Just what is truth?

Mowing gives me lots of time to think. As I trundle along, clipping down my five acres, my mind just spins and spins and spins. And if I have a problem, it fastens on to it and just keeps chewing and worrying about it the whole time.

Friday I began fretting about a conflict that has had me very upset. And nothing I could do would get it from my mind. I couldn't understand why there had to be problems over a difference of opinions. It bothered me a lot, I just couldn't come to grips with the idea that petty differences could affect working towards a common and worthy goal.

Then, later, I was talking with a close friend and we were discussing why people are so quick to anger over a difference of opinion. After all, no two people are ever going to share the same views of things, so why fight about it? Even though I hate conflict, I was involved in one...and really didn't understand why!

But, friend pointed out that in psychology, there is a lot about how truth or fact is perceived. The concept is called "phenomenology".

Think about this...there just isn't one truth. Everyone perceives a truth differently. We are unable to think about something except in the context of what forms us...each of us with different genes, different upbringing and morals, different mental processes, different financial situations, current situations. Every single factor affects how we see truth.

And, of course, that carries over into everything about our lives. How we react to any given situation is going to be directly dependent on how tired or rested we are, how our mental processes work, the standards we set for ourselves and others around us, absolutely everything is going to have a bearing on our reaction!

Well, it didn't solve my problem, and none of us are capable of seeing through the eyes of someone else...but it did make me more aware of why conflicts and differences, arguments and challenges arise!

I have to work on this concept a little bit. I have to try and remember and analyze why someone may react as they do...and most of all I have to analyze what things have made ME react in the manner that I did. I'm not immune to the pressures and stresses of life, and that means my reactions may be different on one day than they would be on another day.

It won't fix a thing...but it challenges me to use my mind in a new way instead of just continuing to worry and gnaw on a problem uselessly. And I hope that is progress.

The emphasis on the magazine is basically rural, but it has some fascinating articles, tips and hints.

Leah was raised in the Talco area and has family there. She enjoys cooking and has for many years. Her recipes featured here are easy, quick recipes, as she and her family seem to meet their selves coming and going most of the time. She enjoys getting her Talco Times each week and keeps up with all of the local happenings.

Leah and her husband have a "dancing" daughter, Callie Joyce, and stay quite busy with her activities. She will be in the first grade this school year. Her husband does commercial woodworking and works for Lawrence Propane.

Leah uses her "spare time" substituting at Quitman Elementary on an "on call" basis and also helps out with the woodworking. They do custom one-of-a-kind pieces for designers in Dallas, residential and office

Zesty Steak Salad is her first "meal in minutes" and you can substitute pork loin or poultry for the steak.

Fried Garlic Toast is great hot out of the oven and can sprinkle on onion powder instead of garlic powder or use a favorite herb seasoning. For a sweeter alternative, leave off the seasonings entirely and spread the fried bread with preserves.

This **Summertime Green Bean** recipe adds a new twist by adding corn syrup. Leah also like to sprinkle Parmesan cheese and crumble bacon on top, along with a few spoonfuls of Italian dressing for an added zing!

Angel Food Dream has got to be a great recipe. She uses an Angel Food Cake and strawberries. Leah says that other fruits may be used like blueberries or blackberries, even peaches. When she serves this cake on a holiday, she has used food coloring in the topping such as green for St. Patrick's Day or Christmas.

Zesty Steak Salad
1 pound boneless top sirloin-cut in strips
1/3 cup Worcestershire
1 medium onion
1 medium onion-julienned
1 medium green pepper-julienned
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
6 cups shredded lettuce
6-9 cherry tomatoes-halved
salsa

In a bowl, combine sirloin and sauce; cover and refrigerate. Meanwhile in a skillet, saute onion and green pepper in butter 3-4 minutes. Add meat; stir-fry until meat is cooked to desired doneness. Spoon meat and vegetables over lettuce and garnish with tomatoes. Serve with salsa if desired. **Yield 4-6 servings.**

Fried Garlic Toast
1-2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
6 slices white bread-halved
Melt butter over low heat in a skillet or griddle. Sprinkle with garlic powder. Fry bread until golden brown on both sides. **Yield 4-6 servings.**

Summertime Green Beans
1-1/2 pound fresh green beans
2 tablespoons dried minced onion
2 tablespoons corn syrup
2 teaspoons butter or margarine
1/4-1/2 teaspoon salt
Cut beans into 1-1/4 inch pieces; place in a saucepan. Cover with water and bring to a boil. Cover and cook over medium heat until tender-crisp; about 10 minutes. Drain and add onion, corn syrup, butter and salt. Cover and simmer for 5 minutes; stirring occasionally. **Yield 4-6 servings.**

Angel Food Dream
1 package (16 ounces) frozen sliced strawberries in syrup
1 prepared Angel Food Cake
1 carton (8 ounces) Cool Whip-divided
Fresh strawberries and mint-optional
Drain berries and reserve 1/3 cup of syrup. Split cake horizontally into two layers; place bottom layer on serving plate. Spoon berries over bottom layer; spread with 3-1/4 cup Cool Whip. Replace top layer. Drizzle with reserved syrup. Garnish with remaining topping and berries and mint if desired. **Yield 8-10 servings.**

A day in the Dales makes a great day

For those interested, we will continue with our vacation as we slowly head down to London.

