



The perfect buch to any meal. . . . especially red cans, fried potatoes, maybe add some fied okra, fresh green onions and ed tea! To a homegrown Texan. . nothing better! Bet you know what is week's recipes are. you are ht. . . . cornbread! Since the time rgardens to start producing is soon. here will be beans to snap, peas to hell and okra ans squash to fry. Add hat ectra touch....fresh cornbread! ley, it is even good cold, crumbled to a glass of sweet milk or as some refer, buttermilk! What a way to nd a day!

The main ingredient of any ornbread recipe is cornmeal of ourse. Cornmeal is made by grindng or milling the kernels of the corn plant. It can be used in making baked oods and is also used in such prodacts as adhesives, cleaning products nd soaps. Manufacturers refine cornneal to make laundry starch and izing for fabrics and paper.

Scientists cannot trace the ancestry of modern corn to a wild plant, as hey can other grains such ads rice ind wheat. They do know that Indiins living in what is now Central and Southern Mexico gathered and te corn from wild plants about 10,000 years ago. The oldest know ossil corncobs are about 7,000 years

producer and exporter o corn. We produce around two-fifths of the world's supply, mostly in the Corn Belt in the midwest.


