

cool, velvety black nights. Winter was brittle with crackling ice storms - or soft with blankets of snow. Then again it might be loud and boisterous with whistling blue







About Maple Springs School

By Frances Mayes Rozell.

While visiting with Joe Ford the other day, he told me that he has located a certificate belonging to his grandfather; Mr. George W. Ford. The certificate was issued to him by the County Judge of Red River County in 1883 for serving as Trustee of the Maple Springs School How is your math? Was this many years ago or not? Maple Springs was at that time located on what is now third street east-where the community center is located.

The certificate states that Maple Springs was school community number 45. Don't know if Mr. Ford was appointed to fill a vacancy on the board of if all members at that time were appointed.

The records in County Court House dated 1912 show Bogata School as Red River County Common School District Number 36. That year the following men in Bogata received votes for Trustee: C.P. Boyd, J.S. Wilkinson, J.L. Bryson, L.L. Howison, J.A. Underwood, N.M. Howison, E.G. Hutchins and John Howison. We assume when the name was changed from Maple Springs to Bogata, a new school district number was assigned to Bogata. In 1912 there were 85 common School Districts in Red River County.

Mr. George W. Ford was born in Tennessee. He was living is Mississippi when he married Martha Ramage who was born in South Carolina. They moved to Maple Springs in 1858. He had a farm on the prairie northwest of present Bogata. Mrs. Ford stayed in their home, a log cabin, with their three children while Mr. Ford was away in the Civil War.

Sometime after Mr. Ford's death, about 1890, Mrs. Ford and her children moved to Fulbright. Joe's father, Mr. John K. Ford was 16 at the time. brothers and one sister at home at the of Maple Springs.

time. He and one of his brothers were in business together. They first had a grocery business then they had a dry goods business for about ten years.

Mr. John K. Ford married Mae Kelley of Fulbright in 1912. They had four children born in Fulbright; John, Janice, Justine and Genevieve. Mr. Ford moved his family to Bogata in 1920. Joe, Joyce, George and Jean were born after the family came to Bogata. Mr. John K. Ford was a cotton buyer and had an insurance business. He was Post Master from 1923-

As we all know Joe followed in his father's footsteps; he also was in the grocery store business. He started working for his cousin, Geoffery Bartlett in 1933 before and after school --- years later he was owner of that business and kept it open and served Bogata well until 1986.

* As our friend, Paul Harvey, would say "Now for the rest of the story." Mr. G.W. Ford was also Trustee of

Maple Springs in 1876. When I took the above article to the News office I read an article the Bogata News has of a copy made from book X pages 295-96 of Red River County records - this being a deed dated 5th day of August 1876 from William Humphreys. Mr. Humphreys gave an acre of his Headright for the purpose of erecting a building to be used as a free church, school house and a room for the accommodation of the Masons, Grangers or Odd Fellows as the trustees may think best. Trustees in office at that time for the purpose of erecting a building were: G.W. Ford, John A. Wilson and H. Lee Howison of Maple

This acre and the site of this building was from the creek (north of the present day Community House) to the street - now Third Street - which He was born in 1874. He had two of course in 1876 was the Main Street
