1-1/2 billion pounds each year. China is the second largest producer with I billion pounds Other tea-producing annually. countries include Argentina, Bangladesh, Indonesia, Japan, Kenya, the Soviet Union, SriLanka and Turkey

The tea-producing coundtries themselves consume over one-half of the global tea crop. Great Britain imports the greatest amount of tea-about 400 million pounds annually. On the average, about 7 pounds of tea are consumed per person each year in Great Britain. In the United States, tea is about 3/4 of a pound per person per year.

There are three main kinds of tea; black, green and oolong. They differ in the method used to process the leaves. The processing takes place in



a factory or near the tea estate. All tea-producing countries manufacture black tea. Most of the green and oolong tea comes from China, Japan and Taiwan.

Grades of tea vary according to the size of the leaves. The largest leaves are selected for packaging as loose tea and are classified in order of size--orange pekoe, pekoe and pekoe souchong. The smaller or broken leaves are generally used in tea bags and are classified as broken orange pekoe, broken orange pekoe fannings and fannings.

Instant tea is made by brewing tea on a large scale and then removing the water by a drying process. When the process is completed, only a powder remains.

Tea grown in different countries or even in different parts of the same country, vary in taste, flavor and quality. To obtain the best teas, each company employs tea taster's who select only certain teas for purchase. The company then sells the blend of tea under its own brand name.

Thus ends your tea lesson for the week. So sit back, brew up a batch and solve the world's problems or just your own! See you in the kitchen!

Brandon Haynes of Duncanville died March 6.







the vicious biting kind. I am. They are supposed to be good for plants. We have two ivy plants. The creatures have not even looked in their direction.

If they were any other type of household pest, I could just get the appropriate bug spray or trap and wait for the results, but I have tried to spray these weird looking things and while they will die if you spray them, you must spray each of them individually. ### Deaf people benefit from cochlear implants

Today, more that 15,000 deaf have auditory nerves, either genetipeople benefit from cochlear implants, a device introduced a little more than a decade ago.

"Manufacturers continue to improve upon their design,," said Rose Chmiel, an audiologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Newer implants have more channels than earlier single-electrode models. As a result, speech understanding is much improved. Also, a smaller speech processor has been developed and other innovations are planned that will make cochlear implants even more user friendly."

Cochlear implants provide sound 'information" for adults and children who have nerve deafness in both ears. Surviving nerve fibers in the inner ear or cochlea are stimulated through use of a surgically implanted receiver/ stimulator which is connected to an external headset that includes a microphone, transmitter and speech processor.

Today's speech processor is about the size of a cassette tape and is worn on a belt or in a pocket. In the works are cochlear implants with external components small enough to fit behind the ear like a hearing aid, and implants that can be worn while undergoing magnetic resonance imaging. (MRI)



The World Wide Web belongs to everyone and to no one. Governments want to regulate it, business wants to make money on it, academics want it exclusively for scholarly research, etc. The ARPANET from 1969, designed to assure control of a ravaged society after a nuclear holocaust, has been super ceded by it's mutant offspring, the Internet. The Internet is wonderfully out of control and has spread throughout the world. The National Science Foundation Network's high-speed lines were once known as the "Internet Backbone." Today there are "backbones" in Canada, Japan, Europe and privately held Internet Backbones created for business traffic. MCI recently spent 60 million dollars upgrading part of the internet backbone. The Internet is a rare example of a true modern, functional anarchy. There is no board of directors, no stockholders and no official censors. Any computer can speak as a peer to any other as long as it obeys the rules of the protocols, which are strictly technical, not social or political.

