
Being the hovering, over-protective type of person I am I began screening prospective baby-sitters in my mind, made up a mental list and began to talk to them.

Tracks Web

For those who want to know more about the internet but don't know where to start!

We have become dependent on an ever-increasing flow of information from the convergence of computing and communications. In large population centers, this demand for information is being satisfied by fiber optics. Dispute the promises of the "Information Superhighway", these services are simply unavailable at any price for most of the world's citizens and geography. Those who have basic phone service get it through 100-year-old technology-analog cooper wire networks that will never be upgraded. It is estimated that 10-35 percent of these copper networks are corroded. We can forget about fiber optics. Stringing wire isn't any cheaper today than it was 100 years ago. There are recent report of Internet usage overloading the phone system, even though only about 10 percent of households use the net.

Just to keep the phone system from failing under the weight of Internet usage may cost billions Only a fraction of phone subscribers use them at any given time and tend to have brief conversations. Internet users can stay on the line for hours and this totally fouls up the load factors that the phone company used for network design and pricing. A doubling of net usage would force the phone companies to spend more than \$20 billion to upgrade. Look forward to paying by the minute for calling your local provider. Someone has to pay for lost revenues and upgrading.

The Teledesic Corporation, a private corporation based in Kirkland, Washington, was granted a license by the FCC on March 14, 1997 to provide a global "Internet In The Sky" using a constellation of 840 low-Earth-orbiting (LEO) satellites. The FCC license will allow Teledesic to build and launch the Teledesic Network it has been working on for seven years.

Backed by telecommunications pioneer Craig McCaw and Microsoft Chairman Bill Gates, the Teledesic Network will provide two-way, broadband connections for voice, data, video and high-performance Internet access. These low-Earth-orbiting satellites at 435 miles in space will provide continuous global coverage with each satellite connected to eight others.

By providing this service to the advanced market, the same service is made available to the developing markets. This will enable universal access to the Information Age. Not by the "Information Superhighway" but by the "Information SuperLEOs.


The Teledesic Network plans to begin launching satellites in the year 2000 and plans to begin service in 2002. They will not market the services directly. Rather, they will provide for the delivery of promised low-cost services by others using small dish receivers.

A Series About Day Trips from This Area To Places of Interest

Honey Grove is a small town one a very fine collection of wonderful old homes. From the modest to the elaborate, it's fun to drive around the town and look at them, even if one did nothing else.

Honey Grove was named in 1835 by the famous Davy Crockett. Crockett camped ina grove of trees that had honey in them while on his way to the Alamo. He wrote to friends in Tennessee, telling them that when things were settled with Mexico he planned to come back to this honey grove to settle. Of course, he didn't come back from the Alamo, but his friend, Samuel Erwin brought his wife to Texas in 1842 and they helped settle the town.

Floyd's Quarry produced the yellow stone that can be seen in many of Honey Grove's public buildings. The stone was also sold to other places, including Red River County. Yes, that yellow stone the courthouse is built out of came from Honey Grove. There are still buildings in Dallas constructed of it. The quarry was abandoned in about 1904 or 1905 as cheaper, easier to obtain building materials became available.

The stones from the quarry can also be seen occasionally as curbs, chimneys and hearths, or around water wells. It is a unique kind of limestone and when quarried the yellow rock bleached and hardened in the sun. There was even a spur of the railroad to the quarry which took stone to many places. At one time there was a dam of the stone across a creek which had a water wheel which powered a cotton gin.

Jacob Fein who helped design the state capital building settled in Honey Grove and is responsible for several buildings

As I mentioned, the driving tour of the town is free. The Chamber of Commerce, located onthe square inthe Voyer Library, has a brochure and there is a nice little book called "Historic Homes of Honey Grove" for sale there for \$5. It features photos and short histories of many of the houses you will see as you ramble up and down the streets.

The town's square has sadly suffered from the creation of a loop around the town. Much traffic goes by on the loop instead of passing through the downtown area now, and cafes and antique shops have suffered from it.


Still, it is a historically minded community and they work hard to keep

The Voyer Foundation has done a lot for the town, and the library has some interesting memorabilia that shouldn't be missed.


Dro p by the Dairy Queen to visit with the locals, or on the other side of town is Doc's Cafe, which has a country theme decor.

And, if you really are feeling adventurous, you can always go towards Monkstown and try to find the tiny towns of Bugtussle, Seed Tick or Greasy Neck!










