



So, once more I am posing a question, or questions. But the question I am pondering the most is the first one of all. Why would we "put on the dog"? I'd really like to know!



House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase the school property tax residence homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to limit all or part of the exemption to political subdivisions that are the principal providers of elementary and secondary education within their boundaries.

In addition, the amendment would authorize the Legislature to allow the transfer of all or part of the age 65-and-over tax freeze to another homestead. Specifically, the Legislature would be authorized to provide that the current limitation against increasing school property taxes on the residence homesteads of persons age 65 or older, or their surviving spouse who is eligible to receive the exemption, may be transferred if the person establishes a different residence homestead.

The amendment would also allow the \$10,000 additional amount for the standard exemption to be used to lower the tax rate of persons cur-

affected by this limitation in 1996 or in an earlier tax year, the Legislature must provide for a reduction in the school property tax limitation in the 1997 tax year and subsequent tax years in an amount equal to \$10,000 multiplied by the 1997 school property tax rate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing school property tax relief by increasing the residence homestead exemption by \$10,000 and providing for the transfer of the tax limitation to another qualified homestead for persons over 65 and a reduction in taxes subject to the limitation."



BOGATA SCHOOL 1929

When Bogata built a school

By Frances Mayes Rozell Nanalee asked us to do some more articles about Bogata, the school and the people. She and I hope you will still enjoy more, even though the 1997 Bogata Homecoming is past. You are invited to send articles either to Nanalee at the Bogata News or to me at Box 21, Bogata, Tx. 75417. Hello, Ted Craddock Grayson, you could send us something about the pep squad in "old days".

The Bogata High School building, as we all know it, was built in 1929, with the first seniors in the new building graduating in May of 1930. Frances Griffin of Bogata was one of those seniors.

I searched some of the old papers at the news office and came up with a few interesting facts.

From the Deport Times, March 22, May 17, August 16, and September 6, and September 20 of 1929: The Bogata School District employed eight teachers and had an enrollment ion excess of 300. (eight teachers for 300 students...WOW).

A new five room brick structure was to be built to house the four high school grades, grades 8 through 11, and a Home Economics Department.

The Sept. 6 paper named the teachers for the 1929-30 school year in Bogata. Mrs. Frances Griffin told me what they taught: F.L. Branson, Superintendent and taught geometry and algebra; Floyd Jones, principal and taught history; Mrs. Lillie Branson, Spanish and English; Miss Frances Baker of Avery, Homecoming; Miss Laura Ziegler of Winnsboro, taught 5th & 6th grades; Mrs. H.C. McCluer (Frances Griffin's mother) taught Latin and math; Miss Vera Lamb of Winfield taught 3rd grade and maybe 4th grade; Ollie Lee Cochran of Commerce taught elementary. (Roger Swan came during the year as Principal and taught history-later Galen Igo came as principal and taught history. The building was begun about the

middle of July and was to be completed in time for school to start Sept. 1st. However, school was postponed until Sept 18 to allow additional finish work of the building.

Mr. H.D. DeBerry was the contractor and Smith and Pottenger was the architect. Mr. DeBerry was an uncle of Mary Jane DeBerry Lowery of Blossom and Thomas Gordon DeBerry of Bogata.

The ceilings in the original part of the building are tin, very decorative. They still look nice today. According to the May 17 issue of the paper, O.G. Grigler of Mt. Pleasant was the builder.


The two class rooms that join the gym and the gym were not built until several years later

The building now occupied by the Plaza Art Gallery in Paris was restored in 1997 by Dr. and Mrs. William Hayden as a branch of the William and Elizabeth Hayden Museum of American Art. This building was built in 1916 after the Paris fire. It was occupied by Greiner and Mohr Drug Store with two doctors using the second floor.

Most of us remember this building as the Austin Shoe Store. During restoration, efforts were made to retain the basic components of the original building (of 1916) tin ceilings on both levels, pine floors, etc. The tin ceilings do look nice in he Plaza Art Gallery and look exactly like the ones in our Bogata School Building, which was built some ten years later.

If any of you know any history about the decorative tine used for ceilings, share your knowledge with us.

You notice the building called for five rooms...no indoor restrooms included. 1929 of course, was before Bogata got running water for the town. Well, now that I have reminded you of the "Outdoor John" I'll close until another time. Let us hear from you.