In Early 1996, a task force was formed by the White House to head off the possibility of other agencies levying new taxes on electronic commerce. It includes representatives of Treasury, Commerce, State Department, National Security Council, National Economic Counsel, Office of U.S.A.. Trade Representatives and the Federal Communications Commission. They are looking into areas of customs and taxation, electronic payment systems, security and encryption, privacy, commercial law for net commerce, technical standards, information content and telecommunications, infrastructure and interoperability. The administration is working on international aspects of electronic money with other G-7 members to present at a June 1997 conference in Denver. On January 15, CNET reported that Visa and MasterCard were almost ready to finalize the Secure Electronic Transactions (SET) protocol for credit purchases. Visa said it will have a SET trial using e-cash cards in May or June, 1997. 1997 will be a year of experimentation for all sorts of electronic commerce-wallets" as plug-ins for browsers, "smart" card technology to simply replace cash with no information about the user being sent over the Internet. All of this is already working quietly in Finland's's largest bank, the most wired nation in the world. Merita, Finaland's largest bank, provides more than 3 million account holders with highly secure electronic access by computer. Nearly 30% of Finnish homes have a PC and 60% of the population have Internet access. In Finland, there are 62 internetconnected computers per 1,000 residents, twice that of the U.S. Banking, shopping and just visiting or migrating from the real world to the electronic world there at a remarkable rate. Nokia Oy, a Finnish company, is making communicator called Model 9000, a phone and computer hybrid no larger than a bulky cellular phone of a decade ago. It allows Internet access to a user anywhere he might be. 1997 will be the first year of the U.S. of real Internet Commerce. A secure payment system is the only thing holding it back. By the turn of the century, "network literacy" will be forcing itself into the very

texture of you life, like it or not.



# Hale-Bopp Comet will be highly visible

Comet Hale-Bopp was discovered on July 23, 1995. When first viewed, it was 250 times brighter than Comet Halley at the same distance, and is about three times as big as Comet Halley. It is said to be the biggest, brightest comet in the last century. Backyard comet-gazers can already spot it hovering on the eastern horizon each day before dawn.

You can spot the comet by looking east about 30 minutes before dawn. Hold your fist at arm's length. The comet is east-north-east and about two or three fists above the horizon. It will slowly move northward each day.

Comets have long evoked a range of awed emotions and strange ideas in those lucky enough to see them. Comets have been blamed for droughts, famines and floods throughout history

The last time Comet Hale-Bopp visited the inner solar system, Stonehenge was about to reach it's final configuration, 4,200 years ago!

Comet Hale-Bopp will come no closer than 122 million miles from Earth and is about 25 miles in diameter. The comet's tail "could" stretch across a third of the sky when it reaches peak brilliance on April Fool's Day.

# "Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed basd on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber--not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

# When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 1997 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss the deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

# Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

# A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$45,000.

### Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on January 1st (and used it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$5,000 homestead exemption to lower their school taxes this year .... and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

### Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled, or if you're 65 years old or older, you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on our home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.) The over-65 homeowner's exemptions and school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death adn lives in and owns the home.


# Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 1996, you won't need to reapply for 1997 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, you'll need to file for an exemption for 1997. And if you turned 65 or became disabled during 1996, you need to file for the additional exemptions.

#### Believe all you hear about catching colds?

COLLEGE STATION — During winter months, it's a good idea to keep warm and dry, but most health specialists will tell you, this has little to do with cold or flu prevention.

"Common beliefs about how a person gets a cold are unfounded," said Dr. Carol Rice, a registered nurse and health specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University. "Many think that being out in cold or rainy weather, sitting in a draft, or coming inside from hot weather into a building cooled by air conditioning will bring on a cold. None of these ideas are supported by research."

What causes colds are more than 200 viruses, she said. Adults average about six colds each year while children may have as many as nine colds a year.

"The reason colds occur more often during winter months is because people stay inside where viruses tend to be more concentrated," she said.

To reduce the incidence of colds it is important to always wash your hands with soap and water, and avoid hand contact with those who have colds, Rice said. Also, try to keep hands away from your mouth and nose.

County Attorney Jack Herrington reports that Glenn Wayne Jackson was entenced to 40 years in prison for the aggravated sexual assault of a child. Herrington said, "Jackson will have to spend 20 years day-for-day before he will even be considered for parole."

Others receiving sentences Monday were; Roy Miles who received one year in the county jail on a revocation of probation; Dusty Lee Baer, who was sentenced to 10 years probation with the condition that he spend 6 months in county jail as a condition of his probation for the burglary of a house; Martisha Rosser received 5 years probation and restitution in a forgery case; Willie James Scales was sent to prison for five years for a felony DWI; and Johnny Harper was sentenced to four years in prison on a revocation of probation.

James B. Zimmerman, Justice, Court of Appeals-Retired, sitting by assignment for the Indecency with a Child charges against Clayton Hall, attorney, has set the three cases for trial on Monday, July 7, 1997 at 9:00 a.m. before a jury in the District Courtroom of Sulphur Springs, TX.


