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
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

National mammography debate not a Texas controversy

In January, national headlines reported a controversy over the effectiveness of mammography screenings for women in their 40s. The scientific debate may be scholarly and interesting among epidemiologists, clinicians, and federal bureaucrats. In the real world, however, women are dying because of breast cancer that went too long undetected. More lives are being put in danger due to women's indecision and fear about this most basic and necessary early detection tool.

The debate is at the national level. Here in Texas, however, there is no controversy. The Texas Cancer Council continues to recommend mammograms every two years for women in their 40s, a recommendation we believe helps save the lives o of Texas women. This is the recommendation of the American Cancer Society, which has been supported by numerous other medical and health organizations, including the American Medical Association, the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology and the American College of

Radiology. Texas physicians also are united in their support of mammography for women in their 40s. A 1996 survey of Texas physicians found that 75 percent of the respondents recommend mammography every one to two years for women in their 40s, and 8 percent recommend it annually. This survey was conducted by Baylor College of Medicine for the Physician Oncology Education Program of the Texas Medical Association and the Texas Cancer Council.

The national debate centers on the findings of a consensus panel of the National Institutes of Health. The

panel had a large body of evidence to Executive Director, Texas Cancer consider in a short time span, and concluded that "The panel also raised questions about the possible risks of mammography. The panel's conclusions drew heated criticism. Many cancer specialists and health organizations believe the panel failed to consider adequately new data emerging from various international studies that demonstrate the effectiveness of mammography for women ages 40-49.

The national debate has left Texas women confused about this very important and personal health issue. All Texas women between the ages of 40-49 should not let the academic debate sway them from getting mammograms. Mammograms can detect breast abnormalities that might be cancer before symptoms occur. Early diagnosis and treatment of breast cancer greatly increases a woman's chances of survival. With 2,500 Texas women dying each year from breast cancer, we must do everything possible to seek early detection for ourselves, our mothers, sisters and friends.

The Texas Cancer Council encourages all women in their 40s to talk with their health care provider about the personal benefits they will receive from mammography. For more information, contact your local chapter American Cancer Society.

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



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

From the looks of the green grass and flowing shrubs and trees, it looks like Spring is just around the corner. But, as you know, looks can be deceiving. We are having an early Easter this year and that means yet another cold spell on the way.

1/4 teaspoon ground ginger Rub lamb with garlic; sprinkle with l teaspoon salt, pepper and rosemary Insert spit into lamb, balancing it evenly. Form pan of heavy duty foil; place at front of fire to catch drippings. Set spit in motion; roast about 6 inches from firebed for I hour and 30 minutes to 2 hours. Combine corn syrup, pineapple juice, lemon juice, remaining salt and ginger and simmer for 5 minutes. Brush on lamb during last 30 minutes of cooking. Pour drippings from pan into saucepan and add remaining glaze sauce and enough boiling water to make about I cup sauce. Heat well and skim off fat.

Easter Lily Cookies l cup egg yolk l cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon vanilla pinch of salt

Beat egg yolks until light; add sugar gradually, beating constantly. vanilla and salt. Stir in flour with spoon. Drop batter onto greased baking tin and spead out, making a flat circle 2-1/2-3 inches in diameter. Make 3-4 circles. Bake at 375 degrees until tinged with brown, 10-13 minutes. Remove pan from oven and place on oven door; quickly shape cookies into lilies. Served filled with whipped cream annd garnish with cherries.



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


The Talco Baseball-Softball Association met Thursday, March 13 at 6:00 p.m. at the Talco City Hall.



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


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donor selection process is designed to answer two major questions: Will a donation of approximately 450 ml of whole blood this time be harmful to teh donor?

Could blood drawn from this do-

nor at this time potentially transmit a

disease to the recipient? First the potential donor must register. Then a brief physical exam ensues. This consists of general appearance, weight, temperature, blood pressure, pulse, hematocrit and hemoglobin, chck the arm for skin lesions and a review of permanent deferral file. Next comes the medical history questionnaire, which is designed to obtain a profile of the prospective donor's health status in relation to donating blood. This questionnaire is very thorough and investigates HIV high risk behavior, syphilis, malaria, hepatitis, hemophilia and other conditions. This is whee high risk donors are not paid cash to donate blood. Stewart Regional Blood Center, which serves the East Texas area, including Paris does not pay cash for blood donations. Paying cash for donors increases the chance of a high risk donor falsifying their medical history questionaire. If you make it through here, then the next step is drawing area, where you donate blood. Once the blood is drawn, it is tested

in the laboratory for infectious agents such as syphilis, HIV, hepatitis B and C, and Human T-Lymphotropic Virus Tpye I or II. The tests are actually performed are anti-HTLV I/II, anti-HIV/I, anti-HIV-2; HBsAg, Anti-HBc and Anti-HCV.

Every possible measure is taken to ensure the safety of our blood supply. However, the risk of transmitting infectious agents is present. Careful donor selection and available laboratory tests do not eliminate the hazard. Autologous transfusion should be considered whenever feasible.