My cousin Medora got up early and went for a walk in the Yorkshire Dales outside of Haworth. She met a pair of elderly sheep herders who chatted with her in their deep Yorkshire accents, and pointed the way to a beautiful walk.

In the meantime Thomas and I had been poking around the quaint town.

We met for breakfast and laughed at the menu which featured a breakfast called the "Chlorestol Killer" or "Heart Attack on a Plate". This featured the full British Breakfast of sausage, bacon, eggs, grilled tomato and mushrooms, toast, butter and jelly but also had fried bread, fried potatoes and an extra fried egg! We passed on that one, but then went to the Bronte parsonage museum and the church where the Bronte sister's father was pastor. It was easy to see how the characters and fells described in the book "Jane Eyre" came to be, for although the day was sunny, under the trees it was still damp and chill and almost gloomy. One could imagine the wind sweeping across the hills in bleak despair!

After visiting with several merchants and our host at the White Lion Inn we went out to find Phil applying the "Don't mess with Texas" bumper sticker to his van! Do you know how funny it was with Phil wearing a Tour De Paris tee shirt we had given him, with the Eiffel tower and a cowboy hat! I suspect his is the only van in Britain with a bumper sticker against

litter in Texas. The day before we had inquired how far out of the way it was to go to Thirsk, the town that was the setting for the Herriott books. Phil had said it was quite a way out of the way, and Thomas had wistfully said to forget it then.

But, Phil had mapped out the route and said we would go. Those who have read the series of books will know that the author wrote as James Herriott and the town he was located in was called Darrowby. His real name was Wite, and the town is Thirsk. We had a lovely drive through the dales spotting more bright pheasant, gasping at vista after vista. We began to descend from there and came into Thirsk was larger than I envisioned it in the books, quite a busy and thriving town with a cobbled square and pretty clock.

We went down a street to the surgery, with it's bright red door. It is

currently in use by veterinarians, but a project is in the works to convert it to a visitor's center and memorial to the beloved "James Herriott" whose books have been enjoyed round the world.

Thomas slipped around back to discover to his delight that the old garage, shed and yard is still just as it was in the books!

We bought a framed print of the street and it's red door, then headed onto the boring motorway for the rest of our journey to London. It was not something we were ready to do, because it meant that our trip was drawing to a close. All too soon it was going to be time to go home, and we

really weren't ready! The motorway was very busy, with traffic heavy and a light rain falling. Phil made driving look easy, but it is bound to have been difficult, especially with the three chatterboxes he had to put up with asking questions all the time.

One thing we learned is that there is a rich person's hobby in Britain. Where as here in the states a vanity license plate doesn't cost much, they aren't specifically manufactured for people there, and when one occurs it is snapped up and can cost thousands of pounds. As an example, a Rolls Royce passed us with a license plate that had initials on it. This would have cost about 30,000 pounds! Talk about having lots of money!

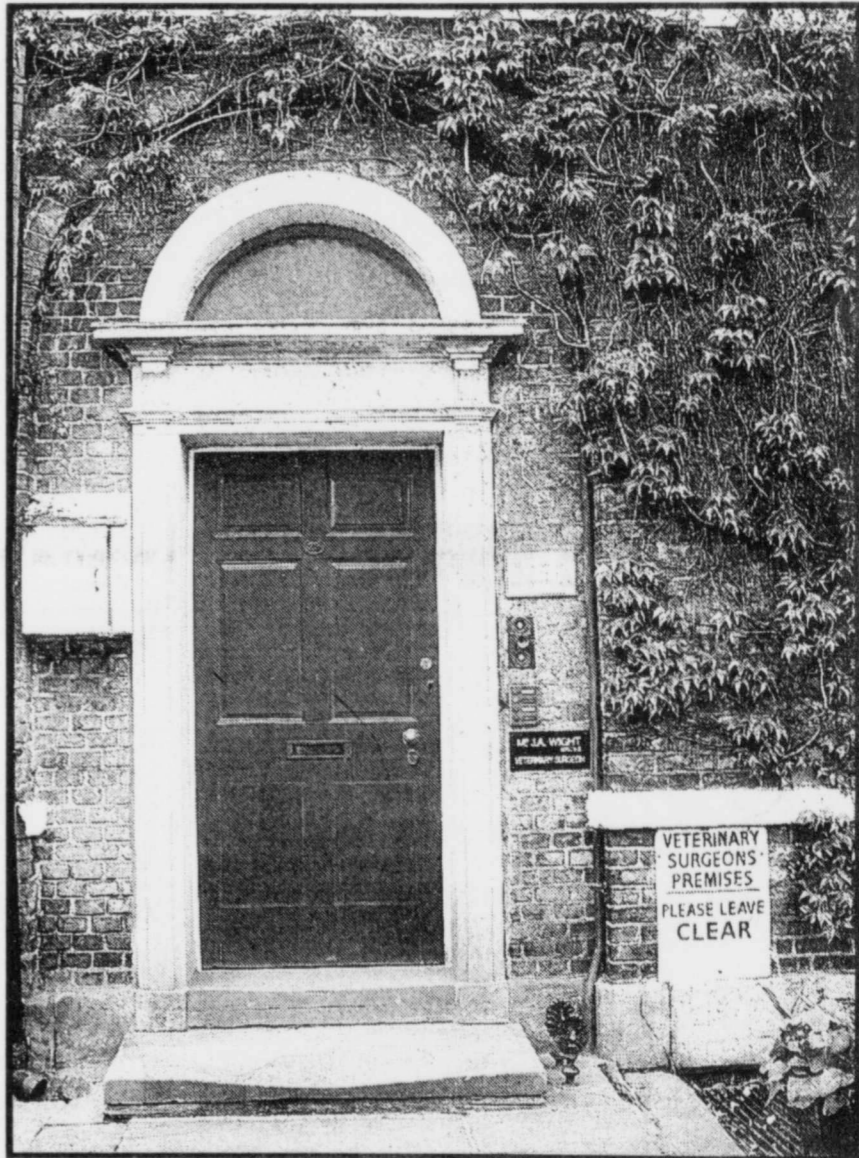

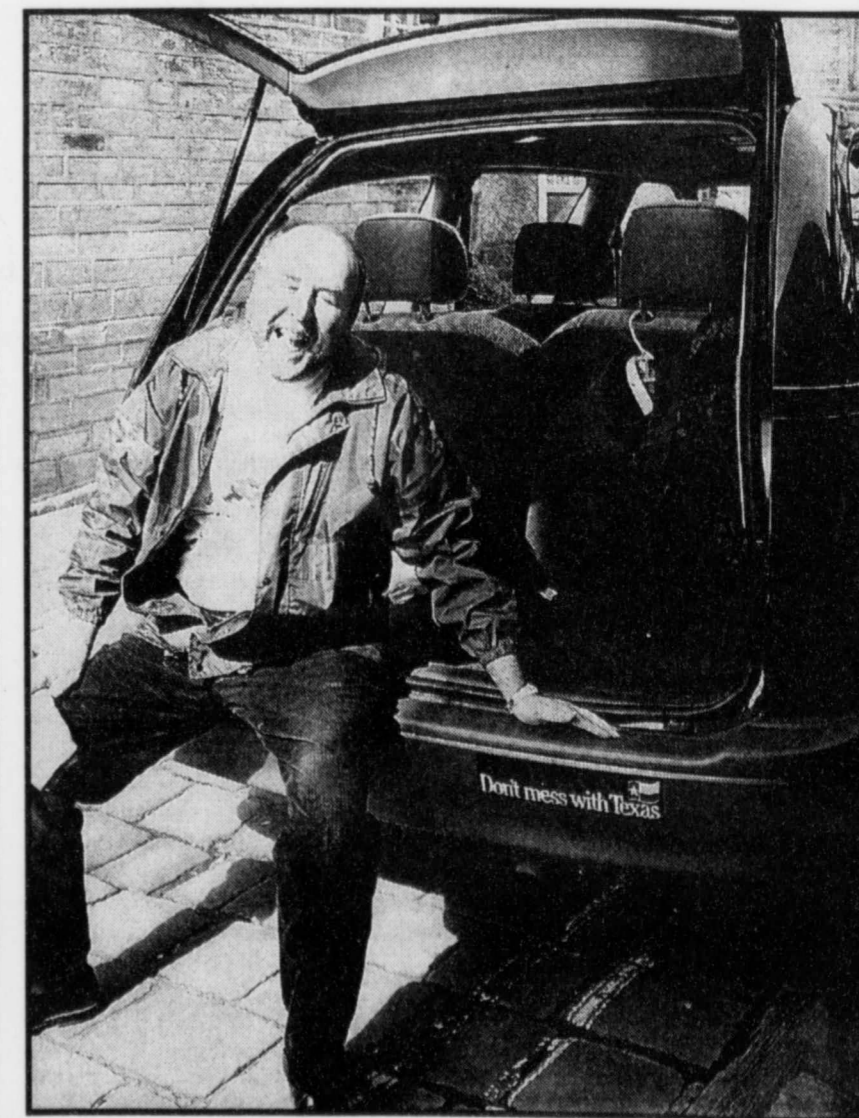
